## **News from Maidstone Council**

### **Rare object puts Maidstone on the map**

An extremely rare object, which is thought to be just one of about 20 items in the world, has been discovered at Maidstone Museum. The rare find, which is thought to be 4,000 years old, has caused a stir of excitement among the museum keepers.

The Early Cycladic III Kernos, a vessel that incorporates 6 cups around a globular basin on a fluted base, is an unusual item especially in the complete condition it is in. There are known Kernoi at the British Museum in London, the Louvre in Paris, Sevres in Paris, The Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge and The New York Metropolitan Gallery of Art and other museums.

Maidstone Museum's Kernos was brought into the limelight thanks to museum keeper, Giles Guthrie and third year Liverpool University student Kayleigh McMahon, who is currently studying archaeology and ancient history and working with Giles at the museum. Keeper of human history, Giles Guthrie said: "We have had it in the museum for some time but only recently realised how unusual it was. A Greek expert from the British Museum came down and had a look at our collection and they flagged it up as being very rare."

The Kernos was used to make offerings to the Gods and each cup would have been filled with a different substance such as milk, honey and oats. We know from descriptions that the filled vessel would have been held on the head of the devotee until sanctified by the priest. This type from this period is predominantly found at Phylakopi on Melos, the same home as the most famous sculpture in the world – the Venus de Milo.

The Kernos is decorated with basic geometric patterns in brown or black clay. The decoration of the find is not very clear but this does not negate from the importance of the vessel at all, some decoration can be seen and it follows the basic pattern known from other items from this period. Later on the vessels appear to lose the stand and develop into a different shape that is used up until the end of the Roman period. What the museum has found is a very early example that took over from the perhaps rarer stone version.

Maidstone Museum, in St Faith's Street, is now planning to have Christie's and Sotheby's to come down and value the piece and has plans to exhibit the Kernos in the future.

Giles added: “When the Kernos is exhibited it will contribute to our understanding of Prehistoric, Archaic and Classical Greek pottery, and will be the oldest piece of Greek pottery on display in the collection outstripping the Archaic ware by over a thousand years. “This item completes the story of the evolution of Greek Painted Pottery within the gallery as it portrays the beginning of the process which is then followed through until the demise of the Ancient Greek civilisation.

“When the New York Met acquired their Kernos in 2004 they described the piece as strengthening the museums holdings immeasurably, and lets hope this piece will do the same for Maidstone Museum.”

## The Grafty Gourmet

This is an authentic Greek recipe using minced lamb. Alternatively, minced or ground chicken can be used.

### Lamb Souvlaki Kebabs with Tzatziki

Serves 8

#### Kebabs

2 lbs minced lamb  
1 medium onion, finely chopped  
3 table spoons soft butter  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  teaspoon ground cumin  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  teaspoon ground allspice  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon cayenne pepper  
Pinch of salt  
Dash of fresh ground black pepper

#### Tzatziki

1 cup Greek Yoghurt (no other yoghurt will do)  
1 clove very finely crushed garlic  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
5 fresh mint leaves chopped very finely  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  cup of finely grated cucumber (de-seeded)

#### Serve with

Sliced tomato  
Thinly sliced onion  
Lightly grilled pita bread

1. Knead the minced lamb, onion, butter, spices, salt, pepper and cayenne in a bowl. Then form into sausages of about 4 - 5 inches long, and about an inch in diameter. Cover and leave in the fridge for about 1 hour.

2. For the Tzatziki, Drain the yoghurt through a sieve, to get rid of the watery content of the yoghurt. Sieve the cucumber and dry on a clean tea towel. Whisk together the yoghurt, olive oil, mint, garlic and cucumber in a bowl. Refrigerate for 30 minutes.

3. Preheat oven to 190 degrees Celsius and cook the kebabs for 12 - 14 minutes.

These can be eaten as a sandwich, by placing a couple of the kebabs in side each pita bread, and adding the sliced tomato, onion and tzatziki. Alternatively, the pita breads can be put on a plate, with the kebabs on top, covered with the salad and tzatziki, with a garnish of finely chopped parsley.

## **Grafty Garden Cuttings – March**

One or two dry, sunny days and I am out digging, weeding and trying to catch up on all the other jobs, including re-organising the borders - most of which were established in the 1980's/1990's so are overgrown, full of moss and in desperate need of restoration. It's a really good excuse to buy some of those plants and shrubs I have longed for, but not had the space to house.

It is the month to prune blueberries, roses and summer flowering shrubs such as Buddleias, Laverters and Caryopteris and to move shrubs and divide and move perennials. Everything needs feeding: plants, trees and shrubs with blood, fish and bone or growmore, the soil with organic material and the lawns treated with a dressing of moss killer, although if the latter has been applied, remember not to compost the first two or three cuttings but dispose of by other means.

Onion sets, shallots, parsnips and early potatoes should be planted/sown, but only if the ground is not too wet or cold. Test this by sitting on it: if it feels cold, do not plant! Better to wait, even if it is a little late.

Seed sowing tips: use clean pots or trays and fresh compost. I use multi purpose and mix in vermiculite, approximately two thirds compost to one third vermiculite, but special seed sowing mixes are available. I also sow into as small a pot as will comfortably accommodate the number of seeds being sown, without crowding, so I can pack as many as possible into the propagator. Fill the container to within 1 cm or 1/2 inch of the top and press down lightly to exclude air pockets: a small, round piece of flat wood, with a handle is useful for this, sow the seed evenly and cover with a layer of more compost or vermiculite. Generally, the smaller the seeds, the less covering needed. Water well, either by a can fitted with a fine rose or by immersion for a few seconds, in a few cms of water, drain and place in a propagator, in a plastic bag in the airing cupboard, on a window sill or in a cold frame covered with glass. Check frequently and bring into the light as soon as seedlings appear, or they will quickly become drawn and leggy and useless.

Seeds with no instructions may need experimenting with: try a few at a time and use different methods. Much may depend on where the plant originated. A colder winter climate may mean the seeds need stratifying: i.e. a spell of frost and cold, so either sow in autumn and stand outside, covered with glass or put the seed in a little dryish compost in a plastic bag, in the fridge for a few

weeks, then sow. A warm climate will probably mean the seeds need warmth to germinate and some, like those of many Australian natives, need smoke in the process, though throwing them on to a bonfire might be a little too drastic, but I am open to suggestions on that one!

Many seeds keep for several years but some need sowing fresh - parsnips especially should be purchased new every year, followed by peppers and small seed like Lobelia, which latter must be sown on the surface of the compost and can be mixed with a little dry silver sand to aid even distribution.

## The March Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Aquarius at the start of the month, and moves into Pisces on the 12<sup>th</sup>. Now here is good news for everyone after a long cold winter, the Spring Equinox occurs on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> March, when the Sun crosses the celestial equator from south to north, and British Summer Time begins on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> March, when clocks should go forward one hour.

Full Moon occurs on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> March, and New Moon on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> March, and should be visible in the western sky after sunset.

Throughout March, Mercury is rising only minutes before the Sun, and is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun). So again we will not be able to see this planet.

I am afraid that Venus is coming to the end of its splendid appearance as the 'Evening Star'. At the beginning of the month it is high in the western sky at sunset, but every night it appears a little lower, and sets a little earlier.

As I reported last month, both Mars and Jupiter will not be easily visible until after the summer. I will return to Mars at the end of this article.

Saturn is in opposition to the Sun on 8<sup>th</sup> March, and is ideal for viewing throughout the month. Relative to the stars, it is moving very slowly north-westwards in the constellation of Leo. Through a telescope its rings should be clearly visible, together with many of its moons, the largest and brightest of which is Titan.

Now back to Mars. In last January's article I mentioned that Nasa's Reconnaissance Orbiter had spotted deposits of Carbonate, which is formed in neutral or alkaline water, which counters the theory that the water on Mars was at one time acidic. Now scientists are reporting that life could exist on Mars due to salts, which stop water from turning into ice. Despite very low temperatures, perchlorates in the soil which act as antifreeze, suggest that there could be liquid water below the surface, increasing the chances of life.

### **The Voices of Classic FM come to Maidstone!!**

If you ever listen to Classic FM, you may have heard of Harry Christopher's world famous choir, The Sixteen who sing at famous concert halls worldwide make CDs and were the starring performers in a four part television series about sacred music over Christmas. In England, they are quite simply "The Voices of Classic FM". Maidstone Choral Union's new Music Director, Martin Hindmarsh, has persuaded these fantastic singers to be part of the next MCU concert, Bach's St John Passion.

The St John Passion is a hauntingly beautiful and moving work that tells the story of Christ's suffering and death over the events of Good Friday as told in the gospel of John. The choir sings the part of the crowd witnessing these events and joining in with their cries for blood. The choir also sings, at various points through the story, some of the most beautiful "chorales" or short pieces that bring home the meaning of the events. For a Christian, this music makes a very moving meditation for Easter.

Maidstone Choral Union is a well established choir, performing four major concerts a year at Mote Hall, a very comfortable venue at the Leisure Centre. It brings high quality music to Maidstone. ## **The Month's Good Cause**

### **Christian Blind Mission (CBM)**

Although from time to time we have featured charities for the blind in our monthly slot, it is six years since we wrote about CBM, a non-denominational, broad-based Christian charity which provides medical help to people who are blind or at risk of blindness in the poorest areas of the world. Their commitment is to "the poorest of the poor", and today the difficulty involved with taking sight to blind people can be just as great as it was when CMB was founded over 70 years ago. In 2002 we told about their work in Sudan, a country buffeted by civil war, chronic political instability, adverse weather conditions and extreme poverty, where life has been made even more difficult by famine and disease. The work there continues, and currently they are appealing for assistance for their work with their partners in the refugee camps in The Congo, where the widespread violence has left thousands at risk of life-long

disability. Another example of their work is provided by one of their workers who is a surgeon who spends two weeks of every month in his hospital in Blackpool, but the rest of his time as one of only two surgeons serving seven million people in the North of Malawi. The CBM workers believe that “the joy and satisfaction of the work – knowing that many people have received sight again and a new quality of life – far outweighs the risks involved”.

## Christian Message – March 2009

I have been gardening with my chainsaw again. Perhaps gardening is the wrong word – more like hacking and clearing.

We have plans to grow some fruit trees and soft fruit. And as we want to have a garden to sit in and enjoy as well as be productive, we are planning flower borders, shrub beds, and so on. But we can't start planting yet.

When we moved here 4 months ago, the garden was quite neglected; the house had been empty for 2 years. So large areas were head-high in weeds, brambles and Japanese knotweed. The hedges were all 20 feet high and everything was overgrown; it was all quite dark and depressing. We couldn't plant anything because there was no space and there was no sunlight to help anything grow.

In order for new growth to come, the old and dead wood and the weeds have to be dealt with. So I've been clearing, preparing the garden for new plants. It's very hard work and just now it looks terrible. There is mess everywhere, piles of weeds and brambles and dead old trees and branches. It takes the eyes of faith to believe that it will ever look like a garden. But, amazingly, now there's some light, snowdrops and aconites have popped up.

All this, of course, is so much like our own lives. While we're not looking, things creep in, fill up the space and take over. And of course it feels comfortable, because we've got used to it as it's slowly grown. Maybe it's attitudes to other people - strangers, neighbours, relatives - that we've allowed to become rotten. Maybe it's attitudes to our money and possessions that we have allowed to possess us. Maybe it's anger, bitterness and unforgiveness that have grown and taken over. Maybe it's our attitudes to morality and ethics that we've allowed to decay until they're worthless.

In the recent bestselling novel "The Shack", an angry and grieving man has an encounter with God. At one point he finds himself in a garden, pulling up plants and preparing the ground for new ones. It's hard and painful work. But it turns out that the garden is an image of his own self and the work allows him to forgive and be renewed.

As we begin Lent, leading up to Easter, why not spend some time weeding and clearing the garden of your own life? How about joining a Lent group, a START group or reading "The Shack"? You could begin with an Ash Wednesday Service on the 25<sup>th</sup> February: Wednesday at 9.30am in St Mary's, Lenham or 7.30pm at St John's, Harrietsham. Feel free to contact me for further details.
