We will meet as usual at the pond. We hope to carry out a number of tasks including -


Planting up a border next to the tower at Woodend.

Planning for the Autumn

Sometimes it is not possible to attend all the events but there are one or two things you could do at home that would make a big difference in the Autumn.

There are no Foxgloves in the gardens even though conditions should suit them. If you have the space at home could you sow a few seeds of the native foxglove and once they have germinated grow them on to a decent size for planting out in September.

There are quite a few areas of primroses but no cowslips. If you have cowslips in the garden, why not divide some of the bigger clumps and pot up a few, again to be planted on one of the grassy banks in the Autumn. The best time to do this is shortly after they have finished flowering.

Yay Coffee

Did you know you can get a decent cup of coffee at Woodend courtesy of Yay Coffee. This Spring they are expanding outside so you can sit on the terrace with your drink and admire the work we are doing on the gardens. They are open from Tuesday to Saturday each week between 9 and 5.
