Horsmonden Historical Society

This month I will give a brief description of two other Kentish characters who are of important historical interest.

Born at Biddenden to a wealthy family in 1100, Mary & Eliza Chulkhurst are thought to be the earliest known Siamese twins joined at the hips & shoulders. They lived for 34 years. When Mary fell ill & died Eliza was asked if she wanted to be separated from her twin. She replied, "We came together, we will go together". She died 6 hours later.

The Church at Biddenden received valuable lands in perpetuity from the family estate and the rent from this provides for today's poor of the village. In memory of this commemorative cakes, stamped with an impression of the twins, are made & distributed every Easter Monday in the village. Cheese & Ale were also supplied. Today Beer is no longer part of it - more's the pity! Many years ago, in the late 70's, I acquired two cakes or should I say two biscuits which were hard as rocks! I varnished them, drilled a hole in each and hung them in the Inglenook. They disappeared some years later.

The other historical character is Anne Boleyn (1500-1536). Henry VIII's most celebrated wife who was born at Hever castle, near Edenbridge, the daughter of the Sheriff of Kent. When she made her first appearance at the Court of King Henry she caused such a sensation that Henry duly divorced Catherine of Aragon and made Anne his bride. However, her strong minded independence caused the monarch to transfer his affections to Jane Seymour and Anne was consigned to the Tower before being executed. Her ghost is still said to walk the corridors of Hever Castle!

After lockdown is all over and we get back to some sense of normality, both Hever Castle and Biddenden on Easter Monday are well with a visit.

Dear Friends

As we write it is the day before Ascension Day and this will mark the beginning of a 9 day prayer initiative by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York that began in 2016 in this country, but has now become a global movement of prayer. It is called



'Thy Kingdom Come' - and seeks to encourage people to pray 'Thy Kingdom Come in people's lives' i.e. that people will discover the love of Christ and welcome him as their King.

The initiative begins on Ascension Day and ends at Pentecost, so I suspect it will have just ended as you read this.

But a prayer initiative seems particularly poignant this year as many of us have found ourselves praying increasingly for God's help, healing and protection. Pastor Agu Irukwu President of the Pentecostal Church has said, "At no time in living memory has the Church needed to pray as much as it does now, as we grapple with the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic." And Roman Catholic Cardinal, Vincent Nichols, has encouraged people saying: "Prayer knows no boundaries or obstacles. Prayer cannot be 'locked down'. Lord, send us your Holy Spirit and the freedom that is the Spirit's gift."

Whether or not we've been involved in 'Thy Kingdom Come', the encouraged way to pray is a simple one and which may be of help now if we are floundering in our prayers. Jesus' disciples asked him to teach them to pray, and he simply said, 'when you pray say: Our Father in heaven' And so when the church began, and for many years after, the Lord's prayer would have been



the one that was continually recited when people said their prayers, and it perhaps encapsulates all that we need to pray. 'Thy Kingdom Come' encourages us to return to praying it continually: praying it slowly, reflecting on the different phrases, and allowing the Lord to guide us in our praying. The recent 'Prayer Course' which St Margaret's ran was likewise based on the Lord's Prayer, and so can we encourage you in your prayers as you simply and slowly pray each day: 'Our Father in heaven' And so, as we pray, may we discover his presence with us, and may we each know more of Christ's Kingdom and his love in our lives.

CV-19 v VE-75 - a Contrast?

As I write this, we and many others around the world have been celebrating the 75th Anniversary of the first Victory in Europe Day on the 8th of May 1945. Yet because of this other, new 'conflict' Covid-19 (or what we knew only a few days ago as the Coronavirus) our celebrations took place at best in our front gardens, distancing ourselves as instructed from our neighbours. Indoors. we saw and heard some heroic and some very simple stories of both men (mostly) who fought and died during the Second World War itself, and those, mostly women and older folk, who, though not perhaps in the front lines, were drawn into the dreadful conflict in so many ways - endless stories of fear and death, shortages of food and ever-present danger. So hard to imagine how it must have been...

Yet...Is it so hard to imagine?

Here we are facing another, different type of World War contending again with stories of fear and death, difficulties with food and certainly ever present danger. But now we are facing a totally invisible enemy in the form of a little virus, like the flu, yet which, as I write this, has infected over 4,000,000 people around the world and already killed nearly 300,000! And how almost random it seems to be. Like a bomb, the virus doesn't discriminate between its victims, attacking all who get in its way although it does seem able to pick out the weak and the vulnerable.

Yet...something amazing seems to be happening - just as in wartime, these difficult days seem to be bringing out the best (though sadly sometimes the worst!) in so many people and neighbourhoods. Not only do we have new 'heroes' like the redoubtable Capt Tom, but there have again been wonderful stories of loving, caring and sharing people going well out of their ways even to their own danger – to help. In our lovely little village here in Horsmonden we see neighbour helping neighbour, new groups being set up to stay in touch with the vulnerable, postmen doing jobs other than posting letters and, of course, our own Heath Stores and Pharmacy who daily put themselves in the 'front line' doing all they can to allow us stay home and keep safe. And incidentally, thank you so much, Tim and Trish, for putting our St Margaret's services online on Facebook for all to see!

This caring nature has its foundation in love, of course, and it is this love which is the most important instruction from Jesus – "This is my commandment, that you love one another, even as I have loved you." (John 15; 17). Let us all hope - and pray - that once this horrid virus has been defeated we can all of us hold on to this loving and creative attitude and keep the new friends we have made.

Housing Needs Survey Report

In January you will recall that you received a survey form requesting your views concerning the provision of housing for those residents in need of assistance. We have now received the report from the Rural Housing Enabler, who undertook the survey, and you can view this report on the Horsmonden Neighbourhood Plan website.

Draft Infrastructure Delivery Plan TWBC Planning have published their 'Draft Infrastructure Delivery Plan'. Here they detail the key updates to the infrastructure required to support the increase and future needs and demands for the borough to support new development and a growing population, as envisaged through the Council's emerging Draft Local Plan. A brief outline of the provisions for Horsmonden are on the 'Delivery Schedule' PAGE 109 (this page is in landscape, you will need to rotate the view to read it). Meanwhile, as in many other cases, the Steering Group are working in isolation and using Zoom for our informal meetings. We are striving to produce a discussion document outlining the various issues and requirements that we need to address in order to complete our Neighbourhood Plan. Alongside these issues we aim to detail a selection of the options available to us as suggested by our consultants, taking into account the information provided by the public surveys and various village meetings. We hope to circulate this for your vital comment once we have had further discussions with TWBC and AECOM. Meantime please continue to keep safe and well - and rejoice that we live where we do! as serious problems for people who are vulnerable to both smoke and the virus, such as those with asthma and other respiratory conditions.

Until the garden waste collections have cleared the backlog of waste, here are a few ideas:

- Leave grass cuttings on the lawn to dry out or scatter the cuttings round flower beds where they will rot down and provide nutrients for plants as well as helping to suppress weeds.
- Create a compost heap. Pile garden waste here as well as fruit and vegetable peelings, egg shells and coffee grounds. The compost created will help nourish the garden in the coming weeks and months.
- Group pruned branches into bundles to create shelters for small animals, bugs and bees.

While we may be able to spend a little more time in the countryside at the moment, please do keep a look-out for problems with the public footpaths and report them to Kent County Council – missing markers, broken stiles or paths which seem to go nowhere because a sign has fallen over. "Keeping Local History Alive"

Capel Manor



Situated along Grovehurst Lane, just off the Goudhurst Road, Capel Manor was built between 1859 and 1862 for John Francis Austen second cousin to the novelist Jane Austen. The family ceased living here around 1925 and the manor began to fall into disrepair. During the Second World War the house and grounds were used as a base for many military units and a unit of the Fire Service. After the War the house, in very poor condition, gradually deteriorated so much that in 1966 it was demolished. The foundations survived, as did the arcaded terrace and balustrades, as well as remains of the winter garden. In 1970 the new Capel Manor House, a glass enclosed design, now a Gradell Listed Building was built.



Memories of Capel Manor by Bev Sedley (nee Dobbs)

When I was a child in the 1950s (I was born in 1947), Capel Manor was one of the most wonderful places in the world to me, a wild garden of decaying statues and hidden beauties.

I think my Auntie Ethel first took me there – she was my great aunt, Nanna's unmarried sister, Ethel Fermor, who moved from the East End of London after the war to live next door to us at Spring Farm. She would take me and my younger sister, Jenny, over the farm and countryside and "up the Manor", naming every wild flower as she



went: milkmaids, jack-by-the-hedge, purple loosestrife, ground ivy, speedwell. Soon Jenny and I went down the road to Capel Cross on our own, going up the little path through the field to the small side gate of the manor, the one past the old overgrown tennis courts, surrounded by foxgloves. This brought us out from the right to the vast terrace in front of the ruined house, edged with pedestals from which most of the statuary had been broken off, shot away by the bored, edgy soldiers billeted here during the war. One day we dared to go in through a small basement door and found a roomful of broken figures tidied away. We hardly



ever went into the main house – the rooms were empty and the plaster pock-marked by bullets.

From the centre of the terrace was an enormous sweep of staircase, truly majestic – it made us feel very special to walk down it slowly and carefully, heads held high. It led to stone- edged formal beds, now full of weeds, and in the corner, at the beginning of a much smaller staircase, was a little gazebo (I suppose it was), but it seemed like a little open temple to me, where you could sit and look out over the wild trees. It was full of graffiti, but I don't remember what was written, just a list of names.

If you went further down the narrow steps past the temple, the path got very over-



shadowed and quite scary. We called this the "Fox's hole"- and had to dare each other to pass the "fox" lurking at the side of a dark, still pool. (I think it was probably the dead stump of a tree fern, as it was really shaggy-looking.) We never dared to go up close to investigate, just used to hurry through the gloomy trees in case the fox came after us. Probably it was the remains of a Victorian stumpery – although it was many decades before I heard that word.

Behind the vast house was our favourite place, the enormous conservatory – most of the glass was broken, just lying on the ground, so we had to be careful, but the towering camellia trees (and they were tree, not bushes – taller than any I have seen since) were absolutely spectacular in spring (red, white, pink) and the conservatory still provided a bit of shelter, although the petals did go brown in a particularly hard frost. Later came tiny tea roses, climbing over the walls.



We thought the manor was a very romantic place, but melancholy – Auntie Ethel told us that the man who built it had done it in the Italian style for his wife, but she died before she ever saw it. I believe he was one of the Austen family. I'm not sure when our family bought the house, whether before, during or just after the war, but Auntie Lisa (my mother's oldest sister, Elsie Larkin), told me she had persuaded her uncle (married to her Auntie Minnie, Auntie Ethel's sister) to buy it to turn into a nursing home (I'm not quite sure what kind of home). After the war, nothing came of that.

If you receive emails or texts about coronavirus from someone you don't know, or from an unusual email address or mobile number, don't click on any links or buy anything. Never give money or personal details to someone you don't know or trust - for example someone who knocks on the door and offers to help.

Get in touch with us if you would like more information about spotting a scam, or what to do if you think you've been scammed.

Reporting a scam

You might be able to stop others from being scammed if you report a scam. You should report the scam to more than one organisation - report it to:

- the Citizens Advice consumer helpline 0808 223 1133
- the police contact them immediately by calling 101 if the scammer is in your area or if you've transferred money to the scammer in the last 24 hours
- Action Fraud online at https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/reporting-fraud-and-cyber-crime) or by calling 0300 123 2040
- HMRC phishing team contact them by email on phishing@hmrc.gov.uk if you've received a suspicious email, text message or phone call from HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC)
- Royal Mail contact them by email on scam.mail@royalmail.com or call 0800 011 3466 if you've been scammed by post

Give as much information as you can - for example, dates, names and email addresses.

If you've been threatened with violence, report it to the police on 101.
