

Parish Council Playing Field Survey

"Middleton Cum Fordley Parish Council would like to thank all respondents for their time and contribution in completing the Resident survey of the Playing Field.

43% of recipients responded to the survey. Next steps include pulling together costs for the various proposed changes and improvements.

We have pulled out the following analysis: - "

The 2024 residents survey conducted by the Middleton Cum Fordley Parish Council gathered feedback from 52 respondents on the usage and potential improvements to the local playing field. The survey showed varied levels of engagement, with a significant number visiting the recreation ground regularly: 31% visited weekly, and another 26% visited daily. The main reasons for visiting included attending village events 80%, dog walking 59%, and using play equipment with children 46%.

When respondents were asked about desired changes or additions, top suggestions included the need for more rubbish bins 37%, train and station upgrade 42% and upgraded children's play equipment 44%. There was positive support for facilities promoting adult well-being, with 57% favouring adult exercise equipment and 53% supporting a trim trail.

A proposed nature-led rewilding area garnered considerable approval, with 69% of respondents backing it. Specific environmental enhancements suggested included bird boxes 88%, bat boxes, and bug hotels 80% each. Proposals for a dedicated and secure dog exercise area had mixed responses, with 38% in favour, alongside requests for additional dog waste bins 48%.

In terms of staying informed about developments, 65% of respondents expressed interest in being updated. The survey reflects residents' active interest in maintaining and enhancing the communal space to cater to a broad range of activities and user needs.

Middleton Dark Skies

December Hightlights


Planets on View. Venus is shining not short of its very brightest, out in the south western sky, setting at around 8.00 PM. On the 4th and 5th of December, Venus can be seen sitting next to the crescent Moon. Venus is one of only three celestial bodies to cast a shadow on earth, the others being the Sun and the Moon! Mars rises in the east at around 7.00PM. As the month progresses Mars will double in brightness, with its red/orange colour becoming very noticeable. Jupiter will be visible throughout the night as it tracks from east to west. It's extremely bright this month and will be at it's closest to the Earth on the 6th. Take a look through a telescope or binoculars for a glimpse of Jupiter's four largest moons. They orbit Jupiter relatively fast, so can be seen to change positions each night. It may be possible to pick out some of the cloud banding on Jupiter, but when Jupiter is so bright it can be quite a challenge to see them. Saturn is difficult to see now as it fades away into the SW, setting at around 11 PM.

<u>Constellations.</u> No one constellation to look out for this month, just look south on a clear night to see the winter constellations arcing across the sky. The most prominent of these is Orion, The Hunter, facing off to Taurus, The Bull, and accompanied by his hunting dogs, Canis Major and Canis Minor. Canis Major contains Sirius, which, after the Sun, is the brightest star visible from Earth, sitting just below and to the left of Orion. Gemini and Auriga are also high up in the southern sky. It's well worth a look through a telescope or binoculars at the sword of Orion, hanging below the three stars that make up his belt. The sword contains the Orion Nebula and will appear as a fuzzy area of light half way down the sword. The star Betelgeuse sits at the top left corner of Orion, and can be seen to be orange in colour, even with the naked eye. It is classified as a Red Giant star, and is believed to be approaching the end of its lifespan, due to its erratic brightening and dimming over the last few years.

<u>The Moon.</u> Known as the Cold Moon or Long Night Moon this month, enough said! Full moon occurs on the 15th. Look out for the moon sitting just above Jupiter on the 14th.

<u>Meteor Showers.</u> The Geminids peak on the 15th, but this also coincides with the full moon, which is practically sitting at the radiant of the shower in the constellation of Gemini, making observations all but impossible. But look a week before or after the full moon and you may be in luck.

<u>Santa Claus</u> Don't forget to follow Santas progress on Christmas Eve on one of the many tracking websites available. Apparently, his average speed to visit all the children around the world needs to be up around 3 million miles per hour, although obviously not between Leiston and Yoxford! Good job it's a magic sleigh.

December Nature Notes

The reason why our ancestors ate birds at Christmas was because both domestic and wildfowl were at their very best at this turning point of the year. Food, particularly in the wild, was much scarcer in the later winter months, so it made sense to eat fowl when they were fat and succulent. In fact, if any bird has a claim to being the original Christmas fowl, it was the swan – though not any old swan. Only six-month old cygnets, which had been fattened up in a separate pond from their parents on barley and grass, would fit the bill. Adult swan was too tough. These were Mute swans and are protected as wild birds now. It is illegal to keep or kill them, although, Fellows of St John's College Cambridge and members the Royal Family are legally allowed to eat unmarked swans. The Crown still retains the right to ownership of all unmarked mute swans in open water, but nowadays the monarch only exercises their ownership on certain stretches of the Thames and its surrounding tributaries. However, other landowners have been able to possess swans since the 15th Century, but only those of a certain income as ordained by the crown. This made swans a valuable commodity, with privately owned birds being given unique marks etched into the beak. Only marked swans could be eaten, and though swan for Christmas dinner fell out of fashion in the 1700's, that law that remained in place until 1998.

Mute swans are a familiar and impressive sight in Britain and despite their name have some distinctive calls. They are one of Britain's largest and heaviest birds, with a wingspan of up to 2.4 metres. Male swans are highly territorial and first threaten intruders, striking an aggressive pose with wings arched over their back, before charging at them to chase them off. Some birds stay in their territories all year, while others move short distances

and form winter flocks. In cold weather, some birds arrive from Europe into eastern England

However, Mute swans are not the only species of swan that we have in Britain; every winter thousands of Whooper swans from Iceland and Bewick's swans from Arctic Russia migrate into Britain to spend the winter here. Both these species of swan are annual visitors to Suffolk, mostly on the coast and towards the Fens. Telling these two species apart can be tricky, and although the Whooper Swan is much larger, about the size of a Mute swan, this is often difficult to judge from a distance, with a longer neck.



The best character to separate them is the colour and shape of the bill. Unlike the large orange bill of a Mute swan both Bewick and Whooper swans have black and yellow bills, but Whooper's have a larger more pointed bill with a large triangular patch of yellow, compared to the proportionally stouter bill with more black and less yellow of a Bewick swan.

2 Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None.

3 Public Forum.

A member of the public from Fordley Road voiced their discontent at the current works being carried out by SCC Highways and follow up works by SZC, including the removal of trees on their property without their knowledge. Cllr Macdowell advised that the issue be raised with County Councillor Richard Smith, their elected representative.

District Cllr Whitelock reported the following:

East Suffolk Council has unveiled its plans for the kerbside collections of small electrical items in East Suffolk. The initial collections will begin later this month with the hope that 120,000 households in the local community will get behind its drive to recycle their electricals. The new kerbside collections will enable residents to leave small electrical items on top of their wheeled bins on their usual bin collection day and items will then be collected by the refuse crew and taken away for recycling. East Suffolk Council is encouraging residents to re-use, reduce and recycle this festive season to help keep costs down and help the environment.

A new 'Circular Christmas' campaign will promote shopping locally, sustainable gifting and recycling of festive waste from now until the New Year – to help people manage the expense of this holiday season and strengthen environmental awareness in East Suffolk.

Students at Alde Valley Academy in Leiston are benefitting from a new breakfast club, providing food ahead of the school day to help improve their concentration and wellbeing.

4 Minutes

a) The Council approved the minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 8 October 2024.

- b) Matters arising and Action Points
- Ownership of the Village Hall. The Parish Council is the Custodian Trustee of the Village Hall, which is registered in the name of the Parish Council. The management of the Village Hall is the responsibility of the Village Hall Committee.
 - Cllr Cusack to arrange for cutting of the hedge at the burial ground c/f.
- 'Destructive' archaeological works. Concern over this matter has been raised by many within the village. It is understood that it was never intended that only archaeological works would be taking place at this time, but also clearing of the areas ready for construction works in Spring next year.
 - Cllr Piercy has provided District Councillor Whitelock with information regarding Causeway Farm.
 - The Clerk has provided a piece for the November newsletter re: Young People Taking Action.
 - Cllr Macdowell is awaiting a response from SZC regarding signage at Trust Farm.

5 Sizewell C and other Energy Projects

The Clerk reported back from the October Sizewell C Main Development Site Forum.

- To date 9 vehicles have been provided with an identity sticker. It is understood that more will be added as HGV companies are employed.
 - The latest on the SZC Link Road is continued archaeology.
- Sole use of Pontins, in Lowestoft, to take place in January 2025 with return to public use after the construction period. SZC staff will be bused to site from Pontins. The number of buses is currently an unknown.
- SZC are planning to improve frequency and volume of contact with town and parish councils by way of more detailed monthly bulletins.
- The Community Fund have met twice. £300,000 has been allocated to date (round 1), round 2 closed on 6 October with a decision being made in January. Round 3 will close on 19 January with a decision expected in April.
- SZC assured the meeting that they are 'spreading the word' regarding private renting, to prevent Leiston from being flooded.
- Drone footage was shown of the entire site, demonstrating the vastness and progress of the project. This can be viewed at the shop in Leiston.
 - SZC are looking into an Observation Platform.
 - SZC are moving towards an SMS system to advise of road closures (more suited to short notice closures).

Cllr Lacey reported back from the Northern Transport Meeting

- The biggest topic raised by many parish councils was the devastation caused by the 'archaeological' works.
- Housing grants, which are now available, come under two bands; Band 1 grants up to £3,000 for minor works to create an extra bedroom and Band 2 grants up to £7,000 for major works. Room(s) must be made available to SZC workers and rent collected.
- The drone footage (mentioned above) was also shared, with mention given at this PC meeting to the mass destruction.
- A request to have access to the detailed construction phase program was sought after the meeting, but no information was provided.
 - EDF report that new rail links are progressing well.
 - B1122 speed enforcement cameras should be in place by the end of Q1.
- B1122/25 junction speed limit. The request for the 500m distance between Yewtree Corner to the junction of the B1122/25 be changed from 60mph 30mph was raised. This will be considered by SZC and the police.
- There will be two large compound areas in Littlemoor Road, both semi-permanent structures, to be used now and during the construction of the SLR.

Cllr Lacey offered his support for the next transport meeting.

Cllrs Macdowell and Thorpe met with the B1125 planners to discuss the footpath(s) and confirm that this is in hand.

A member of the public advised that they have, on more than one occasion, been denied access to Littlemoor Road. Cllr Cusack has experienced the same. It is understood that cleaning of the road takes place, for safety reasons, at the end of the day, however, refusal has been experienced in the morning. Littlemoor Road is the diversion route whilst Fordley Road is closed.

It was reported that the Nautilus Interconnector project is now going to connect into the Isle of Grain in Kent, rather than East Suffolk. This does not change the plan for a cable corridor through the Parish for the LionLink interconnector.

6 Councillors Reports

- a) Village Hall. No report
- b) Middleton Primary School. The meeting was advised that numbers are low at the school.
- c) Highways, footpaths and trees. No report
- d) <u>Middleton Moor</u>. The meeting was reminded that general management and maintenance of the Moor lies with the Middleton Moor Committee. A member of the committee has advised Cllr Cusack that the MMC would like to arrange for the clearing of shrub around two of the ponds. A quote has been received for 4/6 hours work @ £55 per hour, equating to approximately £300. This was agreed. Action: Cllr Cusack to give the go ahead for the works.
- e) <u>Causeway Farm.</u> It was confirmed at the meeting that the tenancy ends in Spring of next year, not October of this year, as previously advised. Following an informal conversation, SCC have reacted positively to the village's thoughts and ideas.

It is the PC's intention to acquire and develop Hastoe Field, representing 10 acres of land adjacent the recreation ground (totalling approximately 16 acres). A concept plan is available for viewing on the village website, with feedback already received. To purchase the field will cost approximately £100,000 with a further £50,000 anticipated for development. It is the PC's intention to put in a grant request to the SZC Community Fund.

It was agreed that a collective view from the village residents would aid the process, and another public meeting was suggested and agreed upon. This will take place in the New Year. It is anticipated that the grant submission will take place March/April time.

It was agreed by the PC to start the application process for the SZC committee fund, this will include the impact that SZC has and continues to have on the village; primarily loss of access to green space, public rights of way being diverted, crossing of the link road, Sizewell Marshes and the beach being inaccessible and the cutting down of trees at Kenton Hills. It will be easy to demonstrate the villager's access to health-giving green spaces and biodiversity has been limited by the project. Sarah Mortimer from the SZC Community Fund has offered assistance in completion of applications. As part of the process the PC must produce several documents, including a Safeguarding Policy and an Equality/Diversity Policy, which the PC do not currently hold. Action: Clerk to produce these two policies. As part of the funding offer, the PC must be able to demonstrate that the project can continue to operate beyond the funding period. To maintain the area, it is anticipated that we will need to employ a grounds person responsible for carrying out the initial setting up work and then maintaining the area in terms of hedge cutting, grass mowing, path clearing etc. This role would also include the maintenance of the recreation ground with the possibility of managing other areas owned by the PC in the village. This will also be represented in the bid for a grant. Beyond the three-year period, this cost will be added to the Precept.

Cllr Piercy offered to investigate other funding opportunities that may be put towards this project. Cllr Whitelock requested that District Councillors be invited to the village meeting in January. It was agreed to make Causeway Farm an independent agenda item at future meetings.

- 11 Flooding/Maintenance/Emergency Plan. Cllrs Cusack and Piercy attended the Emergency Workshop, presented by SCC, on 25 October. The PC have no statutory obligation to prepare an Emergency Plan, however, it is good practice to do so. The question was raised as to what the village would do if it were cut off and, in particular, the interim period before help could get into the village. It was agreed that the parish need to plan for such an event and that village residents need to be involved. An invitation will be put in the next newsletter inviting anyone who is interested in becoming involved with the Emergency Committee, to contact the clerk. Action: Clerk to prepare a piece for the newsletter.

Matters for discussion

<u>Playground Inspector</u>. The Clerk reported that the search for an inspector is ongoing. Action: Cllr Rowe to supply the Clerk with possible contacts.

<u>Survey</u>. Next steps will involve sourcing high-level costs to inform later decisions. It was suggested and agreed that funding/grant options should become part of the Hastoe Field/SZC Community Fund bid and that this will be added to the agenda for the proposed village meeting in January. In the meantime, Cllr Rowe will pursue other grants, specific to bat and bird boxes, for example.

Sizewell C Grant – Adult Exercise Equipment. This will form part of the grant application mentioned above.

<u>Zipwire</u>. Cllr Cusack has been in touch with Ryan Finch who previously worked for Eastern Play Services, as part of the inspection team and whose experience lies in repairing and installing play equipment, he has also worked on Middleton Recreation Ground in the past. Mr Finch is now setting up his own business and has been invited by Cllr Cusack to submit a quote for removal and disposal of the zipwire. Quote, as follows:

£1110 for removal of the zip wire, safety netting and safety surface. Reinstate with soil and grass. Posts to be cut off at ground level. The quote was agreed. Action: Cllr Cusack to advise accordingly.

Discussions regarding a replacement for the zipwire continue. (Previous Minutes refer to the decommissioning of the current zipwire and the cost involved in purchasing a new one.)

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Spending. It was confirmed that CIL money may be used for purchasing play equipment.

<u>Pavilion Pathway</u>. It was suggested that a hard path from the car park to the pavilion, through the pedestrian gate would allow easier access during the winter months. This could be CIL funded, and it was agreed to seek quotes. It was confirmed that there is no heating in the Pavilion and that use during winter months would require the purchase of electric heaters (CIL funded also). Action: Cllr Cusack to request a quote from Ryan Finch and Cllr Lacey to request a quote from Nice Touch Landscapes.

Waste and Dog Bins. The Clerk provided costs, as follows:-

Topsy 2000, 90 litres. £292.32 + VAT, plus £250 + VAT for installation.
