TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD - JANUARY 2013

The first day of January brings with it fresh resolutions, headaches, and a wish for a darkened room. We rush into the New Year with every good intention, but we know in our heart of hearts that however much we wish for our resolutions to bear fruit, we seem always to muddle on in the same old way. The care and maintenance of the churchyard is a case in point. Every year I resolve to do more but find I do less! Fortunately I have been helped over the years by lads from the village, - Alex Reid, David and Matthew Todd and this year by Hamish Strathern; I owe them all a great thank you. This summer I neglected the churchyard because I was preparing to move down the road from 'Ashdene' to 'The Scypen'. But we had a very good work party day when some 30 helpers turned up to save the day. Since that day in October Kevin Milner has stepped in and almost single-handedly has brought about a great transformation in the appearance of the churchyard and I am most grateful to him.

As we enter 2013 we seem to be beset with so many problems, a double-dip recession, global warming and widespread global unrest, so that it is natural to hope and wish for improvement in all sorts of areas. During my recent move I lost telephone and broadband for about two weeks and even as I type this I still do not have e-mails. This, in an age when instant communication seems to be so vital, has made me remember the words of St Paul stressing the value of Faith, Hope and Charity and Love - and this buoys me up, together with millions of others, with a hope that 2013 will see improvement. With this in mind I would like to offer this poem by Emily Dickinson the American poet. I have tried to keep this 'Tales from Churchyard' short, as at this time of the year everyone has so many other things to do. In doing so I keep faith with my old teacher of English in Wales who used to say of any piece of serious writing that it should be like a woman's skirt - long enough to cover the essentials but short enough to keep one's interest.

'Hope is the thing with feathers that perches in the soul, And sings the tune - without the words, and never stops at all, And sweetest in the gale is heard; and sore must be the storm That could abash the little bird, That kept so many warm. I've heard it in the chillest land, and on the strangest sea; Yet, never, in extremity, It asked a crumb of me.'

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD: FEBRUARY 2013

The Newspapers, Radio and TV channels have been saturated with opinions about the snow and the wintery conditions - Why? We should expect it and be prepared for it. Winter is not winter without snow and hard frosts. Twenty years or so ago when I used to do a lot of shooting it was usual for October and November mornings to be glistening white with frost and the air filled with freezing breath - but over the last ten years or so our winters have become a lot less cold and so we are taken by surprise when winter comes back as normal.

It was usual in my childhood to marvel at the frosty ferns that patterned the inside of our windows in the mornings. Central heating was unheard of and as children we rushed down to the fire to get dressed for school. Cars were rare and everyone walked to and from school well wrapped up, but as school was about 2 miles away everyone was very warm when they got there. Schools never closed because of the weather - but this was because all the teachers lived with a mile of so of school and always walked there as well.

Fifty years ago when Glenys and I were first married and living in Bristol we had a winter when the ice and snow lasted from Christmas eve right through to the 23rd of March. The River Avon was frozen over and the Bristol Channel was frozen almost completely across between Newport and Bristol - our flat was unusable because of frozen pipes and very little fuel and so we retreated to the warmth of the hospital where I was working. We stayed there until three weeks before my eldest daughter was born in April.

I took my New Year resolution seriously this time and have walked for about an hour every day and have found this especially satisfying in the snow - one becomes enclosed in a magic world of silence - and the poem of the American Poet Robert Frost conjures up the isolation and peace that comes from being alone in snow:

Stopping by woods on a snowy evening: Robert Frost

Whose woods these are I do not know. His house is in the village though He will not see me stopping here, to watch his woods fill up with snow My little horse must think it queer, to stop without a farmhouse near, Between the woods and frozen lake, the darkest evening of the year. He give his harness bells a shake, to ask if there is some mistake. The only sound's the sweep of easy wind and downy flake. The woods are lovely dark and deep, but I have promises to keep, And miles to go before I sleep, and miles to go before I sleep

HALAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING — 10TH JANUARY 2013 AT 7.30PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Present: S Bust, A Paris, C Bevans, S Godfrey, G Herbert, D Herbert & J Simmonds

Village Hall: Village Hall: Village Hall Committee Review – it was agreed that the VHC helped reduce the amount of time spent at parish councils discussing village hall matters. It was noted that year-on-year bookings had increased, particularly regular bookings. The parish council would like to see more fund-raising events organised by the VHC. Unanimously agreed that the VHC should continue in its present role

Neighbourhood Planning: nothing further required at this stage

Localism Act 2011: New Standards & Conduct Arrangements for Members: Andrew Paris reported that having studied the alternatives, he would recommend the adoption of the standard NALC code. It was agreed that Mr Paris should circulate the NALC and N&SDC versions prior to final adoption next month

Roads: the poor state of the roads generally in the parish was noted – any significant pot-hole problems should be reported by phoning 08449 80 80 80 or online on the County Council's website at www3.nottinghamshire.gov.uk/travelling/roads/road-design-and-maintenance/report-road-problems

Open Meeting: matters discussed; 1) switching off of street lights at night to save energy/money. The parish council's final views will be sought prior to this scheme being implemented (shortly); 2) it was noted that the a grit bin had finally been delivered (at the Gray Lane/Radley Road junction) – many thanks to County Cllr Andy Stewart; 3) speed sign on School lane obscured by hedges – landowner will be asked to cut back hedge; 4) some of the parishes' footpaths are overgrown – Clerk to report to the county footpaths officer; 5) flooding near the ford on the Turnpike – problems were discussed. Parish Council would support any reasonable requests by householders to the County Council/Drainage Board

Planning:

- 1. Goldhill Farm, Station Lane, Edingley: householder application to relocate existing swimming pool, erect building around newly repositioned pool along with link block and associated alterations to existing building (Planning Consent and Listed Building Control) supported unanimously
- 2. Land to rear of The Old Forge, Gray Lane: erection of 1 no. new dwelling application rejected by 4 votes to 1, with 2 abstentions. The proposed house was considered too large for the small site overdevelopment; would introduce alien type of development back-fill; and could set a precedent for further development

Finance: a letter from N&S DC had been received regarding capping of the parish precept; the Clerk to seek further clarification. **Date of Next Meeting:** Thursday 14th February 2013 at 7.30 in the village hall (Parish council meetings are usually held on the second

Thursday of the month)

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD: MARCH 2013

Village Hall: Village Hall Committee meeting scheduled for this month. Hall is booked with regular bookings. A storage heater and two of the radiant heaters need attention – Clerk to organise

Localism Act 2011: New Standards & Conduct Arrangements for Members: it was unanimously agreed to adopt the standard NALC code Roads: mud on Radley Road – Chairman to speak to local farmers. Erosion along the side of Radley Road (on hill towards the Oxton Road) – meeting with County Council Highways already arranged. Discussion was held as to whether the end of Radley Road nearest the Turnpike should revert back to the name Church Lane. It was agreed that village support for this idea would be assessed at the Annual Parish Meeting in April

RADLEY ROAD OR CHURCH LANE?

The name Radley Road dates back to at least the eighteenth century, possibly back to medieval times. For many years however it was known by the name "Church Lane" this was because the lane (obviously) led to the Church. Some 30 years or so ago when the County Council were putting road signs in place, naming roads, Halam parish council was asked to advise on street names in the village. At that time the historical name of Radley Road was chosen, so the road sign was put in place at the crossroads stating "Radley Road".

At a recent parish council meeting it was pointed out that some GPS (satnav) systems still show the name as "Church Lane" as do some databases. This can lead to confusion with delivery drivers and visitors to the village, and it was suggested that the parish council should request that the street name be officially changed to Church Lane. It has also been pointed out that such a change would require all the residents on "Church Lane" to inform the DVLA of this change (for the address on their driving licence) as well as having to inform banks, mortgage providers, utility companies, company registrars and any more informal users of their addresses (e.g. friends & family) that their street name had changed.

A suggestion to get round any satnav confusion but also avoiding the inconveniences caused by a formal change of address is that an addition could be made to the Radley Road street name sign. Underneath "Radley Road" could be added a sign saying something along the lines of "also called Church Lane". That way all Radley Road residents could keep their current address, but anyone looking for "Church Lane" would know where to turn

This proposal and the other alternatives will be discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting on Thursday 14th April, 7.00pm in the village hall. This meeting is open to members of the public (as are all parish council meetings); if you'd like to express any views on the issue then please come to this meeting.

Village Hall: County Cllr Andy Stewart has given the Village Hall Committee £200 to pay for a frame/cabinet for the Jubilee tapestry (many thanks to Cllr Stewart). The Committee is organising four village events for the coming year (see panel in this Village News). A projection screen has been donated to the village hall; it is now planned to obtain a projector so that village film shows can be arranged – Oxton to be consulted on their village film events. The Committee requested that three more folding tables should be bought for the hall – unanimously agreed

Newark & Sherwood DC – Allocations and Development Management (DPD): Andrew Paris reported on the documents received last meeting – generally final amendments and corrections to the main Allocations & Development documents Lengthsman Scheme: the current trials will be monitored as this may be of value in cooperation with adjoining parishes Roads: 1) mud on Radley Road – The Chair has spoken to local farmers as well as meeting with County Council Highways. The road has been cleaned by Highways and if further cleaning is required this will be done at the farmers' expense. Road problems can be reported directly to the County Council. 2) erosion along the side of Radley Road (on hill towards the Oxton Road) – following a meeting with County Council Highways, they agreed to fill the worst sections with crushed road stone. 3) damage to verges along Radley Road – Highways have suggested hard standing turning/passing bays to be created at the worst problem spots. After discussion it was unanimously agreed that these were probably not appropriate especially as the local farmers have agreed to repair the damage once fieldwork has been completed and the weather is drier. 4) new grit bin – agreed to request that Highways write to local property owner to confirm position of the new grit bin at the corner near Manor Farm. 5) water at the top of Radley Road (Oxton Road end) – a Highways exploratory team will be looking at this in detail in the next couple of weeks. 6) drains on the Turnpike – work to start on the Turnpike (near Halam Beck) on 25th March: there will be road works with traffic control on the Turnpike until at least 6th April

Renaming of Radley Road: after discussion it was agreed that the best solution would probably be to add a street sign under the "Radley Road" sign at the crossroads to say "previously known as Church Lane".

Open Meeting: matters discussed; 1) **sale of School land on School Lane** – the potential sale of 2 square metres of land was discussed. As this land belongs to the County Council, neither the school nor parish council can have much influence over this. The school does require that the new safe-guarding fence is re-instated correctly after any such sale. 2) **District Clir Bruce Laughton** reported that N&S DC will be setting a zero increase for their part of the Council Tax

TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD: APRIL 2013

Neither the celandines nor the aconites mentioned in last month's 'Tales from Churchyard' have yet appeared. They must know what atrocious weather we were to have as Easter approaches. The cold weather means that we all keep as warm as we can and venture out little. This was very apparent last Saturday when Southwell was a ghost town - but the bonus was it was very still and very quiet. Sound has a huge part to play in our lives and is the basis of all our communication but a respite from the continuous roar of every day life is to be welcomed.

In the opening paragraph of Winston Churchill's 'History of the English speaking people' he mentions our primeval ancestors walking though our wooded land to 'the sound of the murmurings of innumerable birds'. This remark was made by one of the most famous of English men and whose tongue today has become the most important language in the world, the most widely-used, and to whom the majority of people of this planet aspire to learn. Mankind has come a long way since the building of the tower of Babel - arrogantly built to reach the heavens and punished by God who made everyone speak different languages and thereby confusing everyone.

In the Christian calendar at Pentecost the disciples were given the ability to speak and understand other languages and so we should take it as a blessing that we can now understand each other so much better as nation communicates with nation.



Silence however is a delight when we need peace and quiet, a time to think or meditate. We are led to believe that 'silence is golden'. Children should be 'seen but not heard'. These age-old adages reverberate. There are very few places in the UK where one can enjoy total silence, and then, when you think you have found it, you are suddenly shaken out of your reverie by an RAF jet screaming over your head on a training exercise. Don't give up as you can switch off in your head from the hustle and bustle of everyday life and so in a busy market square you might find silence in your head.

Let's hope the cold weather goes soon as we have not yet heard a full-throated dawn chorus despite the lengthening daylight. On a more cheerful note however our parrot Patty is singing lustily in the morning and gives all our neighbours a much-needed optimism for the spring!

TALES FROM CHURCHYARD MAY 2013

'You can cut all the flowers but you cannot keep spring from coming.' Pablo Neruda

We would have done well had we taken this Chilean poet's words to heart, especially as we have all been so dispirited by the dreadful start to this year. We have been endlessly looking this spring for any drop of warmth, every scrap of blossom, each note of birdsong, and at no time have we been comforted. Winter seems to have gone on forever! However any small sign of better things is cherished as never before; we have seen a battle between the forces of cold from the east wind and a noble effort of our personal gulf stream to lead the tentative advance of our late spring. It is at a time like this that remembering the turning of the seasons is important in our ever-increasingly busy urban lives.

As I write these few lines I am overjoyed because I have witnessed the coming to Halam of at least two pairs of Lapwing; they are nesting in the field to the left of School Lane just outside the village. They have given me great pleasure each day as I have watched their disorderly flight, the 'lapping' sound of their wings and their thin, shrill, wailing calls. The winds of the last few days made the males particularly active, demonstrating their tumbling flight to show their prowess to the females. These birds have a habit of drawing potential predators away from their nest by trailing a 'broken' wing on the ground. It is strange that they lay their eggs so early in the year; I can remember being shown a plover's (Lapwing) egg very early in the year when I was at primary school and plovers' eggs were a Victorian delicacy, although expensive. Such eggs are mentioned in the book 'Brideshead Revisited! although they did not feature in the film. Even today there is a competition in the Netherlands to find the first plover's egg of the year, a practice prohibited by the European Union, but Friesland has been granted an exception for cultural reasons. Eggs are regularly found a early as March 6th and generally speaking such eggs are found earlier and earlier because of the use of fertiliser and perhaps climate change.

Nevertheless these nesting lapwings or plovers have given me much hope for better climate and as W H Davis says: 'Is it not fine to walk in spring, When leaves are born, and hear birds sing.'

HALAM CHURCH MEMORIAL WINDOW

Being an avid reader of biographies on early and late Victorian artists and people of distinction I found, on reading "The Last Pre-Raphaelite (Edward Burne-Jones and the Victorian Imagination)" by Fiona MacCarthy, that in the Epilogue (The Return of King Arthur) Burne-Jones was once again in fashion in the First World War and that Morris & Co, had a full order book from 1915 onwards for memorial windows for officers commissioned by their grieving families. These memorial windows were derived from Burne-Jones's well-tried format for stained glass windows, the single static saintly figure in the upper panel with a scene from the Saints life in the smaller square below. I found on reading this chapter that one such Burne-Jones window was erected in Halam Church, Halam in memory of a son who fell in action in 1918 in his thirtieth year, by his stricken parents.



TALES FROM CHURCHYARD MAY 2013

Sixty years ago Britain witnessed a great spectacle - the Coronation of our Queen. I remember the day because it was so very wet and cold. I did not see it on television because ownership of TVs was rare. However at Southwell Minster there is a continuous showing of the Coronation on TV screen in a film that has been colour-enhanced. This film presentation is part of the Coronation Celebrations and will continue in the Minster until the 16th of June, - do make the effort to see it, as the main exhibition is of embroideries some of which celebrate the coronation and includes an exquisite dress worn by one of the queen's attendants.

The exhibition also includes a frontal, from Halam Church, used at the coronation in Westminster Abbey, and which normally lives in a drawer in Halam Church. Why does Halam have this piece of the coronation? No one seems to know. If anyone can shed light on this do let me know. Its design is figurative and draws inspiration from flowers and plants that have always been associated with the act of coronation. In ancient Greece a crown of laurels would have been given as a token of victory, as a general reward or recognition for an athlete or scholar. Newly-qualified doctors were also given a crown of laurels, as the laurel was a plant believed to cure all ailments. The laurel plant in question was, in fact, what we speak of today as Bay, a herb we all use in cooking. This humble plant has been the exalted choice for coronations and achievements throughout the ages. Today we glibly use the word 'baccalaureate' to describe a educational test that has been passed successfully, an achievement in 'gaining ones laurels'. The word 'laureate' is applied to Nobel prize-winners, to the poet laureate, and to other high achievers. The expression 'resting on one's laurels' refers to someone relying entirely on long-past successes for continued fame or recognition; whereas to 'look to one's laurels' means to take care to match up to previous success. Our present queen certainly has not 'rested on her laurels', as she has dedicated the last 60 years to magnificent service for this country

Halam Church yard is full of daisies at the moment, in the first flush of spring. A traditional celebration of the spring was the crowning of the May queen with a garland of spring flowers of which the daisy had paramount importance. Over the centuries daisy chains have been made with delight by young and old, by slitting the stem with a thumbnail and threading through. Short stem daisies with thicker stems make better daisy chains, something small girls love to do; and the idea of 'coronation' can be enjoyed by all when we join together to make daisy chains. The daisy is one of the design features of the Halam Coronation embroidery on show at the Minster - do go and see it!

NORA ANNE ARMSTRONG 13TH SEPT 1945 - 15TH APRIL 2013

There was a magnificent turn out on the 7th May as many hundreds of people (included a large contingent of Halam residents) attended the funeral and memorial service for Nora Armstrong. It was a very moving service, paying tribute to someone who was; dedicated to public service, committed to helping others and always jolly good fun!

Nora was born in Addenbrooks hospital, Cambridge on 13th September 1945. Consequently, she considered herself a 'light blue' and always supported Cambridge in the Boat Race. Nora spent her first months in Cambridge with her mother at her Grandparents house. The war in Europe had finished but her father was still involved on military duties. At around four months of age they moved to live at Carlton, Netherfield. Her home at this time was above a Dental surgery. Nora spent many hours in her young years with a racquet hitting balls against that wall and her love of tennis was founded at that time.

Nora's education commenced at St. Paul's Infant and Junior School. It was at this school that her singing voice was developed. Little did Nora realise that her husband to be Brian, was also at the school but a few years further on. Brian recalls that although their respective parents knew each other Nora and he didn't come into contact at that time and they certainly didn't hold hands! At the age of eleven, Nora passed her examinations for entry to Bramcote Hills Technical Grammar School. Nora was 15 when she met Brian at the 'Locano' in Nottingham, and they became an item in the Rock and Roll era. On that first night, Brian took Nora back home on the bus. This was not because they couldn't bring themselves to part but because Nora had run out of money and Brian had to pay the fare!!

They became engaged when Nora was 16 but only after Brian, with much coughing, and clearing of his throat had asked her Dad's permission to marry her. Brian bought Nora an engagement ring, which caused some problems at school. Apparently, the wearing of rings was at that time against school rules and the Deputy Head, despite Nora's vocal protestations, confiscated it. Brian and Nora married at Gonalston church when she was 18 years old and within a year, the love of their lives Nikki was born. Nora left school at the age of 16 and began training as a hairdresser and whilst she successfully passed her examinations and at one point ran her own salon, she never really took to the trade. She became a part-time hairdresser and part-time rent collector for the then Southwell RDC. It was at rent collection that she really shone. She could form a respectful rapport with individuals from all levels of society, including some who would be considered as 'the local Krays'. She had the ability to persuade the fiscally challenged to do the right thing by paying their rent and setting aside money for family and dependents. Such was her success that during her time with the Gedling and Newark Councils they had the lowest rent arrears in the country.

Nora first became a housing officer for NSDC before transferring to Gedling Borough Council. It was during her time with Gedling that she became a councillor for Farnsfield and Blidworth a position she retained for 22 years uninterrupted. As a councillor she soon established herself as a spirited, blunt speaking, passionate individual who would fight for what she believed in and she was particularly adept at helping Halam, where she also was a parish councillor for some time. In 2003, Nora became a member of the Council's Cabinet where her responsibilities enabled her to pursue her passion for all things environmental. Her portfolio was nicknamed 'clean and green', which caused Nora to remark, "I am certainly clean but after so many years on the council I hope no one still thinks I am green!" And nobody did! Knowledgeable, and in full command with her brief, working closely with her officers, Nora had the respect and admiration of her fellow councillors.

To illustrate the esteem for Nora, Brackenhurst College, who invited her annually to present an award to the best student on the advanced food hygiene course, are renaming this award. In future, it is to be known as 'The Nora Armstrong Memorial Award for Best Student'. Nora was a founding member of Newark and Sherwood Housing and was a Director of that organisation from 2004 to 2011. Members of the Executive have remarked that "she took forward the role of Director with gusto and vigour".

Nora loved to give parties where her cooking and entertaining skills were a marvel to behold and at "The Scypen", Brian had created a wonderful house in which to entertain! She always took care to find out guests likes and dislikes before she prepared supper. After a bountiful meal, Nora would plonk her bottom into a chair with upright back and arms, charades would begin and fun and laughter ensued, but in Nora's own words to us all, the time spent together was 'jolly bonne'!

Nora developed a love affair for France and was definitely a Francophile, having bought a house in the Dordogne region, where many extended and blissfully happy holidays took place, with Nora throwing herself into life in the small hamlet, much to the delight and amusement of the locals. Nora was planning to move there more or less permanently, but sadly was unable to see that dream come to fruition.

Nora was a peoples person through and through, and whilst always true to her political beliefs, she represented all of her constituents with the same determination and vigour. Forthright to the end, she even wrote to David Cameron whilst in hospital telling him how he should prioritise the NHS - needless to say he replied!
