In My Opinion...

This is good news month!

Following my rant last month, I am pleased to say we have had an application for a new Parish Councillor and two applicants for the role of Parish Clerk! Thanks to all three of them for responding in this way.

In other news, Great Milton will soon have a weekly bus service! I have met with the County officer in charge of the Comet service, of which some of you may have heard. Briefly, this makes use of mini-buses used for home to school transport, during off times between 10h00 and 14h00 weekdays. I have provisionally booked a bus (at least 9 seats up to 16 with wheelchair access if needed) for a weekly run on Wednesdays, as shown in the following proposed timetable:

Ramblings from the Rectory


Just a couple of brief things for August, a bit of a light holiday month, (although I have already had a two week break).

We have just finished watching a BBC drama, 'Broken', about a Roman Catholic Priest, Father Michael Kerrigan serving in a poverty-stricken austerity-savaged parish in a north west city – it was filmed in Liverpool. It was written by Jimmy McGovern, who is not backward in taking on difficult social issues. Sean Bean, he of many film deaths fame (the best was definitely as Boromir in *The Fellowship of the Ring*!) was extraordinary as Father Michael, tortured by his own demons and overwhelmed by the level of need he encountered every day. I simply want to bring it to peoples attention although it made for somewhat uncomfortable viewing from the bucolic environs of South Oxfordshire. Jimmy McGovern has said that he doesn't miss God much and had few qualms about losing the Roman Catholic belief of his childhood. Certainly there were some hard hitting salvos at the Catholic church, but the way he deals with Father Michael's story is remarkable. For a man who claims to be indifferent about God, the theme of forgiveness and redemption that emerge after journeying through six gruelling episodes is compelling. I would put it on the curriculum of every theological college in the land for those training to be ordained.

The Alpha Course, Autumn 2017

Just a short note to publicise the Alpha course that once again we are hoping to run in the Autumn. The Alpha course which has now been used in thousands of churches for many years. Alpha began at Holy Trinity Brompton which is still the headquarters of the Alpha course.

Alpha is an introductory ten week course on the basics of the Christian faith. It takes place on a weekday evening and in the middle of the course there is an opportunity to spend a few hours on a Saturday to look at the person, work and ministry of the Holy Spirit.

An Alpha evening begins with some refreshment, sometimes a full meal, but it can also be coffee and cake. This is followed by a video presentation and then an 

open discussion. Any question is permitted and there is no expectation that anyone who comes should have an advanced knowledge of the Christian faith. I have run and participated in many Alpha courses over the years. I can testify to how useful it has proved to equip those within the Church but also enquirers with a deepening knowledge about the christian faith. Last year we ran an Alpha Course for the Benefice, it was held in Little Milton. We had twelve of us doing the course, a number with a good precedent! People found the course helpful informative and thorough. A couple of people have told me that they want to do it again!

We used a new format last year, which I hope to repeat again. The New material was very accessible, dynamic and easy to understand.

We hope to run an Alpha course beginning towards the end of September, either on a Wednesday or Thursday evening (I am sorry to be a bit vague at this stage). The course is open to anyone to come, you don't have to be a regular church attender, or even to come at all!

From the Archives

The Milton Magazine, August 1870

Fever

We regret to say that there are some cases of bad fever about the parish. There is every reason to believe that this disease arises chiefly from the use of impure water. In a dry season like the present, our shallow wells are liable to become polluted by surface drainage.

Never drink or allow any member of the household to drink water raw from the well. Let the drinking water be boiled and drunk in the shape of weak tea or toast and water. The best water accessible to the public is probably that obtained from the pump near Jess Saywell's. The Vicarage is supplied from the same source, and neighbours are entirely welcome to use the pump in the vicarage stable yard.

Letter

I read with interest Steven Harrods letter/rant in June's Bulletin and I think it deserves a response from someone with a similar sense of frustration but perhaps with a different view. Yes, there is a feeling of apathy and the onus on the 'usual suspects' to volunteer with helping events in our village. Along with others I am 'volunteered out' just now.

Some of the problem is communication, as matters raised at meetings with the Parish Council, never seem to have an obvious result. Steven refers to the regular motorcycle races on the A329 which I have raised with the TV Police at Kidlington and was 

met with a patronising and dismissive reply that offered no solutions. (Correspondence available to see). Did the Parish Council write to the Police?

Other matters raised are the road surface in Thame Road and the need for better signage on the Green. The Parish Council do good work and possibly have done something but I have never heard the outcome.

These matters do concern villagers so maybe telling us what action was taken would lead to better communication – and less apathy. Perhaps publishing the minutes in the Bulletin would create some interest as all the Minutes aren't on the website at this time and not everyone has a computer!

What has turned many people off above all else is the bus situation which quite frankly is a shameful disgrace by all the Authorities involved. Along with many others I was very active with the big campaign to retain our 103 bus and a solid case was made to keep it but we were met with apathy, misinformation and downright deceit and our efforts were in vain. Yes, it does work both ways.

I questioned at an early stage if the withdrawal of bus subsidies was a done deal. I was told no. I subsequently heard that weeks before, staff involved had been notified that subsidies would stop and they would be relocated. It suggested that the decision was already made. Why did we bother?

I wrote to the Prime Minister on the bus situation and was told in a reply from some obscure Government Department that £800,000 had been allocated to Oxford for “Social Services” and a “bus subsidy could be found from that”. Needless to say that money went to everything but. That is another reason there is apathy to some levels of Local authority who are perceived to ignore the public they represent.

End of my rant.

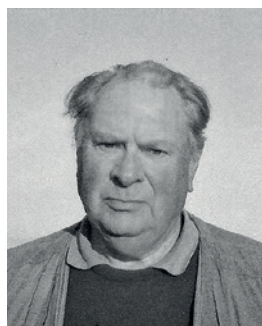

View from Views

Thanks to the generosity of those that sponsored our recent Tractor Run I was able to hand over a cheque for £735 to the Thames Valley Air Ambulance. Now we have got to look forward to the “Ride and Stride” run we do in aid of the “Oxfordshire Historic Churches fund” in September, another worthwhile charity, that helps our parish churches with necessary funds for vital repairs as and when needed, so I will again be begging for support.

Previously I have written that I thought the dry summer we had had so far had not really affected our crops since then we have had some extremely hot periods without any moisture at all, and I just do not know what affect this will have had. The



proof of the pudding will be when we harvest as it is almost impossible to predict now how fields will yield yet. I have anxiously rubbed out a few heads but it is still very much in the milky stage with the grains still puffed up, early reports of the Winter Barley yields sound very promising though. I hesitate to make any predictions, as the Wheat suddenly turned very pale after a couple of those very hot days, was this burning off? or was it just ripening quicker than normal I just don't know, this is really very disappointing as everything looked so promising right through to a month ago. This will, or at least already has brought, the start of Harvest forward by at least 2 weeks and by the time you get to read this, if the weather stays reasonable, the winter Barley and Rape and very probably some Winter Wheat will have had a visit from the combine. On the plus side our solar panels will have been showing their worth I think in June we generated the highest monthly amount of electricity yet, and also recording our highest production for a single day so it's not all bad.

We have just cut some of our Grass margins for hay, as part of the management, the idea is to try and deplete the level of fertility, which encourages grass and nettles etc, thus depressing the wildflowers that we are trying to encourage. This operation means getting to the remoter parts of the farm, and sometimes surprises us what is around, it was great whilst turning this hay to notice we had a Barn Owl not seen for a year or two (welcome back!). On the subject of our grass margins which 2 years ago we "floristically enhanced" (planted some wildflowers), these were planted under very dry conditions, and at the time I was very sceptical that anything would grow, however some have, although not a very dense population, but all said and done the populations are improving by the year. The most important thing is that these margins are not only a buffer between what we do on the land and nature, but to provide food to encourage insects and pollinators, that others feed on. This certainly has worked as the amount of insect activity has been phenomenal, which makes one feel that we are really making a difference, always a difficult thing to judge until you can actually see the result which in many cases can be some years away.

Most readers will be aware that the research into the effect of Neonicotinoids (neonics) on bees has supposedly been found to be detrimental, I am in no way in a position to doubt these findings which means we will have to find other ways to produce our Oil Seed Rape or not grow it at all. There are 2 points in this study that I do not quite understand, one is that if we increase the areas devoted to wild flowers like our Grass margins this will offset the effect, I find this hard to understand, the other point is that these Neonics are also used on crops like cereals, and root crops that do not flower so are not visited by bees at all, so I think there is a certain amount of clarification needed. The debate over the use of Glyphosate, which is a total weed

killer available to gardeners, local councils, as well as us, for path and ground clearance etc, continues with politicians prevaricating mostly on things that they really don't understand or realise the effects of their decision making. However it seems that the decision has been made to give it clearance for the time being but one can never be sure in situations like this that it will not appear on the agenda again shortly.

I could hardly be expected not to mention Brexit, I really don't know what difference either option would make. What I do know is that it is all very important to the wellbeing of the UK, so I just wish these damn Politicians would give up this continual point scoring and agree that in the national interest we should all pull together and agree a final outcome. We all realise that it was a big mistake to call an election it has showed to me that the country needs a certain amount of guidance, not division. We have a team doing the negotiations give them support and let them get on with it and not expect them to show their hands before time, after all what card player shows all his cards until the end of the game, in any deal there has to be some form of secrecy as to what position we may or may not be prepared to accept. I am heartened though to learn how much consultation is taking place behind the scenes with various bodies, we at Organic Farmers and Growers (OF&G) have been asked for a paper on the Organic position, and I know other organisations have had similar approaches, so in spite of all the scepticism things are actually moving behind the scenes.

John Howell MP writes...

Rarely a week goes by without some story on the NHS being carried in the media. Too often we read negative stories about our health services. I was therefore delighted to see the publication of an independent report by the Commonwealth Fund which ranked the UK health service among the top performers as compared with eleven other high income countries. The research conducted for this report was undertaken to look at the US health service and made international comparisons for this purpose. The US fared badly in the report with the UK coming top in the overall ranking followed by Australia and the Netherlands in second and third place respectively.

This is good news and most of the press agreed. It was therefore sad that others were quick to try to shoot it down on the letters pages. I for one am proud of our health service. I don't pretend that there aren't any problems. I know full well that there are. I am often asked by constituents for help with specific problems and always do my best to try to help. Sometimes it is a block in the system that we can shift, at other times it may be a medical decision that is in dispute and then I do have to rely on professional opinion. I also meet regularly with health chief executives in Oxfordshire to review performance and progress on various issues of concern. It is good to know that we are doing well, but this should not stop us trying to do even better and to resolve the problem areas.

In healthcare we need to keep up with research and be willing to look at new ways of doing things. An example I have mentioned before is the new Townlands Hospital

in Henley which itself has no beds. The beds are in the new adjacent care home. Townlands uses the model of ambulatory care, which is essentially care provided on an outpatient basis and can include diagnosis, observation, consultation, treatment, intervention, and rehabilitation services. Townlands Hospital offers a wide range of well used services and seeks to keep people out of hospital as far as possible. It is now well known that our health can degenerate quickly if confined to bed, especially for the elderly. However with the care home beds there is one to hand when needed.

We also need to be mindful of our ageing population. Our population currently has more than three million people aged over 80 years old. By 2030, this figure is projected to almost double, and by 2050 reach eight million. Our life expectancy is increasing – an achievement we can all celebrate. However longevity brings with it challenges for the future and healthcare is no exception. I am pleased that NHS England is working together with Age UK to consider these challenges and to raise awareness and explore potential solutions.

The issue of public sector pay is of course relevant in the health service as in others public sector organisations. I agree that we need to review this on an ongoing basis and am pleased that this is being done by independent pay review bodies. This is the right place for these reviews to take place. They need to take into account the whole remuneration package including fixed annual increments over and above any general percentage increase which are too often overlooked, and also pensions. Review bodies are already making recommendations to the Government. The response will come later in the year when it will be planned and properly costed and funded. I await the outcome.

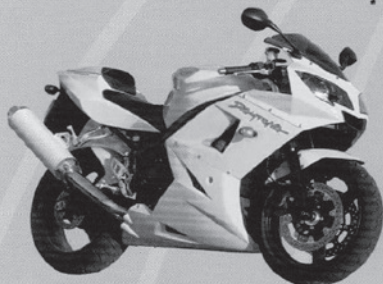

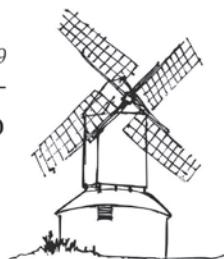

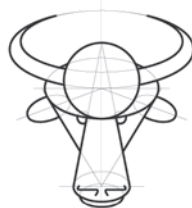
