REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR: CAROLINE NEWTON

The main order of business at SODC remains the new administration's plans for the Local Plan (submitted on 29 March and awaiting inspection). At the time of writing, it seems likely that after much discussion of the options, Cabinet is likely to bring forward proposals to Full Council in the autumn.

The options under consideration by the Scrutiny Committee and Cabinet have stretched from leaving the emerging Local Plan unchanged to withdrawing it and starting again.

The first option (recommended by officers) seems unacceptable to the LD/Green administration as they collectively want reduce dramatically the number of houses to be built, and disagree with all the proposed strategic sites.

The fourth option is very risky as it leaves SODC with an increasingly outdated Local Plan for a number of years which puts us at risk of speculative applications.

Some measure of protection against speculative building seems to have been offered by recently published figures for housing supply which indicate a 9.7 year supply of sites. However the figures are less comforting in two or three years' time when, without the LP2034 as currently drafted, the land supply is projected to crash well below 5 years.

My opinion is that whereas the former administration reluctantly accepted the objectively assessed need, and added in our proportion of Oxford City's unmet need, the current administration seems to be relying on *wishing* the objectively assessed need to be lower, without the evidence to support it.

Some hope for lowering numbers can be found in the Inspectors of Oxford City's LP questioning its level of unmet need and that is something the inspectors of the SODC LP would take into account.

One of the costs of reducing the number of houses in the SODC LP is the loss of the Growth Deal (£215 million) and Houses and Infrastructure Fund (£218 million) for infrastructure both of which were awarded to Oxfordshire alongside the commitment to build the necessary houses. The Administration seem likely to propose at Full Council this Thursday (18 July) that it appeals to Government for agreement to keep that infrastructure funding even if it reduces the number of houses in the LP. It is unlikely that the Department of Housing will agree to this but that remains to be seen.

REPORT FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR STEVE HARROD

NHS announces Oxfordshire will be part of new joined-up health and care system Oxfordshire is to be part of a new 'integrated care systems' created by the NHS in England to improve health and social care services. The new joined up care system also covers Buckinghamshire and Berkshire West.

The NHS and local authorities in the three areas aim to deliver a person-centred vision for health and care services, making sure services are planned and delivered as locally as possible. Health and care organisations will work collectively to bring better health outcomes for people and ensure effort is not duplicated or resources wasted.

Following the announcement by the NHS, Cllr Ian Hudspeth, Leader of Oxfordshire County Council and Chairman of the Local Government Association's Community Wellbeing Board said: "The move to integrated care across the country gives us the opportunity to really make a different for our residents and communities. Locally, I'm convinced that working together in partnership with the NHS we will deliver huge benefits to the health and care system and will improve the health and wellbeing of Oxfordshire's residents."

About integrated care systems

Local services can provide better and more joined-up care for patients when different organisations work together in this way. For staff, improved collaboration can help to make it easier to work with colleagues from other organisations. Integrated care systems can better understand data about local people's health, allowing them to provide care that is tailored to individual needs.

By working alongside councils and drawing on the expertise of others such as local charities and community groups, the local authorities and the NHS can help people to live healthier lives for longer, and to stay out of hospital when they do not need to be there.

Moving forward with housing infrastructure funding bids

Oxfordshire County Council is now concluding contract negotiations in the next few months to formally secure infrastructure funding relating to four strategic transport projects in the Didcot Garden Town area. This relates to our successful Housing Infrastructure Funding (HIF) £218 million bid announced in the Spring Statement.

The county council is also working with Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government and Highways England to complete the clarification stage of its £102m HIF bid projects associated with the A40 between Witney and Oxford, known as the A40 smart corridor. Consultants acting on behalf of Oxfordshire County Council have submitted a planning application for a proposed park and ride site, located on the A40 north-west of Eynsham and the first components of the scheme, which aims to:

- Support jobs and housing growth and economic vitality;
- Reduce transport emissions and meet our obligations to Government;
- Protect, and where possible enhance Oxfordshire's environment and improve quality of life
- Improve public health, air quality, safety and individual wellbeing.

We are hopeful of hearing the outcome of the bid in the next few months. If we are successful in this second HIF bid, it will mean we'll have secured £535 million of infrastructure funding for Oxfordshire since signing the Growth Deal in just over a year. The Growth Deal is now in its second year of delivery and £30m of investment was achieved in the first year. Work is continuing to deliver infrastructure investment across over forty individual schemes in the County.

Major progress on improving Oxfordshire's roads

Repairs and improvements on Oxfordshire's roads continue with more than 34,000 potholes repaired over the last year, a 45 per cent increase on the previous year - and there's more major repairs to come over the summer.

The county council recently announced an extra £13m for road maintenance for this financial year on top of its existing £18.5m programme of work – this follows last year's additional £12m boost. The strategy is paying off with 34,159 potholes repaired compared to 23,486 the year before.

This year's additional money will be spent across Oxfordshire's towns and villages on resurfacing, drainage, bridge repairs and footways.

Last year's extra cash saw more than 37 extra miles of road being resurfaced through a range of methods which also included surface dressing and micro-asphalting – both of which make road surfaces waterproof and extend their life.

Major investment in improving Oxford's Botley Road

Oxfordshire County Council is planning to spend £9.1m on measures on Botley Road in Oxford that will include bus, cycle and pedestrian improvements. The plans include bus priority measures and major cycle improvements to create a safer and continuous route along the corridor. This includes changes to several junctions along the route, notably restricting access to some side roads, where there have been collisions with cyclists, and additional cycle lanes.

Also proposed is a more consistent and improved footpath, including additional crossings, which will benefit pedestrians. Surface repairs and improvements will be carried out to enhance the condition and ride quality of the road to benefit of all users.

Public consultation on the proposals has recently been completed. Construction is currently scheduled to start from spring 2020 with some advanced works from January 2020.

FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

Wow what a July! I have been collecting records for BBOWT and the wider records organisations over the last few years for various species and one of the surveys covers butterflies at Wells Farm. July is always the best when it comes to numbers and this year's count was particularly successful. In fact, Chris and I counted 1075 on our 2.2 mile route! That is a record as far as I know and three times as many as last year's July count. Moreover, although we don't count bees (yet) there were also loads of them about too. So why do we have so many when the news is telling us they are in decline? One of the key reasons for loss (other than pesticides) is habitat. The BBOWT team have put a lot of effort into sowing and managing the fields to provide excellent habitat which is why we see carpets of vetch, hedgerows of knapweed and many other species when we walk around. So I hope you had a chance to enjoy the spectacle.

Nearly all (if not all) the livestock will have now gone to other reserves. Without them we would not have so many wild flowers here because they keep the grass down when put out to graze the fields at the right time. The BBOWT ponies are semi-wild and sometimes get nervous around pets so the Trust have to balance the needs of the wildlife, livestock and people. Signs clearly indicate that dogs (and other pets!) need to be kept on a lead. There are several routes open which pass around certain fields, particularly Barn field and if you wish to know more just reach out to me and I will be happy to point them out.

August is a time when the young animals are much more independent and venturing further away from the family. There is still time to watch our local Black Arrows (swifts) swooping and darting in formation around the houses, particularly in Chiltern View. Keep an eye out for Barn Owls at dusk and maybe a family of badgers on an evening excursion.

CHALGROVE AGE CONCERN

As a result of work being done at Chalgrove Village Hall the regular Tuesday club day will be held in The Pine Lodge during the month of August.. This is a fantastic opportunity to call into the hall and enjoy a cup of coffee. You will be made most welcome.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

It is at this time of year when all the glories of spring and early summer begin to disappear with plant life losing its bloom and lushness. What is fabulous is this year, after some 5 years the wildflowers we planted have been alive with a variety of butterflies, months, and all other insects and invertebrates. It is a real joy to see that at last we may be making a difference to these important species.

By the time this is read some of our harvest will be gathered in and we shall have some idea what effect the weather has had on yield. I am still astonished how well all crops are looking, the weather now is critical. The rain in June must have helped a great deal but even up to then everything seemed to be in good heart. Now most crops look as if they will exceed all expectations, somehow this growing season has been plain sailing, as every time a task needed to be done it was possible to do it, never known this before. Probably as soon as the harvesters start to move the rain will start and never stop until all is safely gathered in (Murphy's Law). Not only has it been a good year for getting on with jobs but with being so dry there has been little or no disease, keeping our costs down.

There has been a lot in the press just lately about us having to care for the soil and that if we don't we only have another 50 or so years before disaster strikes. Whoever thought that we do not care about our soils must be mad, do they not think that we are not aware how important our natural resource is. We must not forget that farmers have tilled the soil in this area for 100's of years with yields ever increasing something we must have got something right. One could argue that one of the reasons for crops to be flourishing is due to soil conditions, so as another step to improving soil conditions we have this year grown all our crops without the use of a plough, as with the use of ever increasing size and weight of machinery subsoil was becoming compacted, this would affect drainage and not allow root penetration to any depth, which cannot be the case this season. Of course there are pressures on us to produce more and at less cost, so that the consumer can afford food, which in turn forces us down certain paths that perhaps may not be beneficial to either the health of the soil or the quality of the produce. I think though that farmers understand that this can only continue for a short while, and as soon as things seem to be going in the wrong direction we alter course.

There are suggestions that the big supermarkets will be installing green walls in their stores, these will grow types of veg and fruit artificially in the vertical, this means that you the customer will be able to pick your own whilst shopping, no plastic, or delivery charge, also you will know it's origin, probably will not be very tasty or have much nutritional value, but never mind it won't have been grown on land that can then be rewilded! We are constantly being bombarded with the theory that eating red meat is bad for the planet, this may be the case for meat that is produced intensively and not on grass, animals have been grazing this earth for a very long time and belching and everything else they do, it is the beef lots of North America that are the problem, it is not our animals eating grass that are the problem. We do though have to be careful, as the alternative to grazing/eating red meat is to grow vast acres of Maize and Soya, which requires a system of agriculture that is at the moment destroying the forests of South America, not sure this is the way we should go. We cannot get away from the fact that the biggest threat to the planet is the Human being as there are too many of us.

Interestingly I have just read a report in the agricultural press, where an Oxford Professor (must be right) has said that methane produced by animals will ultimately cool the atmosphere and that farmers had already played a big part in reducing it emissions, this is of course good news if it is true, nice to think we are doing something right for once. To be honest I do not understand his thinking.

Also by the time this is published we shall know if it is Boris or Jeremy (Hunt (I hope not the other)) one thing I would hope whoever it is can get a grip on the excesses of this life, the excessive pay that some seem to attract cannot be right, when we have people that cannot afford to put a roof over their heads or feed their children. With the country unable to provide the services we all need. No wonder there is unrest in the population, probably at the root of knifings, littering, drug taking, stealing, and many others, creating a don't care attitude, you cannot blame some people saying why should I care someone else better off than I can pay for that etc! "This simply has to be tackled".

Recently I read or rather had read out to me, a piece from some country magazine that JCB, the tractor and digger manufacturer, had just beaten the land speed record for a tractor, over 100 MPH. Just what use this is remains to be seen, but the thought of a tractor doing 100 MPH over our fields, getting work done in next to no time at all makes the mind boggle.

WELLS FARM ALLOTMENTS

So has it been a good growing year so far? Well I guess it all depends on watering at this point. As I write, the well on the site has managed to keep up with demand through the dry spell and provided we all keep on top of the weeds it should be good for most things.

For those plots that have been neglected, please would the tenants at least cut things back to prevent seeds dispersing on to other plots. The agreement states that a percentage of the plot needs to be cultivated. If this does not happen, the plot may be given to someone on the waiting list next year.

I understand there have been issues with the mower, although when I last checked it was working very well. If you find any problems please feel free to reach out to me and I will work with others to try and resolve it. If you need any platers, there is a small first aid kit in the shed. Let me know if you use anything so I can replenish stocks.

Oh, and there should be lots of blackberries appearing this year along the path so should be a good year. According to my plant book there are over 300 sub species of our European bramble which explains why some have darker stems, others have different colour petals etc. They are actually related to roses ... hence the thorns I guess. Did you know that in the 18th century, people would brew strong ale from a mixture of blackberries, malt and hops and it was apparently very popular?

LETTER FROM FRANCE

SUMMERTIME IN FRANCE

As I write this, this part of France has come alive. From the start of June, Every village, town and vineyard opens its doors and celebrates with feasts, fairs, and prodigious quantities of wine. My favourite is the Night Market in Duras, which is a village feast every Thursday evening, with stalls selling all kinds of cooked food, and all the local vineyards selling their wines by the bottle at supermarket prices. A large plate of paella for instance costs 10 Euros.

Last weekend our village decided to have a Fair, with Brass Band, a disco, and huge amounts of food and drink. My Moules Frites went down very well, although I didn't manage to stay to the end, which was 3 am.

THE VINES-DROUGHT!

You may have seen on the news that France has been experiencing very hot weather-a record of 45.9C was recorded in one village in Vaucluse. Here it reached 40C, still extremely hot, and the dry spell has continued for over a month. This is ideal for established vines whose roots go very deep, but disastrous for my vines which are only a year old. So, I have been watering by hose daily. 6000 vines need a lot of water, so my water bill will be huge when it arrives, but needs must. My routine is to get up at 6am, and start watering at 7am, when the weather is cool. By 2pm the water coming through 200 metres of hosepipe is dangerously hot, warmed by the sun, so I stop then. Rather annoyingly, it is the pot grown vines which seem to be suffering most, whereas the bare rooted vines have established themselves more successfully and need less watering. If I had my time over again, I would have insisted on only bare rooted vines, but hindsight is a wonderful thing.

EUROPEAN ELECTIONS

I watched the European Election results with interest, with Nigel Farage & his Brexit party getting 32% of the vote in the UK. France also has a FREXIT party, but they fared rather less well, with only 3% of the vote, so it is unlikely France will be exiting the EU anytime soon. I should also note that there were a significant number of ex-pat pensioners living in France and Spain who voted for Brexit, and have since seen their pensions drop by 18% following the fall in the value of £Sterling vs the Euro which took place immediately the Referendum Result became clear. Before the Referendum, the £ stood at 1.32 to the Euro, and is now down at 1.11. If a NO DEAL Brexit becomes a reality, it is likely to fall further, so we may see an exodus of pensioners moving back to the UK, their "LIFE IN THE SUN" rather sadly coming to an end, whether they voted for Brexit or not.

E10 PETROL

My car is a diesel, but I have been puzzled by the marking of E10 on petrol pumps in France. It turns out that E10 stands for 10% Ethanol added to the petrol, which cuts carbon dioxide emissions from Petrol powered vehicles. Apparently the UK is one of the last countries in Europe to adopt this idea, but it has now come onto the agenda. France decided to adopt it in 2009, so has a 10 year start.

A DOWRY OF TREES

When you travel through France, you often see clumps of trees, planted in a very symmetrical way. I always thought this was rather quaint, but never understood the reason for the plantation. It turns out that not long ago, if a daughter was borne to a family who possessed land, then these trees would be planted so that when she came of age and was married, the trees could be used as a dowry.

Rather nice idea !!!

Pension Credit entitles over-75s to free TV licence - Citizens Advice

The BBC is planning to start charging over-75s for their TV licences unless they receive Pension Credit. Pension Credit is a benefit for people on low incomes who have reached the state retirement age.

Currently, those aged 75 or older receive free TV licences which cover them and anyone else they live with. However, as from June 2020, over-75s will be means tested for the free licence. It is thought that more than three million people will no longer be eligible to receive it.

But if you can provide evidence that you get Pension Credit, you can continue to receive a free TV licence. Over a million people who qualify for Pension Credit aren't claiming it, the government says, so it's worth checking your eligibility.

Call the Pension Credit claim line on 0800 991 234 Monday to Friday 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. to find out about your entitlement. Alternatively visit <u>https://www.gov.uk/pension-credit</u>

You'll need to quote your National Insurance number and be able to give details of your savings and pensions, as well as the account into which you want your Pension Credit paid.

If you live in a care home or sheltered housing you can get an Accommodation for Residential Care licence which costs \pounds 7.50. You only need this if you watch TV in your own separate accommodation.

GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

I have just reviewed my article for this time last year and found a similar period of very dry weather. Today, though, it has rained a significant amount and all the water butts are full again. Unfortunately, the complete lack of water stores on the veg patch means we have lost a number of sowings of young vegetables. Life should be easier for a few days now, but I note that temperatures are reaching into the thirties next week again so we will soon be short again.

I rather confidently told you last year that there was no need to worry about brown dead looking lawns and that they would soon green up again. In my experience lawns are always cured by the following spring. After the heat of last summer and a mild winter we had a lot of bare patches on the lawn which, despite several attempts at resowing, have still not greened up. We even bought new lawn seed in case the seed was dead, but to no avail. Maybe this rain will help.

I notice that the pests are settling in in the greenhouse again. Last year, as a result of my accident, we didn't get around to removing the sad looking aubergine plants which appeared to have no functioning green tissue. These plants carried on producing aubergines and when the weather cooled as autumn advanced, new fresh growth was produced and the aubergines just kept coming; a very impressive result indeed so I won't be in a rush to remove these plants when the inevitable red spider mite sets in. The aubergines are already cropping well this year.

Other survivors of last winter were some large specimen tender Fuchsias. I am looking forward to them flowering as I thought I had lost the whole lot. What a treat that will be.

This year, due to some losses through general neglect over the winter, I did have fewer plants in pots than is usual. I bought only two new plants, Marguerites which I can't resist. They will flower all summer if you keep up with the dead heading which, so far, I am managing to do. Summer bedding and colourful pots must be regularly dead headed, watered and fed to maintain a good show. I'm not great at keeping mixed pots going and prefer to have different plants which I can switch in and out as they look at their best and then look less good. However, it is not easy to move around large pots so some are on display for the duration of the summer.

This summer we seem to have lost all our plums, all our pears and virtually all our apples. The culprits, I think, are probably finches. This year they didn't eat the buds, but waited for flowers and tiny fruit. The birds also cleared the gooseberries while we were away. I picked some before we left and planned to pick the rest on our return, but they were all gone (probably about 7 to 8kg); normally the birds wait until they ripen so I can only assume they were desperate so I forgive them. On the positive side, our apricot tree had masses of flower in February and the fruit will be ripe very soon - I can't wait!

John Howell MP writes...

By the time this newsletter is published we will have a new Prime Minister and Parliament will probably be in recess. This is a time when MPs often take a holiday, as do many others. It is also a time when we can spend more time in our constituencies. I find it a good time to catch up with local meetings and spend more time out and about in the many villages across the constituency.

As I think of holidays I am sure many will be travelling abroad. With climate change high on our agenda the issue of CO2 emissions from aviation is a hot topic. Some people avoid travelling by air but for others this is not realistic. Some people look at carbon offsetting and I know that others find it difficult to know what to do for the best. As with all issues around climate change we need to tackle it on all fronts.

There is indeed a need for action at a global level to address CO2 emissions from aviation Here I am pleased that Ministers are taking action to encourage the development and supply of lower carbon jet fuels. Amendments have been made to the Renewable Transport Fuel Obligations Order (RTFO) to include the use of sustainable alternative fuels in aviation. Further to this, £20 million has been made available through the National Productivity Investment Fund to leverage private sector investment to help develop and commercialise alternative fuels. This has the potential to reduce the carbon impact of aviation and heavy goods vehicles and capitalise on the industrial opportunities for growth and jobs.

This month the Committee on Climate Change published its Progress Report to Parliament. In it they welcome Parliament's decision to make 'net zero' law commenting that it is a positive step making carbon neutrality mainstream. The legislation has been brought forward by the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy and it puts the UK on track to become the first G7 country to legislate for net zero emissions. Other major economies are expected to follow suit. It is also good that young people will also have the chance to shape future climate policy through a Youth Steering Group which has been set up by Government and will be led by the British Youth Council. They will advise Government on priorities for environmental action and give a view on progress to date against existing commitments on climate, waste and recycling, and biodiversity loss. Of course tough targets do not, in themselves, reduce emissions. We need action plans to deliver the targets. Much needs to be done. I acknowledge that it is for Government to drive this forward and I agree entirely with the progress report that decisive cross-cutting action is needed.

Every step is progress and we should not be too quick to criticise. No should we feel overwhelmed by the challenge as I know some people do. Every action taken by an individual is a move in the right direction and we should not feel that it is too small. This is why I have welcomed initiatives such as Young Climate Warriors which encourages positive shared action. I know that there are several communities in the constituency where a climate action group has been set up. I would welcome knowing more about these so that we can encourage one another and share ideas.
