WALKS IN AND AROUND FRAMPTON

A Walk from your Back Door (Number 3)



This walk takes you up above the Sydling Valley with fine views and pretty good under foot whatever time of year as it's mainly on chalk and perhaps a bit more

of a challenge!

The walk starts opposite Long Ash Garage for the Long Walk (9.5 miles) and for the Short Walk (7.5 miles) if you omit the section down to Godmanstone. You may feel you want to take the car up Church Lane to avoid one hill depending where you are in the village! There is a parking area on the opposite side of the A37 just near the signpost and style for the start of the walk (Ref. OS Explorer Map. Pickett's Cross SY 630956). Remember the Country Code about shutting gates. Some of the area above Sydling is Open Access but it is a popular sheep grazing area so dogs on leads please.

Cross over this field diagonally and the next until you come to a gate leading to the road just beyond the Watercress Beds. Walk along the road (watch for traffic) a short distance until you turn off to the right to Magiston Farm. Walk through the farm and up the hill, just before you reach the top, take the gate on your left which is waymarked. Follow this path along the line of the hedge on your right for a further two fields until you come to a wood. The wood has recently been used for mountain bikes but this has made the track through easier to identify and you eventually come out on to a field.

Go diagonally across the field until you come to a path. This track is well marked with the hedge on your right and you pass Huish Barn and continue for a good mile with fine views of the Sydling Valley to your left. When you come to a junction with a path leading down to Sydling, turn right until you get to the Wessex Ridgeway. Then turn right again on to a wide track and continue for about two miles until you come to a junction of paths, one or two memorial stones and fine views across to Hardy's Monument. In the spring these upland chalk areas are excellent for wild flowers. At this point you can either have lunch and continue on the return journey or add a bit more by taking the route to Godmanstone. To do this, double back behind the monument (there is an old small caravan in the field on the right), go through the gate

(1) and turn right onto the path (2) down to Godmanstone. This takes you straight down to the A352, cross the road and continue on the path down to the river Cerne. Another good place for lunch by the river. Turn right and follow the path to Godmanstone taking the first style on the right and the path round the back of the mill and out on to the



road. Cross the road and take the first path on your right at Manor Farm.



Climb up the hill until you are back on the Wessex Ridgeway again. If you are not doing this extra part, walk through another field until you see below you a gate and a signpost to Crete Bottom (2a) and at the bottom

of the valley you will see Bushes Barn (3).

Bushes Barn is an interesting

settlement, with its own spring and you will see the remains of workers cottages where a large family once lived, the youngsters climbing the hill every day to go to school at Godmanstone. A trip once a year or so into Dorchoster by popy and trap was a

into Dorchester by pony and trap was a highlight. Recently a bell has been erected and this makes a nice shelter if it is raining. Depending on the time of year you may spot owls, deer and hares (4).

Go through the gate and continue on the path along the bottom of the valley until

the track goes to the left, ignore this and continue through the gate on your right and as you come to the end of the field, climb up the field until you see a gate in the hedge on your right. Go through this and continue a short distance until you see a gap and a waymark on the right leading through a young wood. Go through the wood and you come out to a wide valley. Follow the path along the bottom of the valley until you come to Longford Farm. Go straight through the farm and along the driveway leading to the "B" road to Sydling. Turn right over the bridge and then left up towards Long Ash Garage and Frampton.

THE LAST HOURS by MINETTE WALTERS


Situated on the north shore of Weymouth Harbour, Dorset, Melcombe was developed as a significant settlement and seaport in the 13th century. It was here that the Black Death entered into England in the summer of 1348, (the disease being carried there by fleas on infected soldiers and sailors returning from the Hundred Year's War or from a visiting spice ship.)

No-one knew what manner of sickness it was - or how it spread and killed so quickly. The church blamed God as the cause and fear gripped the people as they came to believe that the plague was a punishment for their wickedness. However, Lady Anne of Devilish had her own ideas.

She had been well educated and was both literate and knowledgeable. With her brutal husband absent from the Manor, when news of the disease reached her she looked for more sensible ways to protect her people than daily confessions of sin. She decided to bring her serfs inside the safety of the moat that surrounded her Manor House, then refused entry to anyone else including her husband.

Lady Anne made an enemy of her daughter and her husband's steward by doing so, but her resolve was strengthened by the support of her leading serfs - until food stocks ran low. The nerves of all were tested by continued confinement and ignorance of what was happening in the outside world.

The Last Hours is the first of two stunning historical novels about the Black Death and the consequences thereafter. Minette Walters has found fame throughout the world with her novels, 18 of which have now been written at her home in Dorset where she lives with her family.



VILLAGE HALL News

The Trustees of the Village Hall actually enjoyed a 'real' meeting on Monday 14 February with a long agenda to sort out what will be happening during 2022.

Finances are strong and bookings have continued to rise with five weddings now in the calendar for 2022. Indeed, the Trustees found some difficulty in finding free dates for our own events!

There was discussion concerning the Queen's Platinum Jubilee but members felt that the FVH Trust should not be the sole organisation responsible for any celebratory events in view of all the other events they organise. However, they would be prepared to make the hall available if any organisation, or group of organisations feel that they would like to organise a suitable event and a date can be found.

Village hall heating was discussed in view of the central heating problems encountered towards the end of 2021. It was decided to seek estimates for a possible replacement heating boiler and an overhaul of the system, any work to be carried out during the summer period.

The foliage along the river bank at the rear of the hall had been inspected and required pruning before springtime. It was dealt with by a working party on Sunday 27 February.

Following much discussion, it was decided to hold a **Spring Sale** (to include a tombola) on Saturday 26 March from 10am. Set-up will be on the Friday from 10am if anyone wishes to bring items along, either as a donation for sale or submitted on a 50/50 basis. If there are large items you wish to dispose of you can give me a call and I will arrange to collect them. We already have, in our stock, 3 very nice lawn mowers and 2 bicycles together with much, much more. We also have a collection of bottles of wine etc., left over from the last tombola but we will always accept more or any other suitable items if anyone wishes to donate. Throughout the sale, refreshments will be available from our catering team.

Because of Covid problems our planned Jazz evening in 2021 was cancelled but is now in our programme again. **Jazz in the Village** will take place at the hall on Saturday 16 April from 7.30pm, when the hall will be laid out in 'Bistro' style. Tickets are £10.00 for adults and £5.00 for under 16's. They are available from Frampton Garage or from the organiser, Malcolm Potter 07968 586 906. There will be a bar run by the hall trustees.

On 7 May it's time for the **Spring Big Breakfast.** As before excellent local fayre will be served from 9am till 12 noon.

International Dining was discussed, and it was agreed to aim at a date in early June, which would suit those involved in organising the event. More news later.

Val Ghose reported on the **2021 Christmas Craft Fair** where there was a good take-up by new stall holders and almost everyone was pleased by the attendance and business done. Looking forward, the 2022 edition of the Fair will take place on Saturday 19 November with set-up on the Friday.

The next meeting of the Hall Trustees will be on Monday 25 April.



The Queen's Platinum Jubilee 2022 St Mary's, Frampton

We are looking for a way of celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee at St Mary's, Frampton and the idea of new kneelers (hassocks) has been suggested. The last one was completed in 1977 to celebrate the Queen's Silver Jubilee (see picture below). Prior to this, in 1974, there had been a major effort and 40 kneelers had been recovered (tapestry, canvas and wool) by Framptonians, some who are still in the parish and we salute them for their efforts. These have worn well and many only need a little tidy up.

We thought it would be nice to add to the collection with one or two new kneelers to celebrate this momentous occasion. It may be that by the time this goes to press we have hunted down a design that is already being used by churches across the UK but we thought it would be interesting to see if we had any residents who would like to come up with a design. Fairly simple as it has to be reproduced on canvas. The size of the kneelers are, Length 35cm, Width 25cm, Depth 7cm. If we get quite a few we will display them in the church. Of course, we also need sewing help so if you have
