After the spook fest of Halloween, the countdown to Christmas is underway. The Events team have two big events planned: the Gala Night and the Santa Party Christmas Social.



Here are a few updates on what we have been working on:

#### **Playground**

The matting under both sets of swings has been resurfaced, and repairs to the multi-gym bridge are now complete. The worn muddy patch next to the football pitch has been re-seeded to help it recover.

While working on plans to add some fencing, a few concerns came up about extra costs and regulations. After looking into it further, we realised that fully fencing the multi-gym play palace just isn't financially or practically viable for a village our size—there are simply too many knock-on overheads. Instead, we're planning to add a short stretch of fencing to gently guide dogs and walkers around the picnic table area, rather than straight through it, when coming from the school playing field and Badgers Bank. It's only a small tweak, but we hope it will make a big difference!



#### Refurbishment of village noticeboard

This has been removed for much needed renovation, but we hope to have it back in place in early November.

#### **Basketball Court**

We know the basketball court surface is worn and are getting quotes for resurfacing and repairing the hoop backboard. We're also exploring the possibility of enlarging the pitch, but early feedback from playground consultants suggests this would be very costly compared with simply resurfacing the existing area. The pitch sits on a slight incline, so levelling a larger area would require significant groundwork. Expanding it sideways wouldn't solve the problem either, given the current location and orientation.

#### **Bus Stop by recreation ground**

We've looked into the suggestion of a bigger bus shelter for village children catching the school bus to Wallingford and feel, on balance, our current bus stop is doing the job well. It's in good repair, recently repainted, and the pavilion is nearby if extra cover is needed. The bus usually arrives about five or ten minutes early, so children often wait on board before departure. We'll keep an eye on it, and meantime please continue sending your ideas to help make Moulsford even better for everyone!

#### The second bus shelter in the village (near Colereeve House)

Vegetation was cut down last year and has helped, however the shelter itself is now in need of painting and a bit of TLC. There is a small window in which we can get it done this year before the weather worsens; otherwise it will need to be done in the Spring. If you can help with this work, it would be much appreciated.

#### Solar panels for the Pavilion roof

We are arranging a full structural survey of the Pavilion roof and following this we will research solar panels for the Pavilion. This should help to reduce running costs.

#### **Moulsford Highways**

A while ago we requested volunteers to participate in a small group to work on suggestions for how we might best reduce speeding problems in the village. This has not been progressed yet, owing to a change of clerk, availability of volunteers, and a reduced number of councillors to drive it forwards, but we hope to return to this in 2026. We have finally received the paperwork from SODC re. renewing our parish council lease and can move to finalising everything with them. It's only taken 5 years!

We will be issuing new tenancy agreements to all allotment holders to take effect from January 2026, as there have been some changes to the terms of our agreement with SODC.

After another hugely successful comedy night, thank you to Tracey and the whole team that made it happen, the nights are drawing in, the clocks have gone back and we all know that the Christmas planning has to begin in earnest!

Well, here's one great idea that you can nail down now. Bring family and friends to the Santa Party! It's a free event with something for everyone and every age, think traditional Christmas combined with "party". We can't tell you every detail, that would be like opening your presents in November, but we're aiming to create just a little bit of Christmas magic right here in Moulsford.

Now a very important question, boys & girls and ALL you grown up folk; considering the year as a whole, have you been Naughty or Nice? Asking for a friend who lives in the North Pole. Exciting news in December Moulsford News.

#### What's in a name?

Many have wondered how our village became known as Moulsford. The 'ford' is easy enough. But Mouls? Fuzzy spelling in the past? Odd languages spoken by tribal people? Perhaps we will never really know.

1200 or so years ago the Vikings were taking over swaths of the country. Aethelred, Alfred's elder brother, was still king, and after losing the battles of Reading and Basing in 871 AD found himself caught between enemy armies. A few days later he won the Battle of Ashdown defeating the Vikings. The battlefield may have been at Kingstanding Hill and Moulsford Bottoms. But the name Moulsford was not used then. For more on this history read 'King Alfred – A Man on the Move' by Dr. Paul Kelly.

In old Norse one meaning of *mol* is stones or pebbles on the beach or riverbank. Their language was written in runes (to confuse their enemies perhaps). This could relate to a river crossing. Viking treasure keeps popping up in nearby villages as well as Moulsford. They were here.

Moulsford is not mentioned in the Doomsday Book, so one might suspect the name came later than 1086. By then, the ruling class was speaking Norman French. Today we eat Moules frites (or some do). The Thames River supports several varieties of fresh-water mussels (the bivalve, not the biceps). Was this the source of our village name?

In Luxemburgian moul means mitten, from old Dutch or German or Latin or French. See the difficulty? Other meanings are - twit, cake tin, matrix, mould. Do any of these describe Moulsford? 'Twit's Crossing' does not seem to fit the mould.

Moul is also a surname, found in England, France and elsewhere. As many of our family names derive from an occupation, Moul perhaps sis **taken** from old English mul or mule keeper, and used to identify a stubborn or **mule-headed** person.

So let your imagination wander. We should ask Susie Dent (Channel 4's 'Countdown' lexicographer) for advice, but my bet is on fuzzy spelling.

#### **Back to History**

The story of Moulsford starts a long time ago and much of the early history is written in several sources – the Moulsford Parish Council website is a good start. Most of Moulsford and Streatley was at one time owned by a branch or two of the Morrell family.


Moulsford has 17 listed buildings, bridges, walls and markers. The Old Vicarage is not listed although the church is. The first Vicar of Moulsford was Rev. George Kidd Morrell, and in 1847 he moved into the new parsonage. The church was also renovated at that time. Rev. Morrell passed away in 1882. The estate was sold in 1907, after nearly 2 centuries of Morrell ownership.

The Morrells operated the Lion Brewery from 1782 after forming a partnership with Edward Tawney of the original owner's family. This brewery was the largest one in Oxford and began in1743. The brewery closed in 1998 after a family dispute. The chimney and waterwheel are still visible although the buildings were redeveloped into flats in 2002. Morrell's products were most likely the favourites at local pubs, including the Beetle, for over 200 years.

The Beetle name began about 1850 and was converted from a pub into an inn by Hopewell J. S. Morrell in 1903.

The Beetle and its riverside setting may have been an inspiration to many authors and journalists. The Potwell Hotel fits the description in H. G. Wells' novel 'The History of Mr. Polly'. The hotel was detailed in John Galsworthy's 'The Forsyte Saga' as the Pouter Pigeon Inn.

#### Planning for safer communities

**Moulsford News: November 2025** 

My work as Police & Crime Commissioner is not just about working alongside the police. There is collaboration with other blue light emergency services; each county has a body called a Combating Drugs Partnership which is a collection of police, NHS and public health and a huge overlap into the world of local councils, such as the work of Youth Offending Teams who will become involved when children are arrested by the police.

Although not a statutory consultee, there is a particular involvement in the planning process that many people are not aware of. Thames Valley Police employ Crime Prevention Advisors who are consulted on planning applications and major developments. Small changes, such as making sure parking areas are overlooked by neighbouring properties or that alleyways are well lit can help to both reduce crime and make people feel safer.

Sometimes this involves commenting on major projects such as the safety plans at the long awaited new stadium for Oxford United, or seeking to secure funding for policing when significant new housing developments add to local infrastructure needs.

Ultimately these planning decisions are for local councils to make, but it is important that local people have their say and that safety concerns and issues raised by the police are taken into account. This is why I have recently raised the potential risks of turning off many of the county's street lights. In a large number of our smaller villages, including mine, we do not have street lights, and no-one is arguing to introduce them, but even those of us who are happy without lighting in more rural locations will want to see well lit streets in our more urban areas. It was a significant win to ensure that parish and town councils will now have to agree to any proposals to turn off street lights as a result of public pressure.



More passengers, more Wheelyboat trips, wider variety of medical conditions and more – than ever before!

Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC), the local volunteer-led charity dedicated to providing boating for disabled and less mobile people, has just declared another record season. On every measure, over WABC's operating season April to September, numbers were up significantly. Almost 500 passengers; 100 boat trips, carrying over 100 wheelchair users and people from all over South Oxfordshire with over 30 different illnesses and disabilities. Incredible!

WABC Chairman John Jenkins MBE, elaborated: "We are all thrilled. The statistics we are announcing today are remarkable and reflect an amazing performance by our incredible team of volunteers who have worked tirelessly all season to give our record numbers of passengers river trips they could only dream of. Their experiences have, in many cases, been totally transformative, benefitting their health and wellness generally."

Jenkins continued: "And what makes our performance even more remarkable is that we have achieved all this in spite of the upheaval of the mid-season move from Benson to our new central Wallingford Riverside base. All enabled by our volunteer team – they are just wonderful!"

"The popularity of our free-of-charge service bodes well for our growth plans next year and beyond – we want to do more and this season's performance statistics certainly endorses that aspiration."

#### Wallingford's Accessible Boating Club Invites New Volunteers to Help More People Enjoy the Thames

After a record-breaking 2025 season, Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC) is looking for new volunteers to help even more people with disabilities and limited mobility experience the freedom of the River Thames.

From its base at The Riverside, WABC runs WOW-one - a specially designed Wheelyboat that lets wheelchair users roll on and off, safely and securely.
