Grafty Gourmet - Garlic Prawn Linguine

This is a great summer dish, and as like all my recipes, it is very simple to make.

500g uncooked linguine 1 tablespoon butter 3 tablespoons white wine 2 teaspoons grated Parmesan cheese

1 teaspoon chopped fresh parsley 1 pinch salt and pepper to taste King Prawns, peeled 500g

and deveined

3 cloves garlic, minced

- 1. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to the boil. Add the linguine and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente. Then drain.
- 2. In a medium saucepan, melt the butter over a low heat; add the wine, parmesan cheese, garlic, parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer over low heat for 3 to 5 minutes, stirring frequently.
- 3. Increase heat to medium and add the prawns to the saucepan. Cook for about 3 to 4 minutes or until shrimp begins to turn pink. Be careful not to overcook or the prawns will become chewy.
- 4. Divide the linguine into portions and spoon the prawns and sauce on top. Garnish with more Parmesan cheese and fresh parsley, if desired.

From the Minutes of Boughton Malherbe Parish Council Meeting Monday 11th July 2016

Public Session: Defibrillator issues and whether access code should be removed – C. Wheal

KCC/MBC Reports: Cllr Shellina Prendergast, MBC

"I am getting into the swing of the role and am on 3 Committees, including Planning and Strategic Planning and there are 2 meetings this week with big agendas. Junction 8 was refused on landscape and heritage grounds last week. The MBC local plan has been submitted and is with examiner with the Public Hearing and Examination due in September sometime.

Also, the Matrix Scoring System for unauthorised development indicates 3 sites -1 in Boxley and 2 in Headcorn which scored highly. All have cost implications - Hammer stream and the Meadows were 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} . Action will be taken. Cllrs are taking the problems in rural areas very seriously.

I went to see Mathew Scott, the new Police and Crime Commissioner and we had a positive meeting. A new on-line reporting system will be launched later this month. Also, they are recruiting new PCSOs – another 80. He would like to know what issues affect us here. Clerk to supply list by end of week."

Yasmine Gordine is the MBC Parish Liaison Officer and she is working her way around parishes; working on Matrix; working with KALC, and can help with any problems – chase up the person required within MBC.

- 1- good news: Smokey Paws project 43 stations have them with 60 kits and 12 sets in process of being allocated. First FRS in the country to do that.
- 2 with a previous Liverton Hill closure the Fire Brigade wasn't notified. This time, Lenham was not informed although Head Office was. Also, the diversion sign was placed in middle of grass triangle at Eastwood Road directing traffic *to* Grafty Green. Other signage was ok. CW reported this and was assured it would be rectified. Work didn't start work until midday on Monday (the first day) because the signage (to close the road) hadn't arrived.

Liverton Hill

During the current closure, workers are resurfacing some areas and refilling others. One diversion sign wrongly placed (Above)

Ditches, gullies, potholes - 7th and 8th July - KCC team investigating drains and gullies and put in a new drain at the Woodcock Lane junction side of problem. Problem is under driveway in Fox's Earth and would need jetting. Cllrs agreed that the Clerk write again.

The verges have not been cut in the Parish – cutting stops at the boundary at Southernden. This parish not been done at all and it should be twice a year. Clerk to contact KCC.

HGV signage – Clerk to contact Jenny Whittle (Also chase up the wooden finger post for the Village Green)

59 Bus – John Collins

The timetable not changed since February 2014 and he hasn't been notified of any changes. The next Group Meeting will be in September and as 56 days' notice for registration for changes is required, none are expected. Some newer buses are now in service which comply with the Disability Act.

Grafty Geeks

What's it all about?

Pokémon Go is a location-based, reality game for mobile devices, typically played on mobile phones. Players use the device's GPS and camera to capture, battle, and train virtual creatures called Pokémon, who appear on the screen as if they were in the same real-world location as the player. It was released in most regions of the world in July 2016

Game Play

After establishing a game account, the player creates an avatar by selecting a hair, skin, and eye colour; style; and outfit. After the avatar is created, it is displayed at the player's current location along with a map of the player's immediate surroundings.

Features on the map include a number of PokéStops and Pokémon gyms. PokéStops provide players with items, such as eggs, Poké Balls, and potions and can be equipped with items called lures, which attract wild Pokémon. Gyms serve as battle locations for team-based "king of the hill" matches. These are typically located at places of interest.

As players travel the real world, their avatar moves along the game's map. Different Pokémon species reside in different areas of the world; for example, water-type Pokémon are generally found near water. When a player encounters a Pokémon, they may view it either in augmented reality (AR) mode or with a live rendered, generic background. AR mode uses the camera and gyroscope on the player's mobile device to display an image of a Pokémon as though it were in the real world. Players can take screen shots of the Pokémon they encounter either with or without the AR mode activated.

The ultimate goal of the game is to complete the entries in the Pokédex, a comprehensive Pokémon encyclopaedia, by capturing and evolving to obtain the original 151 Pokémon.

This is the basics, there are other complexities to the game like capturing wild Pokémon, throwing a Poké Ball and being awarded with currencies and candies, so if you are interested in playing the game please go to the internet to get more detailed information.

Maidstone Museum wins Heritage Lottery Fund support

Maidstone Museum has received a £78,700 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for an exciting project to redisplay ancient Egyptian and Greek artefacts in an Ancient Civilisations Gallery. With support from the Maidstone Museums' Foundation, the Egyptology Department at the British Museum, the Petrie Museum at University College London, and the Egypt Exploration Society to research and uncover the stories behind the objects, the redisplay will be unveiled in Summer 2017 with a fantastic new space in which to discover the artefacts.

The project will enable visitors to Maidstone Museum to experience the Ancient Civilisations collections in a modern environment. The Museum's Cur8 youth group (ages 12-24) will research both the Victorian collectors responsible for bringing the items to Maidstone Museum, and the life of the museum's 2,500-year-old Egyptian mummy, Ta-Kesh. With nearly a third of the 10,000 annual school visitors finding out about ancient Egypt and Greece through workshops, local teachers will be invited to help create educational activities for school visits.

Maidstone Museum is owned and operated by Maidstone Borough Council, and holds more than 600,000 artefacts and specimens in its historic buildings. As the largest collection in Kent and one of the best regional museums in the South East, Maidstone Museum is free to attend and offers a wealth of educational services and workshops to local schools and visitors of all ages.

Commenting on the award, Lyn Palmer, Public Programming Manager at Maidstone Museum, said: "We are thrilled to have received the support of the Heritage Lottery Fund and we look forward to transforming the Ancient Civilisations Gallery into a fantastic space that educates, informs, and entertains. We're also delighted to be working with the Kent Association for the Blind to ensure that development of the space will be optimised for visually impaired visitors, while Maidstone Borough Council will be funding a new lift and ramps to provide accessibility to the gallery and other galleries currently out of reach to less able visitors."

Explaining the importance of the HLF support, the head of the HLF in the South East, Stuart McLeod, said: "We are pleased to support Maidstone Museum with their project to form a collectively-curated new space to exhibit and research artefacts from the Ancient Civilisations Gallery. Thanks to National Lottery players, the funding will engage the community and youth groups to research the collections and bring to life the stories behind the artefacts."

In addition to the redisplay of the Ancient Civilisations Gallery, Maidstone Museum will be working with the Kent Institute of Medicine and Science (KIMS) and Liverpool John Moores University to conduct a CT scan and facial reconstruction of Ta-Kesh, helping determine how this 2,500-year-old mummy – who passed away aged 14 – looked during her lifetime.

Christian Message August 2016

"Take back control." "Life will go on." "The sky hasn't fallen in." "Make Britain great again." "It's about sovereignty."

We've read or heard these things said before and after the referendum on the EU. I personally regret the outcome, having benefitted enormously from our membership (EU exchange scientists at Pfizer; scientific collaborations across Europe; school and university exchanges and collaborations, to name but a few). Others of course see it differently. Whichever side we're on, we must live with the result, slim as it was, and work our way through the political and economic turmoil that seems to be an immediate result.

The referendum has been described as a once in a generation decision. It's probably going to have its effects for far longer than a generation, though, and will affect each of us in ways we will never know. We can't run the "control experiment" to see what would happen if we didn't make that decision, so we'll never actually **know** the difference. Now we're out, we're out.

There is a parallel here with our spiritual lives. During our lifespan we make decisions day by day about what to do, where to shop, where to live, and so on. And we make decisions about God, too. To listen to him or not. To pray or not; to go to church, to give thanks for answered prayer, to give thanks for the safe delivery of a baby, to ask God's blessing on our marriage – and so on. Ultimately, we make a decision as to whether we are in God's family or not, in his kingdom or not.

"It's about sovereignty." In other words, it's about who controls our lives – Eurocrats, or our own politicians. The EU referendum may ultimately have been about that. For each of us, our response to God is about sovereignty, too. We see God's kingdom as either a threat – "I don't want God interfering in my life" or an amazing opportunity – "I love having God in my life" – for guidance, help, power to live well, forgiveness, being part of a loving community – the list goes on. How do **you** see it?

The decision to be a member of God's family, to be in his kingdom, to take up his offer of living life in all its fullness is one that is celebrated here and in heaven — Jesus said, "God's angels are happy when even one person turns to him." (Luke 15). It's not about God taking control, or interfering: it's about enjoying the best possible life, being fulfilled in every aspect of our lives with God as a friend and guide, alongside us through it all. And we **can** know the difference for good that it makes.

On this one, I want to say to everyone "vote in!" – come into God's family and you won't regret it for a minute.


