Fossil Festival

We need to know by the end of the week if anyone else would like to help at the Fossil Festival that is being held on the 11th and 12th September. Sessions run from 9am to 1pm or 12noon until 4pm on each day. Volunteers will be based outside the Rotunda to chat to visitors, tell them a little bit about what's going on, and direct them around the site. Other volunteers will be needed to assist in collecting information on where visitors have come from, how many people are in their group, and what aspects of the Festival they have particularly enjoyed.

Ragwort

There has been a lot of ragwort flowering in the park this year, especially on the bank above the pond. Ragwort is a controversial plant. On the one hand it is extremely poisonous and of particular danger to livestock who can suffer liver damage and death from eating the plant. It is the only plant to have its own act of parliament (Ragwort Control Act 2003). On the other hand it is a native biennial that is an important food source for many invertebrates. Over 200 species have been recorded visiting the plant for nectar and others, despite its toxicity, feed on the leaves. The brightly coloured caterpillars of the Cinnabar Moth feed on the leaves and absorb the poison, becoming poisonous to predators themselves. Should it be removed? Not necessarily. The law recognises its value to wildlife and recommends controlling the plant only if it is growing within 100m of fields used for grazing animals or growing fodder.
