

#### **HAZARDS TO GRAZING HORSES**

A Monkton horse owner has asked us to emphasise the hazards of small hard objects – in this case golf balls, being hit or thrown on to grazing paddocks.

Mrs. Kay Gregory of Golden Point Farm has recently found golf balls in the grass of her livestock paddocks. She points out that if a horse or any animal swallowed a golf ball it could have fatal results. Objects like golf balls could also cause a horse to stumble if a hoof slipped causing damage to its limbs, and injury to the rider.

Countryside agencies frequently point out that any kind of plastic waste or discarded rubbish can be severely damaging or life threatening to grazing animals and wild life.

## WITH TRIBUTE TO "THE FORGOTTEN ARMY"

Many of us watched the moving and sobering reflections from veterans and their relatives on televison broadcasts on the  $75^{th}$  anniversary of VJ Day  $-15^{th}$  August. Here in Monkton, on an unusually rainy Satyrday morning villagers gathered at Willetts Hill to mark two minutes silence, the reading of a commemorative poem for peace,, and at 11.10 am, the tolling of our parish church bell -75 times for each year since the end of the war.

Prayers were also read for peace and reconciliation between the world's nations.

Mr. David Blackwell read the poem, . Prayers were read by churchwarden, Denyse Cole, and Rev. Canon Peter Gausden.

Homes in the village were decorated with flags as in VE Day in May, and in spite of the rainy occasion front garden picnics tiook place.







#### THE PASTORAL LETTER ... CANON PETER GAUSDEN POINTS OUT THE IMPORTANCE OF EVENTS TODAY WHEN WE CANNOT ALTER EVENTS OF THE PAST

Dear Friends,

September, 2020

This has been a strange year thus far. It opened with very real concerns about Climate Change, rapidly overtaken by the more immediate threat from Covid 19.

Then came the brutal killing of George Floyd in the USA followed by the Black Lives Matter demonstrations in this country. Suddenly, the focus narrowed and it seems that we turned from the wider challenges of Covid and Climate in order to contemplate the evils of our British past. Poor Greta Thunberg was pushed right off the radar while we concentrated on pulling down statues of 18<sup>th</sup> Century profiteers from the slave trade and examined memorial inscriptions in churches in case they should need amendment or even deletion.

Rather than pursuing these sterile investigations into the past, would it not be more constructive to deal with what is going on at the present? If we really want to atone for the manifest evils of the 18<sup>th</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> Century slave trade, should we not be campaigning more vigorously against the slave traders of the present day? The recent arrivals on our coast of desperate migrants in small boats has been yet another reminder that slavers are still very active almost on our doorstep and 'people trafficking,' as we now call it, remains a world-wide and highly profitable business.

Does anybody worry about what colour these migrants are? What counts is that they our brothers and sisters in the human family of God, and to him, All Lives Matter.



## VILLAGE NATURE NOTES from DR. CLIVE NUTTMAN Murderous plants and 'singing' caterpillars in Monkton!

he wildflower field between the Monkton Street and the recreation fields is taking on a distinctly autumnal appearance. Hastened by dry conditions and plenty of sunshine, things are looking rather brown as the grass is well past its best and many flowering plants have gone to seed. The dried reddish-brown spikes of docks are very conspicuous, along with thousands of common knapweed; the brown thistle-like seed heads will ensure that next summer will see another colourful display of purple flowers that will attract insects in search of nectar and pollen. Thistles have taken over along the eastern margin and, together with some buddleia, the remaining flowers offer some attractive resources for bees, flies and butterflies.

A few splashes of yellow and pink colour are provided by various vetches and the large flowers of some late-flowering oxeye daisies catch the attention, together with several 'umbellifers'. This is the name given to the carrot family of plants; I always think of 'umbrellas', as many of the members of this group have large platforms made up of masses of tiny white-creamish flowers that look a bit like an umbrella! Among the hedge parsley and wild carrot is yarrow, a plant that looks as though it is closely related but is in the daisy family – it's easily distinguished by the very fine, almost feathery, dark green leaves. Umbellifers to avoid include giant hogweed, hemlock, and wild parsnip – all three are poisonous (hemlock was the plant that killed Socrates!) and will cause blistering of the skin.

Further colour is on offer from numerous butterflies; whilst brightly-hued peacocks and red admirals feast on the buddleia, most of the butterflies in the field are rather drab. Gatekeepers, meadow browns and small heaths are present in good numbers but are quite dowdy in comparison and easily overlooked; small and large whites are also abundant. A gaudy exception is the common blue butterfly. Although small, the beautiful lilac-blue males catch the eye – the females are duller and brownish. The males hold, and aggressively defend, small territories,

gaining mating opportunities with any female that wanders into the patch. Once the eggs hatch, the caterpillars – in common with other members of the 'blue family' – provide one of the most extraordinary stories in natural history. The caterpillars sing! Inaudible to the human ear, and probably made through the compression of air in the body, the sounds – together with chemicals produced from tiny pores – serve to attract ants. Whilst ants are carnivores and would usually eat such a defenceless 'meal', they end up 'tending' the tiny larvae; the ants touch the caterpillar's body with their antennae, stimulating them to excrete a sugary solution that the ants gorge on. This strange relationship has benefits to both parties – the ants get a 'free meal' and the caterpillars are protected by their new friends. Sometimes, fact is stranger than fiction!

#### THE KENTISH RECIPE ...

## MARROW OR COURGETTE CHUTNEY – a solution for using up all those extra vegetables. Ingredients

- 1.5kg/3lb 5 oz marrow or courgettes, peeled and deseeded
- 225g shallot, sliced
- 225g apple, peeled, cored and sliced
- 225g sultana
- 2cm piece ginger, finely chopped
- 225g demerara sugar
- 850ml malt vinegar
- 12 black peppercorns

#### Method

**STEP 1** Cut the marrow into small pieces, put in a bowl and sprinkle liberally with 2 tbsp salt. Cover and leave for 12 hrs.

**STEP 2** Rinse and drain the marrow or courgettes, then place in a preserving pan or large saucepan with the shallots, apples, sultanas, ginger, sugar and vinegar. Tie the peppercorns in muslin (or put into a small enclosed tea strainer) and place in the pan. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer, stirring from time to time, until the consistency is thick.

**STEP 3** Leave to settle for 10 mins, then spoon into sterilised jars (see tip below), put on the lids and label. *Will keep for a year in a cool, dark place.* 

Just before you start cooking your chutney, wash your jars in hot, soapy water, then leave in a low oven to dry completely.

Recipe note. The reason for sprinkling the marrow or courgettes with salt is to draw out excess moisture.





## HARVESTS AROUND MONKTON IN THE EARLIER MEDIEVAL TIMES

it is unlikely Monkton will be able to celebrate Harvest in the usual way this year, but the continuum of being thankful for what our land provides has been going on for centuries, and although quantities and technology have changed dramatically, the real sense of harvest has not changed at all.

The picture above shows a glimpse of what might have been going on in the land of Monkton manor in the early 1300s.around this time of year. We are used to seeing miles of golden grain around us and the blonde fields after the crops have been harvested.

Thanet has been well known for grain growing as long as farming communities have existed.

It is fascinating to realise these early Monkton villagers, who were largely in thrall to the monks at Christ Church Priory, Canterbury, were during late August and September gazing upon similar golden fields.

Every year at Michaelmas, 29<sup>th</sup> September, the manor stewards or beadles were obliged to submit accounts to the Priory at Canterbury. In the later 1200s most of the arable fields were sown with barley and oats, but rising amounts of wheat were sown from 1300 to 1325 around Monkton and towards Brooksend.

The manorial records show that frumentum, an early form of barley, and inde, another early grain crop, were also cultivated in quite large acreages. Vetches, peas and beans were also grown for food. This corn farming was very profitable for both the monks of Christ Church and their tenants.

In the 13<sup>th</sup> century, around 1225 the land workers of Monkton were being innovative in practising marling, which means adding chalk or lime to clay soil to improve it. By the 14<sup>th</sup> century fertilising the fields was normal practice. As chalk was available so near the surface around our village it is not surprising there are traces of so many chalk holes in the district.

#### **FORAGING IN SEPTEMBER**

In recent months many people have ventured in to our local countryside and may have noticed the wide variety of wild fruits and vegetables thriving there.

Collecting wild food or FORAGING is highly fashionable and often seen on TV chef programmes. But there is a catch. Pickers need to know that clearing the countryside of nuts, berries, other fruits and wild edible plants may seem very chic, but is also damaging to our flora and fauna if not carried out in a thoughtful way, and without damaging the countryside.

Some of the berries in large quantities locally include the following – blackberries, hawthorn berries, rose hips, elderberries and sloe berries,

Not immediately in Monkton, but in woods In our area you can pick up sweet chestnuts, hazel nuts, and beech nuts. Many people have walnut trees growing near them in Monkton. Walnuts grow in a hard green outer casing, a bit like conkers. You need to be quick to gather these as squirrels, gather them and hide them for the winter.

A quick search on line, or in traditional recipe books will give you all sorts of ideas for using these wild foods. Ensure that eating them raw or without cooking in a certain way will not have a toxic result.

There are plenty of websites, with well-illustrated articles on seasonal foraging – so don't be afraid to have a go perhaps making elderberry wine, or sloe gin.

If you are unsure about where it is OK to gather, you can always check with the landowner. And make sure you follow the country code.
