

#### Lockdown by Alex Clarke

When I was asked to record a few reflections on this past year I realised that I had already forgotten some of the extraordinary time we have all been through. On 20th March 2020, all our lives were thrown into disarray. 14 months later, after a few false starts, it looks as if we might be finally creeping back to a bit of normality.

Before COVID, no one would have believed what we were about to experience and in time I cannot help feeling that it will still be hard to take in what we have lived through. Like so many others, we were initially shocked and seriously concerned about our future. There have been so many lives lost in the last year, we realised that our relative inconveniences needed to be kept in perspective.

After the initial shock and panic, it became apparent that somehow, we have managed to survive and that we were going to get through this. Our business, like the country as a whole, was is going to take a long time to rebuild and recoup all that was lost, but at least we would will have retained our a sound base, with all the team intact.

Click & Collect Fish & Chips and Provisions soon became the new normal and rhythm of our lives. The chat through the French doors revealed so many different stories - no two were the same, no one had been left untouched. It was a strange existence. I was working as many hours to deliver a couple of services from each pub a week as I had been working previously to deliver fourteen services from each pub. It still seemed to be mad, but also right thing to be doing.

Sometimes, I wondered whether I was doing it for the community and the community were kindly coming out to support us, but the reality was that the whole thing was a nonsense. I hope, however, that, I concluded correctly that more than anything else, it provided a bit of social contact and community glue that we were all missing desperately from our lost normal lives. A key moment came when we had finally got the timings so well organised that customers were collecting their Fish & Chips or Provisions without crossing over with anyone else before or after them. But it became clear that this defeated the most important a key point of the exercise – a bit of (socially distanced) interaction. As we come out the other side, it has been an absolute joy to see life seeping back into the pub. It has been wonderful to see the shear pleasure of customers being allowed to visit us again. Less anticipated was the delight of my children on their to return to school and the relief of the teams to be allowed back to work. So much that we took for granted is now so much more appreciated. The novelty value will, of course, wear off but it would be good for us all to remember those

Thank you all so much for your support through this. It gave us a sense of purpose and helped us retain an element of sanity. We really want to be at the heart of the village, and to provide somewhere for locals to meet up safely, so that we can all enjoy filling that much missed gap of communal company and, conversation over some good food and a welcome drink.

Fingers crossed for a continued steady opening up. Best wishes to all Alex and the teams





#### **COVID-19 Vaccinations**

We continue to deliver second vaccinations, working in date order, vaccinating patients 11-12 weeks following their first dose.

Current guidelines state that patients have to return to the venue where they had their first vaccination, as the second dose will be allocated and sent to that venue. Should these guidelines change we will, of course, let everyone know.

We appreciate that everyone wants to know when their appointment will be, and we are working as fast as possible to get through our patient lists. Please bear with us as our team continue to work incredibly hard to deliver the vaccine into our community.

## **COVID-19 Vaccine Safety**

The UK vaccination programme has been very successful. At the time of writing, more than 30 million people have been vaccinated and it is estimated that 6,000 lives have already been saved.

There have been reports of a very rare condition involving blood clots and unusual bleeding after vaccination. This is being carefully monitored and reviewed.

#### THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Many of us wait anxiously for the outcome of the recent public inquiry into a possible increase in the passenger cap at Stansted Airport, yet the local community's love-hate relationship with Stansted Airport is only the latest in a series of significant aviation events that have occurred within the Hundred Parishes.

In a field at Standon Green End in the parish of Thundridge, a monument marks the spot where Italian balloonist Vincenzo Lunardi landed in 1784 after completing the first manned flight in England. He took off from London beneath a balloon filled with hydrogen.

In 1913, Bentfield Hucks was the first Englishman to loop-the-loop in his Bleriot aeroplane. He was born

Imperial War Museum- Duxford

in 1884 in Bentfield Cottage, Stansted Mountfitchet and thus acquired his unusual forename.

Duxford airfield, now the site of Imperial War Museum, Duxford, first became operational in World War I. Some of its buildings, constructed by German prisoners-of-war, still stand. In 1938, Duxford was the first airfield to take delivery of Spitfire fighter planes. Frank Whittle flew regularly from here while he was developing ideas that eventually led to the invention of the turbojet engine just before the end of WWII.

Altogether, twelve military airfields operated within the Hundred Parishes during WWII. Andrewsfield, straddling the parish boundary between The Salings and Stebbing, was the first American-built base in Europe, becoming operational in 1943. Stansted was another American-built airfield. Thousands of Americans were based in this area; many never saw home again.
