Community Gold and Silver Awards




Adrian Cottle and Ray Pattemore - Silver Award:



Well. about 25 I built years ago, this large Radio-Controlled yacht. Then. moved house and it went. temporarily, into the loft, and there it stayed.





what3words

what3words divides the Earth's surface into 3 m squares. Each square corresponds to three randomly generated words to provide a unique description of the location. This can be incredibly useful for identifying a precise location such as where to meet someone or locating people during search and rescue.





For example, during a search and rescue in County Durham what3words was used to locate lost people within Hamsterly Forest. After calling 999 the lost people were asked to download the what3words app and send the three words corresponding to their location to the call-handler. This information was then used to quickly find the lost people.

By entering the corresponding three words into the what3words app the location of the lost people can be found, shown left.

what3words can also be accessed online, a section of the road entering the Devizes Police HQ is identified by the words volunteered.wire.recap, shown above. This can be confirmed by the following the link:

Tuscan Ribollita ~ Soup

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp. olive oil, plus extra to drizzle
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 carrots, finely chopped
- 75 g (3 oz) kale
- 2 x 400 tins chopped tomatoes
- 750 ml (1 ¼ pint) vegetable stock pinch of sugar
- 125 g (4 oz) stale crusty bread, roughly chopped
- 400 g (14 oz) tin cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
- 40 g (1 ½ oz) Parmesan cheese, finely grated, plus extra to serve
- Large handful parsley, roughly chopped



Tip:

This recipe can be made vegan by using a vegan alternative for or not including the Parmesan cheese.

Method:


- 1. Heat oil in a large pan and gently fry onion and carrots for 5 min until softened. Add garlic and fry for 1 min more.
- 2. Meanwhile, remove and discard woody stems from the kale and shred the leaves.
- 3. Add tomatoes, stock and kale to the pan and bring to the boil. Simmer for 10 min until kale is tender. Next add sugar, bread and cannellini beans and simmer for a few minutes more, stirring occasionally, until bread is starting to break down. Stir through Parmesan and most of the parsley and check seasoning.
- 4. Ladle into 4 warm soup bowls, sprinkle over remaining parsley, a drizzle of oil and some more Parmesan. Serve.

Roly-Poly Bread and Butter Pudding

Ingredients:

- 85 g very soft butter, plus extra for the dish
- 350 g raspberry jam
- large fresh unsliced white bread loaf (about 800 g)
- 4 eggs
- 400 ml double cream
- 400 ml milk
- 85 g caster sugar, plus a little extra
- 1 tsp vanilla paste or seeds scraped from 1 vanilla pod





- 1. Butter a deep 2-litre baking dish. Dollop in half the jam and spread over the base of the dish. Trim the crusts and rounded top from the loaf so that you are left with a rectangular block of bread. Cut into 4 thick slices of bread. Whizz the crusts and left-over bread into crumbs and freeze for later.
- 2. Spread the butter over one side of each slice of bread. Flip the slices over and spread the un-buttered sides with remaining jam. Roll up the slices from the short sides, jam-side inwards, to make 4 fat Swiss rolls. Halve each so you end up with 8 short, squat Swiss rolls. Squish these snugly into the baking dish, cut sides up, so you can see 8 jam swirls.
- 3. Whisk together the eggs, cream and milk, then sieve into a jug with the sugar and vanilla. Give a good stir, then carefully pour over the bread swirls - you may have to do this in stages, letting the custard soak in bit by bit. Let the dish stand at room temperature for 30 mins so the custard continues to soak in.
- 4. Heat oven to 160 C / 140 C fan/gas 3. Scatter some more caster sugar over the pudding, then bake for 1 hr-1 hr 15 mins until the top is golden and the custard is gently set. Cool for 5 mins, then serve.

Wiltshire Police Trivia - Ken Drew

The early 19th Century saw too much agricultural unrest in Wiltshire for Salisbury City Police to deal with. A County Police was proposed. In 1839, Wiltshire became the first county to form a county-level police force. But, only just; the second - Gloucestershire Police, were formed only a few days later!



Thus, the motto of Wiltshire Police - Primus et Optimus or First and Best.

The first Chief Constable was a retired Sea Captain. He was paid £400 a year. Constables (170) received 87½ P per week. In return they had a uniform, a truncheon and a booklet but no training.

In 1841, however, attempts were made to abolish Wiltshire Police on the grounds of being too expensive. County wide petitions were signed. Westbury's petition still exists. It is over 20 feet long!

In 1918 Florence White became first female constable.

Wiltshire Constabulary became Wiltshire Police in 2005.

Wiltshire Police is the third smallest territorial Police Force in the UK. Only the City of London Police and Warwickshire Police are smaller. But it has the 20th largest geographic area to police of the 45 territorial police forces of the country.

In 2018, Wiltshire Police were awarded a prestigious World Class Policing Award in recognition of its 'outstanding' response to the 2018 Novichok attacks in Salisbury and Amesbury.

The force headquarters is in Devizes. Wiltshire Police employs more than 2,000 people including approximately 960 officers. Volunteers and members of the Special Constabulary also play a vital role as part of the policing family within the County.

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Wiltshire is one of the safest counties in the UK, currently with the sixth lowest crime rate per 1,000 people in England.
