**HURSLEY with AMPFIELD**, a parish, including the hamlet of Ampfield, and situated on the high road from Romsey to Winchester, distance  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles east of the former, and  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles from the latter towns. Hursley Park, with its large and elegant mansion, the seat of Sir William Heathcote, Bart., overlooking a vast tract of country, richly wooded and well stocked with deer, and surrounded by plantations and scenery of considerable beauty for many miles. The church is an ancient building, principally of brick, with square tower of stone. The whole of the edifice, with the exception of the tower, is about to be taken down, and a new one to be erected on its site; a temporary place of worship is now being fitted up for the reception of the congregation during the alterations. The living is a

rectory, in the patronage of Sir W. Heathcote, Bart., and enjoyed by the Rev. John Keble, A.M. The Union workhouse is at the extreme eastern end of the village.

**AMPFIELD**, a hamlet of Hursley, pleasantly situated  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles west of Hursley, has a church of considerable beauty; it is nearly new, and built in the Gothic style; the material is blue brick and stone. It has a slate roof and belfry, with a tasty octagonal spire. At the western entrance of the churchyard is a conduit, curiously built of stone, with an appropriate scriptural tablet, and surmounted with a cross. The living is endowed with £2,000 by Sir W. Heathcote and J. White, Esq. The present incumbent is the Rev. Robert F. Wilson, A.M.

**HURSTBOURNE TARRANT** is a large village in Hampshire, situated in a narrow but pleasant valley, through which, for three parts of the year, flows a small stream called the Swift, which rises in the parish. It is  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles north-east from Andover, and  $10\frac{1}{2}$  miles west from Newbury; it is in the Union of Andover, hundred of Pastrow, Division of Kingsclere, diocese of Winchester, and in the northern division of the county. It contains 900 inhabitants. The living, now in the gift of the Bishop of Winchester, is a vicarage, with Fernhams, or Vernhams Deane, annexed. It is now held by Rev. Gilbert Alder, M.A., and the Rev. James Connell, is the curate. The tithes are commuted, the rectorial, on lives to John King, Esq., at £1,340 per annum and the vicarial at £455 11s. 6d. per annum. The vicarial glebe is worth £50 yearly, exclusive of the tithes, which is excellent. The church, dedicated to St. Andrew, is very ancient, has a square wooden tower with cylindrical piers, and low pointed arches, of a latter part of the twelfth century; a chancel, with monuments to the memory of the Paulet family, and others. The Independents have a chapel here, and a school. There is a National school, recently erected, in which William Vokins is master. It is supported in part by sums of £5 and £210s., bequeathed by William Jones and Peter Dore, in 1756, for the purpose of educating the poor,

and with 18 shillings, part of £9 per annum arising from £300 consolidated annuities, invested by Richard Bunny in 1770, and by a deed executed by him directed to be annually distributed to the unprovided poor of Hurstbourne Tarrant, but 18 shillings thereof was to be applied by the trustees or wardens to the educating two or more poor children. The three sums, £5, £2 10s., and 18s., are now appropriated to the support of the National school, with £8 per annum presented by D. Dewar, Esq., and £10 per annum presented by T. A. Smith, Esq., making together £26 8s., which is further augmented for a sufficient stipend for the master by annual subscriptions from the landowners and inhabitants. The whole parish, including the hamlets of Ibthorp and Upton, comprises 5,035 acres, in which there are two large woods and two commons, of 200 acres and 70 acres; the latter distinct from the former; the owners and occupiers of the hamlet of Ibthorp only having a right thereon, and which extends to everything there growing for their own use in the hamlet, but not for sale; and they are the lords, each in their own right, thereof, as they are also of their own land in the hamlet of Ibthorp. The general surface of the land is hilly, but fertile and productive, and the soil, which inclines to the calcareous principally, is well suited to the growth of wheat, turnips and saintfoin. The rateable value is £4,123; D. A. B. Dewar, Esq., is the lord of the manor.

**HURSTBURNE PRIORS**, a parish in the Hundred of Evingar, 9 miles north-west from the Andover road station of the South Western railway, and 2 from Whitechurch. The church, St. John, is a rather large structure, with low tower, which has a very fine peal of bells. The living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Winchester, and the

tithes have been commuted for £190; it is at present held by the Rev. S. T. Lockhart, of St. Mary Bourne. The parish contains 506 inhabitants, and 3,070 acres of land. The Earl of Portsmouth is lord of the manor, whose seat, Hurstburne Park, is in the parish.

**HYTHE** is a chapelry or district division, in the parish of Fawley, 3 miles west of Southampton, by water, and 12 by land. It is in the Union of New Forest, Hundred of Bishops Waltham, Southampton and South divisions of the county of Southampton, most agreeably situated on the bank of the Southampton water, and nearly opposite to that town, with which a communication is kept up by the passage boats, at the charge of threepence each person. Here are many respectable houses. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the incumbent of the parish of Fawley, of the

annual value of about £150. The Hon. and Rev. Adolphus Frederick Irby, M.A., is the present curate. The church, dedicated to St. John, is of brick and stone, and was built in 1823 by public subscription, aided by a grant from the incorporated church building society; it has 250 free sittings. Here is a National school supported by voluntary contributions, aided by a small weekly payment by the pupils. Also a place of worship for independents. Andrew Robert Drummond, Esq., is the lord of the manor.

The living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Winchester, and the tithes have been commuted for £190;

it is held by the Rev. S. T. Lockhart, of St. Mary Bourne. The parish contains 468 inhabitants, and 3,132 acres of land. The Earl of Portsmouth is lord of the manor, whose seat, Hurstbourne Park, is in the parish. Here is a paper mill. **APSLBY, FAULKNERS DOWN** and **NEW BARN** are farms.

**HYTHE** is a hamlet, town, and ecclesiastical division in the parish of Fawley, New Forest Union, Dibden liberty, South Hants, 6 miles from Redbridge station, 91 from London, 3 miles west of Southampton by water and 12 by land. It is most agreeably situated on the bank of the Southampton water, and nearly opposite to that town, with which a communication is kept up by the passage boats. In 1851 the population was 680. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the incumbent of the parish of Fawley, of the annual value of £150; the Hon. and Rev. Adol-

phus Frederick Irby, M.A., is the curate. The church, dedicated to St. John, is of brick and stone, and was built in 1823 by public subscription, aided by a grant from the Incorporated Church Building Society; it has 250 free sittings. Here is a National school, supported by voluntary contributions, aided by a small weekly payment by the pupils; also a place of worship for Independents. Andrew Robert Drummond, Esq., is the lord of the manor.

**PERRY** is 1 mile west; Mullins, half a mile south-west, Langdown, 1 mile south-west.

Its parish contains 867 souls and 5035 acres of land, rising in bold undulations, and including the small village of IBTHORPE, or *Ibthrop*, half a mile N., and part of UPTON hamlet, which is 2 miles N.N.W. of the church, and is partly in the parish of Vernham's Dean. Though hilly, the parish is generally fertile, and well suited to the growth of wheat, turnips, saintfoin, &c., the soil being chiefly calcareous. It includes more than 1200 acres of woods, and has two high moorland commons, one 200 and the other 70 acres. On the latter, the inhabitants of Ibthorpe hamlet have exclusive commonright, but the other is open to all the parishioners. The parish extends to *Prosperous, Pilldown, and Lower Conholt farms*, the latter of which is near the borders of Wiltshire. David Attinwell Bartle Dewar, Esq., of London, is lord of the manor, but a great part of the soil belongs to smaller freeholders. The CHURCH (St. Peter) is an ancient structure, of mixed architecture, with a wooden tower and five bells. The cylindrical pillars and low-pointed arches of the nave are of the 12th century. The chancel was restored in 1853, at the cost of £600, by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as appropriators of the rectory. It contains a handsome monument in memory of *Lieut. Fras. Alder*, of the 77th regiment, who died at *Scutari*, Oct. 6th, 1854, aged 21. He was the third son of the present vicar. Among the other monuments is one to a *Paulet*, and another in memory of the Rev. Peter Debary, who was 40 years vicar here, and died in 1841, aged 77. The vicarage, valued in K.B. at £8. 13s. 4d., and now at £370, with the curacy of Vernham's-Dean annexed to it, is in the patronage of the Bishop of Winchester and incumbency of the Rev. Gilbert Alder, M.A., who is also rural dean of the *N.W. Division of Andover Deanery*. (See page 68.) The glebe is 8 acres. The Vicarage House is a commodious residence, which was improved in 1842, at the cost of £800. The tithes were commuted in 1841—the vicarial for £267. 11s. 6d., and the rectorial for £704. 17s. 6d. There is an *Independent Chapel* in the village, built in 1840, and there is a smaller one at Upton. The *National School* was built in 1848, at the cost of £374. Two yearly rent charges, viz., £5 left by *Wm. Jones* in 1756, and £2. 10s. left by *Peter Dore* in the same year, are applied towards the support of the school. Poor widows and widowers of the parish have 20s. a-year left by *Mary Mundy*, in 1706, out of land at North Down. In 1775, *Richard Bunny* gave £300 three-per-cent. consols, in trust for relieving the poor parishioners, and schooling two poor children of that part of Upton which is in this parish. Out of the dividends the trustees pay 16s. 8d. yearly to the school, and they distribute the remainder among 40 or 50 poor parishioners. In 1797, the *Rev. Peter Debary* left £25, in trust to apply the interest in distributions of religious books. The poor of Ibthorpe hamlet have a yearly rent-charge of 7s. 6d., left by *Luke Pearce*, out of land at Wildhern.

Wm. Mortimore, Esq., is lord of the manor, but a great part of the soil belongs to the Pierrepont, Lawrence, Fowle, Carter, Smith, and other families. The **CHURCH** (St. Thomas) is a small antique edifice, with a low wooden tower. The benefice is a *curacy* consolidated with Faccombe Rectory. Tangley tithes were commuted in 1838, for £330 per annum. *Post via Andover.*

**VERNHAM'S DEAN**, or **VERNHAM**, is a large hilly parish adjoining Wiltshire, extending from 7 to 9 miles N. of Andover, and including the small neighbouring villages of **DEAN**, **VERNHAM ROW**, and **VERNAM STREET**, about 8 miles S. of Hungerford and N. of Andover; and part of **UPTON** hamlet, which is only 7 miles N. of Andover, and is partly in the parish of **HURSTBOURNE-TARRANT**, as already noticed. The parish includes also several scattered farm houses, &c., and contains 744 souls and 3840 acres of land, rising in bold undulations, and having a strong chalky soil. Wm. Child, Esq., is lord of the manor, and occupies the Manor farm (more than 600 acres,) but the greater part of the parish belongs to the Heath, Miles, Herriott, Hilliard, Hooper, Randall, Bevan, and other families. The **CHURCH** (Virgin Mary) is near Vernham street, and was restored in 1851, at the cost of £1000. It is a neat structure, in the Early English style, except the western doorway, which is a fine specimen of Norman architecture. The benefice is a *curacy*, consolidated with the Vicarage of **HURSTBOURNE-TARRANT**. The tithes of this parish were commuted in 1841—the vicarial for £188, and the rectorial for £635. 2s. 6d. The latter belong to James King, Esq. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have small chapels here.

**LINKENHOLT**, a small village on an eminence, 9 miles N. of Andover and S. of Hungerford, is near the junction of the three counties of Hants, Wilts, and Berkshire, and has in its parish only 90 souls and 1074 acres of land. **HURSTBOURNE TARRANT** is a large village, 5½ miles north-west from Andover, situate in a narrow but pleasant valley, through which, for three months of the year, flows a small stream called the Swift or Test, which rises in the parish: it is in the Northern division of the county, Andover union, petty sessional division and county court district, Pastrow hundred, diocese and archdeaconry of Winchester, and rural deanery of Andover north division. The church of St. Peter is very ancient, and has a square wooden tower with 5 bells: it has a nave with aisles, separated by cylindrical piers and low pointed arches of the date of the latter part of the twelfth century, and chancel, in which are monuments to the Paulet family and others. The register dates from the year 1546. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Winchester, and held by the Rev. Gilbert Alder, B.C.L., late scholar of Trinity Hall, Cambridge, surrogate. Three sums of £5, £2 10s. and 18s., bequeathed by different donors, are appropriated to the support of the National school, aided by annual subscriptions from the landowners and inhabitants. The Independents and Primitive Methodists have chapels here. A. W. Dewar, esq., who is lord of the manor, the Misses Mosdell, and Henry Atkins, esq., are the principal landowners. The general surface of the land is hilly, but fertile and productive, and the soil, which inclines to the calcareous, is well suited to the growth of wheat, turnips and saintfoin. The rateable value is £4,484 15s. 0d. The whole parish, including the hamlets of IBTHORP (or

IBTHORP), three-quarters of a mile north-west, UPTON, 2 miles north-west, and CONHOLT, 3 miles north-west, comprises 5,036 acres, in which there are two large woods and two commons of 200 acres and 70 acres, the latter distinct from the former; the owners and occupiers of the hamlet of Ithorp only having a right thereon, and which extends to everything there growing, for their own use in the hamlet but not for sale; and they are the lords, each in their own right thereof, as they are also of their own land in the hamlet of Ithorp. Rateable value £4,788; the population in 1871 was 887.

**HYDE**, 2 miles south-east from Fordingbridge, is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1855 from the old parish of St. Mary, Fordingbridge, in the Southern division of the county, Fordingbridge union, county court district and hundred, in the rural deanery of West Fordingbridge, and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester. ## Hurstbourne Tarrant

**Hurstbourne Tarrant** was a Saxon settlement (Hissaburnham), part of the extensive King's Forest. In 1266 Hurstbourne was granted to the Cistercian nunnery at Tarrant in Dorset, hence the name. Writer William Cobbett loved the village, staying often with his friend Joseph Blount at Rookery Farm where he wrote much of his 'Rural Rides'. He made more than 20 references to 'the village of Uphusband, the legal name of which is Hurstbourne Tarrant'. In one he commented 'I love this place'. The very large gravestone of his friend Joseph is just inside the lych gate of St Peter's Church. He left instructions that the stone should be large enough for children to play marbles on. In the church you will see the fine painting of the 'Three Quick and Three Dead'.

**Ibthorpe.** Ibbers Farm (Ibthorpe) is a possible site where Olaf's hostages settled. These people stayed as part of an agreement with King Ethelred made in 994 when the Viking, Olaf Tryggvason, having been confirmed by Bishop Alphege of Winchester, returned to Norway and converted his country to Christianity.

**Upton**, one of the small hamlets in the Parish, earns a mention in the Domesday Book. In the 11th century, 'Optune' formed part of the possessions of Edith, queen of Edward the Confessor.

The Bourne rivulet is one of the highest sources of the river Test.

“..parish of Hurstbourne Tarrant 867 souls and 5035 acres, rising in bold undulations.....more than 1200 acres of woods...2 high moorland commons, one 200 and the other 70 acres. David Attinwell Bartle Dewar is lord of the manor but a great part of the soil belongs to smaller freeholders...the Rev Peter Debarry was 40 years vicar here and died in 1841, aged 77. The vicarage, valued in K.B. at £8 13s 4d and now at £370, with the curacy of Vernham Dean annexed to it, is in the patronage of the Bishop of Winchester and incumbency of the Rev Gilbert Alder MA, who is also rural dean of the northwest division of Andover Deanery. The glebe is 8 acres. The vicarage house is a commodious residence, which was improved in 1842 at the cost of £800. The National School was built in 1848 at a cost of £374. Two yearly rent charges, viz £5 left by William Jones in 1756 and £2 10s left by Peter Dore in the same year are applied towards the support of the school. Poor widows and widowers of the parish have 20s a year left by Mary Mundy in 1706, out of land at North Down. In 1775 Richard Bunny gave £300 three per cent consols. [consolidated] in trust for relieving the poor parishioners...the poor of Ibthorpe hamlet have a yearly rent charge of 7s 6d left by Luke Pearce out of land at Wildhern.

The Post Office is at Mrs Ann Batchelor’s. Henry Day, of Ibthorpe, is the weekly carrier, to Newbury on Tuesday and Andover on Friday.
