Nobody expects the IA inquisition

My knock on Jacky Parsons' door was timely. As Acting Chair of the Village Hall Committee, she has been putting extraordinary effort into upgrading the venue, which will soon boast revamped electrics, drains, kitchen, loos etc. Whilst the hall hosts several meetings and functions, it is an underused resource, but one that has huge untapped potential. I live almost opposite and wanted to find out more.

RH: I remember seeing that the hall was opened by Lady Olave Baden-Powell. Was it originally for Scouts and Guides? **JP:** No, but it was generously funded by the Leslie Sell Foundation, which was set up primarily to provide financial assistance to the Scouting and Guiding movements nationwide. The Sell family lived in IA and wanted to support their own community, although the village itself is too small to support a Scout Group or Guide Company. **RH:** So who owns it and runs it now? **JP:** The Leslie Sell Foundation has gifted most of its properties but still owns ours.

We have a temporary lease. It is run by a small committee, which would very much welcome new members. The Foundation would like to gift our hall to the community and this would mean setting up a charity to run it. The work that has recently been done will help to make it more attractive to potential users and hence more likely to be financially viable. It needs some more modernisation but, with a good plan for its future, the Foundation might well consider providing the funding to achieve that. **RH:** Gift horses and mouths come to mind. What are the next steps?



JP: I plan to send round a questionnaire in February asking what people would like of the hall. It is ideas to ensure its viability that we really need and, of course, any offers of help in running and maintaining it would be incredibly useful. We particularly need somebody who would be willing to set up and run a web site to promote it. RH: From the plaque in the entrance I see that next January will be the hall's 40th anniversary. Let's hope that, by then, its future will be secure and we have a good excuse for a party!

Claus for celebration

I was away over Christmas but on return heard tell of sightings of Santa in the village. So I emailed the North Pole and Father C kindly sent me a picture. I had a word with Rudolph the red-nosed Range Rover, sorry, Reindeer, too. He told me that he was a bit nervous flying over Ashridge but that Ivinghoe Aston was the most wonderful place he'd been. Amelie and Phoebe followed Santa, sleigh bells jingling and ho-ho-ho-ing, to The Village Swan, where they were delighted to receive a bag of sweets. "The candy canes were



the best" they said "and Santa even made it snow!" Very many thanks to Santa, reindeer and elves.

The deer of Ashridge

Fallow deer have been a feature of Ashridge for a thousand years. In 1926 the Brownlow Deer Park was home to 500 red deer and 500 fallow deer in. The reds were rounded up and sold, but the fallows remained and escaped into the surrounding countryside when fencing fell into disrepair. In 1955 the need for management was recognised. The population today is probably around 1200, up from 800 or so in 1988, although precise numbers are virtually impossible to assess. Scientific studies show that the estate and the countryside around it could maintain around 600 without causing unacceptable damage to other aspects of the biodiversity. A carefully organised annual cull of the least healthy animals takes place in late autumn and early winter.

Not so long ago there were more than 100 road traffic accidents each year involving deer, but now there are only 20 or so. The reduction is probably down to greater awareness in drivers as a result of publicity, and possibly a change of behaviour in the deer. Remember that they are herd animals and if one crosses a road nothing will stop the rest from following! The correct course of action in the event of an accident is to call the police. Rangers will help with injured deer if on National Trust land, but there is no out of hours service.

Ashridge is a priceless local asset. Karen Groom and I are members of the Estate Committee and happy to field any questions you may have about the Estate. We are grateful to Lawrence Trowbridge, Head Ranger, for the information above.

appy New Year to all our lvinghoe Community and our own building's 151st year of existence! As we take down our sparkly Christmas decorations and plan our next

trustees meeting, **lvinghoe Old School Community Hub** is presently chewing on a newish phenomenon we might take part in – and we need to know what you think about it also. It works from two angles of giving time and receiving a 'Credit'. So, we would like to introduce you to the concept of **TIME CREDITS**.

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We all need a little help sometimes, for lots of things. Our communities are no different, and this is where Time Credits come in. If you give an hour of your time to your community, your community can 'thank you' by giving you an hour back to spend on something you like to do, if you want, in any of the venues we show here. Everyone's hour is worth the same and everyone gets thanked. **We all like a thank you really, I find!** There is no limit to how many credits you can earn, and you can save them yourself, or share them with friends.



Our group of voluntary trustees will be discussing whether the Hub joins this volunteers scheme offering Time Credits, and if so, what we can offer back into the pot like the other venues below, to be enjoyed for free from your saved earned Time Credits...and so far, free computer use has been suggested. Some venues already part of the scheme are: Places for People Leisure centres has joined the scheme giving Time Credits Countrywide for swimming, as has the Wycombe Swan which has offered theatre tickets on particular performances: Chiltern Music Therapy has offered workshops which look at 'creating change and improvements in communication, physical, social, cognitive and emotional wellbeing and mental health needs'. Other venues who have joined the scheme locally and in London include the Agua Vale Swimming Pool Aylesbury, Swan Pool Buckingham, Better Leisure Centres Countrywide including Chiltern, Chesham and Chalfont Leisure Centres; the Wycombe Wanderers Football Club: Lords Cricket Ground; Amersham Museum; Adult Learning Centres across Bucks; Marlow Museum; British Museum; Museum of London: Tower of London: Tower Bridge Exhibition; St Paul's Cathedral; Keats House, London; and the Thames Clippers London...Room Hire at Bucks

Mind, High Wycombe, for a start.

Hopefully, this Time Credit scheme will inspire some fresh volunteers from amongst our community, to assist another plan that 'Prevention Matters' within BCC has been working with us to run, here in the Hub. We want to offer a session a week of 'Movers and Shakers Club'. This is a three hour session centred around a lunch club for the middle hour, a health promoting moving to music first hour and a social third hour of film, a speakers talk or a card game, etc., whilst we digest our lunch!

We now have a projector to show film, and with the £800 monies we raised at our Christmas Market / 150th Birthday in late November 2015, minus the costly sudden wind the following morning tearing our two triple size tents to ribbons, as shown here... luckily we are still left with enough to buy our new projection screen and commission someone in the making of bespoke black-out-blinds for our complicated school windows.



After we have that preparation made and in use, we will work with Hayley's CuriosiTea Rooms café to prepare a lovely lunch for us each week and with our PA system we will lure someone in to run our music and movement session. Personally I would join in with line dancing if the music was good and the atmosphere friendly and fun!

Then when all of this is in place we will we calling out for volunteers to be present to assist anyone who needs help from car to Hub, from chair to loo, and thence to lunch. Does anyone like the idea of this because volunteering will earn you Time Credits if you do?

Does anyone else even have experience to run such a club? Do get in touch please if you are either wanting to come to such a club; wanting to volunteer to help members of such a club with moving about; and indeed if you have the skills to run it yourself!

Lastly we are advertising for a cleaner, and asking for anyone interested to get in touch to thrash out a working plan and fee – contacts as below.

Meanwhile our community-run Hub of four Victorian classrooms is open seven days a week, voluntarily providing space to commune, either within our tenant's café CuriosiTea Rooms, whilst enjoying tasty and affordable home made food and drink; or by hiring out or joining clubs using our characterful two adjoining rooms/hall size space; or within our IT space where using computer space, or learning how to use computers in one to one tuition, or just simply copying documents and printing out takes place. Here's to a great year 2016, for our community! Do drop in and become part of this cosy village Hub experience!

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

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

The **Miller's** Tale...

ur final opening for 2015 was for Brookmead school in mid November, we had approx 45 children and staff arrive early in the morning and as usual we enjoyed having them come to the mill and being able to show them how the mill works, and seeing their faces as they learn how wheat is turned into flour and having a go at hand milling on our hand querns and lifting sacks to the top floor using the sack hoist, judging by how quickly the samples of bread baked with Ford End flour were gobbled up I think they liked the end result too!

In my last article I mentioned that we were having a film made to help promote the watermill, I'm pleased to be able to say that it is now finished. The committee members from Ford End all met up one evening in late November for the first official screening of the film and we were all really impressed with the final version, sol would like to say a massive thank you on behalf of the watermill society to Andy Beezer and Roger Hillier fantastic job lads!

When we started back at the mill after the xmas and new year break we were confronted by a doorway full of spiders web and it appeared as though the spiders had been having a whale of a time during the holiday period themselves. We usually have a good spring clean before the start of our open season but we decided to attack the place with brooms and a hoover as it was rather cold and it would help to keep us warm. Whilst we were busily cleaning away a lady who was interested in volunteering at the mill turned up, so I left the lads to it and started showing the lady around the mill. We are always looking for new volunteers and it's great when, like this lady, they are very interested and you can see the genuine enthusiasm in their faces as you tell them all about the mill and how it works and what we do there. The lady in question is keen to come and help out during our open days so it looks like we have hooked another member to our team.

We are just putting together our rota for volunteers so if you have ever thought about volunteering at the mill now is a good time to get in touch! It's not hard work and only takes up a few hours on a Sunday (or Bank Holiday Monday) and I'm sure our regular volunteers will agree we are all very friendly and it's very interesting and rewarding being at the mill when we are milling.

Preparations for our 2016 open days are under way, opening dates have been agreed and quotes for printing flour bags have been sent off. One thing that is usually straight forward is the wheat supply, which for the many years has been Hereward winter wheat. However Hereward wheat is getting harder to find as farmers are moving away from traditional varieties and growing more of the modern wheat varieties.

The farmer from Aston Clinton who has supplied us with Hereward wheat for the last few years did not grow any last year and has offered us a modern alternative. We would prefer to use Hereward if we could, so this means I'm having to contact farmers and grain suppliers trying to find some Hereward, or a suitable replacement milling wheat and as we are not a commercial outfit and only need what is considered a small amount of wheat, suppliers have been slow in getting back to me, if they reply at all!

It seems we are not going to be able to source Hereward without travelling lots of miles, so we are going to have to change to another wheat variety. I have narrowed it down to two varieties, Skyfall and Crusoe, both are deemed good milling wheats, now it's just a matter of which supplier has the best specifications for their wheat and at a reasonable price and not too far for us to travel to collect.

Anway, here's looking forward to another good year at Ford End Watermill and we're hoping to see some new faces from the local area come down and see what we get up to on our milling days.



Ivinghoe Allotments from the Plot



hope you all had a great Christmas and wish you all a very happy and productive New Year.

The month of January on the allotment is a relatively quiet time but you can still dig if the soil is not too wet, which is very unlikely considering the weather that we have had over the last month or so. Despite this there are a few things that may be sown now; leeks and onions (if you are exhibiting at a show – more later about this!). Tomatoes can also be started now in a heated greenhouse or under glass indoors.

It is also time to think about chitting your seed potatoes, either in the greenhouse or shed so that the early variety will be ready for planting in the plot or garden, but do be aware that the ground may still be wet and cold.

Did you know that the potato is the fourth most important vegetable after wheat, maize and corn? It was introduced by the Spaniards in the 16th century. Sir Walter Raleigh introduced it to Ireland in 1563. And this is a fact for your pub quiz; Sir Walter Raleigh spent most of the reign of James I imprisoned in the Tower of London, as a result of an absolutely awful expedition to the Orinoco in 1617 while looking for gold. He was executed in 1618. Watch this space, you will always learn something new – if not a little useless!

There are potato days held in the UK by various allotment societies where they discuss blight or choice and there is always an opportunity to talk about potatoes with other like-minded people.

From my enquiries, the British potato variety database suggests there are 200 different types so please do not lose sleep or get anxious about which potato you are going to plump for! You have plenty of choices. Having an allotment can improve

your mood and self-esteem according to recent research published by two UK universities. The results showed significant gains in mental well-being, fewer weight problems and lower levels of fatigue, depression, tension and anger. What a great advertisement for being an allotmenteer! I hope that lvinghoe Parish Council can deal with the rush for plots once people have read this article!

Great news!!! It is now official, and due to popular demand, the lvinghoe Flower and Vegetable Show is back this year! A new cast is behind it, consisting of some lovely local ladies. Everyone is very enthusiastic about making it a roaring success, so pop the date in your diaries:

Saturday 10th September 2016 – it is up to all of us to support it!

All allotmenteers, gardeners, crafters and cooks are welcome to enter. There is a category for everyone, including children. Please don't moan afterwards if you did not enter, it is up to you to do that and who knows what you may achieve – at least give it a go and participate in this fabulous event.

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



Ivinghoe conservation area

Gladman lost the Station Road development appeal because it failed to meet one of the Government's criteria for sustainable development - the environment. The deciding factor was the high quality of the revised lvinghoe Conservation Area policy and associated document. It was worth waiting for this to have been completed and adopted by the new District Council. It might be obvious to all who live in lvinghoe that the open aspect from the lawn to Mentmore is unique, but the documentation shows that it is recognised by the whole district, distinguishing lyinghoe's case from many others. For the very same reasons the lvinghoe neighbourhood plan needs to be equally strong.

County Council grant settlement

On 17 December councils were notified by government of their grant allocation for 2016/17. It is not news that the cuts have been far greater than expected and come on top of year on year reductions since 2010. Instead of the anticipated 30% cut for this year 2016/17, Bucks County Council received a 43.3% cut in grant, being allocated only £23.7 million instead of £28 million as expected. Next year it will receive £8.1 million and grants will cease from then on.

This should be offset to an extent by the council receiving a portion of the business rate previously retained entirely

by central government, and permission to raise council tax by 2% over and above the 1.9% previous limit, specifically to meet adult social care costs.

However the government applies a funding formula called a top up grant adjustment which has reduced Bucks share of extra funding this year by £1.6 million, and in 2019/20 by £10.9 million, adding up to a total of £52.7 million reduction in the next four years.

I could continue, but you get the overall gloomy picture of reduced budgets and services and increased taxes.

Although the County Council budget is still £335 million, there are continuing new costs to pay for additional legal duties to meet in health and social care, children services, flood prevention, and more, as well as increasing numbers of people needing care and the introduction of the national minimum wage.



Tring Station and the London Midland Rail franchise renewal

Aldbury parish council have written to me and others about the need to have a plan for Tring Station to improve the parking and reduce the impact on local residents, which I fully support. Although the use of Cheddington station has remained about the same since 1997, Tring station usage has increased by 72%.

The West Midlands rail franchise document published on 15 December is now out for consultation.

It is vital that Bucks and Herts, Dacorum and Aylesbury Vale Councils work together to put their views into this consultation and include in their own local plans of the needs of local residents and the impact of future development.

I will be meeting the Director of Development and Strategy at Bucks County Council and the Cabinet member to influence the work on this. I have added to the case made by Aldbury Parish Council by reminding them that Hertfordshire is still sitting on money to construct a cycleway along Northfield Road and that Tring Station is restricted by Green Belt and Chilterns AONB designations which led to the restoration to farmland of the temporary car park created 10 years ago during the West Coast Main Line improvement programme. The bus from Castlemead to Tring Station was withdrawn when funds run out as only about seven commuters used the service regularly at that time.

DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

Example costs (excluding car parking):



In some circumstances, we may be able to undertake hospital trips to the John Radcliffe or Nuffield hospitals. Please contact the number below if you are having difficulty accessing transport to these hospitals.

The volunteer will usually wait while the appointment is taking place, and then take the resident home. However, there may be circumstances where the return trip is much later or another day. In this case, each journey will be classed as return – as the volunteer will need to return to Pitstone using their own vehicle and petrol.

These charges are exceptionally good. The trips are being undertaken by volunteers so, at present, these cannot be extended to include appointments other than healthcare. Also, there is no guarantee of an available volunteer driver, but we will do all we can with the volunteer resources we have. Please give as much notice as you can.
