DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

There is still an amber alert for groundwater flooding in the Upper Pang, and sewage leaks in East IIsley and Hampstead Norreys. Two of the last three editions of the Newbury Weekly News have featured front page stories about sewage, quoting me and members of the public who have been affected. The BBC interviewed me and residents in Hampstead Norreys in late March, and on Tuesday 16 April French newspaper Le Monde sent a reporter to write a story about it.

On Wednesday 10 April we had Pang Valley Flood Forum, attended by Thames Water and WBC

representatives. On Thursday 11 April we had a public meeting in Hampstead Norreys organised by the flood warden and parish council. On Sunday 14 April the Angling Trust, Action for the River Kennet, the four main political parties, and Extinction Rebellion members came together to protest about sewage in Newbury. More than 250 people attended in Victoria Park. There are plans for more protests across the country.

After the January flooding, WBC commissioned a company called WPS to write a section 19 report about the flooding. This will be coming to Scrutiny Commission in the autumn, and Thames Water and the Environment Agency will be invited to the same meeting.

This problem is not going to go away. Rising temperatures is causing greater rainfall and the chalk aquifer we live on is saturated. If we get a relatively wet summer, we might find ourselves living with the impact of high groundwater for months to come. So, we all need to work together. Nothing should go down the toilet apart from pee, poo, and paper. No wet wipes. No tampons or sanitary towels. WBC and riparian owners need to ensure ditches and drains are clear. There need to be robust sustainable drainage and foul/fresh water connection planning conditions on new housing. Rules about not building on flood plains need to be respected. The list goes on. We all need to do what we can to alleviate the pressure on the system.

Thames Water added insult to injury by telling residents in East IIsley that they were 'the only person in the village' and therefore it is not a priority to tanker excess sewage out of the village. Thames Water has acknowledged that their automated response system, that says everything is sorted out when it isn't, needs to change.

I asked WBC for the streets to be cleansed. They told me it is Thames Water's responsibility. Then they told me Environmental Health had been out and there wasn't a problem. So then I took more photos and video of the algae in the water and the toilet paper caked on the pavement and sent it to the council. So the saga continues.

MALTHOUSE WELL.


After a very wet start to the year, when we had significantly more rain than average, April has been a little kinder to us where we have had roughly an average amount of rain. As a result, we have been expecting the Malthouse well water level to drop as

usual, but against all expectations it has been rising stubbornly throughout the month of April!

This caused all kinds of consternation and confusion, but finally after the Environmental Agency was contacted they suggested that the engineer they sent to repair the gauge on the 18 January may have connected the gauge wires the wrong way round! So, when the water gauge showed a fall it actually showed a rise and when it rose it showed a fall.

Another engineer will be coming out, but on the basis that the EA suggestion is correct, we have recalculated the data which showed that the ground water peaked at 2.99 metres below ground level on 9th March and by the beginning of April it stood at 3.44 metres below ground level. This fall has thankfully continued during April and the Malthouse well would now read approximately 4.5 Metres below ground level. The recalculated data is shown in the graph below. It will be interesting to see the level when the engineer has been

The good news is that it is reasonable to assume that the flood risk for this Spring is now over and everyone can breathe a sigh of relief.



COUNTRY NOTES

Towers of yellow flowers along the edge of a ride in the wood, yellow archangel, the lower tiers opening a canary yellow, those above progressively paling to a greenish white at the top. Archangel, a grand name for this humble yellow deadnettle; it's country name of

A young robin picks and pecks its way across the Clemenger's gravelly car park, when it turns towards me it vanishes, it's speckled breast a perfect camouflage amongst the small pebbles.
