**THANK YOU, RAY PEACH** – After more than 25 years of dedicated service, Ray has very sadly submitted his resignation to the Parish Council Chairman. The Parish Council wishes to extend its sincere thanks to Ray for his outstanding commitment and service to the village.

Throughout his time on the Council, Ray generously gave his time, skills, and practical expertise, and was always the Councillor people turned to when something needed to be done. His many contributions included village repairs, the installation of new benches and notice boards, and ongoing maintenance at the Cemetery, Recreation Ground, and Holding Field.

Ray also played a key role in managing the allotments, from repairing broken fencing and resolving water leaks to maintaining plots and ensuring the allotment toilet block was kept clean and in good order. In addition, he could always be relied upon to erect gazebos and support events such as the Spring Clean and the Village Fête. He organised road closures for the annual Remembrance Parade and major village events, including the Jubilee.

Alongside this hands-on work, Ray provided valuable input as a member of the Finance Committee and also served as Vice Chairman for a period of time. Ray's many years of dedication are deeply appreciated, and his contribution to both the Parish Council and the wider village will be long remembered. We know he continues to be involved with other local groups and we wish him well. Thank you, Ray.

It was also lovely to see the wonderful Bethlehem scene in the Churchyard; thank you to all involved in creating this too.

**GREEN WHEELY BINS & GLASS RECYCLING** – The collections dates are **Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> February and 4<sup>th</sup> March**.

**MAKING A DIFFERENCE AWARDS 2025/26** – Thank you for your nominations, we are in touch with a judging panel and successful nominees will be notified soon and invited to an awards evening in March.

**GROUNDWATER MONITORING BOREHOLES** — Observation boreholes to monitor groundwater levels are being installed between February 2026 and April 2026 in the Malthouse Open Space area adjacent to St Mary's Churchyard. This area has been identified as suitable from a geological perspective, is in reasonably close proximity to the brook, and away from residential property.

New check-in screens are currently being installed in Kingsclere, Oakley and Overton which should be operational by mid-February 2026. There will be times when the screens may not yet be fully set up, so please check in with the reception team and accept our apologies for any inconvenience whilst we get our systems functioning.

## Walk-In Help for Appointments

We continue to upgrade our online triage system for all incoming requests but are very aware that it doesn't suit those who have no access to our online services. If that is the case for you, you are welcome to visit the reception at your surgery and a triage submission will be made for you by one of the reception team - they are happy to help!

## Notifications via the NHS App

As more services are being made available to patients via the NHS App, it is important that patients switch on the notifications setting so you can be kept up to date with managing your health and well-being.

### In the NHS App (iOS & Android):

- Open the NHS App.
- Tap the Account icon (person icon) in the top right hand corner or 'More' and then 'Account and Settings'.
- Select Notifications (or 'Manage notifications').
- Tap "Go to Device" settings.

### In your Phone settings:

- For iPhone: Go to Settings > Notifications > NHS App and ensure 'Allow Notifications' is switched on.
- For Android: Go to Settings > Notifications > App settings (or similar) > NHS App and ensure notifications are allowed.

## The Church Pages

Hi, Happy New Year!

The new year is often a time for new beginnings. A new exercise program or a new diet often makes this sentiment of “newness” real in our lives. There’s something about a new calendar stretching before us, a never-before-lived-in year ahead of us that gets us dreaming and planning in a way that we just aren’t in, say, June. I bless whatever you’ve set your heart & mind on for 2026. May this year be fruitful, and may it be marked by peace & joy.

There are new things happening in the churches around us too, with changes afoot in our benefice, and I’d like to explain what these changes are. Rev. Jonathan Hillman was licensed on the 6<sup>th</sup> of January as Priest-in-Charge of the benefice of Baughurst and Ramsdell and Wolverton with Ewhurst and Hannington. This is fantastic news as they’ve been without an incumbent for more than five years, and although they’ve been ably supported by many visiting clergy over that time, they will be excited to finally have some stability and to be able to plan their future vision together. Jonathan was at the same time licensed as Associate Minister of the benefice of Kingsclere and Ashford Hill with Headley. This will allow him to take full responsibility for the parish of Ashford Hill with Headley from me, leaving St. Mary’s Kingsclere as my sole focus. It is proposed that a Pastoral Scheme will then be entered into, whereby the parish of Ashford Hill with Headley will formally become part of the newly renamed “North Wessex Churches Benefice”, along with Baughurst, Ramsdell, Wolverton with Ewhurst, & Hannington. This will take some time to work through, with these schemes often taking up to two years to complete. Jonathan’s double licensing allows the ministry “on the ground” to get going for the new benefice, while the paperwork is done behind the scenes.

There are no plans to change service times or schedules in Kingsclere, but I would suspect that once Jonathan has settled in, he may feel the need to tweak things in the other churches. Please do pray for Jonathan, his wife, Kate and son, Joe, who have moved into the Vicarage in Ashford Hill. There will be so many new things to adjust to as they settle into the area, and he begins this new phase of his ministry.

By a crazy coincidence, the new Rector of Burghclere with Newtown and Ecchinswell with Sydmonton is Father John Hillman! Please also pray that we don’t all get too confused!

As we clergy step through the gate of this new year, we will, no doubt, like the man in Minnie Louise Haskin’s poem, be putting our hands into the hand of God, to steer us the way He would have us go.

## Journeys in Biology III: DNA and Who You Are

## Nature Notes

*...Then, as he looked, it winked at him, and so declared itself to be an eye; and a small face began gradually to grow up round it, like a frame round a picture. A brown little face, with whiskers. A grave round face, with the same twinkle in its eye that had first attracted his notice. Small neat ears and thick silky hair. It was the Water Rat! Then the two animals stood and regarded each other cautiously. 'Hullo, Mole!' said the Water Rat. 'Hullo, Rat!' said the Mole.*

Just before Christmas, as I was walking along beside the brook, I caught sight of a small brown ratty-looking creature running along the bank. As I stopped to watch, it came to an obstacle, changed course, ran directly into the water where its run morphed seamlessly into a swim, paddled for a few feet, then jumped out to continue its trot along the bank. I am still not convinced whether it was a brown rat (*Rattus norvegicus*) or a water vole (*Arvicola amphibius*); these two little brown mammals are often confused with each other. One way to tell them apart is comparing their noses – rat's noses are longer and more slender than a water vole's, which is rather stubbier. Rat's tails are longer, and a water vole's ears are smaller and tuck closer in to their heads. Further confusion may come from people's memories of river resident and expert boater 'Ratty' from *The Wind in the Willows*, who was in fact a water vole – the book written in a time when water voles were often commonly referred to as 'water rats'. Were he alive today, *Willows* author Kenneth Grahame, who died in the 1930s, would perhaps be horrified to learn how the population of water voles has declined in the UK, due to habitat loss and an increase in non-native predators. I hope, optimistically, it was a 'Ratty' that I saw.

January brought some grey, freezing weather. However, even on the most dismal days it is possible for nature to delight: forcing the dog out on a very cold day I spotted a group of sparrows huddled in the wheel well of a car; they took turns to hop down on to the driveway and then swapped back to the top of the tyre. Perhaps the body of the car was warm after a recent drive, or the well sheltered the sparrow group from the biting wind as they scavenged. I have heard stories about small birds – particularly robins – building nests in wheel wells as quickly as overnight – another reason to check your tyres before you travel.

## FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN

As February descends upon us the garden is coming to life and the days are getting longer which is always welcome after the dark days of December. How lovely to see the flowers of the hellebores; if you have not already done so cut back the old leaves that have been damaged through the winter as they distract from the beauty of the flowers. Let us hope that we are able to start gardening this month; last year was delayed with the constant rain, making it difficult to catch up the rest of the year. The perennials will need tidying up, cutting back the old stems that were left over winter. These can be cut up and added to the compost heap. Perennials can be lifted and divided if weather conditions allow, giving you new plants for areas which have lost plants through winter conditions.

It is probably to early to mow the lawns as the grass will still be wet. Even if the lawns are too wet to cut, they can be made to look smarter if edged. If this has to be done by treading on the grass use a plank of wood to stand on, this will also give you a straight edge to work with.

Some pruning can be done now, e.g. bush, shrub, and climbing roses, buddleias, deciduous hedges, cornus, late flowering clematis and old overgrown shrubs. Sow sweet peas; these can be planted in a pot to grow indoors or outdoors. Plant up lilies in a large planter, these always make an impact on a patio. Prune the shrubs that have flowered during the winter to keep them at a manageable size. Winter flowering heathers will need to be cut back after the flowers have faded to maintain neat and bushy plants.

Early rhubarb can be achieved by providing a dark environment; cover the plant with a terracotta pot or a black plastic pot weighed down.

Broad beans, carrots, and salad onions can be sown outside this month. Chillies, leeks, and tomatoes should be sown indoors. Jerusalem artichokes, rhubarb, shallots can be planted in the vegetable garden now. Harvest brussel sprouts, cabbages, forced rhubarb, kale, parsnips, purple sprouting, and Swiss chard. Chit seed potatoes, they need to be kept indoors in old egg trays, remembering only three or four shoots are needed. Mint can be divided and a clump put in a pot to grow in the greenhouse to give early pickings. Check trees for mummified fruits as these need to be removed. Cheer up permanent containers; add pansies and polyanthus or cyclamens. Dahlia tubers can be potted up and kept in a frost, free environment.

Plants to enjoy this month: early crocus, camellia, hellebores, heather, early clematis, japonica, hardy cyclamen, dwarf irises, and early narcissus.
