Thorney, Harby & Wigsley Voluntary Car Scheme

(serving the villages of Thorney, Harby, Wigsley with Spalford and N & S Clifton)



The Car Scheme is gathering momentum and I am pleased to be able to say that since we re-launched officially in April this year we have completed 65 trips for a total of 14 local residents. This has included journeys for medical appointments as well as providing transport to and from the railway stations in Newark and Collingham where taxi services are usually hard to come by. Shopping trips have also been completed and recently we helped a couple return home after a wedding celebration (a midnight pick up!) from the Newark area. Another couple benefitted from our help when we transported them to and from an evening wine tasting event at Newark. So you see the Car Scheme really is for all adults-younger or older. We currently have 16 volunteer drivers, all recruited from our local villages and so far we have 23 people who have registered and are now all eligible to use the scheme. Registration is easy and it's free-just call the Co-ordinator Clare Welfare on 07717-17-88-00 or email:thwvcs@gmail.com. Being a driver is not an onerous task and we could benefit from a few more volunteers who may be able to offer their time on an occasional basis. At this point we have drivers in Thorney, Harby, South Clifton and Spalford but no volunteer drivers have come forward from Wigsley or North Clifton but hope this may change soon. Please just call me if you would like a bit more information about what being a driver entails. Volunteers who may be willing to undertake trips either early morning or evenings would be particularly welcomed! By the way, there are benefits to being a driver - we recently held our first social event for drivers at my bungalow in Thorney on Sept 7th. The subsequent barbecue was good fun, despite the dodgy rain showers and big thanks go to neighbours Lisa and Chris for the loan of their gas barbecue which saved the day! It was great for all drivers to get to know each other a bit better even though we live in different villages! Thinking about planning another social event for us all in due course....mmmm, let me think!

It is amazing how competitive the tranquil game of Lawn Bowls can get on a warm balmy Summer's evening as the woods gently click together around the jack! Management of the Green is vitally important to the game, a soggy green makes it difficult to cut and prepare and also slows the woods in play.



THE ALLOTMENTEERS - Carol Dallamore

Autumn has arrived bringing its own palette colours for us to enjoy.

The pumpkins and squash have been harvested so that the skins can dry and seal for storage. Ranging from soft greens to vibrant orange they are glorious and it seems such a shame that we are to eat them. Gathering the last of the raspberries the sun warms the fruit showing up the lovely glowing 'Raspberry Pink'. A colour so suited I feel to warm woolly jumpers and corduroy.

The Red Admiral butterflies are enjoying feeding on fallen fruits. Newly hatched their marking are crisp and clear. The beautiful Peacock butterfly too has taken advantage of this bounty. Both these Butterflies can over Winter emerging in the warm days of Spring but their colours are by then a little faded.

The bees have supped the nectar from the large yellow sunflowers and now the birds are taking the seeds. Look into a sunflower head and see how neatly and compact the seeds have been set, certainly one of nature's bounteous wonders. When putting seed out for the Winter birds, save a dozen sunflower seeds to grow on for Summer. Plant in a group in a spare corner of the garden and enjoy the colours and the visitors.

Ripe red tomatoes fill our baskets and several pounds have been turned into ketchup and chutney. Red and yellow chili peppers and deep purple aubergines nestle among still green leaves. Summer leaves tend to be a softer yellow based green and as we head into the colder season the Winter cabbages and leeks have a tougher blue green hue.

The hedges will soon become less dense as the leaves turn golden brown before dropping to produce a coppery Autumn carpet. Among the fallen leaves can be found the beautiful shiny Horse Chestnuts. Who can resist the childhood habit collecting of these, freshly eased out of their jackets and polished place them with other finds such as Hawthorn, rosehips and crab apples to produce a seasonal plate of colour. These last three fruits can be used with others such as Rowan and blackberry to make Hedgerow jelly, a lovely accompaniment to lamb and beef.

Preserving is the ideal way of ensuring that what we produce on our Allotments, lasts through the lean Winter months and also gives us a sense of achievement in a job well done.


