## LOCAL ELECTIONS – 4<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2023

Local elections throughout West Berkshire are taking place on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May. This is for all the parish councils, including West Ilsley Parish Council, and for West Berkshire Council. The formal notifications of election at both the parish and district levels can be found on our website and the noticeboard.

For West Ilsley Parish Council it is possible to elect 6 councillors.

For West Berkshire Council all wards are included, however, relevant to West Ilsley is the Ridgeway ward where 1 councillor can be elected.

For West Ilsley Parish Council, if 6 or fewer applications are received, these applicants will be elected uncontested to the council. If more than 6 applications are received, there will be an election for which the residents of the parish will vote on 4<sup>th</sup> May.

Regardless of whether you need to vote for your parish councillors, there will be a vote for your District Councillor on 4<sup>th</sup> May.

To vote in the elections this May, you will need a photo ID if you are voting in person. If you do not have this, you can either apply for a postal vote or a Voter Authority Certificate. **If you need any help with applying for election or applying for the free ID or want to request an application form, contact the electoral services team at West Berkshire Council by calling 01635 519464 or emailing [vote@westberks.gov.uk](mailto:vote@westberks.gov.uk).**

Acceptable forms of Photo ID include:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo.

### THE CORONATION 1953

A couple of us are cataloguing for the Parish Council a lot of village documents and photographs which have been kept in a loft for some years. We came across the following article which was one of the display papers for the West Ilsley Parish Council 1994 centenary celebrations – we thought the villagers of

2023 might be interested to see how things were done 70 years ago! The author is Tim Morland.

"The Coronation celebration at West Ilsley got everybody in the village working together; we raised money from raffles and donations and from a fur and feather whist drive, enough to provide mugs for each ("a nice momentum for the kiddies" said Fred Verney) and to lay on a party for everybody and drinks to toast the Queen in Mr Hinds' barn. The drink did not stretch as far as we had anticipated as a lot of the Hodcott stable lads drank up and held up their mugs for more before we had got round. Eventually the toast was drunk however; for me it was flat champagne in a chipped King Edward VII mug. There was a dinner for all the old people, but when Denis Morland went to tell Loyd Newton and offered to ferry him, he just said "I ain't old" and shut the door in his face.

Most of us listened to the service on the wireless, but my brother Ben was invited to go and see it on the Eagles' new television. I think the Burkes were the only others in the village to have a set.

Eventually the climax of the evening was reached when the entire population was taken by tractor and trailer up on the Ridgeway for the bonfire and fireworks. Charlie Watts, gamekeeper and special constable, volunteered to keep an eye on the houses while we were away. The bonfire was enormous, carefully built from straw bales, old motor tyres and assorted timber. Denis Morland had a major hand in its construction, and both Jimmy Gore and Norman Hinds provided material and labour. It was lit with a trail of straw soaked in petrol (Fred Angell was soaked in petrol too so he was kept out of harm's way). Very magnificent it looked despite the wind and the rain which caused most villages to postpone theirs. Lots of passers-by on the main road came up and jointed in.

The fireworks were bought from Waeco near Salisbury; they came packed in a tea-chest together with full instructions as to how they were to be set up. The rockets were to be placed on a table-like structure which had two layers of wire netting about a foot apart. The idea was to put down a piece of card which was the fuse, arrange five on each side with the blue touch paper on the card, then light it so that a salvo of ten rockets went up together. However we thought we would save time by putting all the rockets out beforehand with the result that ten went up as planned, closely followed by ninety more, which looked magnificent but left us without any more for the rest of the display. However all the other Roman candles and things were fairly successful, except for something called a "Blitzkrieg" which fell over and surrounded me with sparks and bangs – very unnerving but no harm was done.

Even more unnerving was the moment when Denis Morland, in trying to light a "Golden Waterfall" (which

was a row of fireworks joined together and timed to something which looked like the crossbar of a football goalpost), found the fuse was too short to be reached from the ground. Accordingly he positioned the Landrover underneath it and lit the fuse while standing in the back. Then he jumped for the driving seat – but the Landrover wouldn't start. The sight of the golden rain pouring down on the Landrover was one not to be forgotten.

Finally came the tableau with ER and a crown, and everybody clapped and went off to bed.

The following weekend at Drayton I watched exactly the same firework display being let off properly in calm weather, with the rockets spaced out and the rest staying the right way up. It seemed a little tame after ours ..."

### **WEST ILSLEY VILLAGE HALL SURVEY 2023**

Thanks very much to those who completed the West Ilsley Village Hall survey. We had 50 responses from around 130 houses, which was a fantastic response.

Most respondents (20) have been in the village 10-30 years, with 16 having been in the village 30+ years, 7 respondents up to 3 years and 4 up to 10 years. It was great to see feedback from such a range of households. See answers to question 3 below.

Respondents were predominantly households of 2 people (21) with 17 respondents being a 4 person household. And ages of people in the household were well distributed, predominantly 30 to 80 (58 respondents) or 5 to 29 (33 respondents), see answers to question 5 below. Highlighting the high number of families in the village, and the need to cater for all ages.

The majority of respondents had visited the hall in the last week (13), or the last month or 3 months, highlighting the increase in events over the winter months. See answers to question 6.

When asked what events respondents would be interested in attending at the village hall, the majority

(44) said socialising, followed by well-being (29) and adult education (27). See question 9 below.


Specific suggestions included pop up café, film nights, art exhibitions, table tennis, dance classes, a shop, library, repair shops, race nights etc. Preferred day and time for such events was not surprisingly weekend evenings followed by evenings in general.

When asked if respondents would be interested in having office facilities at the village hall, 15 said yes or maybe. This information will be provided to the West Berks village halls organisation, which is investigating support for such facilities.

Most people heard about events through ad hoc WIN event emails, or the monthly WIN.

Around half (24) of respondents said that they were planning or maybe planning on booking the hall for an event in 2023, with reasons for those saying they weren't including 'no need', 'kitchen inadequate', 'atmosphere' or 'furniture'. This feedback will be used to aid the short and long term development opportunities for the hall.

This will also be guided by the ratings for the village hall amenities, which were as follows.



It was great to see that 9 people said yes or maybe to the question 'do you have a hidden talent or knowledge that you would be happy to share with others'. Comments included sewing, cooking classes, sport nutrition, flower arranging, wine, and talks on space.

Following the very successful talk from Zu and Jacqui, the survey provides further incentive to put more of these events on, with 2 more lined up already. The aim is to do these over the winter months, to avoid clashing with WICC gatherings and brighter nights when people may want to be outside.

Even more pleasing were the 16 who said they were interested or maybe interested in supporting events or helping with the running of the village hall. We will be keen to make contact with those who volunteered themselves, to help bring even more events and people together in 2023.
