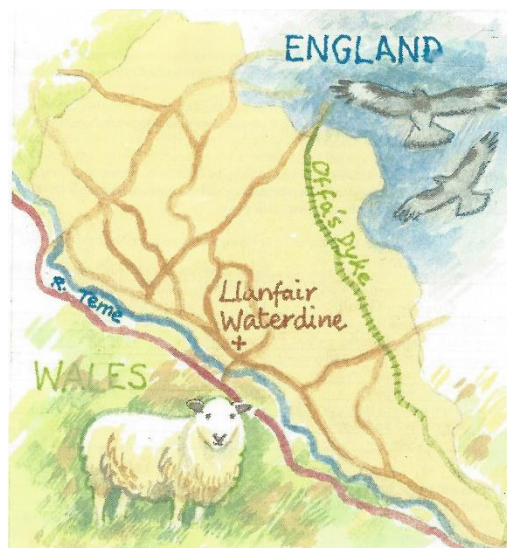

Local singer amongst panel that chose Queen's Platinum Jubilee Song



On June 2nd choirs across all 53 countries of the Commonwealth will be singing the same song in celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Amongst the seven-strong panel chosen to select both the lyrics and the music was acclaimed local baritone and Voice Professor, **Graham Trew**. Graham was Chairman of the Association of English Singers and Speakers for ten years and for 27 years sang as a Gentleman-in-Ordinary to Her Majesty in The Chapel Royal at St James's Palace.

Jubilee Beacon

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacons and Associated Activities June 2, 2022. Bruno Peek LVO OBE OPR, Pageantmaster of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacons says "Building on a long tradition of lighting beacons to mark significant royal celebrations, over 1,500 Platinum Jubilee Beacons will be lit across the UK and Commonwealth on the first evening of the four-day Jubilee Weekend.

The Beacons will enable local communities to join together and pay tribute to Her Majesty as part of the official programme of events. Thousands of town criers, along with Pearly Kings and Queens, traditional and Northumberland pipers, buglers and choirs from communities across the four corners of the nation will lift up their

voices and play and sing specially commissioned music prior to the lighting of over 1,500 Platinum Jubilee Beacons, at 9.45pm on Thursday 2nd June 2022.

Throughout The Commonwealth, in capital cities and elsewhere, the lighting of the beacons and the singing of the song will commence at 9.15 p.m. local time. It is wonderful to see the range of support for beacon lighting which will highlight both the diversity and the unity of the nation. The Queen has lit up our lives for seventy years through her dedicated service and commitment. We would like to light up the nation and the Commonwealth in her honour.”

Timetable 2.00pm

A specially-written Proclamation heralding the lighting of the beacons will be announced by hundreds of town criers and 50 Pearly Kings and Queens.

9.35pm local time across the UK

Traditional and Northumbrian pipers and pipe bands will play Diu Regnare, a unique tune specially composed for the occasion by Piper Major, Stuart Liddell, the world’s leading piper.

9.40 p.m.

Buglers linked to local beacon lightings across the UK officially announce the lighting of the beacons with a specially written bugle call, entitled Majesty.

9.45 p.m. exactly local time

To coincide with the lighting of the beacons, community choirs across all nations will sing A Song for the Commonwealth, which has been written and composed by Lucy Keily, from Australia and Vincent Atueyi Chinemelu from Nigeria.

Graham Trew and The Jubilee Song

Under the auspices of ‘Commonwealth Resounds’, which promotes cultural links throughout the Commonwealth, a song, ‘A Life Lived With Grace’, composed by a Nigerian musician to words by an Australian lyricist has been chosen as the winning piece for The Queen’s Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

Aspiring poets from all over the Commonwealth sent over 70 poems for selection to be the words of the Queen’s Platinum Jubilee Song. After careful deliberation a shortlist of three was chosen and aspiring composers, again from all over the Commonwealth, set their choice of poem to music.

There were nearly 70 entries. The other six people on the adjudicating panel were Baroness Scotland of Asthal, QC, who is the Secretary-General of the Commonwealth; Anne Gallagher, Director-General

of the Commonwealth Foundation; the baritone, Roderick Williams; Judith Weir, who is Master of the Queen’s Music; Bruno Peek, Her Majesty’s Pageant Master and the composer Alison Cox, Head of Composition at the Purcell School.

Graham says “It was an honour to be asked to be on the adjudicating panel and we hope that people all over the world will be pleased with the memorable winning song. It will be sung throughout the Commonwealth on Jubilee Day, including by Llanfair Singers, which I conduct. We hope that this will be from the nearest Beacon.

The winning song will be available online in different formats and I would encourage choirs to sign-up on the Commonwealth Resounds website to join over 100 choirs from around the Commonwealth who have already committed to performing the song at the same hour on 2nd June.” **Michael Symonds**

How you can help prevent climate change at Christmas

(Many apologies to Tesni whose following article was inadvertently missed off the December edition. But only nine months to go to next Christmas, so plan ahead! Ed.)

As of today, greenhouse gas concentrations are at their highest levels in 2 million years and are continuing to rise. Consequently, the earth is about 1.1 degrees Celsius warmer than it was in the 1800s. Scientists have agreed that limiting global temperature rise to no more than 1.5°C would help us avoid the worst climate impacts and maintain a liveable climate. Yet the current path of carbon dioxide emissions could increase global temperature by as much as 4.4°C by the end of the century. Emissions must drop 7.6 per cent per year from 2020 to 2030 to keep temperatures from rising by 1.5°C.

I believe the most simple and effective way of helping to achieve this is to consume products sustainably. In 2019, transportation was responsible for 29% of greenhouse gas emissions making this sector the largest contributor to climate change. Transportation includes, cars, vans, planes, cargo ships etc. The most detrimental aspect of this is the transportation of international goods. A simple way you can help this problem is by purchasing from the UK.

Here are what I think are the most cost and carbon efficient ways of purchasing this Christmas: if you prefer to do your shopping online, instead of heading straight to Amazon which sells for large international companies have a look at a site called Etsy UK. Etsy focuses on supporting local small businesses and advertises their products on their site, when shopping on Etsy you can input your location and program the searches to only advertise things in the UK and within a certain mileage. This would significantly reduce your personal carbon footprint as Etsy is also dedicated to offset 100% of carbon emissions created by their sales from

packaging and delivery by donating money to emissions reduction projects on each sale. If you wish to purchase clothes you can look on sites such as Depop and Vinted which sell second-hand clothes in the UK, you can also sell your own clothes as well!

If you prefer to purchase in person, try and avoid the large franchise's and instead shop in independent smaller shops who source their produce from the UK. If you would like a more cost-effective alternative I would recommend shopping in charity shops, During the period between the start of October to the end of November eight members of my family have birthdays. This year I opted for a more cost and carbon efficient way of buying them all presents by spending no more than £12 on everybody combined by shopping in charity shops, I intend to do much of the same for Christmas.

With regards to Christmas dinner, check your food labels and purchase seasonal UK sourced food, supporting smaller food shops where possible.

Closer to home, I have recently started up a "Give and Take Table" in the Community Pavilion which is intended to limit wastage and help people share sustainably and avoid buying new products. You can give or take anything you would like from the table during opening hours for free, you never know you might even find a Christmas present on there!

**Got a slow cooker?
If not, get one, they're great!**

Slow-cooked chicken stew

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 large onion, halved and sliced
- 12 large bone-in chicken thighs, skin removed
- 225g pack chorizo picante, thickly sliced
- pack of 3 mixed colour peppers, cut into chunks
- 2 carrots diced
- 150g (drained weight) pitted green olives
- 300ml dry white wine (serve the rest of the bottle with the meal)
- 300ml chicken stock
- 1 tbsp tomato purée



Method

1. Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large frying pan. Fry the onion for about 5 mins until golden.
2. Tip into the slow cooker pot (we used a 6.5-litre model), then fry the 12 large bone-in skinless chicken thighs and 225g thickly sliced chorizo picante in the same pan until starting to colour – you will need to do this in two batches.
3. Briefly fry the diced carrots in the same pan afterwards.
4. Add to the slow cooker with 3 mixed colour peppers, cut into chunks and 150g pitted green olives.
5. Tip 300ml dry white wine, 300ml chicken stock and 1 tbsp tomato purée into the pan.
6. Scrape up any bits stuck to the bottom, then tip into the slow cooker, cover and cook on Low for 6 hrs. Ready to serve!
7. Bob's your uncle.
8. Serve with some crusty bread and we also made some Patatas Bravas. Spanish spicy potatoes. Find a recipe on Google.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

Our APCM was held after the 11.15 am morning service on Sunday, February 6th.

The Revd. Dr. Martin Quayle took the communion service, after which refreshments were served, before Dr. Quayle took the chair for the Vestry Meeting. Our two churchwardens were unanimously re-elected and this led on to the APCM-proper, where all members of the present PCC agreed to continue, having been proposed and seconded, apart from Mary Morgan, who decided to step down after fifty years of service to the church in various rôles. She was very warmly thanked for her work and we look forward to still benefitting from her advice and support in the future.

The last edition of Llanfair Times contained extensive news on all aspects of the Church. This information was published following the cancellation, due to Covid, of the Parish Meeting, which was to have been an opportunity for all groups to present themselves to the parish. Following from that entry it is good to report that congregations for our varied styles of service continue to rise and that more people are supporting the church by joining the Parish Giving Scheme. However, fund-raising has still been difficult during Covid and the church is faced with new costs to renew falling masonry and roof tiles. Areas that need replacing around the windows can only be undertaken by a specialist and this, plus the need for specific raw materials and scaffolding, will deplete our resources considerably. Predicted costs to do with the projected toilet and kitchen plans for the church have risen dramatically during Covid and the remains of a legacy set aside for this work will need to be supplemented with a grant, or the plans revised, in order for the work to come to fruition.

In Conversation With..... Fiona and Martin Quayle



RL: Thank you both for agreeing, in the weeks following your move (and any of us who have moved house will know just how taxing that is), to be interviewed for Llanfair Times. I hope that you have received the traditionally warm welcome to Llanfair church and parish.

RL: Where do you both originally come from?

FQ: I originally come from Aberdare and then Abergavenny but when I was three my parents moved to Buckinghamshire. I went to Slough High School. When I was 14 my parents moved to Hampshire where I did my 'A' levels. I went to Lucy Clayton College where I took a fashion design course. I had my eldest child, Rosie, when I was 22 and three more children in the next ten years. Rosy, the eldest, is training to be a psychotherapist at the moment; Mark is an interior designer; Daniel is a property developer, and Edward is a chef.

MQ: I was born in the South-East but grew up near the Peak District in a mining village which has become a commuter satellite of Manchester. However, I went to Woking Grammar School where I lost my northern accent in a day!

RL: What brought you here?

FQ: We came to Shropshire in 2004 when Martin got a job in a dental clinic. We both felt we needed a complete change

MQ: I had had my own practice which was a seven-days-per-week commitment.

FQ: I had been a Ward Manager (*that's a rank above a Ward Sister – Ed.*) in an acute psychiatric patient ward. I was lucky to work with a very good multi-disciplinary team and we created a therapeutic environment on the ward.

RL: So what did you do, Fiona, when you came here?

FQ: I had a post as a mental health nurse in a community team in Wellington, Telford, and then I worked in a mental health crisis team at Shelton Hospital before we moved to Yorkshire when Martin trained in the ministry. I continued to work in mental health, primarily in early intervention in psychosis, until my retirement in September 2021.

RL: And you, Martin?

MQ: I worked in the salaried Dental Health Service for Shropshire and then in the Community Dental Service in Wales, based in Llandrindod, before we moved to Yorkshire.

RL: How is the Vicarage and the garden?

MQ: It is all lovely. We've painted and decorated the Vicarage. The house is very comfortable. The front garden has been completely changed. We are digging up ivy roots, etc., and hope to have a naturalised floral meadow.

FQ: You need to be a keen gardener at the Vicarage! I luckily enjoy gardening and it is lovely to be outside. It is exciting looking at colours and contrasts. I've brought some plants from my old garden. The view along the valley from the back is wonderful. Everyone passing can see that the front garden has been cleared and is more open.

RL: What about pets?

FQ: We have a German Short-Haired Pointer who has taken to Bucknell like a duck to water. Bucknell has some lovely walks around the woods.

RL: Martin: what is your vision for us here?

MQ: I want to see a thriving Benefice, with each parish and community working out its own spiritual identity. A real plus in this Benefice is the live music in every church.

FQ: Working as a team is important. Our worshipping together has been part of our life together and is the Anglo-Catholic tradition. Participating in the Daily Offices is important. Shropshire has become our home, but we have brought much from our previous life-experiences.

RL: Thank you both for all that you have shared. I know that many look forward to having you in our midst and to helping to lead us forward, both as individual parishes and as the seven parishes together, the Middle Marches Benefice.

Seasonal Tips for the Gardener's Year

How time flies! Christmas is already way behind us.

Give Your dahlias an early start by potting the dormant tubers in large pots or trays and placing them in a frost-free greenhouse to start them growing. They can be planted out in late April or the beginning of May, when all risk of frost has passed.

Cut buddleia back hard to two lower shoots per branch after the last frost.

If you haven't already done so, it is time to cover rhubarb to encourage tender stems. A mulch of farmyard manure around the base of the plant will help produce more stems.

Many vegetable seeds can be planted outside from the end of March including parsnips and peas. Sweet pea seeds can be planted indoors for planting out at the end of April.

Cut the dead flowers off amaryllis bulbs and continue to water them and feed with a potash fertilizer until the leaves die down naturally and then store them in a cool place until next autumn when they can be watered and started into growth to flower again.

Lift and split any herbaceous plants which are getting too large and replant the pieces to increase your display.

Prune Spring flowering shrubs, such as forsythia and flowering currant, just after they have bloomed. This will encourage new flowering stems to grow for next year.

Sow the seeds of tomatoes in April and pot into 9cm (3") pots when they have two proper leaves and are large enough to handle. Keep on a warm windowsill or in a heated greenhouse until May when they can be planted into Growbags or greenhouse borders.

Repot any houseplants which have outgrown their pots and include some slow-release fertilizer in the new potting compost.

Chitted potatoes can be planted out at the end of March. Earth them up to keep the light off the tubers as they grow and prevent them from going green.

Plant some parsley seed in a small pot and just cover with compost. Pot on into a larger pot as it grows and it can be placed outside by the kitchen door within easy reach when cooking.

If you grow broad beans, keep an eye out for blackfly. You can usually reduce their damage by pinching out the tip of each plant just above the top flower.

If you have space in your heated greenhouse, you can plant up summer pots and hanging baskets ready to go outside when the risk of frost has gone.

NATURE NOTES

February fill the dyke
Be it black or be it white
But if it be white
It's the better to like

The rhyme refers to heavy rain which is black or snow white, filling the ditches in wintertime. I thought it appropriate, again.

It is February 22nd after the three storms and I have just returned from a gentle walk along the lanes around Melin Y Grogue. The hedges have been swept clean revealing bedraggled nests that I could not find last year when the hedges were in full leaf. I spent a few minutes throwing back over the gate, turnips, that the force of the water had washed into a heap from the field into the lane but the sheep didn't seem too bothered. I did, however, notice that a rabbit was taking advantage of this plentiful supply of food.

There are buds on the Honeysuckle, the Wild Gooseberry and if you look hard enough at the Blackthorn, tiny pimples of pinkish white

blossom to come. The snowdrops have been magnificent and seem to have spread since last Spring in gardens and wild places. Many of the Hazel catkins have been dashed to the ground by the gales but many others are still hanging on so there will be hazel nuts aplenty come the Autumn

Last week, that is before the storms, I was so pleased to see a pair of Dippers by the bridge at Melin y Grogue over Crochen Brook, there was a small beach of pebbles from which they bobbed up and down and the water was clear and shallow.

I have been troubled by an errant mole who seemed to have taken up permanent residency in my garden but this pales into insignificance when I see the hundreds of molehills in the fields. Not to mention the grey squirrels whose numbers seem to have multiplied. I am also aware of increased badger activity along the lane which is lined by their latrines.

I am hopeful that later in the Spring the boggy field at Melin y Grogue will be pink with Ragged Robin as it was in 2021 but not in 2020 when the field was too dry. Last year it was a sea of pink and definitely something to watch out for.

Well, I have saved the best till last! I have mistletoe growing on one of my apple trees.



I had set about a dozen seeds years ago on various apple trees marking each one with a piece of string and had given up looking. Walking through the garden last week I was so surprised to notice a small clump. I have yet to discover whether it's male or female but I think however it will be many years before there are bunches for sale at the Christmas Auction.

Young Farmers hedge-laying



Since the end of lockdown, Knighton YFC officer team has organised an exciting programme of events for their members, based on learning more about rural skills and agricultural production in the area. As well as recent visits to local businesses FM Caine and Son, a local pig-growing unit run by an ex-member of the club and an evening of sausage-making with Tom Pugh, members have been learning the traditional craft of hedge-laying.

On this whole-day course, run by Richard Clarke of Really Rural, hosted by Andrew Beavan at the Vedw Farm, and funded by CPRE, Young Farmer members, some as young as 14, got the chance to learn the basics of managing a hedge by laying. This involved part cutting tall stems at their base and laying them on their sides around supporting stakes, filling any gaps with cut material, and binding the tops. Members learned that hedges are dynamic systems needing constant but changing management to ensure their health and long-term survival. It was hard work but a very enjoyable day – and who knows, Knighton YFC may just have inspired the next local hedge-laying contractor!

Western Mail October 1914



“In Wales, some 4,500 refugees were accommodated, whilst Lord Bute offered to find homes for 3000 refugees in Cardiff and on Rhosay. Towns including Cardigan, Aberaeron, Lladysul, Lampeter and Barmouth all invited Belgian refugees. The Davies sisters of Gregynog (the daughters of David Davies the entrepreneur who developed Barry Docks) recruited 91 of what they termed “a better class of refugee”, mainly artists and musicians, and set them up in Aberystwyth and Barry, hoping to enrich the cultural life of Wales, with a degree of success. The Western Mail ran a column in Flemish and a Belgian primary school was set up at 9 Richmond Road.”
