#### Strength through weakness

I'm a self-confessed book snob, so I was sceptical when my wife suggested I read Rebecca Yaros's Fourth Wing Series. It turns out it's not just my wife who is a fan - fourth wing Hysteria has led the books to be very successful, selling millions of copies and topping bestseller lists.

Despite being snobbish originally, through listening to the audiobook like many I too am gripped. (A word of warning though – I'm advised by my wife that some of the later content can be described as NSFC - Not Suitable for Church - so please approach with caution. You have been warned!)

The book is about Violet Sorrengail, a young woman who is forced to join a dragon rider academy after being ordered to do so by the commanding general, who also happens to be her mother. The book explores themes of survival, friendship, and of overcoming adversity.

While not explicitly stated, Violet suffers from a disabling condition shared with the book's author. Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome is a condition which affects the body's connective tissue. We see this in Violet's hypermobility, prematurely greying hair, joint pain, and brittle bones.

We seem to be living in times where leaders seem more interested in emphasising strength than showing compassion for weakness, and where empathy seems to be in short supply. This is mirrored in these books, where Violet Is seen by others as being weak and fragile. As a result, during her training her peers are keen to kill her off as she is seen as holding back her division or "wing". Her resilience is captured in her frequent statement "I won't die today".

Violet is a compelling character because her weaknesses are often the source of her strength. Paradoxically, her achievements often come from her weaknesses.

The story of Jesus is a story of paradoxes. His teachings emphasise humility and service, yet he performs miracles and has divine authority. His death is the foundation of our belief in eternal life and redemption. He reverses the traditional values of the world and challenges society's hierarchies and conventions.

Ultimately the cross is both a punishment, a painful death, and a source of new life. Jesus's strength comes in part through his weakness; that while God he experienced being fully human, and through this he can save us.

Fortunately for us, none of us (as far as I'm aware) have been forced to join a dragon rider academy. Most of us don't suffer from debilitating diseases. However, we all have our challenges to overcome.

We are approaching the end of the Easter season and getting closer Pentecost in early June where we celebrate the Holy Spirit empowering believers to fulfil God's will for us. I hope we can bring compassion here others emphasise strength, seek peace where we see wars, and let what the world sometimes sees as our weaknesses be our strengths. Where we see darkness, let us hold onto, celebrate and bring forth the light of Christ.

#### "The desert and the parched land will be glad; the wilderness will rejoice and blossom." (Isaiah 35:1)

Eastertide is the season of Blossom – Apple, Cherry, Quince, and Hawthorn, or whatever grows near where you live. The branches burst into life to bring joy to bare black twigs, and the petals drift slowly on a light breeze to rest on the surface of the roads and the rivers to make a swirling carpet in the Spring sunshine.

Then comes the "greening" when the blossom gives way to leaf, and the hedges come alive to make our narrow roads even narrower, the Horse Chestnuts unfold on the green in Yalding, outside the school in Laddingford, and in the churchyard in Collier Street. If you get the opportunity, this is a good month to get to know the trees of Yalding churchyard (leaflet available in the church) and find ancient yews and a tulip tree, birch and beech, walnut, cedar, and the second tallest wild cherry in Kent.

There is new life in the season of the Resurrection.

It's all around us, even within us, our spirits lifted by warmer weather and longer days and the hope of a glorious Summer to come. Everything will be all right; the past is behind us. We have learned our lessons and we shall not repeat our mistakes. Salvation has come at a cost, for which we are sorry, but Redemption has been won and we shall not waste the opportunity or forget the life given for our sake.

This month we celebrate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE day, the end of the Second World War in Europe and the prospect of a brighter future. As time passes and we move from generation to generation like trees blossoming year after year, it's easy to forget how we ended up in such a terrible situation, and assume that such things will never happen again. Think on. If we do not keep alive the lessons that our ancestors learned with their sacrifice, we are in danger of suffering the same fate. This anniversary is more than just an excuse for a party.

Maybe it is important that nations get a taste of political extremism from time to time so that they can be reminded about where it leads and feel the danger they might be in if it is allowed to flourish. Global tensions and economic hardship provoke a desire for simple political solutions. But there is nothing simple about the destruction of society and a cherished way of life, nothing simple about hatred of neighbour and a willingness to see others suffer, nothing simple about losing freedom to fear and oppression.

The future of our villages, our county, our nation and our world is in our hands. Don't just throw them up in despair like dead branches. Use them to do good, to offer kindness, and to make peace among your neighbours. Build relationships that matter, give of yourself for the sake of others, and stand up for what is right. Then you, too, will blossom like the trees, and others will be inspired to follow your example.

Now would be a good time to start.

# Collier Street Pop-In Get Together 2025 St Margaret's Church



**Packages to Northern Ireland from May 1<sup>st</sup>.** The Windsor Framework came into force for Royal Mail deliveries from May 1<sup>st</sup>. Basically, it means that all business parcels to all BT postcodes will need, what can be best described as a customs declaration. This can be done by the customer on line or by the Post Office.

**US Tariffs...**Some customers sell goods to the USA that may attract an extra cost due to Mr Trump's new tariff regime. Please make your American customers aware that they may be charged an extra fee for imported goods from the UK. I still await further information from UK Authorities on how this will affect small exporters. Gifts should not be affected.

**International Money Orders.** Since the demise of Moneygram services from Post Offices the only availability for this is the Western Union desk at the Robert Dyas store in Maidstone.

Please be aware that the mobile phone network signal is not so good in the Post Office. Many of our customers find their phones cannot download the necessary QR codes in the Post Office. So, if you are using a QR code from your phone to post off a return package it may be good practice to take an earlier screenshot of the QR code so our infra-red readers can interpret it quicker.

## <u>Jacqui Bakes</u> Dubai Pistachio Cream Cookies

We wanted to see what all the fuss was about, Dubai cookies! We weren't disappointed, soft and gooey chocolate chip cookies stuffed with pistachio cream in the middle. Enjoyed warm for the best texture experience. You can find pistachio cream in Aldi or online from Amazon.

Ingredients
150g pistachio cream
180g SR flour
1 tbsp cornflour
1/2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
115 g butter, melted
100g brown sugar
50g granulated sugar
1 large egg
1 tsp vanilla extract
100g white chocolate
50g unsalted pistachios



#### Method

Freeze the pistachio cream, spread onto greaseproof paper and ideally freeze overnight.

In a bowl combine flour, cornflour, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda.

Whisk melted butter, and sugars, add egg and vanilla, whisk until thick and smooth.

Mix the flour and butter mixtures together, until just combined, leaving some flour patches.

Fold the chocolate chips and pistachios into the dough.

Divide the dough into 12 balls and chill in the fridge for 1 hour.

Preheat the oven to 180 degrees.

Divide the frozen pistachio cream into 12 equal parts. Press a chilled dough ball flat, place 1 part of the frozen pistachio cream into the centre and enclose with the dough.

Place on a prepared baking sheet with at least 2" in between to allow for spreading. Bake for 12 minutes, remove from oven allow to cool for 5 mins then drizzle with melted pistachio cream and melted white chocolate.

## Earth Day 2025 at St Margaret's Collier Street

On Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> April, the school turned our attention to Earth Day. Earth Day is an event that takes place annually and each year the focus changes. It is recognised around the world and is a day to help people think about our planet and how we can help look after it. The theme this year was 'Our Power, Our Planet'.

The day began with an assembly introducing Earth Day and why the day was established over 50 years ago. It was impressive how much the children already knew regarding climate change and how the burning of fossil fuels is harmful to our planet. We discussed the different ways that our world could be powered. The children in Discovery were able to recall some of the renewable types of energy,



such as solar and wind power. We discussed FOCSS's efforts to raise a large sum of money in order to invest in solar panels for the school.

Later that afternoon, each class took part in activities related to taking better care of our planet.



#### Russet Class

Our youngest children in Russet were able to recall some of the different ways that homes, schools and businesses could be powered. They focused on wind power, looking at photos and videos of wind turbines in action. They were amazed by just how large the turbines were! Russet are a creative group so decided to demonstrate their learning by making their own version of wind turbine using mostly recyclable materials.




#### Pippin Class


Pippin reviewed what they had learnt during the assembly and then focused on what they could do to help look after the environment, from saving energy to picking up rubbish. The ideas ranged from turning lights off when leaving a room, cutting down on using non-recyclable packages where possible and the most practical and popular option, was to turn the tap off when brushing their teeth. They each decorated a handprint and wrote five different changes someone could make to take better care of the environment.

#### **Bramley Class**

Year 3 and 4 started their afternoon by reading 'Somebody Swallowed Stanley' and 'Somebody Crunched Colin'. They discussed the message of the texts and the ways Earth provides for us. They wrote 'thankyous' to the planet which expanded into a letter with sentences such as 'thank you for the tiniest creatures' and 'I am grateful for the trees as they give me oxygen'.



#### Discovery Class



As part of the geography curriculum, Discovery had recently studied the changing world and focused on renewable energy and sustainability. Along similar lines to Bramley, the children wrote letters to thank Earth for its gifts. This was then linked to spirituality by 'looking through the window', considering the positives and negatives about the environment and reflecting on their own actions.

#### The 2025 Tractor Run



At 9am on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> of April the sound of tractors rumbling along the lanes woke up some residents as tractor enthusiasts headed for the field behind the home of Stephane and Margaret Mackay. It was the annual local tractor run and Stephane agreed to host it again after successfully doing so 2 years ago.

Ray and I went along at 9am to help with the cooking and serving of bacon and sausage baps for the tractor drivers and their

Two of Stephane's nephews were cooking bacon, helped by David Goff, while Ray cooked the sausages. Frances Goff poured all the teas and coffees while Margaret and I served the food. A total of £225 was raised for the cause.

There were about 52 people who went out on the run, either in the cabs or the trailers. Having left about 10.45am the convoy drove along the lanes through Brenchley, Matfield, Capel, 5 Oak Green and on to the 'paddock' at The Chequers Laddingford, arriving about 1pm, where they were on display during The Chequers Beer Festival weekend. Everyone had a good time and Stephane and Margaret were grateful to their friends for helping.

Thanks also to Margaret and Stephane themselves for giving their time to host the run in lovely surroundings and for raising valuable funds for a great cause.

#### **BOROUGH COUNCILLORS**

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR**

A new County Councillor has been elected in this month's local elections – Cllr Brian Black (Maidstone Rural South)

#### 25.05.06 CHAIRS REPORT

Report circulated to all Councillors and the Clerk prior to the meeting.

#### Planning

Councillor Jack Highwood has worked regularly, methodically and diligently researching and opining on every planning application that impacts our Parish. In addition, all councillors have contributed to viewing and feeding back prior and during meetings.

Councillor Deborah Papas has developed excellent presentations for all our meetings, and this has proved particularly useful for when planning applications are discussed, by showing plans and pictures relating to each case.

#### Highways

In the past year, several sign incidents have been reported and rectified as well as re-painting of various markings around the village including addition 30 roundels on the B2162.

We have also had the addition of parent and child signs along B2162 north and south approaching the school, which has been actioned from our Highways Improvement Plan. In addition, KCC have also approved and funded new weight restriction signs either side of the junction of Longends Lane on the B2162 which will be erected in May / June time.

Councillor Deborah Papas has worked very hard on our relationship with KCC Highways.

#### Car Park

We installed a height barrier at the entrance to the car park, to prevent large vehicles from entering.

We have recently approved and instructed works to have an electric supply to the recreation ground, so that we can install lighting, CCTV and possibly car charging.

Saturday 29th May. We boarded the minibus and started out full of excitement. All was going well as we headed through France, when we reached Holland, we were making good time. Unfortunately, we discovered that most of the



motorway in Holland was shut. Sat nav kindly directed us down a little road to the edge of a river, where a whole motorway of cars were being taken accross on a ferry, 8 cars at a time!! The closed motorway had left us stranded in the middle of nowhere, and we had problems locating Germany! Luckily we found someone with a map who spoke English (none of us spoke any Dutch) and we set off again. As we got within 2 minutes from our destination the

minibus declared we were totally out of fuel, but we managed to drive into Riepe after a mere 12 hours on the road, where all our hosts were waiting for us. We were then driven to where we would stay, but since it was 1.15am in the morning we were very anti social, and went to bed.

We enjoyed bread with butter, meats, cheese, vegetables and homemade jams. After breakfast, we all went to Reipe church together. The church is a very beautiful building, and is known locally as "The teapot" because of the shape if its Spire. We noticed the graveyard as very neat and well kept. The service was about the same length as ours, consisting of a few hymns, some prayers and the story of Zaccarias complete with cartoons by the church youth group. The local people were very welcoming, a lot of hard work had gone into the service to make it bilingual.

After the service we went to the church hall to enjoy a piece of homemade cake and some more tea! We also met some new people, and did our best to talk to them (mostly in English). After church we had a lovely lunch with our hosts before heading out for an afternoon trip to a local museum. Here we watched a film about the history of Riepe and Emden. Unfortunatly it was in German, so we struggled to understand it. We also looked around the museum, and saw lots of interesting photos and artefacts. 
