

Parish Council report December / January

Our last few meetings have been relatively quiet affairs. However, there has been plenty going on between meetings in preparation for future decisions.

The Task and Finish Group looking into how best to use our Community Infrastructure (CIL) money came up with a series of proposals which were adopted by the parish council. These being:

- to enhance the Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) signs around the village;
- to explore with the school & Shropshire Council a solution to the parking problems around Oak Farm Lane;
- to add an additional street light to the Avenue by the bridge in conjunction with some road safety measures on The Avenue;
- and to explore 20mph zones in the approach to the school, The Avenue and Fox Lane.

The plan was to have a combined site meeting with Shropshire Council engineers to help resolve issues for Oak Farm Lane and The Avenue. Despite the Parish Clerk's best efforts over recent months Shropshire Council hasn't responded to requests for a meeting, directly or through our county councillor. Over recent months it is fair to say that members have become increasingly exasperated by the latter.

Having previously secured the Alma Close funds from Shropshire Council, after a lot of hassle for the Clerk, Cllr Chris Jones and myself held several on site meetings with prospective contractors for new accessible play equipment for the playing field. Initial quotes for the equipment were very close, prompting councillors to ask for visualizations of the designs and revised quotes which remained very close. After consideration of the specifications and the designs Kopman was chosen as the preferred contractor and asked to draw up a more detailed quotation.

For what seems like an age members have been concerned that works off Rednal Mile, by Corbett's Bridge, may have been happening without the required permissions in place. More recently this has been about an adjacent site to the original site. Once again the council resolved to contact the enforcement team at Shropshire Council. This has again resulted in some frustrating contact with Shropshire Council.

Members were pleased to see the School expansion project reaching a conclusion. The school is an important part of the village and we are all pleased to see the situation for pupils improved by this project.

With the sad news that the Methodists Chapel will be closing the Parish Council have been exploring where to hold our meetings. The Clerk made enquiries at the Village Hall and the School and we will be making a decision on that at our December meeting. We are sad to see the Chapel close and are extremely grateful to them for hosting our meetings over recent years.

Cllr John Thornhill recently attended Shropshire Council's 'Meet the Leader' drop in session in Oswestry. Cllr Thornhill took the opportunity to discuss a number of concerns with the Leader, Cllr Lezley Picton. Detailed reports from John will be considered at our December meeting. In summary, at John's meeting with the Leader, he expressed the council's ongoing concerns about the link between the parish council and our Shropshire Councillor; lack of action at Corbett's Bridge, and the lack of response from Shropshire Council highways in relation to traffic calming measures. Cllr Thornhill also attended a session with the Police and Crime Commissioner, John Campion, in Kinnerley, where the PCC accepted that Shropshire didn't have the right policing levels – something we all know.

A resident has asked us to mention in the magazine that many paths and verges are overgrown and they kindly ask residents to trim their hedges back from paths to improve access and safety.

We hope you have had a good Christmas and we wish you all a safe, healthy and prosperous 2024.

Patient experience will help improve diabetic care and support



According to NHS figures there are currently 30,000 people living with diabetes in Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin (STW) and the proportion of adults living with the condition is the 16th highest out of 42 areas in England. Furthermore, the rate of people receiving the 'National Institute for Health and Care Excellence' (NICE) recommended care processes is the lowest in the country.

This means that organisations within the local Integrated Care System (ICS), including NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin and public health bodies, are looking at ways these services can be improved. As the independent patient champion, Healthwatch Shropshire gathered experiences to ensure that the patient voice is at the heart of efforts to improve services. The Healthwatch Shropshire report is now available https://www.healthwatchshropshire.co.uk/report/2023-10-30/diabetes-care-and-support.

Lynn Cawley, Chief Officer of Healthwatch Shropshire, told us, "I would like to thank the over 200 people who shared their experiences and suggestions for service improvements. We are really pleased to be working with organisations from the Integrated Care System to ensure that patient experience helps to inform decisions as services change. The report has been shared with the leaders and decision makers and we will be presenting the findings to meetings across the area to ensure the patient voice is at the heart of efforts to improve services."

Councillor Cecilia Motley, Shropshire Council cabinet member for adult social care, public health and communities and Co-Chair of the Health & Wellbeing Board, said, "Our Public Health Team will work with Healthwatch to ensure that this report and its recommendations is received by the Health and Wellbeing Board in Shropshire, and that as a Board we take ownership of monitoring actions that are agreed. The survey findings are clear; we must do more to work together as a system to improve our care, treatment and support for our residents living with diabetes."

Dr Syed Gillani, Clinical Lead for Diabetes at NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin, said: "We are currently undertaking a system-wide transformation of the way we provide diabetes care for our residents in Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin. This will include how we support people with diabetes to understand and manage living with their condition on a day-to-day basis."

"We will use the results of this survey to help inform how we best design these new pathways, with those people with both Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes at the heart of our work."

Healthwatch Shropshire is the independent health and social care champion in Shropshire. It gathers the views and experiences of patients, service users, carers, and the general public about services including hospitals, GPs, mental health services, community health services, pharmacists, opticians, residential care and children's services. It also has statutory powers that it can use to influence service provision by encouraging improvements.◆





West Felton Stores hosted The Post Office for as long as anybody can remember. The shop used to be called 'the post office' as it seemed to be the most important part of the enterprise.

A 'Post Office restructuring programme' in 2012-2018 saw quite an upheaval, with post office counters removed in many rural shops and an outreach service instituted where the shop owners agreed to have a visiting postmaster attend on certain days at certain times with their 'post office in a box'. People grumbled, but there was no choice so it was accepted and worked fairly well for some years. But, not well enough for The Post Office which, having split from the Royal Mail in 2011, now had to be a viable, separate company.

At the same time we all started to do most of our communication by text, email or social media; and sending parcels has become easier - the postman will now collect them from your home for FREE!

The Post Office has been keeping a close eye on the business conducted by every outreach postmaster and, as we found more convenient ways of posting our letters and parcels, they cut down the hours they were prepared to provide services, especially in small villages like West Felton.

That is how we ended up with an hour and a half in the lobby of the village hall - which is volunteered free of charge, or we would have no outreach at all!

Again we, the population, have worked our way around the unsatisfactory system, resulting in a noticeable fall off in business in the village hall Outreach Service. This will not have gone unnoticed by The PO. The West Felton service is just one of those run by Ruth Hutchings and our hours were reduced against her wishes.

So, whilst many of us have found our way around the poor Post Office service in West Felton, we should bear in mind those for whom this is still an essential service and, in spite of the regular technical and other difficulties, perhaps we should try to use it a bit more in the hope of it's continuation going forward. •

Op the Garden Path with Topiarius

ne of gardening's interesting features is that the "experts" don't always agree and that "the rule book" is not always right. Matthew Pottage recently mentioned a few rules that could be broken in his article in The Garden. One was that he had been surprised that an unpruned wisteria will still flower. I could have told him that as ours gets very little attention but flowers. The aspect of our garden is such that we have to ignore the rules about plants needing full sun as otherwise we would be a bit short on variety. The quick answer is that, whilst some things sulk or throw in the towel, there are many plants that have not read the rule book.

Another area where "rules" don't always work out as expected is in hardiness. In many cases there are other factors than just temperature involved, for example the time at low temperature, the wind factor and how wet the soil was. Perhaps most annoying are the plants that are borderline, they do fine in most years but the next year you are caught out. This was the case with us after last year's unusual cold spell in December. Here too experts don't always agree, I found ratings on the web for a particular salvia to vary from definitely tender to standing several degrees of frost! My system (if it is a system) is to bring really tender stuff into a frost-free glasshouse at the beginning of November and to bring definitely

dodgy things such as fuchsia in pots into a cold glasshouse later in the month, leaving what I judge to be almost hardy until very low temperatures are forecasted—my mistake last year was to fail to see the cold coming.

We can expect some weather interruption in January but I won't be breaking the rules of walking on grass or digging when frozen. However, I hope that remaining restructuring and shrub and tree pruning can continue in the better spells. Also, it is a good time to check the pH of the vegetable plot for application of lime if necessary. Our soil is pretty near neutral and generally OK for lime hating plants but to be sure I sprinkle sulphur chips on the rhododendrons etc. Other than that, it will be a very quiet gardening month although the new year will prompt a start on clearing the accumulated debris from paths.

Some people make New Year resolutions but that is not something that I have taken up. However, the path clearing is first indication that spring will be coming and is a good job to lift any low winter spirits. Among the looking forward thoughts will be plans and expectations for how we will prevent the problems and failures encountered last year. In my case there will be some adjustments to how I protect vegetables from insects plus the perennial determination to do better at weeding.







Volunteers Needed to Spread the Joy of Reading in Shropshire Schools

West Felton Head Teacher, Helen, focusses on a really strong reading programme. Our school has achieved 95% in the Reading SATS compared to 73% nationally. Other children are not so lucky.

Children's literacy charity **Schoolreaders** is looking for more volunteers who can help spread the joy of reading to children in primary schools across Shropshire, particularly in Market Drayton, Shrewsbury, Telford and **Oswestry**.

Every year, 1 in 4 children leave primary school unable to read to the expected standard.

Schoolreaders recruits volunteers to listen to children read in primary schools, focusing on schools where children require the most support. Volunteers are asked to listen to children read once a week in term time and to commit to an academic year.

95% of children supported by a **Schoolreaders** volunteer improve their reading age. Partner schools also reported that volunteers had a positive impact on pupils with 95% improving their reading confidence and 87% their reading enjoyment. Additionally, children benefit enormously from the volunteers as positive role models in the classroom.

Jane Whitbread, founder of **Schoolreaders**, comments "Children who leave primary school unable to read well can't access their secondary schooling fully which will compromise their life opportunities. One in seven adults in England (7.1 million) are functionally illiterate and cannot read instructions on a medicine label, sit a driving theory test or fill in a job application form. Working together we can change this.

"Our **Schoolreaders** volunteers provide a crucial supplement to classroom teaching and are welcomed by schools and the children. If more children gain pleasure from reading from an early age and their reading fluency and confidence improves too, communities and society will reap the benefits."

Reading skills and developing a love of books from the earliest age will hopefully aid children to become confident, interested and engaged readers who read for pleasure.





FROM ISLAM TO CHRISTIANITY

The web site unHerd.com exists to publish articles that push against established thinking. A recent article describes how a Muslim lady migrated from Islam to Christianity via atheism. The writer's thinking has led her to believe that civilisation rests on Christianity and seeing how Western Europe has developed it is easy to understand how this happened. Starting to read the article, a reader might gain the impression that life can be split into two parts. There is the 'modus vivendi' – the way of living; and there is the spiritual aspect. The author dwells for much of the article on the former and her adoption of atheism, but latterly the author discards atheism for its failure to answer a simple question: "what is the purpose of life?" The same question is put in a slightly different way in the opening chapter of Timothy Radcliffe's book, "What is the point of being a Christian?"

As a way of living, Christianity has had a profound influence, but its teachings have evolved over the years. Some practices are echoed by Islam. The wearing of a head covering was emphasised in the early church and still obtains in some Eastern Orthodox countries today. Head covering is obligatory in Islam although pressure is rising to abolish it. Homosexuality is regarded with disdain in both Christianity and Islamism. Islam reserved a special hatred for Jews and a similar, those less evident, undercurrent of antisemitism continues to permeate Christian societies The article portrayed how a young Muslim girl was taught to behave. Prayer and ablutions were obligatory but she regarded them as pointless: she was taught to hate people who were unbelievers.

Her journey to Christianity progressed through atheism. She read Bertrand Russell's famous lecture on "why I am not a Christian" given in 1927. She felt that religion had imprisoned her and now she could be free. Hell and eternal damnation no longer existed; she was unburdened from the fear that religion imposed on her. She came to see as well that not everything that Christ did was kind; note the effect that Jesus had on the fig tree or the Gadarene swine. Russell persuaded her that morals were not necessarily a recipe for happiness. The church's denial of divorce, illustrated by his rather distasteful description of a diseased husband, was used as an example of the failure of religion. Russell claimed, not without evidence, that the church had tried to hold back scientific advance. The arrest of Galileo, who held that the earth went round the sun, contradicting the Catholic church's belief that the opposite occurred, did much to discredit religion.

At this stage her journey through faith might have stopped. But she didn't stop thinking. Christianity, unlike Islam, allowed plenty of freedoms; of conscience, of the press, of expression and other freedoms. Compare the reactions of the cartoons of God with those of

Mohammed. The important point is that whereas the Christian church might have behaved in the same way to caricatures of God in the past as Islamists do to Mohammed today, Christianity has shown that it can evolve. Indulgences (in Protestant churches) went with Luther; the Privy Council abolished Hell in 1864 (the two Archbishops voted against), but disagreements still exist; witness the discord over same sex marriage.

Yet she makes another and probably the most important point. With all these freedoms, do we still need God? And here she returns to the question in the first paragraph — what is the purpose of life. Free at last, she still had a niggling feeling that life was not complete. She sought professional help; she sought support in alcohol: then a therapist said to her: "You're spiritually bankrupt". She reacted to this startling

pronouncement by saying that she was an atheist; she hated God. "That's great" came the reply, "you have the opportunity to design your own God". Given this chance, she set to work thinking what she would like her own God to do and to identify what God would stand for. As she started to think and to express

what she would like, she suddenly realised that she was describing what Jesus and Christianity stood for. Implicit in her article is that having the one (Christian way of life 'modus vivendi') is incomplete without the other (God).

She ends by saying that if we are to withstand Islam, Communism and other religions, we must defend the civilisation that we have built, and that civilisation is founded upon Christianity. Islam as a faith is 600 years younger than Christianity and may be, in time, will evolve like Christianity. •

The first Harvest Festival 1955: The Fox & Hounds

The first Harvest Festival ever to be held in a public house, 1955: The Fox & Hounds,

As recounted by the late Glyn Jones

Tt was 1955; in the Fox & ■ Hounds a few friends were dis- from a bad illness. cussing gardening, harvesting and so on when someone suggested that we organise a Harvest Festival in the pub. A small committee was formed involving: Charles Eyton (The Colonel), Walter Little (Patch), Charles Thomas (Mick) and Glyn Jones, also helped by Elsie Bonnar and Doll Durnall.

It was decided to arrange a Harvest festival in the Fox & Hounds with the permission of the Landlord, Wally Phillips and his wife.

Glyn Jones approached the West Felton Rector of the time, Rev RGT Gillman, to know if he would be willing to take part but he refused, being disgusted at the idea of such an event!

Nothing daunted, Glyn then asked the Padre of Park Hall Army camp if he would conduct a suitable service.

Captain Howard-Bowen, Chaplain to the Forces was delighted to help. He conducted a 15 minute service, during which time the beer pumps were closed down for silence. A good gathering of local people attended, produce was auctioned and made £34.6.4d. This was later handed

to a villager who was suffering

The evening paper of that period was the Wolverhampton Express & Star which reported the event as a great success and quoted it as the first of its kind in Shropshire. Many other areas followed and the tradition continues to this day.

When the Rev Kenneth Millington arrived as Rector to the Parish he took kindly to the task of conducting the service for many vears, as did those who followed him down the years.

Qualified Auctioneer Jim Pearce conducted the sale of the goods and later on was assisted by his son, Jim Junior, making much money for local charities.

Towards the end of the 1960s the committee amalgamated with the British Legion as a joint effort and soon afterwards the Legion organised the full event, issuing Christmas parcels to widows of ex-servicemen and senior citizens until 2001.

The Harvest Auctions continued in the village hall for some years, but the distribution of parcels ceased, the proceeds instead going to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal. ♦

the New Inn and was first licensed in about 1791. It was a coaching inn with stabling for ten horses. It was purchased by John



Freeman Dovaston in the mid-1800s. The stabling was adjoining the pub facing the road.

In 1921 the Landlord was **Lewis Buckle** living there with his wife Mary Ann and their two daughters. Their son Frank was killed in France in 1916 and Lewis himself died aged 54 in 1922 - so we don't know who was running the public house when the hall was first opened.

Pte. Frank Buckle, Army No 17261, 4th Batt, Grenadier Guards is remembered on West Felton War Memorial

The son of Lewis Buckle and Mary Ann Hammond, he had three siblings, Sidney, Annie and Dorothy.

His father, Lewis, had a varied career: Gamekeeper at Worksop; Railway Porter when they lived at St Martins and by **1915 they are all living at the Fox & Hounds Public House**, West Felton. Frank signed up in1914, aged 17. He served in Belgium and France and was killed in action. Sidney also enlisted but was discharged immediately on medical grounds due to an operation for removal of appendix.

Frank was killed, aged 19, in the second phase of the Somme Campaign.

At home in West Felton his father had also died and his mother and the family left the Fox & Hounds to live at Gatacre Road, Oswestry. She died in 1949.

Wally Phillips was Landlord in 1932 and still there in 1955, see page 24.

Ann tells us, in the late 1950s the landlord Len Brown used to cut hair in the stables; many a time he would cut half of someone's hair and then go for a pint or tell them to come back tomorrow for him to finish it. Len was quite a character and was well liked by everyone. He also had an egg business and was well known in the area.

By the late1970s the Fox & Hounds was run by **Ike and Dora Kendrick late** of the Union Inn at Queens Head. It was home to a popular bowling green and there was great disappointment when the owners decided to give it up for development as private homes.


The bus stop by the houses was still named "The Fox and Hounds" on the Arriva timetable until a few years ago.
