CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends,

Imagine the scene on a bleak hillside with the detritus of violence scattered around, bent nails, battered mallets, filthy sponges and a carefully laid down spear. There aren't many people there now, the dead man has been hurriedly carried away and buried out of sight so that his tortured body wouldn't spoil the festival to come. Many of his friends had disappeared hours before, hidden away with their shock and terror. A few women had stayed to watch and his mother and best friend had stood by, close enough to hear his dying words of love and share every agonised breath before there was only silence. And now, almost everyone has gone, some to weep, to scream, some to wash and cook food for the great feast and some to shrug their shoulders and get on with the rest of their lives. Only soldiers are left, tired and stinking of blood, sweat, alcohol and testosterone; the tools and marks of violence. One picks up his winnings, the dead man's clothes, others pick up the dice, hoping for better luck next time. Off they go, ready to wash off that day's work and feed their tired bodies. It is a dismal scene, and this year we are only too used to dismal scenes of violence, terror, misery and cruelty.

In spring, we celebrate Easter, it's a great festival and we celebrate new life with flowers and special food. But we can't get to Easter day without Good Friday; we can't skip the suffering and death of Jesus to get straight to his resurrection. This year, we cannot forget that many of our brothers and sisters will not be able to celebrate Easter in their beautiful churches and enjoy their Easter feast at home, eating the celebration food which had been taken to church to be blessed by their priest. But suffering and death doesn't take away the truth of Easter. The truth of Easter is that love will always rise again and triumph over evil. That's why Jesus, who was all love, couldn't stay dead. This is the faith which is shared by many Ukrainian people and this month, may we keep them at the front of our minds and prayers. Thank you so much to everyone who's already given generously to support the refugees and please carry on doing everything you can. And do come to church this Easter, even if you've never been before. If we're really going to know the new life and the good life which Jesus brings and if we're really going to make a good difference in our world, we need to be together.

Do have a very happy and blessed Easter.



Harby Playing Fields Update – March 2022

Spring has arrived on the playing field and activity has continued to grow with a number of new initiatives bursting into life.

The Pavilion community bar has been open for its first two weekends and has proved very popular. The community bar area has been furnished with 'new 'tables and chairs to complement the very professional bar. Also we send a big thank-you to Milly and Will Turner for donating a display fridge to the playing field. Phil Haywood and his team from Foxtrot & Oscar have provided a fantastic friendly service to all visitors. Their offer includes beers, lagers, wines, cocktails and snacks (including doggy treats). Phil has also provided darts, music and the screening of the rugby internationals. We have also added hot pie, sausage rolls and mushy peas to the menu. Don't forget the Happy Hour specials on a Sunday!

Attendance has been excellent from villagers and those from further afield and helped everyone to get to know each other a little better. If you have any feedback, good or bad, please tell us your thoughts. We intend to continue with these events throughout the year, opening dates and times will be advertised on flyers, websites and other media so please watch out for the dates and come down and enjoy time with new and old friends.

A new football team has been selected to become Harby FC and will play in the Lincolnshire Sunday League from September 2022. This is the first time that Harby has entered a team for many years and revives one of the fundamental uses of the field. Friendly games will commence in August, with training nights throughout the preseason period. We hope that some villagers will turn out for training and even play for the team, if you can't quite manage that these days, then do come and offer your support on Sunday mornings.

The play equipment area has been well used throughout the past months, particularly in the after-school hours. Thanks to the parents who have braved the weather and who have also kept the area clean and tidy. We are exploring a grant to plant more trees in the Play area and around the perimeter of the main field along with hedges infill. This will enhance the environment and give a pleasing autumn display. If we are successful there will be a community planting day to involve the whole village. We seem to have the moles a little more under control with the help of our new contractor, this will allow safer use of the football pitch and the play area.

The Multi Use Games Area is a target for improvement this year, quotations have been obtained for various levels of maintenance and resurfacing. We are investigating grant opportunities before we take action. The Bowls club is low on members and has withdrawn from the leagues this year. The Playing Field is working with the members to review the situation. The club has been in existence for over 70 years so let's work hard to help it evolve and flourish.

Car boots will start from 10th April, please support these as all proceeds are reinvested in the village through the many groups who help to run the events. This year we hope to provide the food and drinks ourselves so if you can help, let us know.

We are working with the village groups to provide a special day to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee with music and food on the Playing field on 4th June. A new Harby Food and Craft show is planned for 30th July which we hope will develop into a regular event to showcase local produce and skills. Bonfire night planning has already started for the 5th of November and we will once again need your help and support.

Other plans include: More car shows after the success last year - Caravan clubs - Music events - Children's games.

A spring clear up event is planned for the weekend of 2nd and 3rd of April, there's lots to do to prepare your village playing fields for the summer, please volunteer or just turn up on the day.

Harby Parish Council Update

Easter is just round the corner and spring is coming – hope you enjoy the better weather and don't eat too many Easter Eggs.

Precept

The Parish Council has started planning for the next financial year and the precept request has been submitted to Newark and Sherwood District Council and will be included in your Council Tax bill in the very near future. The Council have been careful to ensure that the precept has not been increased too much, whilst trying to maintain the services it provides and also properly maintain the assets for which it is responsible. Historically the Parish Council had relied on its reserves to provide services, but these reserves had dwindled in recent years and the Parish Council had been forced to increase the precept to ensure that it could continue to operate for the last couple of years. The Parish Council has again increased the precept this year, but it is hoped that as the pandemic is now easing the Council will be able to undertake some of the projects which had been on hold.

Dog Poo

This is a matter which is raised regularly with the Parish Council and whilst we have no powers with regard to this issue, we do try to be as helpful as we can be and provide solutions where possible. It should be noted that the majority of dog owners are also very concerned about the current problems as it only takes one dog owner to be inconsiderate and all dog owners are blamed for the issue. When anyone owns a dog, it is part of their ownership responsibilities to clear up, in public places after their pet - this is not currently happening for all dog owners despite big red bins being provided by the Parish Council for this purpose here is a photo of the new bin at the junction of High Street and Station Road – you have paid for it, so why not use it? The Parish Council continues to work with the District Council Community Protection Team to try and catch those dog owners who are being inconsiderate so that fines can be imposed on them. This request is also made on behalf of the school where regular deposits are left for the children to walk into and the playing fields where users can often find deposits - this really is unacceptable as there are serious health issues for children in relation to dog poo.

Elections were held on the 17th February and the Councillors elected are as follows: Newark & Sherwood District Council, Emma Davis, who will join District Councillor Dales Nottinghamshire County Council, Debbie Darby.







In January, returning speaker Richard Pullen presented an engaging account of the war in East Africa 1914-18 through the memoirs of Sergeant Harold Downs DCM. who served with the Royal Garrison Artillery. Unlike the static war of attrition on The Western Front, the forgotten front war in Africa was mobile and like a game of "cat & mouse" with a much smaller German army. Some of the first casualties of the Great War were at Tsingato in August 1914 and the war in Africa ended on 24 November 1918, 13 days after the Armistice on the Western Front. A little-known naval battle took place on Lake Tanganyika between a larger German vessel and two British motorboats HMS Mimi and HMS Toutou in 1916.British troops not only faced the German Army, but also natural enemies of disease, wild animals and communication limitations, making the forgotten front a harsh environment to survive. (Thanks to Richard Croft for this report.)

In February, member speaker Harold Paine gave a presentation with some great slides on "The English Civil War". He started with the royal family background showing that Charles I was a descendent of Henry VII and his own opinion was that if Richard III had managed not to be usurped by him then the civil war may never have happened. Charles I was a believer of the Divine Right of Kings but was also indecisive and went back on his word which made the parliamentarians feel that he was untrustworthy. Harold told us about the most significant battles at Edgehill and Marston Moor though there were others. Mostly, they resulted in a stalemate but Oliver Cromwell had been observing and could see where the parliamentarians had been going wrong in battle. He took charge and with new tactics the throne was lost and Charles was beheaded. Harold finished his presentation by showing us a picture of a gold medal presented to the parliamentarians who fought which commemorated their victory over the royalists. It had a picture of Cromwell on it and was the first medal awarded for participation in a war.

Then at the start of March, Richard Croft threw in a "surprise extra" meeting for us. Richard gave us a tour of Harby All Saint's Church and the Manor House site. We started outside the church where Richard told us about the churches that have stood on this site. We know that there was a church here when Queen Eleanor died in 1290.Richard showed us a carved face that was found in Jowett's Wood that is most certainly from this building. A Norman doorway has been reused in the current church, along with the font dating from the 16th century. A new chapel was built in 1824 and then replaced in 1877 by the current one. Richard showed us photographs to illustrate where the older church would have been by comparison. We looked outside at the statue of Queen Eleanor and the coats of arms that surrounded her on the bell tower. These were replicated in colour inside on the floor by the alter. The bell from the 1824 church is also kept inside the current church and Colin Wells kindly rang it for us. We also had a look at the Queen Eleanor window and pictures of the original design for it. We followed this by a walk around the site of where Harby Manor once stood. This is where Queen Eleanor died. Although there is nothing left of the building, part of the moat can still be seen.
