8-2026	8.	<p>PUBLIC SESSION</p> <p>(i) Shropshire Councillor Report</p> <p>Government Funding Settlement The government recently announced how much money councils across the country will be receiving over the next 3 years. Shropshire Council were pleased that, after many years of single year settlements, that there would be some certainty about future funding. That was tempered by disappointment at the amount of funding announced. As you can see in the graph urban councils will, on average, be receiving 20% more funding per head by 2028/29, but Shropshire Council will see a core funding cut of around 12% over the same period. This will place huge additional pressure on the council, at a time when our finances are already very difficult. We believe the government have fundamentally misunderstood the cost of delivering services in a rural area, and are appealing the decision on this basis. We expect to get the final settlement in the next few weeks.</p> <p>Highways The cold weather, then snow, followed shortly by heavy rain has caused a great deal of damage to roads that were already in poor condition. Additional staff have been put on to deal with the worst of the potholes, but there is a huge amount of work to do. I'm aware that the back lanes in the hills around Clun have been particularly badly hit, and will continue working with the highways team to make sure these are not forgotten. There are some glimmers of good news. The government recently announced additional, ringfenced, funding for highways maintenance. This will come in over the next few years, the 26/27 increase is modest but by 29/30 Shropshire Council's highways budget will have increased by about £16m, or nearly 50%. The 4 year settlement means that Shropshire Council can create a prioritised list of work, and I will battle to ensure that as much as possible comes to the Clun area.</p> <p>Clun Vision I am trying to find out what has happened to the funding for this. I spoke to Nigel Hartin who confirmed that his understanding was that there was money for it in this year's budget. Highways team aren't currently showing much enthusiasm for engaging with discussion on this, but I won't let this drop.</p> <p>Food Waste Legislation requires all councils to complete weekly food waste collections from the start of April this year. The promise has always been that extra funding would be given to allow this to happen, but this has not materialised. Given the financial pressure Shropshire Council is already under, this means that at present we are not able to start weekly collections. The final decision on what we will do is with cabinet, but I think the most likely outcome is fortnightly collections of food waste from all houses as an interim step. Assuming I'm correct, this would mean any houses that do not pay for garden waste collections will receive a food caddy, those who do pay for garden waste collections would have the option of putting food in their green bin, or receiving a new kitchen caddy.</p>



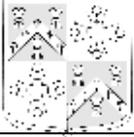

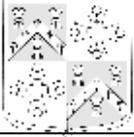

Clun Town Council with Chapel Lawn Churchyard Committee Terms of Reference

1. Background

Part of the churchyard of St George's Church in Clun was closed on 31st March 1893 by an order made in Privy Council on 28th October 1892. Closure was subject to two conditions:

- i. In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;
- ii. In such earthen graves now existing in the Churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order viz., widows, widowers, parents and unmarried children, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

For reasons that are not now fully understood, the closure of this part of the churchyard was subsequently ignored and a large number of internments took place during the latter part of the twentieth century and into the early years of the twenty-first century.

In 2020, the then Churchwarden raised the matter with the Ministry of Justice which confirmed the closure in 1893. The St George's Parochial Church Council subsequently decided to exercise its right to transfer responsibility for maintenance of the closed part of the churchyard to an appropriate local authority under Section 215 of the Local Government Act 1972. Clun Town Council with Chapel Lawn accepted that responsibility from the Autumn of 2023.

Although maintenance responsibility has been transferred to the Town Council, legal ownership of the closed part of the churchyard is unaffected and all other rights, powers and functions remain under the control of the Church. The churchyard also remains a consecrated area subject to Faculty jurisdiction. The churchyard is widely recognised as an important part of the townscape of Clun, attracting visitors and providing a quiet space for rest, remembrance and reflection. It is also of historical significance: there are 34 listed Grade 2 listed memorials sited within its boundaries.

2. Objective

The Churchyard Committee shall oversee the maintenance, cleanliness, and safety of the closed part of the churchyard of St George's, Clun. The Committee aims to ensure that the churchyard remains a dignified, peaceful, and well-kept space for remembrance, rest and reflection.

3. Membership

There shall be a maximum of five members comprised of:

- i. three town councillors, one of whom shall be the Chair;
- ii. one of the currently serving Churchwardens;
- iii. at the discretion of the Committee, one member of the public.

The quorum shall be the three town councillors.

The Town Council shall appoint the town councillors each year at its Annual Meeting, or at a council meeting as soon as possible thereafter, and shall nominate one of them as the Chair. Their terms of office shall end either with the appointment of their successors or on the fourth day after an ordinary election of the Town Council, whichever occurs first.

If there is only one serving Churchwarden, they shall automatically become a member of the committee on appointment to that office by St George's Parochial Church Council and shall remain a member until the appointment of their successor. If there is more than one serving Churchwarden, St George's Parochial Church Council shall notify the Chair of the Committee in writing as to the person who is to be the Churchwarden member of the committee.

The committee may co-opt one member of the public.

All members of the Committee shall be bound by the Town Council's Code of Conduct.

4. Meetings

The Committee shall meet at least quarterly, or as required. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the Town Council's standing orders, policies and procedures.

5. Delegated Powers

The Committee has delegated authority to spend up to the limit of the annual budget agreed by the Town Council for its work. The Town Council shall set the budget for the forthcoming financial year no later than 30th March.

The Committee has delegated authority to develop, commit to and implement a plan

and schedule for the maintenance of the closed part of the churchyard, including but not limited to grounds maintenance, tree inspections and resulting work, monument inspections and resulting work, and inspections of the churchyard to identify and address any health and safety hazards. The Committee has delegated authority to procure services and to enter into and manage contracts with suppliers to undertake this work, ensuring that maintenance activities are carried out promptly and efficiently, maintaining the cleanliness and appearance of the churchyard.

The Committee has delegated authority to establish a working group to advise it in the discharge of its responsibilities; and also to make use of volunteers and voluntary organisations in its work.

The Committee has delegated authority to develop and adopt policies and procedures necessary for the proper and safe discharge of its work.

The Committee shall, in exercising its delegated authority, always comply with the Town Council's standing orders, financial regulations, policies and procedures.

6. Responsibilities

The Committee shall:

- Prepare a maintenance plan and schedule for the closed churchyard that shall be reviewed and updated annually;
- Carry out work in accordance with the maintenance plan and schedule and with any other priorities that may emerge during the year;
- Conduct regular inspections of the closed churchyard to identify and address any health and safety hazards, such as uneven pathways, damaged structures, or fallen branches;
- Take appropriate measures to mitigate risks and to ensure a safe environment for visitors and for those engaged in maintenance work;
- Maintain the memorials, graves and grave markers within the closed churchyard in a respectful and dignified manner, ensuring they are kept clean and free from debris;
- Liaise with St George's Parochial Church Council, with Church Authorities and with Shropshire Council as may be necessary to carry out its responsibilities;
- Coordinate with families or descendants regarding any necessary repairs or maintenance of individual memorials or graves, respecting insofar as is possible their wishes and privacy;
- Prepare and submit regular reports, at least 3-monthly or more frequently if it judges this to be appropriate, to the Town Council summarising maintenance activities, expenditures, and any notable developments or concerns;
- Engage with the local community to raise awareness of the importance of maintaining the closed churchyard as a place of remembrance and cultural heritage;
- Provide opportunities for community members to participate in volunteer maintenance activities or contribute to the upkeep of the churchyard.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I write as the Chair of Trustees, of Clun Memorial Hall (Charity Reg. No. 507032), in connection with a public footpath at the above location. I attach the Land Registry map of the area, upon which I have marked, Points A,B, C & D.

The path traverses land owned by the Memorial Hall from point B to point D. From point A to C, the path is frequently used by visitors and residents, not only to access the hall itself and the adjacent children's playground but also as a short walking route to the town, for those using the large car park, at the Hall. The use of the hall car park is encouraged, due to the congested nature of the town itself, and the limited parking available along the narrow streets.

From point B to point C, this can be very difficult during wet weather and is indeed, impossible at such times, for mothers with pushchairs, or wheelchair users, due to the fact that over the years a build up of leaf mould and wood chippings ensures a slushy mess is underfoot; impossible for anything with wheels, such as pushchairs and wheelchairs. This messy condition remains, until an extended dry period firms up the surface once again. Wood chippings have been laid in the past, to alleviate the problem in the short term. However, this has increased the problem in the long term, as the chippings break down into mulch. This now requires removal and a new firm base to be established.

I am aware that surface maintenance of public footpaths is the responsibility of Shropshire Council, however I am also aware that funds are not plentiful just now and that we may be well down the list for such remedial work to be undertaken.

The Memorial Hall Committee currently has a project to refurbish the tennis court and introduce pickleball & petanque to the area immediately adjacent to this footpath. This was formerly a MUGA, which had to be dismantled a couple of years ago, due to the dangerous nature of the surrounding block wall. A local contractor is scheduled to complete the work, when we have raised the necessary funds. His quote includes the cost of reinstating a firm pathway between points B & C, previously referred to. The total cost of the whole project, which includes new tennis nets and court marking, fencing, etc. is £13k. Thus far we have raised grants totalling £4.5k (Bernard Sunley Foundation, £4k & the Wynn Foundation, £500) which together with our own contribution of £2k, means that we have raised 50% of the required funds to date.

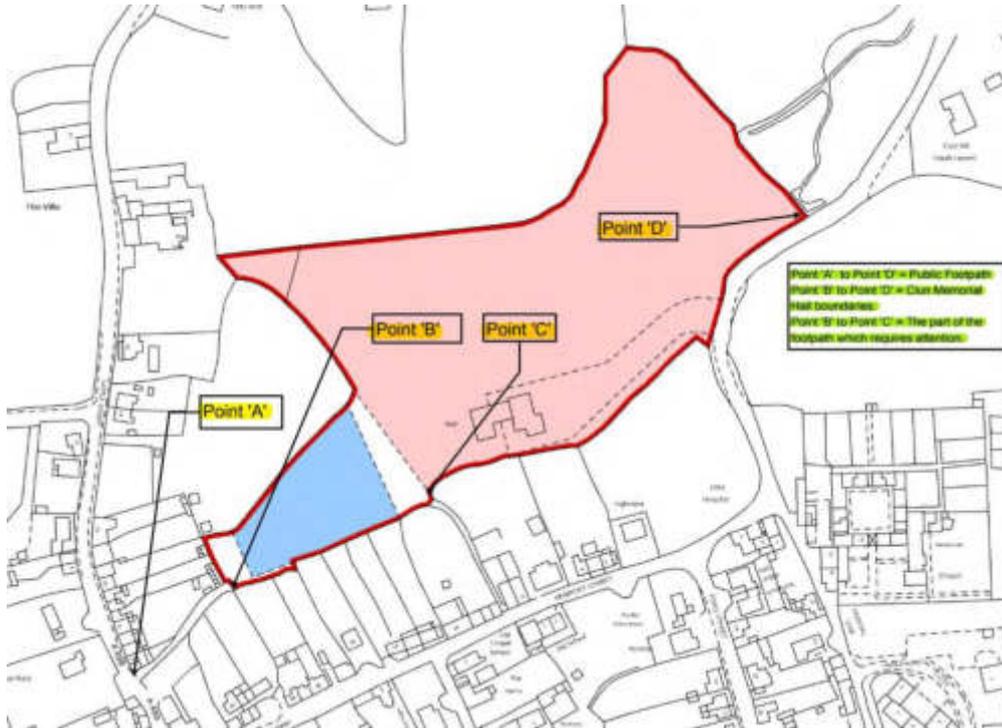
The contractor's quote, specifically relating to the ground works element, (machinery hire, stone/scalping/delivery and labour), is £5,312. It is our intention to also approach the Clun Town Council for a contribution towards the overall cost, on the basis that the works will benefit the whole town and should not fall on a private charity, in entirety.

The purpose of this email is therefore:

- To seek your view on the issue - might it be that you would be able to undertake the work yourselves, within a reasonable timescale, i.e during the coming year?
- Should this not be the case, will it be in order to commission the work ourselves, as outlined above?
- In which case, would you consider making a contribution towards the cost of £5,312? (A copy of the quote is also attached)

Please appreciate that we are trying to find a practical solution, during a period of financial constraint to all parties and I look forward to hearing from you in due course,

Shropshire Council Response

Apologies, I thought I had replied, but alas I had not, so please find my response here: I have considered this request and agree that putting a more robust surface along this path does make sense. Although improvement of surfaces is not a duty on Shropshire Council, I do have some capital funds to carry out improvements over and above the duty to maintain.

Having considered your proposal, I am willing to contribute £4,000.00 towards the project to surface section B-C of this path. This figure is lower than the £5,312.00 requested, as I cannot fund the removal of the deteriorating bark chipping surface. At the time this was laid, I was contacted and cautioned against this for the very reason that it rots and makes the situation worse over time. My caution was too late, as the bark had already been laid, which was technically an unauthorised interference with the surface of a right of way (or an unauthorised deposit upon a right of way?). I cannot spend public money on correcting what was effectively a criminal act, although done with the best of intentions!

I trust you can understand the thinking behind this decision, in the spirit of resolving this troublesome path once and for all. Although I have yet to have our capital allocation confirmed for next year, I am confident that this level of contribution can be made, whatever the outcome of our allocation for 2026/27.

Once you have confirmed the remaining funding and the project is going ahead, please contact me again to arrange transferring the funds. I see that you are already on our payments system, so arranging payment should not be an issue.

I cannot guarantee carrying out this work with our own team, to coincide with your project, so I think a contribution is more suitable in light of the wider work being carried out here. It would be too messy to try to co-ordinate 2 contractors.

I trust this information is of help.

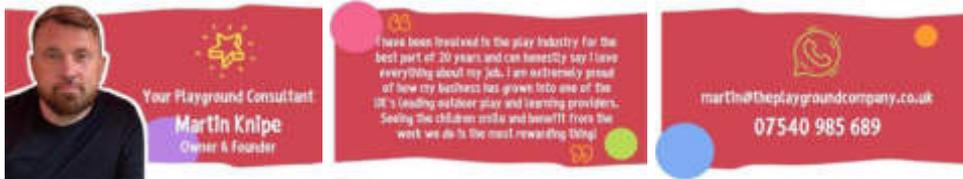

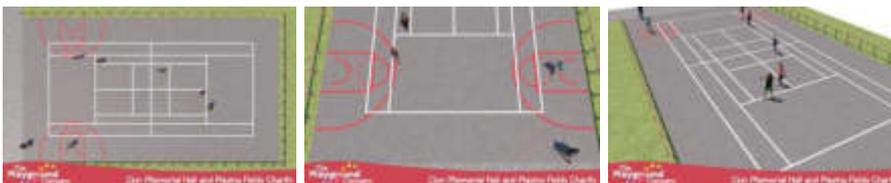
