Best Kept Village Competition

- The Best Kept Village Competition judging is earlier than usual this year (9-24 May) and by the time you receive this it will have finished.
- However there's every chance we will make it into the 2nd round – judging for this is in the period 27 Jun-19 Jul.
- Therefore please continue the effort throughout this period – it's very simple – **don't drop litter and pick up any you see anywhere in the village.**

Gem Festival in Charlton Park 12-14 Jun – free tickets

- Free tickets are again being offered to Charlton residents, (also some other parishes).
- To get these, send an email to the Parish Clerk.

Existance Festival

- Here's a complication!... Existance Festival (who exceeded their noise limits last year and were not allowed back by Charlton Park) are only a few miles away this year on the same weekend as Gem Festival (but starting one day earlier) – 11-14 Jun.
- They are just over the county boundary, in Long Newnton parish. Depending on the wind direction it is possible that they might be heard in Charlton.
- Gem have a licence to lam but Existance's licence is to 2am. So if you hear music after lam on that weekend it may be coming from Existance rather than from the Gem festival-goers.
- We have no special arrangements with Existance Festival.

Other Festivals in Charlton Park in July

- Naadagama Festival, 11 July.
 - A Sri Lankan cultural event, one day only, appears to be more like a concert with ticketed seating than what you might think of as a music festival.
 - Recorded music 3-6.30pm, live music 6.30-11pm. Alcohol licence finishes at 11pm.
- 3 one-day music events 17-19 July. Believed to be all by 'tribute bands'.
 - Little is known about these events as they haven't yet (at the time of writing these notes) applied for a licence.
 - Understood to be stopping at 10pm each day.

Farming News

Similarly to last year when it stopped raining it has forgotten to start again. The fields behind the cricket pitch have been direct drilled with the spring wheat and have also had an application of digestate to supply it with the nutrients it needs to get it to harvest. This is a low input spring cereal which means we are limited to the number of herbicides we can apply to the crop. The aim of this is to provide a weedier environment for insects and wildlife to live in.

The winter wheat on the other side of five lanes is growing nicely; however, we did manage to scorch the crop when we applied the last dose of fertiliser. This was due to the large diurnal temperatures and the windy conditions before and after application. This was to the lower leaves, and they only add about 2-5% of the total yield.

We have also planted all the maize, but this is at the other end of the Estate and again it has been a battle to



conserve enough moisture to get the crop growing. Thankfully the team have done a great job of cultivating and rolling close together to keep the moisture in the ground.

The war in Iran has increase our tractor diesel by 80% and fertiliser going forward by 100%. Our fertiliser for this years crops, was all in the shed or on the crops before the war started so did not impact this years margins, but availability and price going forward will affect what crops we grow next year.

Wilts Farming Club - Malmesbury Branch.

In March we had our AGM, which was wonderfully brief, and not too boring, which was followed for convenience by me giving a talk about my farming journey to the point that brought me to Stonehill in 1979, with more to follow, when some time filling is required!

In April we went on a visit to Roves Farm, Sevenhampton, near Swindon, where the Burr family have created a fantastic Visitor Centre, showing the public where their food comes from, with us enjoying the lambing Poll Dorset and SuffolkCross sheep and freshly calved Sussex cattle. Which we enjoyed sampling with a Steak Pie in the Café and were able to buy from the well stocked Farm Shop. We resisted the Children's Play Area!

May, saw Joe Crapper come from his family's Brinkworth based Recycling and Landfill business to tell us how they take green waste and turn it into compost (They are one of the sponsors of the Chelsea Flower Show this year). Wood from building sites, pallets, etc. is sorted and used for energy production by themselves and a Power Station. Probably the bit that was of our particular interest, was how the methane that is produced from the landfill is now being piped to also produce energy which they have started to use to heat a pressurised inflatable Growing Dome for growing Vegetables and Fruit, which will be for sale and consumption in their Farm Shop and Cafe, Sustain.

June will see a local visit to the Anaerobic Digester Plant at Charlton Park, and a talk by Robin Aird, Estate & Farm Manager, on the cropping and farming on the Estate.

July, although it might have to get moved to August, Roz Savage, our MP, is coming to tell us about UK Food Security Policy. Roz is the Vice Chair of the All Party Parliamentary UK Food Security Group. I don't expect we will hear about her amazing ocean rowing across the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans! Nor about her visit to Charlton last year to support our bell ringing World Record, and that she has 4 Guinness World Records.

You don't have to be a farmer to come to our Club, we meet in the afternoon of the second Tuesday of the month, at the Village Hall, unless we go on a visit. And we are also meeting at 2.00pm on the 4th Tuesday, at Down on the Farm Cafe, for a cuppa and a chat, as our members appreciate the importance of the social side of farming.

News from the Bell Tower



As I write this, we are getting ready to celebrate **Bell Sunday**, the Sunday closest to St Dunstan's Day 19th May. He was born in Baltonsborough, Somerset in 909 AD, and I haven't got space here to describe his life (worth a Google search), but briefly he was very influential through several Kingships, rebuilt the monastic community and was Abbot of Glastonbury, Bishop of Worcester and then London before eventually Archbishop of Canterbury and he devised the Coronation Service for King Ethelred which was at Bath, and that service is almost still the same one we witnessed a few years ago. Amongst other things, he was an accomplished metalworker which is why he is Patron Saint of Goldsmiths, Silversmiths, Blacksmiths, Locksmiths, Musicians and Bellringers.

Since my last piece in the Chat, we have had an outing to John Taylor & Co, the only remaining Bell Founders in the UK, who cast our two Trebles, unfortunately the Crucible cracked the day we went, so we did not see a casting, but it was a fascinating tour of the works and Museum, and we got to ring on the light 12 there, and at three Churches on the way and return journey.

I'm shortly off to visit my daughter and family in Melbourne, Australia, where I will be able to join in with other bell ringers from all over Australia and New Zealand and from other countries, as they enjoy their Annual Ringing Festival for 4 days in June. Previously I have been when it was in Perth, Western Australia on my way home, where I had the chance to ring on the 16 bells in the Swan Tower. And also in New Zealand when I worked there, on the most southerly ring of bells in the World at Dunedin.

Bell ringing has so many interesting parts to it, including history in the Churches we visit, Engineering in the workings of the bells, challenges in the achieving the control on the end of a rope that we only get by pulling it, you can't push it, the social side of coming together as part of a band, that can be inter generational, often said as carried out from 9 to 90! A pastime that is healthy for body and mind. Please consider coming along on a Thursday evening when we are practicing between 7.30 and 9.00pm and finding out more, and also enjoying a 'Cuppa & Cake' when we stop for a break.
