Planning Applications

P18/S0273/HH and P18/S2074/LB (new detached garage. 5-6 Priory Bank Church Road Great Milton, OX44 7PA). The Council RESOLVED that it held no strong views on this application, although the owner of the neighbouring property's concerns over the height of the structure and the potential for conversion for use as accommodation were acknowledged.

P18/S0194/HH (Rear single storey extension. Rylands Lower End Great Milton OX44 7NL). The Council RESOLVED to recommend approval of this application. No objections were received from neighbouring residents.

P18/S0169/FUL and P18/S0170/LB (Provision of new open fire, fire hood, chimney lining system and rebuilt stack; installation of kitchen extractor system. The Bull, The Green, Great Milton OX44 7NS). Given that the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council are also on the Committee of The Great Milton Community Pub Company Limited, the Parish Council RESOLVED not to comment on these applications to avoid any potential conflict of interest.

P17/S3337/FUL and P17/S3338/LB (dining room extension together with provision of external staircase to first floor flat and all associated works. The Bull, The Green, Great Milton OX44 7NS). Given that the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council are also on the Committee of The Great Milton Community Pub Company Limited, the Parish Council RESOLVED not to comment on these applications to avoid any potential conflict of interest.

P18/S0047/FUL (Change of use of redundant community room to a one-bed affordable older persons bungalow. Community Room Fullers Field Great Milton OX44 7PJ). Ian Melton commented that the community room was in occasional use. The Chairman stated that alternative venues are available in the village, and on this basis the Council RESOLVED that it held no strong views on this application but urged the Neighbours Club and other potential users that may wish to comment on the application to contact SODC immediately.

P18/S0180/DIS (Discharge of condition 3 - Protect hedges during development operations on application ref. P17/S3081/FUL Construction of private tennis court. Crofts Furlong Farm, Lower End, Great Milton). No comments were made on this application, of which the meeting was advised for information only.



Decisions have been made by SODC on the following applications:

P17/S3619/FUL: The Oxford Belfry Hotel, London Road, Milton Common OX9 2JW. Retention of Staff Accommodation Static Caravans. Planning permission was granted for this application by SODC's Planning Committee on Tuesday 16th January.

P17/S4021/HH: The Annexe at Sands Cottage Stadhampton Road Great Milton OXFORD OX44 7PE. Extension to The Annexe at Sands Cottage, and internal remodel of Sands Cottage. Planning permission has been granted for this application.

P17/S4227/O: Land on the South Side of London Road Adjacent to Great Expectations Milton Common. Erection of up to eight dwellings with associated access, parking and amenity space. Planning permission has been granted for this application.

P17/S4260/LDE: Welcome Break Oxford, Thame Road, Waterstock. Installation of DNO-standard GRP housing. Planning permission has been refused for this application.

Appeal Ref: APP/Q3115/W/17/3186899 London Road, Milton Common, Thame, Oxfordshire OX9 2RW. The application Ref P17/S2433/PAR, dated 30 June 2017, was refused by notice dated 25 August 2017. The development proposed is conversion of vacant agricultural buildings to two dwelling houses. The appeal was dismissed.

A full bank reconciliation was received and the latest bank statement was signed. The bank balance as at 6 February was £22,564.07.

Requests for funding

A request for a further funding contribution for 2018/19 has been received from the Maple Tree Children's Centre in Wheatley. Chris Sewell (Trustee and Vice Chair) addressed the meeting and outlined the improved facilities at The Maple Tree, while noting that this alongside the expanded programme will generate increased costs, notably for staffing and cleaning. The Parish Council RESOLVED to contribute at

least £500 towards the Maple Tree's ongoing costs in the next financial year, while commenting that given the Centre's location potential contributions from Wheatley's county councillor and other local funding sources should be explored.

- Green and Growing has undertaken many jobs around the village, including removal of the collapsed ivy on the path between Fullers Field/The Green and digging out of 'grips' to improve roadside drainage.
- A letter has been received from a resident of Milton Common regarding the condition of land at the junction of the A40 and A329 and urging action by the Parish Council. The Parish Council wishes to protect this area and allow it to recover, but has limited funds available. Following a site meeting, discussions have begun with the County Council (which owns the land) with regard to a possible funding partnership for the erection of fencing: a response is awaited from OCC.
- The pothole/collapsed drainage pipe outside 6 Priory Bank has been temporarily repaired with a view to more substantial remedial work in the next financial year.
- In response to last month's e-mail to Royal Mail it has been confirmed that there are currently no plans to revise the village postal arrangements.
 - The salt bin in Fullers Field has now been refilled.
- This Bulletin contains a piece requesting that residents wishing to continue to receive a printed copy of the magazine should 'opt in'. Currently it is anticipated that electronic copies will be e-mailed to those who do not do this: the Bulletin will also continue to appear on the Great Milton Parish Council website as now. The Parish Council is mindful of the importance of the Bulletin as an outlet for news and information and will ensure continued access to it for all residents via their chosen method.
- The litter pick will take place on Saturday 3 March starting at 1000 at the Old Garage.
- Thanks were placed on record to Greenford Ltd, whose staff did an excellent job of clearing litter from Sworford Lane earlier in the month despite appalling weather conditions, and also for the prompt repair to the culvert and gulley at the entrance to The Yard, which was seriously damaged by a vehicle driving over it in mid-January.
 - The meeting closed at 8:35.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 19th March 2018 starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion.

We do however realise that there are some residents of the village who may not have access to the internet but who will still wish to receive the bulletin's information. Therefore, we will run limited print copies on an 'opt in' basis.

Ramblings from the Rectory

Temptation is a clear and present danger. You don't have to be a christian or a person of any faith to know this, and you might not call it temptation; but we all know the human propensity to mess things up, to go down roadways of behaviour that are damaging for ourselves and for others. We all know at the simplest level how

hard it is to control even our most basic bodily appetites. As I write I am yet again engaged in the annual struggle to lose a few pounds, why did I put it on in the first place? Because I like my bread and beer!

Temptation can have a far greater and more devastating impact than personal weight gain. The big temptations are basically all down to three things, money, sex and power. The Bible is filled with warnings about the corrosive power of money. Jesus warned us that we cannot serve both God and money (Matthew 6: 24) In St Paul's first letter to Timothy (1 Timothy 6:10) he writes: 'For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil'. Please note he doesn't say that money itself is the root of all kinds of evil, money is neutral, it can after all be used for all kinds of good; rather it is love of money Paul talks about. This isn't just a personal problem, we all know the financial chaos that can result because behind the veneer of respectable looking financial institutions can lie a culture of uncontrolled greed. Then there is sex; how much damage has been done by unfettered appetites for sex, lust and adultery? Finally, power. Again we have all seen what the human lust for power can do and the devastation for millions that can result when powerful men become dictatorial in their ambitions.

The power of temptation is real, we might disagree about the causes but I think we are morally blind if we can't see the consequences that result when people fall to it's corrosive power. If in doubt about this, look at the world, actually don't look at the world, just look at yourself and ask the question: 'when was it that I gave into a thought and did something I really really know I shouldn't have? When did I last give in to a thought and say something know I really really shouldn't have?

Lent is all about the reality of temptation, and finding the resources to resist it. It always starts with the story of Jesus in the wilderness for forty days being tempted. Most will know the story of course and so I won't go into length here repeating it; you can read it for yourself in Matthew 4: 1-11, and Luke 4: 1-13. Mark's gospel also tells of the temptation but in a much shorter account which doesn't actually mention what the temptations were.

Jesus' temptation were particular to him and had to do with the love of power, doing sensational and spectacular things which would enable him to fast track to glory and take the easy way out. However, he had come for a very different purpose and that was all to do with the power of love. His life, teachings, miracles, and ultimately his death, all of these pointed to the love of God to restore and heal that which is broken and lost. It involved Jesus in complete self giving sacrifice for those he had come to rescue and save, not in self elevation and power, there was nothing less looking like power than the Cross.

We will have temptations particular to us, things that we know mess us up, or

worse mess others up when we fall to them. As a christian, I take this seriously and the battle as a human being that I know is in me which involves rather more than bread and beer! I believe that we have spiritual resources at our disposal. It is significant that when tempted Jesus always countered with 'it is written'; He used the scriptures he knew so well, not as a collection of occasional comforting thoughts but as a weapon to counter and resist the forces of evil that assaulted him. There is a lovely phrase at the end of Mark's short account of Jesus' temptation: 'And he was with the wild beasts; and angles waited on him.' I believe that the reality of temptation, for all the human and psychological causes (which I do not deny) also has a spiritual cause and we are involved in the battle. However we don't have to do this alone.

Of course there is the christian tradition of giving things up for lent. Personally I think this only has spiritual value if we then take something positive up as well. The tradition of the fast was always meant to be about showing us just how much we are victims of our most basic appetites and then aligning ourselves with the presence of God to overcome these. This year for Lent I have actually been trying to cultivate more an attitude of thanksgiving. So through Lent, and then hopefully beyond I am finding at least five things every day when I go to bed to positively say thank you to God for. This is not something I have necessarily been good at.

View from Views

As D Day for Brexit draws nearer we are, both us farmers, as well as the general public, equally in the dark, as to what is going to happen, as there are so many mixed messages, far too many to mention, so my comments are restricted to farming matters and the very limited knowledge that I have. A proper policy for farming must be a balance between preserving the environment and encouraging food production, as these are subjects that our Environment minister has been highlighting, what we don't know is when and if he will change his mind. The countryside is not an "eco-museum" but a place of work. Our much-loved landscape is a product of the different types of farming, from the sheep-grazed uplands of Wales and Yorkshire, to the lush dairy farms of Devon, and arable areas of the Eastern counties. Recently our esteemed PM has been, we are told, brokering deals with China and although I am pleased to hear that this has included to a large extent agricultural products, particularly beef which was banned at the time of BSE, and malting Barley, the fear with any deal of this sort may well have repercussions on the home market as we will have to take their products as well. We then have to ask, are their production costs lower than our, will this compete fairly with our own market, can we survive on an even lower produce price, do we fix tariffs to protect our home producers, or will we be able to say our standards are so high that our food is worth the price we expect? Also we have to factor in what the Supermarkets have to say on this as they have to compete with each other, by cutting their prices, which does us no favours, so quality suffers in the long term. It is all still very much up in the air, so the questions continue.

Now the weather is still dull chilly and wet, or at least it is as I write this, in spite of what we may think January proved not to be that wet although we did have our fair amount of flooding, in fact this year the river has been a bit like a yo-yo in and out all the time. I get the impression that these floods seem to take a long time to recede not sure why, the river seems to be acting in different ways all the time. Whilst on the subject of the river I would like to draw reader's attention to the recent "River Thame Conservation Trust" (RTCT) newsletter which really is worth a read and can be found http://riverthame.org/rtct-january-2018-newsletter/ where you will see that through their work with Thames Water they have received some funding. Also you will note that they have had a recent litter pick illustrating the vast amount of plastic picked, this problem has been made quite an issue in the national press lately, as well as my remarks in this previously, remarks by our county councillor, and Vicar, I also attach (if it is reprinted) a picture showing the amount of litter we have picked along our road to Great Milton, not a mile, this is over and above what others say they have picked, it shows

what there is about. We all need to play our part by helping the litter pick weekend 3 & 4 March in Little and Great Milton be nice to think this was a thing of the past!

By the time this is read Spring should be just around the corner, the birds are already starting



to make a song and dance about it anyway, and Partridges, plus other birds I guess have paired up for the production of young. I must say that the prospect of some warmer and cheerful is appealing at the moment. This year it seems that the small birds are appreciative of the feeding I am carrying out on our margins as on certain days great flocks of them appear as you walk past, not sure what they are but it seems like Greenfinches, and chaffinches, and various other finches plus many tits, there have also been a lot Field Fares around this time. Whilst on the subject of birds one day round about the end of January driving towards Stadhampton I could not believe that there was an Egret feeding in the ditch right by the road at the bottom end of Little Milton, just by the Chicane, must be a first.

Picking up on my remarks previously with reference to the re-introduction of wild species. Beavers and the like, I read in the press that the Scottish Government are not going to encourage this activity as they have seen the damage the Beavers have done to the river banks, and the effect they are having on Agriculture. On the subject of river banks I think I read that the Environment Agency (EA) plan to increase, exponentially, the licence fee to anyone wishing to do any works on rivers, meaning I assume removing fallen trees fish passes and the like, this will severely restrict works that the river trusts wish to do to enhance the rivers and also the land owners who are now responsible for removing trees, he net result will be less work done and more flooding plus a lot of other issues. These of course are all tasks that were traditionally carried out by the EA, or it's predecessors.

Fix My Street and Safety Defects

Members of the public are rightly concerned about the state of the roads in Oxfordshire and January has seen a dramatic increase in the number of Fix My Street (FMS) reports being registered on the system due to the severe weather events in December 2017 and January 2018, where repeated freeze, thaw and snow has caused considerable damage to the road network.

The average January sees nearly 2000 reports coming in whilst January 2018 has seen over 7000 reports. The vast majority of these reports relate to safety defects on the highway, potholes, potential flooding issues and tree damage. We anticipate that the February and March figures will also rise well above average as a result of the bad weather. An additional £1m to fund highway repairs has been received from Central Government and it could not have come at a better time.

To deal with the issues the Area Operations Teams are prioritising potholes, flood

sites and vegetation issues blocking the highway in the first instance. To do this we are drafting in additional staff, extending overtime and working weekends where necessary. In addition, our contractor, Skanska, is looking to recruit additional teams to deal with the increasing number of defects that are being listed for repair. Other, non-safety, issues will unfortunately need to be deferred in the short term. These issues will not be forgotten and will be addressed when we have dealt with the current problems on the network. We will be updating our web pages to reflect this change in priority.

The rise in the number of Fix My Street shows how well the public are supporting the Fix My Street system and we are keen to ensure that we respond to issues as quickly as we can. Any assistance that the public can give in providing photos of the sites would be very helpful as we may be able to prioritise work from the photos rather than visit each site individually. Please do not compromise your own safety by taking photos if it is not safe to do so. If a defect has paint markings around it then it has already been scheduled for repair and does not need a new report.

What you will see:

- More inspectors on the network to prioritise work and deal with short term safety issues
- More defect gangs fixing these potholes.
- An increase in structural patching and minor patching programmes to deal with sites with large clusters of pothole during the late winter and early spring period. These repairs last longer but take time to arrange.
- An additional Dragon Patcher on the network from mid-February operating as "Inspect and Fix" on the rural network.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

I overwinter many plants in my greenhouse, particularly tender perennials, both as mature plants and as cuttings. I visited a garden a couple of years ago where the owner said she always took cuttings in September as she went away for August. My experience this year has been that rooting of the cuttings was good and they survived well over the winter within an unheated propagator. At the end of January, I potted up all the well-rooted cuttings into individual pots and covered them in fleece. Sadly, there has been a higher rate of loss than I anticipated. I think this is probably due to the low temperature in the greenhouse; I aim to keep the temperature just above zero which, combined with keeping the plants very dry, works well at keeping most tender perennials alive and well. Clearly this approach does not apply to cuttings as,

on potting up, I had to water them in so they were wetter than I would have liked; I should have taken them indoors! I will try again this year. Last month I wrote that I had made efforts to label cuttings, but, unfortunately, I did not label the only one I can't remember the name of! This plant was a new acquisition late last summer and I didn't know if the cuttings would work, but they did and I have two unknown small plants as well as the original (in the garden and unlabeled too!). Some internet research is required, I think.

The curse of the spring gardener hit me this year when I woke up one morning with a bad back; the result has been no gardening for the last two weeks. I am just starting to gently garden, but fear I am be well behind, particularly with weeding. I am fortunate that my other half has battled on alone with the clearing and rose pruning. He is very good at pruning (rather better than I am) so I am happy with that. Do keep up with the weeding as much as possible; I am in total agreement with the old adage that "one year's seeds are seven years' weeds", although some of the weed problems are blown in with the wind or come in with introduced plants.

The lack of gardening activity has meant more time available to walk around and simply enjoy the garden and see what needs doing. I have been able to enjoy the early spring flowers and the lovely scent from various plants, especially on mild sunny days; I do think that, despite the weather often being very bad in February, that this month definitely signals the start of spring; by the time you are reading this, it will be March and the days will be getting rapidly longer and brighter. Do take the time to go outside and simply look at the plants you have and look at their new growth. The spring garden is so full of promise.

I have also been looking at the various plants I have received as gifts over the years from various gardening friends past and present. I have developed a habit of calling plants by the name of the donor so I always think about that person when I look at the plant. Unfortunately, this also increases the guilt if one of those plants dies.

Our biggest garden problem at the moment, is a persistent mole which is quite literally destroying our lawn. It (or its friend) just keeps returning after supposed treatment and over the last week it has dug bigger and bigger hills; I fear one of them is a birthing chamber which will multiply the problem. Oh, no!

It was brought to my attention, that I failed to sign my article last month. I also apologise for the grammar last month which was a result of writing the article on my iPad; Pages is not a patch on Word!

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

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

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
