NEW AFTERNOON SERVICE AND SOME TIMING CHANGES

A new timetable, reproduced in Malherbe Monthly, was introduced on Monday 25th March.

Mondays to Fridays

The big change is the re-introduction of an afternoon service to Maidstone, departing from Grafty Green at **13.25**.

There are also two timing changes. The 12.20 service from Maidstone now departs ten minutes later at **12.30**, and the 17.25 service from Maidstone now departs twenty minutes later at **17.45**.

Saturdays

The 09.23 service from Grafty Green now departs at **09.30**, bringing it in line with the Monday to Friday departure time.

All buses should or very soon will be easy access vehicles with no entrance steps.

'Countryside facing 'warfare', says chairman of National Trust, ..as local communities.. fight vague new legislation' . So ran the leading story in the Daily Telegraph on March 7th, envisioning a future of 'rural communities fighting '.. a succession of housing and wind farm developments'.

Government's pronouncements on housing become daily more confusing. Construction is one area where the government rightly sees an urgent need for reversing that industry's downturn and getting us back to growth.

The new NPPF and Localism Bills must be clearly and rapidly redefined still further, so we can know exactly how Government intends to deal with the nation's massive housing shortage. WKPS' task is to see that this shortage is resolved without compromising the countryside with any more land-grabbing than absolutely necessary.

There are in place large development plans situated immediately around the major towns within our region. Like others, WKPS has to accept that such developments are needed. If we say 'no' to everything, we will rapidly become ignored. We have to strike a balance between much-needed housing and the countryside we wish to protect. Supporting outlying town developments can give us the moral authority to object to any such developments appearing in rural areas.

All authorities have scheduled consultation sessions, to discuss how these large schemes will progress. Those attending include groups from the Church, CPRE, Kent Wildlife, Rural Kent etc. as well as developers, landowners and Parish and Borough Councils. WKPS will be involved with these consultations to ensure our voice is properly heard.

After four years of economic stagnation, there are rumours of 'small green shoots'. Developers are certainly increasing their planning applications. Providing the constraints on lending do not continue to be dissuasive on those seeking new mortgages, these green shoots will translate into a greater number of new building starts. Without the clarification needed on the new legislation, this must be a time of great concern to anyone who cares for the countryside. Without Core Strategies firmly in place, developers can apply for planning permission almost anywhere. The new regulations require authorities to decide applications more rapidly - especially for large developments. Prolonged delay will produce an automatic presumption in favour.

Constant and detailed vigilance must be WKPS' watchword as we enter these new, uncertain times.

Sue Burch has written the following tribute: 'I admired Judy for her spontaneous acts of kindness; nothing was too much trouble and always with a smile. I loved the trust she had in the people that she counted as her friends and they were in abundance. I remember how she took the word of a friend that a pony – that was in Wales – was just right for her – that was enough, she met the horsebox at a service station and the pony came home with her! She was a gentle soul but had nerves of steel, and a character that showed great courage after Les died. I will miss her greatly. ' Sue.

Grafty Gourmet

This is a great recipe for vegetarians. The parmesan can be substituted for a vegetarian equivalent if required. As usual, a very simple but tasty dish to make and enjoy.

Spinach & Ricotta Gnocchi

200g of young spinach Small handful of parsley leaves – finely chopped 1 x glove of garlic 140g of ricotta cheese 85g of plain flour 2 eggs 100g of freshly grated parmesan cheese (use a vegetarian equivalent if vegetarian) Freshly grated nutmeg Olive oil & rocket, to serve

1. Boil the kettle. Place the spinach in a large bowl and pour boiling water over it. Leave for 2 mins until wilted, then drain thoroughly. Leave to cool, then wrap a clean tea towel around the spinach. Hold it over the sink and squeeze out as much water as possible. Finely chop.

2. Place the spinach, parsley, garlic, ricotta, flour, eggs, cheese and a generous grating of nutmeg into a large bowl and season with salt and pepper. Use a fork to stir very thoroughly until everything is completely mixed. Using wet hands, form the mixture into walnut-size balls. Place on a large plate or tray and refrigerate for at least 30 mins.

3. When ready to cook, bring a large pan of water to the boil. Reduce the heat to medium and drop in batches of about 8-10 gnocchi at a time. They will sink to the bottom, and when they rise to the top give them about 1 min more, then remove with a slotted spoon and keep warm while you cook the rest. Serve the gnocchi on warm plates drizzled with olive oil and scattered with rocket and more cheese.

Windows 8 – Getting Started - 10 Top Tips

There is a lot to get used in Windows 8, so here are 10 Top Tips for keyboard people to get you started. Once you have mastered navigation in Windows 8 you will soon realise that the applications you been using regularly have not changed very much at all.

- To find the Start Screen when you are in an application point to the **bottom left corner** of the screen. A small image of the Start screen will be pop up, click it to return to the Start Screen.
- 2. Remove any unused icons (known as Tiles in Windows 8) on the Start Screen so you do not have to scroll to find applications you use regularly. Point to the tile that you don't need, right click, then select Unpin from the Start.



- 3. To add Application Tiles use search to find the application that you use regularly, when you have found it point and **right click** on it, then select **Pin to Start** from the menu.
 - 4. To view applications you have already opened point to the top left corner of the screen, when the first application is displayed drag your mouse down the screen, then all applications will be displayed, select the one you want to use.
 - 5. To find features such System Properties, Device Manager, and Control Panel, File Explorer and the Desktop, now called **Power User Task Menu** point to the **bottom left corner** of the screen, right-click.
- 6. You can find and manage your Devices by selecting devices from the Charm Bar point to the top right corner of the screen in any application and the Charm Bar will appear. The Device Charm is the 4th Charm down.
- 7. When using Internet Browser, to view any pages you have opened, point to the **top of the screen,** right click which will display all open web pages.
- 8. To quickly close applications, point the mouse to the top of the application window, click and hold the mouse button down, then drag to the bottom of the screen
- 9. The Applications Bar will appear if you **Right click** the mouse button on part of the Start Screen that is not a Tile or Icon. The Applications bar will appear at the bottom of the screen. Select the button at the right of the bar to show "All Applications".

10. If you like using the keyboard and would like to know more about Keyboard Shortcuts, search for Windows 8 Keyboard Shortcuts on the internet and you will find quite a few that include the things like Window Key + C will open the Charms.

The May Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Aries at beginning of May, and moves into Taurus towards the end of the month.

New Moon occurs on Thursday 9th May. **Full Moon** is on Friday 24th May when in Libra.

Mercury rises in the southeast at sunrise in the constellation of Aries, so again we will not be able to see it in the twilight.

Venus rises in the southeast at sunrise in Aries, and sets just after sunset near the constellation of Taurus, so again will not be visible this month.

Mars is rising in the southeast at sunrise with **Mercury**, so will also not be visible this month.

Jupiter is not so well placed for viewing this month, as is rises at sunrise and sets in the northwest in late evening near Taurus. Through a telescope it may be possible to see the dark and light bands together with the **Great Red Spot**. It may also be possible to see, even through binoculars, Jupiter's four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the southeast at sunset between the constellations of Libra and Virgo, and is well up in the southern sky before setting at sunrise. Through a telescope you should be able to see the famous rings together with many of its moons.

You may have read recently that scientists, working at the deep underground facility in America, may have glimpsed "dark matter" for the first time. They have recorded signals that could have been caused by dark matter particles, known as "wimps" or weakly interacting massive particles, colliding with normal matter. The tests, which were carried out at the Cryogenic Dark Matter Search in Minnesota, will require further experiment to confirm the results.

While on the subject of dark matter, the Large Hadron Collider at Cern has been shut for two years for a £70 million upgrade in the hope of finding this mysterious and invisible material, which makes up a quarter of the universe and holds galaxies together.

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Christian message May 2013

I have recently been through a major event. It is almost 37 years since I last was as close to this particular process and almost 25 years since I had the trauma of moving house. It is one of those life experiences that are very common, almost inevitable some would say – but every time it happens it feels like it is the first time anyone has ever been through it. It is a roller coaster of triumphs and setbacks, of joy and trepidation and when it is over it leaves the participants richer and poorer....

My daughter has just been married!

I could write at length about the whole marriage industry, about how it seems that the cost is at times frighteningly exorbitant for the simplest of elements. I remember with a shiver the Wedding Fairs and the worry of ever finding a dress that would be 'the one'. There was a period leading up to the wedding when it felt as if we were trapped in a surreal dream where no matter how hard you try get back to reality the dream simply wouldn't end.

It did end though, and in the most wonderful way. The marriage ceremony seemed to make sense of all the build up. It distilled the essence of the huge step that two young and very much in love people were taking. All of the commercial aspects of the day melted in a gloriously joyous hour. The families and friends witnessed before their eyes a life changing transformation and I was filled with a sense of contentment that this was right and that the Service was the perfect way to unite my daughter and her chosen partner.

Why was it so right? There are facts that made it so. First, the weather was kind. The two days on either side were of torrential rain and freezing snow. My daughter worshipped at All Saints as a girl, she was confirmed from there and, in her own words, she only ever thought that this was, one day, the church in which she would be married. The church looked beautiful adorned with superb flower displays. The hymns and the readings <u>meant</u> something to us all. Finally, it just felt very comfortable being there amongst the people who mean most to us and to them.

There was so much more to it than that, though. The words of the service are profoundly moving and serious. They ask for a physical and a spiritual commitment from the couple – not just for now but for the rest of their lives. Marriage is a gift from God, a way of life given by Him - these sentences take us back to the central purpose. Vows and promises are made that demand total commitment – whatever lies ahead. In return for these solemn words the couple are assured by the blessing -

Let their love for each other be a seal upon their hearts and a crown upon their heads. Bless them in their work and in their companionship; awake and asleep, in joy and in sorrow, in life and in death.
