FOODBANK DONATIONS

MOBILE LIBRARY

PASTORAL LETTER

Dear friends

There has been a lot in the news recently about how supermarkets are struggling with their supply chains, about empty shelves and reduced customer choice. But one of the things that strikes me is just how much choice we still have, what a huge variety of goods there is on offer in our shops and online.

I love to try different foods, to shop for new ideas and exercise that choice. Just looking at something like the range of coffees on sale, or the array of electronic devices available, can be overwhelming. For a long time, I have tried to be conscious of making good choices when I shop, of trying to ensure I don't buy from companies exploiting people or the environment, but it can be really tricky to get good information.

And when I reflect on this, it seems astonishing that in a world where we know the need to build sustainable practices for the sake of our planet, where it is accepted that slavery and child labour are wrong, these things are still so widespread. It is well known that the tea, coffee, fruit and chocolate we buy may well have been harvested by children who should be at school, or playing, not working to save their families from poverty. And many large corporations' working practices routinely involve the devastation of rainforest or exploitation and pollution of water sources.

The fashion industry is notorious for the reliance on, at best, poor working conditions for many employees so we can enjoy cheap, throwaway fashion. If it's really cheap, someone, somewhere will have paid the price. And it won't be those owning the big corporations.

Wouldn't it be great if, instead of consumers having to struggle to make sustainable choices, all companies were legally required to change damaging practices, which currently they not only get away with, many profit from them! A Business, Human Rights and Environment Act would make it illegal for companies operating in the UK to have human rights' abuses and environmental destruction in their supply chain, and those causing or profiting from harm would be held to account, while their victims would get the justice they deserve.

A group called The Corporate Justice Coalition is calling for this new law to hold producers to account, prevent abuses and ensure victims are compensated and damaged environments restored, as far as possible. If you want to know more, take a look at www.traidcraft.org/holdbusinesses-to-account ; you could add your name to the petition.

Jesus told his followers to 'love your neighbour', and if we are honest, surely we know in our hearts that all people deserve to be treated fairly, even if it means some inconvenience to ourselves! This sort of action is, for me, a perfect example of faith in action, of recognisng the humanity we share with people around the globe we may never meet. And surely, the suffering of any human being, particularly if caused by the greed of others, is something which diminishes us all.

So, go, love your neighbour – wherever in the world they may live! Every blessing
