Grafty Garden Cuttings - July

The pheasant has hatched her clutch of eggs in the centre of the iris clump. Lots of tiny chicks are running around, but only when she thinks we are not about. Unfortunately, the chaffinch nest in the lilac tree was robbed by a jay. I saw it go in, but it had done the deed in the few seconds it took for me to reach the tree. A blackbird has built just outside the back door and does not seem to mind our comings and goings, probably hoping to be safer there. There are several greater spotted woodpeckers around as well and each day sees them on the peanut feeder. The apple branch they keep pecking holes into now has even more, so we expect it to crash down any minute.

We are busy cutting back and lopping trees and bushes as the jungle thickens with every week. There has been enough rain to spur on growth and we cannot keep up. If July is hot and dry, watering will be the main task, especially baskets and containers and swelling fruit and vegetables.

Runner beans need regular watering for if they are moist at the roots, they should set well and not go stringy too quickly. And sweetcorn, marrows and peas etc, all need plenty of water. Thoroughly and less often is best. Plants in pots suffer shock and do not grow so well, if allowed to dry out completely, but just as bad is overwatering when roots can rot. If uncertain whether a watering regime is correct leave watering until the soil on the top of a pot is dry, water, leave to stand for an hour, and then gently tap the plant out of the pot. The compost should be moist to the bottom. If it is not, and only the top inch or so are wet, then, obviously more needs to be given at each watering. Tapping a clay pot can indicate whether it is dry (a hollow sound) or, if feasible, lifting to test~ its weight is another way.

After the mild winter, pests are rampant. The bright red lily beetle and the black vine weevil beetle are major pests in my lilies at the moment and both need squashing when found - the former can fly, so just knocking them off does no good at all, as they come straight back. They can both do a great deal of damage in a very short time.

Our gardening club enjoyed a weekend of garden visits in the Midlands in June, enjoying such treats as Lord and Lady Carrington's garden, the private garden of Ashwood Nurseries and National Trust Coughton Court and Upton House, all of which can be highly recommended. Those with restaurants or tea rooms, even more so!

A new website for walkers in Kent

There's no doubt about it, walking is good for you. It's good for your heart, it's good for your lungs, it's good for the muscle and bone growth of your children and it's good for your feeling of wellbeing! Strong scientific evidence now supports the many benefits to health of regular walking – it is recommended that we take at least 10,000 steps a day.

Studies show that walking can:

- Reduce the risk of coronary heart disease and stroke
- Lower blood pressure
- Reduce high cholesterol and improve blood lipid profile
- Reduce body fat
- Enhance mental well being
- Increase bone density, hence helping to prevent osteoporosis
- Reduce the risk of cancer of the colon
- Reduce the risk of non insulin dependant diabetes
- Help to control body weight
- Help osteoarthritis
- Help flexibility and co-ordination hence reducing the risk of falls

Walking offers a great way to help kids get the active habit. If parents express excitement about the prospect of a walk in the countryside, they are more likely to transmit this feeling to their children. It's important to treat the walk as an exploration or adventure and to go at the child's pace, no matter how often they want to stop and look at things; take treats to eat and plenty to drink; and head for some landmark that will appeal to them such as a castle, a playground, an ice cream van or a boating pond. If children experience walking as part of a fun activity they are more likely to want to go again.

So, how do you find out what is on offer? John Harris, a keen walker, got fed up with the lack of information on walks that were going on in the County. So, he decided that if he couldn't find what he was looking for – he had better create it! So www.walkinginkent.co.uk came into being.

Guided walks: Local groups who offer guided walks are listed together with links to their web-sites.

Books of walks: There are over 50 books of walks for the County. All the details are here.

Leaflets of walks: Over sixty leaflets are produced around the County, many of them difficult to find. Not any more! www.walkinginkent.co.uk list them all.

Walking groups: Every walking group in the County is listed.

There are also links so that you can check: the weather for your walk, links to other useful sites, how to get to your walk by public transport – and more is being added all the time.

Neighbourhood Watch

At the recent Annual Parish Council Meeting, Police Sergeant Mick Hayes from the Rural Maidstone Neighbourhood Policing Team came along and introduced himself. He informed the Parish Council of the reported crimes for this area. Since the beginning of the year there have been 2 crimes:- 1 in April being theft of Storage Tanks in Elmstone Lane and the other, which for some reason comes under Lenham, was 9 smashed windows in a storage shed on Liverton Hill. He also told us that our local officer is PC Claire Russell who covers Ulcombe, Headcorn & Harrietsham as well as us. Hopefully PC Claire Russell will be attending some of our meetings in the future and we hope to see an increased uniformed Police presence in and around our area.

I would like to raise your attention to the following two incidents.

We are concerned after an elderly person had money taken from her purse in her home by a person who cleaned her windows. The suspect was a white European female, 5' 4", Auburn collar length hair. If you or your members have recently taken on a new window cleaner that fits this description can I ask you to be aware. When you are paying anyone for services they have tendered you, then do this at the door and do not invite them into your home.

We have also had a person going door to door buying antiques. They can be very persuasive and will follow you into your home. They will walk around looking at your belongings and offer to buy them. They can then be very difficult to get rid of. Again, be cautious who you let into your home.

Trading Standards would like me to warn and inform you of the following incident. A lady has been calling door to door, gaining access to peoples homes by claiming she was doing a bank survey and asking householders for their personal banking details. She had no identity card, just a letter with a telephone number and a registration code. She is described as having an Irish or Scottish accent, heavily built, unclean appearance with shoulder length dark hair and wearing dark clothing. She is believed to have been on foot.

We would advise people to be careful of people cold calling and always ask for identification. If in doubt have the confidence to say no. Take care when giving out personal details. Road Closure

Some of you may recently have seen the Notice in the local paper from Kent Highways, stating that Headcorn Road, Grafty Green (Liverton Hill) could be closed as and when required between 09.30 and 15.30 Monday to Friday. The Notice states that because there are works proposed to be carried out, the Order comes into operation from Monday 4th June 2007 for 18 months.

I have been in touch with Kent Highways to clarify this statement, and have been informed that because it takes 6 weeks to apply for a road closure it gives them blanket cover for 18 months, and when work is required to be done it will not take so long. Once the work has been arranged, notices will be sent to all homes in the affected area and to the Parish Council giving approximately 1 month's notice of when the road will be closed.

Hopefully this will clear up any misunderstanding.

Letters to the Editor

This month we have two letters in response to an article in last month's edition of Malherbe Monthly concerning Dogs and their doings written by Maidstone Borough Council's Civic Wardens.

Please find below the two letters and for reference, the article as it appeared last month.

Dear Editor

I'M WATCHING YOU

The article in the June edition of Outlook regarding dog "watch/wardens" rang alarm bells for me when I read it.

As one of the small handful of dog owners who regularly walk our lanes I felt almost personally targeted.

Yes, my little man uses the verges to do his business along with foxes, badgers, hedgehogs, weasels etc. He does **not** use the road having been trained not to.

DOG MESS

I was not happy when I read the 'Message from Maidstone Borough Council's Civic Wardens', in the June issue of Malherbe Monthly. The

suggestion that residents should report dog owners who do not clean up after their dog was particularly disturbing.

I do not know nor care who initiated the Civic Wardens involvement, but already the result has been an offensive article in the magazine and some very ugly signs that do nothing to enhance the beauty of our very special village. Perhaps in future if residents perceive that they have a problem they should first air their grievances in the magazine, and so help prevent 'Big Brother' culture moving into Grafty Green.

A message from Maidstone Borough Council's Civic Wardens

The council is very concerned about our lanes and open spaces. We want to make sure your village is clean and free of dog mess, so as to give you a better quality of life.

We have received a number of requests from local residents asking the 'Hit Squad' to come and clean your village of dog mess, particularly Woodcock Lane. Dog mess is unsightly and a health risk, especially to children. If caught not cleaning up, the dog owner can face a fixed penalty fine on the spot for £50 or, if prosecuted, a hefty fine of up to £1000. It also wastes a great deal of our resources (and your Council Tax) clearing up all this mess.

We would like to work together with you in solving this problem. We ask that dog owners clean up after their dogs, by using old plastic bags and take it home for disposal. If any dog mess needs cleaning up, please contact the Hit Squad on 01622 602162

If you see a dog owner who doesn't clean up after their dog, please report it – by phoning the Civic Wardens on 01622 602117. They will step up their patrols, put up signs and visit any owner who is breaching the law.

It is generally only a few dog owners who flout the law and don't clean up. If you're one of these think again, we intend to use every power open to us to clean up our environment for you, your children and your neighbours.

Lenham Archaeological Group laid out a comprehensive range of finds that have been made in the fields surrounding Chilston Ponds, including pottery, flint tools and bone.



MAKING THINGS HAPPEN

This could be the motto of so many of BibleLands Project Partners. The **Shamms El Birr Centre, Cairo** is one such example of where one man's vision has become a reality. From small beginnings as a school for blind women, it has become a thriving centre for children and adults with visual impairments and children with mental disabilities.

Dr Morcis is a man of outstanding vision, whose work is motivated by his genuine love and affection for the wellbeing and development of those in his care. He aims to promote the independence of each child as much as possible and continues to support them after they have left the Centre. Six hundred people have passed through the Centre and Dr Morcis remembers each one.

There are currently 65 children here with a range of mental and physical disabilities, of whom 43 are blind. All receive an education that is best suited to their particular area of need. Through a variety of activities, they also develop their own interests and are taught life skills that build their self-esteem and enable them to go on to have independent lives.

The Centre is a great Christian witness, supporting people of all faiths, with a focus on inclusion. This is true of its approach to education, family or the community. Rehabilitation programmes help them to respond to disability in the best way possible. To help support the families of children at the Centre, one of Dr Morcos' recent initiatives is to establish group therapy sessions for the parents. These enable people to share their stories about the issues that they face and to explore possible solutions.

BibleLands has recently sent £9000 to pay for a new minibus for day-to-day transport and medical emergencies.
