2011 Census: 27th March 2011



The Office for National Statistics (ONS) carries out a census every 10 years to find out more about the people who live in England and Wales and about the make-up of local neighbourhoods.

Census population statistics are really important in understanding people's needs and making sure all communities get the services they need where they live.

If the census can't see you, the organisations responsible for delivering the services you need won't be able to see you either. So, the census needs to include everyone, everywhere – and that's why it is a

legal requirement that everyone takes part.

Whatever you tell the census will be in strictest confidence and will only be used to produce statistics. ONS will not share your personal information with any other government department or organisation.

The next census will take place on 27th March 2011. ONS will be sending out questionnaires for around 25 million households to complete. It will ask about work, health, national identity, citizenship, ethnic background, education, second homes, language, and marital status and so on. The answers will be turned into statistics and used to build a picture of today's society.

You'll be able to do it online, or by post. **But you must do it.** If you need help and advice, you will be able to find everything you need online and also on the census helpline (0300 0201 101) from 4 March 2011.

The 2011 census may be the last time the census is taken and needs everyone to take part in helping tomorrow take shape, so this will be your chance to make a difference. For more information, visit www.census.gov.uk



Pet's Corner!

Parrots - Part 2

Last month we looked at the suitability of parrots as pets, and now we can look at some frequently asked questions for the new parrot keeper.

Will my parrot talk?

Certainly the larger parrots such as African Greys and Amazons are usually good talkers, but some of the smaller species can also be taught to mimic a few words and phrases. However, they will only learn what you teach them, so talk to them!

Should I cover them at night? Absolutely - most birds need twelve hours of sleep a night in order to stay healthy! You can use a sheet or blanket to cover them and this will become part of their bedtime ritual.

Should I get a cock or hen? There really is no difference as far as their suitability as a pet is concerned.



Should I clip my bird's wings? We do NOT recommend that you clip your bird's wings - one of the most enjoyable activities for you and your bird is flying!

Clipping can lead to behavioural problems, reduce the bird's ability to fly away from predators (pet cats and dogs) and incorrect clipping can result in fall injuries. Never clip a young bird's wings, learning to fly can prevent injuries at a later date, builds confidence (reducing the risk of behavioural problems) develops the cardio-vascular system and muscles which will ensure a fit, healthy and happy bird.

How can I keep my bird happy? A good quality, fresh and varied diet with different textures, lots of companionship, play and bonding time, allowing time out of their cage for flying, exploring and interacting, and rotate a range of safe toys. See our links for more information.

What can I feed my parrot? Parrots can eat a wide range of fresh, clean fruit and vegetables (see our website for a full list) as well as pasta, rice, sprouted pulses and occasional herbs and boiled eggs as a treat. Never feed too many sunflower seeds, and chocolate and avocado are poisonous. A good quality, dust-free parrot pellet or should complement the fresh food.

BUS SERVICE 59

Grafty Green - Maidstone via Ulcombe and Kingswood

At a recent meeting of the Service 59 Working Group, Arriva advised of **changes to the service on Mondays to Fridays** which will take effect on and **from Monday 11**th **April.** (There are **no changes** being made **to the Saturday timetable** operated by Nu-Venture).

The Monday to Friday changes are being introduced because of increasing financial pressures, in particular from rising fuel prices a 20% reduction announced by the government in the fuel duty rebate given to bus operators, and a reduction in the reimbursement rate to operators for concessionary fares. Arriva is going to continue to operate the Monday to Friday service on a commercial basis and the changes are being introduced to try and ensure its viability.

The changes primarily affect the Kingswood – Maidstone section of the route, but there are some changes to the Grafty Green timetable which can be summarised as follows:-

The 0720 departure from Grafty Green on Schooldays will be retimed to depart at 0710 and will run via Chart Sutton and Boughton Monchelsea rather than via Langley. It is due to arrive in Maidstone at the same times as now.

The 0723 departure from Grafty Green on non-Schooldays will be retimed to depart at 0721, arriving in Maidstone at the same times as now.

The 0915 departure from Grafty Green will be retimed to depart at 0930. This is because the start time for using Senior Citizens' Concessionary passes is being changed from 0900 to 0930. Arrival time in Maidstone will also be 15 minutes later at 1020.

The 1227 departure from Maidstone to Grafty Green will be retimed to depart at 1220, arriving at Grafty Green at 1313.

The 1615 departure from Maidstone to Grafty Green will retimed to depart at 1550 and will run via Boughton Monchelsea and Chart Sutton rather than via Langley. It will be due to arrive at Grafty Green at 1643.

The 1750 departure from Maidstone to Grafty Green will be retimed to depart at 1715 arriving at Grafty Green at 1808.

The three departures from Maidstone to Grafty Green will all be scheduled to run back to the depot 'out of service', which effectively means that the present 1325 and 1703 departures from Grafty Green to Maidstone are withdrawn.

I have asked Arriva to look again at whether it is possible for the new 1313 arrival at Grafty Green to return to Maidstone in service, thus maintaining the opportunity for afternoon return trips to Maidstone. I have also expressed concern to Arriva about the earlier start time of the first bus to Maidstone on Schooldays, and asked them to monitor carefully potential overcrowding on this and the 1550 return trip now that these buses are also going to serve Boughton Monchelsea and Chart Sutton. Arriva is also going to look at whether the 1550 service might be retimed to depart 5 to 10 minutes later.

The full timetable from 11th April will be included in April's Malherbe Monthly.

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a very simple, healthy and tasty dish, which can be prepared in minutes.

Italian Chicken with Rice - Serves: 3 to 4

4 tablespoons of Olive Oil 2 Skinless boneless chicken breasts (cut into strips) 1 Red Onion (cut into 8 wedges)

2 Orange Peppers , halved, deseeded and sliced thickly

2 Garlic Gloves (crushed)100g Long Grain Rice400g Can Chopped Tomatoes300ml Chicken Stock4 tablespoons Ready-made Pesto

- 1. Heat oven to 180C. Heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil in a frying pan, add the chicken and cook for 3-4 minutes until golden all over and set aside.
- 2. In a large oven proof sauce pan, add the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil, onion and peppers, and cook for 3 minutes or until lightly golden.
- 3. Add the crushed garlic and fry for a one minute. Stir in the uncooked rice, then the tomatoes, stock and reserved chicken.
- 4. Turn up the heat and bring to the boil before transferring to the oven to cook, uncovered, for 20 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste and drizzle over the pesto before serving.

NEWS FROM ULCOMBE'S VILLAGE SCHOOL

January and February have brought us the joy of visitors. As many of you will know, Ulcombe Pre-School was with us for two weeks in January. Then early in February we had a short repeat. This time it was only for one day as there were problems with the flooring at the Village Hall. We are also pleased to have recently helped by hosting Zumba, Boxercise, the Parish Council and U.D.A.S., the last group preparing for their very own murder back stage!

The Pre-School's short spells with us have prompted several to ask if this might become a permanent arrangement. It is true to say that we greatly value our links with Ulcombe Pre-School, and we are delighted to help out when the need arises. However, at the present time we do not have the capacity for this to be a long-term arrangement. I can say, with confidence, that the Governing Body will be happy to explore this possibility further when the Library extension is complete, though this is currently being delayed as the architects seek outline planning permission for a small development on the land to be sold by KCC.

Our other significant visitor was Her Majesty's Inspector of Schools on behalf of Ofsted. This was to conduct what is known as a Monitoring Visit, and this can happen in between and as well as full inspections. Schools which receive monitoring inspections are those whose last full report was satisfactory overall. Read on for further details.

LIBRARY UPDATE

Regrettably there is little to add to last month's update. As many of you know, Kent County Council has granted planning permission for the extension, which will house our library, but a Maidstone Borough Council Planning Officer turned down the planning application from KCC and Bailey Partnerships for outline planning permission on the disused plot to the north of the school site. We are extremely fortunate that the offer of funding from KCC has remained in place, though in the current financial climate we are increasingly concerned that this may be withdrawn if we do not take advantage soon.

A revised scheme is being prepared, which I believe has been submitted to Borough Council for their comments. My understanding is that a second planning application has not yet been made, as the comments from MBC planners may affect what the architects propose. In view of our concerns about funding, I hope this will be in the very near future. Plans will be available at the school and with the Chair of the Parish Council when the planning application is made, as well as with MBC, as before. We hope that when plans are resubmitted they will receive even greater support, as this development is essential to long-term progress and improvement of our school.

OFSTED COME AND GO IN THE BLINK OF AN EYE

With January drawing to a close and February almost upon us, we received a surprise phone call. It was from Her Majesty's Inspector of Schools (HMI) to say an inspector was coming. This was a monitoring visit and so within an hour of speaking to the

HMI, she and I were meeting here in school in preparation for a visit the following day. And so, on Tuesday 25th January, a few minutes before 8am, the inspection of our school started.

This was not like the previous inspections though. Monitoring visits focus just on the key issues that were raised by the last full inspection. For us, the key issues were using assessment information, raising expectations and improving attendance.

We know that the inspector was pleased to see everything that we have done to try and make the curriculum stimulating and exciting, including our creative curriculum and our multi-sensory room. (This is a hot air balloon at the moment!) She was happy to see that all of the lessons were well differentiated, with children completing tasks which were appropriate for their ability.

The area which continues to challenge us all in school is attendance and punctuality. However, from the inspector's point of view, she could see that the school has worked hard to make a difference, and she was happy that we were doing all that we could.

Her conclusions were that the school was continuing to make progress towards being a good school and that the rate of this progress is as she would expect. The letter from the inspector to me is both on the school web-site and on the Ofsted web-site, should you wish to read it in full.



St Edmunds Centre Secretary steps down

You may remember in my annual report for the AGM in May 2010 I said this would be my last year on the management committee. Well the next AGM looms ever nearer and it is time to look for a new secretary to take over.

When Tom Sams held a meeting in 2002 those of us who attended were asked whether we wanted to save the hall for village use or see the Diocese sell it off as just another building project. Yes use it or lose it, we voted to try and save it for villagers use.

We formed a group calling ourselves "the friends of St Edmunds" The chapel was sadly neglected and only the table tennis club still used this dilapidated hall, with paint and plaster peeling off the walls, a hole in the floor from wood rot and a kitchen so full of wood worm that the shelves inside the cupboards were held together by the Fablon covering them. When it rained water came through the walls trapped by the Ivy and Hawthorn covering a third of the building and the windows were so rotten two pains of the glass fell out. The damp musty smell was very off putting to anyone thinking of using it too.

George Denny the church architect was kind enough to draft up plans to refurbish the hall and we looked for builders. The quotes came in and the middle figure was £48k this was a big task for so small a village of just 120 properties to raise.

We were advised if we were to get council backing it would be necessary to become a charity trust and to acquire a long lease on the building. As reluctant as some of us were we applied to the Charity Commission and became a charity. A long drawn out legal negotiation for the lease began.

During this time "I don't do heights" Tom Sams and Brian Fuller sat on the roof on the hottest day of the year and cleared the Ivy and Hawthorn that had been allowed to cover one third of the outside of the building. The foot soldiers to this event were Duffrey Robinson, Steve and Karen Taylor, Janetta Sams and children Eve Felton and I. These same people worked out in all weathers clearing the overgrowth on several weekends. The inside was cleaned and painted by yet another group Catherine Motley and her daughters, Karen and her Mum and daughters, Simon Wardle and my husband Bob. Brian and our fellow members ran fund raising events like quiz nights, race evenings etc. All of which were held with the help of Harrietsham and Lenham village community halls. Eve baked cakes and made jam to sell at coffee mornings and the school fair.

In 2007 Lord Sandy Bruce Lockhart without who's help we would never have secured council grants, re-opened the refurbished hall. I am happy to say it has been in use ever since.

What I have tried to illustrate is our very small village of about 120 properties all played a part in securing a community centre for this village, every household donated money when Karen and I knocked on their doors. In all we raised a quarter of the costs ourselves £12k in total.

Lenham Swimming Club has opened every summer since 1977 and will be a huge loss to the community if we are unable to continue operating. However, changes in health and safety legislation mean that formal qualifications are now also required.

"The Life and Films of Jack Cardiff" -Film Historian Ian Christie talks to the Egerton Film Society

On Thursday 17th March at 7.30pm at the Millennium Hall, Egerton, renowned cinema scholar and lecturer Ian Christie, Professor of Film and Media History at Birkbeck College, University of London, will be the guest speaker at a special meeting of the Egerton Film Society. The Society, founded in 2000, screens a mixture of classic and popular films on the last Thursday of each month, as well as presenting occasional evenings featuring guest speakers who talk about films and film-making.

Professor Christie will be giving a personal insight into the life and work of Jack Cardiff, one of Britain's most revered cinematographers. Jack Cardiff's career spanned an incredible nine of the first ten decades of moving pictures, and his work behind the camera altered the look of films for ever through his pioneering use of Technicolor photography. He was the first of his profession to be presented with an Honorary Oscar and a unique figure in British and international cinema.

A film historian, broadcaster, writer, film-maker and lecturer, Professor Christie is an internationally recognised authority on film history who contributes regularly to radio and television programmes on cinema. Before joining Birkbeck's School of History of Art, Film and Visual Media in 1999, where he has recently been Director of the Centre for British Film and Television Studies, Ian Christie taught in Oxford and at the University of Kent, and was elected a Fellow of the British Academy in 1994. He held various posts at the British Film Institute and co-produced a five-part series on early cinema for BBC Television entitled *The Last Machine*, presented by Terry Gilliam. He has written and edited books on various film subjects including film-makers Powell and Pressburger, Sergei Eisenstein, Terry Gilliam and Martin Scorsese, and also on Russian cinema. Recent television appearances include *The Hundred Scariest Movies, The Thirties in Colour* (BBC4), *Scotland on Screen* (BBC2), *Rude Britannia* and *Dive! Dive! Dive! Olive! Dive!* (BBC4).

Professor Christie's talk will be followed by a screening of Craig McCall's richly rewarding and highly acclaimed cinema documentary, "Cameraman: The Life And Work Of Jack Cardiff" (2010) - a treasure trove of cinematic riches and a must for all cinema fans. On Thursday 31st March there will be a special showing of the restored version of "A Matter of Life and Death" (1946), Powell and Pressburger's much praised film, beautifully photographed by Jack Cardiff.

Doors open at 7pm on both evenings, when a licensed bar and light refreshments will be available. Non-members will be made most welcome. Admission is £3 for members and £4 for non-members. For further information contact Richard King on 01233 756592.

The March Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Aquarius at beginning of March, and moves into Pisces on the 12^{th} .

The **Spring Equinox** falls on Sunday 20th March, so after this date the days will grow longer than the nights. **British Summer Time** begins on Sunday 27th March, when clocks go forward one hour.

New Moon occurs on Friday 4^{th} March, and Full Moon is on Saturday 19^{th} March, in the constellation of Virgo.

Mercury is at its greatest distance east of the Sun on 23rd March, so towards the end of the month you should be able to see this elusive planet very low in the western sky in the early evening.

Venus is again a brilliant "Morning Star" this month, low in the eastern sky just before sunrise, but it is getting increasingly difficult to see. It is moving rapidly north - eastwards, crossing Capricornus and into the constellation of Aquarius at the end of the month.

Mars was in conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 4th February, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter is also approaching conjunction on 6th April, so it might just be possible to see the giant planet at the beginning of the month, low in the west at sunset. We will lose sight of it before the end of the month.

Saturn is rising in the east in the evening, and is well up in the southern sky in the early hours of the morning. It is moving very slowly north-westwards in the constellation of Virgo.

Most of you will be aware that there is a lot of junk floating around in space. A US report concluded that space was so littered with rubbish that a collision could set of an uncontrolled chain reaction capable of destroying the communications network on Earth. Apparently there are about 10 million pieces of man-made debris, 12,000 of them large objects consisting of old satellites and rocket stages etc., and any collision could create debris capable of destroying other satellites. Its sounds unlikely but The Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency and Nitto Seimo Co, a fishing net company, are planning to tackle this problem. They are developing a super-strong metal net, spanning several kilometres, which will be deployed be a satellite, to sweep up the waste in its path as it circles the Earth. After a journey of several weeks, the net and contents will become electrically charged, and will be drawn back towards earth burning up as it enters the atmosphere.
