## **Grafty Garden Cuttings – July**

With the light evenings, warm weather and World Cup football on the television, I find it increasingly difficult to venture indoors, especially in the evenings. The heady mix of flower perfumes and the chorus of bird song are intoxicating and there is always something that can 'just' be done before cooking a meal: a little dead-heading, watering or potting-on, boarders to dig and compost to spread, edging or chasing rabbits. Never a dull moment really. Time to break out the candles and keep on digging.

The peas I sowed last autumn are cropping well, as are the broad beans I find autumn sown to be much more worth while - no caterpillars in the peas and if it comes hot and dry, my spring sown broad beans develop rust not pods. The garlic also looks good, but the dwarf and runner beans are off to a slowish start. Slugs have been a huge problem, so the bran is in play, with a very few slug pellets where the birds have no access. This year seems to be one long battle against everything that chomps. For the first time ever, we have had to fence and net the brassicas, the sweetcorn and marrows and spinach, and newly planted ornamentals. The wire serves a purpose, but looks like Fort Knox.

Time to sow wallflowers, forget-me-nots and other like biannual's cut down leaves on spring flowering bulbs, divide iris clumps and continue to keep an eye open for pests and diseases. My gooseberries regularly suffer from mildew but I sprayed them with milk and it seems to work, for we have a healthy crop for the first time in years. Fed up with limp lettuce salads, I am also trying mixed oriental leaves, sown and grown in a large pot, which stands by the back door. They are cut and come again and very tasty.

Continue mulching to conserve moisture and water plants thoroughly and less frequently, to encourage deep rooting. Hoeing between plants regularly is also nearly as good as a watering and allows any moisture that is about, to soak in.

## **Platts Heath School Update**

After attending the SOAB meeting which took place at County Hall on 8 June where Sir Sandy Bruce-Lockhart spoke very passionately and admirably on our behalf, it is with great disappointment that we have to report that the majority vote was that the proposal for closure of Platts Heath School and merger with Kingswood School should be put forward for public consultation.

Of the Board: 2 opposed, two abstained and the remaining five were in favour for different reasons (not all negative).

This is the response we clearly did not want. Although public consultation does NOT mean the closure/merger will happen, its process can have a very damaging effect on the school. We therefore appeal to all of the parents of Platts Heath School to have faith, hold tight and continue to support the school by keeping their children there. If you start to leave now, the inevitability will be closure! We have to view this consultation in a positive light and show them our strengths.

Our second appeal would be to the community of Platts Heath itself and surrounding villages to give us your support by signing our petition and writing to Paul Carter, John Simmonds and Graham Badman at KCC. Your letters can make a difference!

We also need your support on **Thursday 13 July at 7 pm at Kingswood School** when we have to attend our **Public Consultation meeting.** This is where you get the chance to have your say!!

The future of our school and village is in your hands now! Please, don't just sit back and wait for others to do something, we all have a responsibility for the community in which we live. If you want to make a difference make sure you attend! Your presence and opposition to this proposal will be valued immensely!

Why do KCC want to close us?

1. As far as we can decipher from the proposal, it is due to the fact that we have less than 100 children, our accommodation is of poor quality and we have lack of scope for development, i.e. bigger and better buildings. Yes, our buildings are a little bit shabby but, they provide a warm, comfortable, functional and versatile environment suitable for our children to learn, and at the end of the day, isn't that what education is all about, but it would seem that today we live in such a material world where the condition of our buildings is far more important an issue than the standard of education going on inside them.

2. In reality, it would appear that KCC are only interested in money and our school just happens to be sited on prime building land.

For those of you who don't know our school, we have been here for over 130 years and are visible when passing through the village on the Headcorn Road, but blink and you might just miss us. We currently have 74 pupils many of which are achieving above average results. This year 6 out of 7 of our year six leavers who took the 11+ will go on to Grammar School, that is quite an achievement!

I personally, have found this school to offer a very close, caring and personalised education for both my daughters and I have great respect for those teachers who actively encourage parent involvement.

Our thanks go out to Sir Sandy Bruce-Lockhart and Hugh Robertson for being so passionate about our cause and who are doing everything within their power to help. To Cllr Jan Sams and Tom Sams for their support and encouragement and to those within the community who are already behind us.

#### We intend to fight to save our school but we really do need your support! Please Please Help!

We will keep you updated.


## **Stop Press .. Platts Heath School Fayre .. Stop Press**

## <u>Heaths Countryside Corridor</u> <u>A community initiative of Charing Heath and Lenham Heath</u>

Heath helps its endangered neighbours !!

The best laid plans for 'mice and newts' will provide a sanctuary in the shadow of the High Speed Rail Link through the Kent countryside.

Supporters of the Heaths Countryside Corridor (HCC) abandoned their leisurely Sunday morning recently to set up dormice nest boxes in what remains of an ancient woodland near the village of Charing Heath. Just over a week later, and more turned out in the dark and rain to see what appears to be a significant colony of great crested newts in two ponds situated on a strip of land sandwiched between the M20 and the Channel Tunnel Rail Link near Lenham.

Both sites were recently acquired by the HCC trust in order to provide a nature conservation and recreational area for local inhabitants – people, plants and animals alike!

Ruth Lovering, the HCC Secretary, said 'We live alongside so much wildlife and flora and yet seldom notice what treasures we actually have living amongst us. The HCC is in the process of carrying surveys of the sites acquired along a corridor running from the eastern end of the village at Charing Heath through to Chilston at the western end of Lenham Heath. It's early days yet, but already we have discovered rare species of lichens and unusual habitats for mammals, birds and insects. And now we have what looks to be a fragile community of dormice somehow hanging on to survival in Hurst Wood, after being knocked around during the construction of the Channel Tunnel Rail Link, and a significant colony of Great Crested Newts.

'It cannot be easy for dormice surviving such upheaval, and not to mention the noise from the motorway and the jet-like rush of noise every time a Eurostar train rushes past' said Steve Kirk, a local conservationist licensed to survey dormice colonies and handle these endangered animals. 'These creatures sleep for six months of the year, risking famine and hypothermia if they are woken up in the winter, and – as they sleep on the ground during the winter months - they need secluded areas; but they also need nesting places among trees that sustain 13

them with the flowers, fruits and nuts during the Spring and Summer in order to breed before the cold returns. The HCC is doing a fantastic job in helping these endangered animals.'

Jo Haskett, Project Officer for the Kentish Stour Countryside Project (KSCP) was equally complimentary of the work and aims of the HCC. During a cold and wet Friday night, Jo showed local people, including a number of children, the newt colonies around the site that she had discovered following several weeks of surveying. Afterwards she said 'If it weren't for groups such as the HCC, Kent would be in danger of losing important breeding grounds for the endangered Great Crested Newt. The site that once used to belong to the Chilston Estate, but which has long since been cut off by the M20 and more recently the Channel Tunnel Rail Link, is home to a healthy population of these astonishing amphibians. But the area has been under significant pressure from both the environment, in the form of drought, and human activity, all of which threatens to destroy this small natural oasis. The intervention of the HCC at the eleventh hour will secure this habitat for the long term, and the KSCP are happy to be involved with them.'

HCC is very grateful to our sponsors: the dormouse event was funded by Action Earth and Kentish Stour Countryside Project; the Newt survey work was funded by Heritage Lottery Fund, Kent County Council, Maidstone Borough Council and Rail Link Countryside Initiative.



It makes sense to have a bulk order delivered over 2 to 3 days every 4 months, rather than have tankers clogging up our village every week.

## CARE FOR THE VULNERABLE

**BibleLands** works with those who have been orphaned and other people who live in particularly deprived circumstances across the region. With growing poverty becoming an increasing matter of concern for those living in parts of The Middle East, BibleLands Project Partners continue to meet the need for practical support to the poorest and most underprivileged communities across the region.

**£12562** has been sent to **Development of Upper Egypt Trust (DUET)** to help fund a recycling and environmental project in Meir, a rural village in Upper Nile Region where high unemployment and poverty prevail. This project will not only help to keep the environment clean, but will also help to generate employment.

**£5000** has been made available to help with the running costs of a **Baby Care Clinic in Tura** on the outskirts of Cairo. The Clinic provides essential postnatal baby and child care to the local community.

**£5000** from BibleLands has helped to fund two new lifts at Cedar Home in Beirut. A service lift will enable food and laundry to be distributed throughout the building from a basement; a task that has previously been done by carrying it up flights of stairs in the six storey building. The other passenger lift will be used by the girls and staff to access their living accommodation more easily.

Our total **social care programme** support amounted to **£141,509**

It is hoped soon to be able to offer a LearnDirect Sage Basic Bookkeeping Course and another on Website Design and suggestions for other subjects are always welcomed.

Every Saturday morning an informal drop in session is run from 10am to noon offering free advice on computer problems as well as using the facilities to send emails or surf the Internet.

## July ... A Turning Point?

As we reach 1<sup>st</sup> July each year, we stand at the mid-point of the year; it's the 182<sup>nd</sup> day of the year with 183 remaining. It's a good time to take stock, to look back at what we've been doing and to look forward to what we plan and, perhaps, to things we hope to do.

About a dozen years ago I came across a useful exercise in examining my own life. It was part of a book which then became one of my all-time favourites; it's called 'God of Surprises' and was written in 1985 by Fr Gerard Hughes, a Jesuit priest. The first chapter is called "Where Your Treasure Is". The chapter's title is

a direct quote from St Matthew's gospel, chapter 6, verse 21 - Jesus said: "For `where your treasure is, there your heart will be also"; here, Jesus is teaching about faithful living and the difference between earthly and heavenly values.

At the end of Hughes's first chapter, he suggests an exercise to help readers to understand themselves better. The exercise involves writing your own obituary. He says *'this may sound a bit morbid'*, but he encourages the reader to try it before deciding it is a waste of time. He goes on to say:

"Do not write the sort of obituary which you are afraid you might have but the kind of obituary which, in your wildest dreams, you would love to have. Do not analyse it, or try to think it out too clearly, but allow your fancy run free. Having done it once, return to it now and again and see if you want to add to it or correct it".

Most of the chapters of the book conclude with suggested exercises but, for me, this one was the most powerful of them all. At the time I was preparing to leave the Army after some 30 years and to become a full-time student at a theological college in preparation for ordination. I won't share with you my own draft obituary but I offer the exercise as a suggestion at this turning point of the year.

I believe it is good to reflect on past events, to consider where we are at present and to ponder the direction in which we may be heading. Of one thing we may be sure: *God is with us*, for that is the Name of God \*\*.
