Grafty Garden Cuttings - March

The snow and cold weather have succeeded in bringing back some of our birds. I have been watching nine blackbirds squabbling over the apples I threw out on to the lawn and there are blue tits and chaffinches on and under the bird feeders. Further up the garden I have also seen gold crests, long tailed tits and the woodpeckers are about again. Jays and a cock pheasant pay the odd visit, too.

We have now had enough rain to make the garden more like a swamp, but if it does dry out by the second half of the month, I shall be planting my early potatoes, sowing parsnip seed (having first warmed the ground under cloches), putting in onion sets, giving the buddleias a final cut right down and pruning the roses.

Rambling roses should be tidied up only if needed, which could include some drastic chopping if they are very old and out of hand. Climbers need all side growths especially those that flowered last year cut to within 3 buds of the main leaders, which should be trained in to their supports. Bush roses need old or dead wood cut out, any crossing or weak stems removed and the main stems cut back to an outward facing bud. This can be anything from 4" above ground level to a foot or more, depending on type of rose and how hard it was cut the previous year. If time is short, take a pair of hedge clippers or a chain saw and just trim across the tops of the bushes. Apparently it makes no difference which method is employed and the latter can even produce more blooms - according to trials carried out.

Hydrangeas also need attention, once the worst of the weather is over. Spent flower heads, left on to protect the new buds, can be cut off, old wood cut out and new growth taken back to a pair of strong buds lower down shaping the bush carefully as cuts are made.

Ivy is taking over our countryside and although it is great for wildlife, providing food and shelter all year round, it needs keeping an 'eye' on. The various cultivars can look wonderful as ground cover, on pergolas or up walls, but the wild variety is terribly invasive and can smother beds, boarders, houses and trees the minute one's back is turned. A great deal of my weeding involves pulling out ivy seedlings, as well as the ubiquitous ash and brambles.

Spring is really under way, so definitely time for some garden visits to enjoy the wonderful displays of bulbs and spring flowers.

To make this club work all members have to have at least the minimum 500 Litres every time we order, that is about 3 to 4 times a year. It makes sense to have a bulk order delivered over 2 to 3 days every 4 months, rather than have tankers clogging up our village every week. We now cover Harrietsham, Headcorn, Lenham, Liverton Hill, Platts Heath, Sandway Ulcombe and Biddenden. THE KENT COUNTY COUNCIL (VARIOUS ROADS) (BOROUGH OF MAIDSTONE) (VARIOUS SPEED LIMITS) CONSOLIDATION ORDER (VARIATION NO. 14) ORDER 2007

Notice is hereby given that KENT COUNTY COUNCIL propose to make the above named Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, and of all other enabling powers, and after consultation with the chief officer of police in accordance with Part III of Schedule 9 to the Act:

The effect of this Order will be as follows -

Bearsted - to extend the 30 mph speed limit in Ashford Road westwards to include the junction with Willington Street.

Boughton Malherbe (Grafty Green) - the existing 40 mph speed limits will be reduced to 30 mph in Church Road, Headcorn Road, Lenham Road and Woodcock Lane.

Boxley - to reduce the speed limit from 50 mph to 40 mph in Sandling Lane.

Chart Sutton - to extend the 30 mph speed limit in Warmlake Road approximately 350 metres eastwards to the recreation ground.

East Farleigh - the 40 mph speed limit in Dean Street will be reduced to 30 mph from its southern terminal point near Horse Shoe Farm to 25 metres north of Workhouse Lane. North of this point the 40 mph speed limit will be unchanged.

Harrietsham - the 40 mph speed limit on Ashford Road (A20) which ends near Hook Lane to be extended for about 550 metres westwards to now end near the culvert 210 metres Maidstone side of the altered West Street junction.

Hunton - the existing 40 mph speed limit in West Street will be reduced to 30 mph between 110 metres north of Bensted Close and 85 metres south-west of Grove Lane. Bensted Close will become 30 mph, as will the 40 mph section of Elphicks Farm Road (Bishops Lane)

Sutton Valence - the 30 mph speed limit on Headcorn Road (A274) to be extended southwards to 140 metres Headcorn side of South Lane.

Sutton Valence - the 40 mph speed limit in Chartway Street to be reduced 30 mph.

Thurnham - to introduce a 30 mph speed limit in Caring Lane from Ashford Road for 690 metres (about 60 metres south of AWoodlands@)

A copy of the proposed Order, a statement of the Council's reasons for proposing to make the Order, maps indicating the location and effect and a copy of any Orders which will be amended by the proposed Order may be examined at Kent Highway Services, Mid Kent Division, Doubleday House, St Michaels Close, Aylesford ME20 7BU during normal office hours.

An information pack containing basic details of the traffic order proposals will also be available for examination at the Highway Information Centre, Directorate of Strategic Planning, County Hall, Maidstone ME14 1XX, and at the Information Office, Town Hall, High Street, Maidstone.

Incumbent takes early retirement

By the time you read this many, if not all, of you will know that I have decided that the time has come for me to retire from full-time stipendiary (paid!) ministry. Over recent months I have spent time reflecting on my ministry and my personal situation: past, present and future. In this process I have been greatly assisted by the Senior Staff of the Diocese, the Bishops and Archdeacons; I have also received a huge amount of stimulus, care and support from many parishioners - for which, thank you.

I shall not dwell on my Incumbency but I should like it to be known that I have been very happy and fulfilled in my seven years in post. I began in 1999 by taking responsibility for the parishes of Harrietsham and Ulcombe, to be followed a year later with the addition of the parishes of Boughton Malherbe and Lenham. It was a great privilege to be able to share in ministry with two outstanding curate colleagues: the Revd Nigel Fry and the Revd Ann Sadler, before they moved on to 'greater things'! Likewise, it has been a real privilege to share in ministry with so many able leaders: Readers, Lay Ministers, Church Wardens, members of Church Councils and Musicians as well as the many gifted and dedicated parishioners - far too many to list - who give so freely of their time and talents; God has bestowed rich gifts upon our parishes.

My last service in the benefice is to be on Sunday 29th April at Ulcombe, All Saints, at 10.30am; this is a whole-benefice service for all four parishes together. I am leaving to take up a post (unpaid!) in the Whitstable Team Ministry, with specific responsibility for the district of Swalecliffe, St John the Baptist. I shall be living in the Swalecliffe Rectory and working in that district for two days a week, plus Sunday duty; the CofE calls this arrangement 'House-for-Duty'. The remainder of my time will be spent in some diocesan commitments and personal pursuits. The Parish of Whitstable comprises some six churches with a team of three full-time clergy, a youth worker, myself and many other lay workers. I am to be licensed at Swalecliffe on Wednesday 9th May at 7.30pm.

For the future of the four parishes of the Len Valley Benefice, it is my prayer that a new Incumbent will be found without undue delay but this process generally takes several months. Meanwhile, we are very fortunate to be supported and served by a number of local clergy, both retired and active, together with the many lay folk who already do so much for God's work in the area. I ask for your prayers for the future of the benefice and especially for the leadership who will be managing the vacancy during the process of identifying the next Incumbent.

Finally, my thanks for all the care and support I have received in each of the four parishes; I shall continue to hold you all in my prayers.
