Every council needs to be aware of WHICH PARTICULAR power they are using when spending money. Councils are 'creatures of statute' and must justify each expenditure with legislation. It is good practice to include in the minute the statute relied upon when the council resolves to spend money; this provides the beginning of the audit trail for the account and audit process.

## 1.3. Section 137 Local Government Act 1972

If a council is considering expenditure for which there is no statutory power councillors may use Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972. which states: A local authority may, subject to the provisions of this section, incur expenditure which in their opinion is in the interests of their area or any part of it or all or some of their inhabitants, up to a total of £5.00 per elector Register of Electors.

The expenditure must bring some direct benefit to the area or part of it, or to some or all of the inhabitants; this means that it must be possible to point to some way in which, in the broadest sense, the area or its inhabitants will be better off as a result of the expenditure.

Direct benefit must be commensurate with the expenditure involved; it is for the council, acting reasonably, to judge whether this test is met, but they need to consider whether the expenditure is reasonable in relation to the degree of direct benefit that it will produce. Expenditure within the stated financial and legal parameters must be included within the budget of the council.

The important thing to remember is that s137 cannot be spent on an individual. E.g. a young scout may ask the council for financial help to enable a visit to an international jamboree in South America. Worthy as this may be the council cannot agree because the statute says s137 money must benefit 'some or all of the inhabitants.' However if the request came from the scout troop the parish council could consider a grant to the troop as a whole; it would then be benefiting 'some' inhabitants.
