Village Hall - October Newsletter

We were blessed with glorious weather for the summer fair which appeared to be enjoyed by all.

Thank you for making cakes, helping out and coming along to support the event. Total income for the event which was made up from income from stall holders, games, food and drink sales was just over £1,600. The cost of the entertainment came in at £820 and the cost of food, drink, (beer and wine) and other sundries was £352 providing us with a profit on the day of a very creditable £428. This will enable us to meet the cost of refurbishing the PA system, (£195) and leave a surplus of approximately £233 which we can put towards hosting future events at the hall or maintaining the hall in good condition.

It is of course not all about the money, it was lovely to see the community coming together both young and old enjoying each other's company and the entertainment in a beautiful setting on a lovely summer's afternoon.

Thank you as always for your support of the village hall without this the hall would not be sustainable and a community resource would be lost so thank you again for all your help it is greatly appreciated.

News from Helen Whately - MP

"As many of you will know, at the start of September I was involved in a nasty road accident on the A252 which left me needing surgery on my ankle.

I am hugely grateful to the emergency services and to everyone who came to help in the minutes after the accident. It made such a difference at a horrible time, and I have been so moved by the countless kind messages that people have sent since.

The one beneficiary of all of this is my dog Alfie, who thinks me being stuck at home is terrific news. He doesn't know why I'm suddenly here all the time, but he's determined to make the most of it - and by following me around the house constantly he is doing a great job of cheering me up.

I'm hoping to be back on my feet soon, but in the meantime, I am getting on with work from home as normal.

Over the summer my team and I have been busy locally, including analysing more than 2,000 responses to my housing survey and writing to the Housing Secretary with the results.

In the letter I set out our local red lines: that development should come with proper improvements to local services, and shouldn't come at the expense of our beautiful countryside. If you haven't read the letter yet you can find it on my website.

I spent the early part of the summer calling for Operation Brock to be stood down which it then was in July, and I'm hoping that my recent letter to the Transport Secretary about the impact of ticket office closures on older and disabled passengers is also successful.

The Farming Minister Mark Spencer came to visit us in Graveney and talked to local growers about some of the challenges they're facing, and the Sentencing Minister Ed Argar came to Lenham as part of our crackdown on rural crime.

That crackdown has been a team effort with local councillors, farmers, and the police, and it's such a good example of what we can achieve when we come together locally to work on a problem.

That's why this autumn I'm launching five local priorities which I want to bring people together to work on. Having been your MP for 8 years and spoken to people every day about what matters to them, I've chosen five areas which I know people care about locally and I think we can make real progress on. They are:

1. More GP and dentist appointments

Working to increase the number of GP and dentists locally, and the number of appointments available from the ones we have.

2. Faster police response

Working to improve the responsiveness of local police, especially in rural areas.

3. Investment for schools and pupils

Helping local schools to win investment, and local pupils to get more from their education.

4. Environmental improvements

Protecting the local countryside, improving biodiversity and getting investment in our waterways.

5. Help for local business to grow

Finding out what's holding local businesses back from growing, and helping them bridge those gaps.

Of course, I'm not going to hit pause on my other campaigns — like getting a new swing bridge for Faversham or keeping up the fight for a Leeds/Langley relief road. But I want to see just how much progress we can make on these issues if we put our collective might together.

Keep an eye out for more information in the coming weeks, and please do have a think if you can get involved in any way. Once I'm back on my feet I want us to hit the ground running! "

You may have read in the September draft minutes (elsewhere in the magazine) that the Parish Council awarded a grant to Platts Heath School towards their new outdoor play area. Traffic Calming & Headcorn Road - By The Way; Some Facts

Living at the Headcorn end of Grafty Green by the village gate where 60mph becomes 30mph been very aware that there has been no improvement since the traffic calming was implemented and if anything, things worsened. We've, to my knowledge, not had official comment from the Parish Council about the success / or not of the traffic calming but merely two different articles by different individuals (presumably Parish Councillors) published in Malherbe Monthly no doubt prompted by a Freedom of Information request.

Two 30mph post mounted signs either side of the road were replaced with a single small 30mph sign mounted on the white gate - in bright weather not overly visible and being on opposite side of road can be hidden from view for incoming village traffic by traffic leaving village. Now after originally raising this issue way back an answer from KCC via our clerk Vickie Ford - quote "KCC highways have informed us the speed terminal signage in incorrect it should be 600 or 750mm in size (diameter) and not 450mm (current sign size) - it will take around 4/5 months to correct this". This is of course the same KCC who initially put a national speed limit sign at Strem Farm location for going up Liverton Hill whereas the limit was 30mph! Chapter 3 - Roads Signage (the Highways Bible) states without ambiguity the signage in question 750mm (or possibly 600mm) but very definitely not 450mm.

KCC comments also go on regarding the sign removed at Wren's Nest location quote - "the signage that was removed from the verge was incorrect which is why KCC think it was removed. It was set 10/15m away from where the speed limit actually started, which shouldn't have been the case. It was KCC who moved it there because the original post sign was in the ditch and prone to topple particularly in winter when ditch had running water - they were told at time put sign on a cranked post where by the post would have been in dry ground at the back edge of the ditch.

One conspicuous sign alone will not stop speeding however it will help - a nudge / reminder to many law-abiding motorists that there is a 30mph limit. Those familiar with Hollingbourne will know as you enter there are very conspicuous with 30mph signs *BOTH SIDES* of the road.

Changing to the subject of pot holes the long running saga of those situated between Offen Farm and Wrens Nest has as I'm sure you will have noticed come to an end with some significant patching completed - it all finally came to a head on Sunday morning when KCC placed cones complete with metal signs in the running just around the blind bend thereby causing many near misses in a very short space of time - several phone calls later temporary patches were done (this should have been

done weeks, even months earlier) and four days later the permanent patching done. Further irony was that whilst these very serious pot holes were left to fester a highways crew spent a day doing remedial 'cosmetic' patching (no actual pot holes) at Woodcock Lane where traffic speeds at the junction are literally 10mph or less. At one stage we were even told the delay in doing the pot holes was delaying in obtaining road closure permit - it is of course KCC who issue the permits!!!

In all this debacle with KCC and in particular the signage problem one person, our Parish Clerk, must be thanked most sincerely for her tenacity in securing the outcome with KCC - something hitherto which had rumbled on without resolve.

Grafty Geeks

Beware of Scams/Fraud – A personal story

For this article I thought I'd share with a story about an experience I had with a fraud.

I receive regular payment notifications from Google Play, as I do have subscriptions with them for games and storage. I noticed that I was getting more than normal, so decided to check. As these payment go through PayPal, I checked there first, as you can report problems via the App. If it is a known supplier, they generally ask you to contact them directly, which is what I did. I went through the Google chat help option, who directed me to check my subscriptions in the Google Play app, which I didn't know I could do, so that was interesting, but one of the payments of 9.99 was not shown. After hour+ with them, they concluded that I must have been scammed. Useful tip: You can ask to save chats you have with Bots on line, which will get sent to your email, in case you need evidence later. I couldn't stop payments to Google play, as I need them, so I continued to research the problem.

I found that the payment was actually going to YouTube, which I discovered by selecting that payment in PayPal. I must have subscribed in the past, but no longer needed it, so I cancelled this. I got the cancellation notice and the usual "sorry to see you leaving...." email, and then eventually they confirmed it was cancelled. I just put this down to my mistake and left it at that. Until 2 days later I had another notification that a payment of 9.99 had been taken, so this time I checked this with my bank, Halifax. In the *Halifax App* you can select a payment and select "Help with this transaction", there are various options available, but the one for me at this time was "If you still have an issue and think a transaction is unauthorised, then contact them". As I had already discovered from Google that they felt it was a scam, I contacted Halifax. Very quickly they agreed that this was indeed fraud, and it turned out that this payment was being taken once a week since May, when I had a new card issued. They instantly refunded these payments, and it turned out that I had also had 51 smaller payments being taken, of between 0.11 – 1.29, in addition to the 9.99 per week, so in total I got back about £150. They had to stop my card and give me a new one and since then it has been fine.

Clearly I should check my account more often, but due to me changing jobs and having a crazy few month's I hadn't taken enough notice. I was also getting a lot of emails from various people during this time, so had just deleted the Google Play and PayPal notifications. It was only when I decided to review my finances after my new job had settled in that I noticed this excessive activity.

Lessons learnt for me are shown in bold and italics above, and also of course to check my bank more regularly and don't ignore any payment notifications before checking.

I hope you found this interesting and helpful if ever you are in doubt about payment activity.

Boughton Malherbe Community Emergency Plan.

The plan which has been in place since 2015 has to be amended once more because of so many recent changes.

We are urgently in need of volunteers to bring us back up to strength with one vacancy for a co-ordinator and two more for general helpers to provide the numbers that might be needed should we suffer a major disaster, like a plane crashing in Grafty Green or lesser events that still require our assistance to help those affected.

Co-ordinators will be involved in the management of disaster assistance and helpers would be on hand to take on general help as the need arises under control of the co-ordinators. There is no prior training required and the plan is flexible to cope with any eventuality. We hope it will never need to be used.

Each co-ordinator will have a copy of the plan for use if we should have need of it in co-operation with the emergency services and Kent Resilience Forum. Each Co-ordinator will also have a confidential list of helpers they can call on if needed and available.

Helpers' duties are just to be on hand to assist if requested by a co-ordinator and they are able to do so safely. Nobody is expected to take unnecessary risks to themselves or others.

If you would like to Volunteer as a co-ordinator or helper please Email Ron Galton at galton@gotadsl.co.uk giving your full name, postal address, Email address, landline and mobile telephone numbers. Please also give details if you have a useful attribute such as trained First Aider, or a useful item that you would be willing to use if needed such as a tractor, 4x4, generator, special rescue equipment etc.

The information you provide will be kept confidential and only given to co-ordinators after you have joined as a volunteer. Unused applications will be destroyed

The public will only be given the edited version of the plan which includes only the contact details of each co-ordinator should a resident need to contact any one of them for assistance.

Only co-ordinators will have the full version of the plan which contains contact details of all helpers.

It is hoped to issue the updated Emergency Plan to all residents with your November copy of the Malherbe Monthly.

Grafty Gourmet

A warming dessert with two textures of pastry. This crumble has a short crust pastry base with a crumble topping. Serve with warm custard, cream or vanilla ice cream.

Apple & Almond Crumble

For the filling and base:-

8 eating apples (Granny Smith or Braeburn work well) 50g of golden caster sugar ½ teaspoon of mixed spice 2 tablespoons of plain flour, plus extra for dusting 500g block shortcrust pastry For the crumble:50g of plain flour
50g of ground almonds
70g of golden caster sugar
70g of cold butter, cut into cubes
30g of flaked almonds

- 1. Firstly, make the crumble. Tip the flour, ground almonds, sugar and a pinch of salt into a bowl, then rub in the butter with your fingers until the mix resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in the flaked almonds and chill until needed. Can be prepared up to two days ahead and chilled.
- 2. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan with a baking tray inside. Peel, core quarter and slice the apples, then tip into a bowl with the sugar, mixed spice and flour. Toss well and set aside. Roll the pastry out on a lightly floured surface until it's large enough to line a 20-22cm pie dish. Line the dish with the pastry, then trim and crimp the edge.
- 3. Spoon the apple mixture into the base, then scatter over the crumble. Bake on the hot tray for 35-40 mins until the topping is toasted and the pastry is deep golden. Leave to stand for 10 mins, then serve warm with cream, custard or ice cream.



Minutes of a Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 4th September 2023 at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall

Present: Clirs B Adams; T Andrews; N Eastwood; R Galton (Chair)

In attendance: Cllr M Round (Maidstone Borough Council); Clerk Mrs Vickie Ford

Anybody filming or recording this meeting kindly requested to declare it: none

M01/09/23 Apologies

Apologies from Cllr R Turner were received and accepted; Apologies from Cllr S Prendergast (Kent County Council) were noted.

M02/09/23 Declarations:

Any lobbying: none declared

Any interest in items on the agenda: none declared

Any changes to the register of pecuniary interests: none declared

M03/09/23 Approval of Minutes

RESOLVED: the Minutes of the meeting held on 3rd July 2023 were taken as read, confirmed and signed as being an accurate record of the proceedings.

M04/09/23 Public Session: no public session (five members of public present)

M05/09/23 Maidstone Borough Council's Emerging Local Plan:

The Chairman welcomed James Daughtry and Andrew Wilford of Esquire Developments to the meeting. There followed an informal discussion of the provision for 25 new dwellings in Grafty Green during the life of the Borough Plan. Mr Wilford explained that Esquire wanted the views of the local community on the provision of new dwellings within the Parish, especially any thoughts on suitable land. It was acknowledged that a single development of 25 dwellings may not be appropriate for the Village, although that would bring benefits through the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) or a \$106 agreement ("Community payback"). Any need for affordable housing should be identified. The meaning of "sustainable" in relation to a community was explored. Mr Wilford stated that the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) represented an opportunity to influence planning locally, even without a neighbourhood plan. The Chairman stated that the Parish Council was open-minded and suggested holding a public meeting to find out what the local community really wanted. He thanked the Esquire representatives for attending and they left the meeting.

M06/09/23 Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) Report

Cllr Round explained that the Borough Local Plan was still not confirmed. The NPPF requires the Authority to have a Plan in place every five years; no plan was in place for 2022-27 yet. He outlined the problems relating to housing targets. Ward boundaries would be changing next May and, if there was to be a General Election in 2024, constituency boundaries would also be different, creating the new Weald constituency. The new Headcorn ward would incorporate Sutton Valence and have an electorate of around 6,500. Cllr Round reported that he was no longer an MBC Cabinet member, turning his attention to the local community.

CIIr Prendergast (KCC) had drawn the Parish Council's attention to the various consultations on the agenda and offered her help with any matters arising from the meeting.

M07/09/23 Planning Outcomes since 3rd July 2023: None

M08/09/23 Local Policing/Community

Police/Crime Report: It was noted one crime had been reported in the Parish since 3rd July.

M09/09/23 Liverton Hill:

The Chairman reported that, as part of the process to update the Highway Improvement Plan (HIP), he and the Clerk had had a few conversations with KCC and appeared to be moving forward with the issue of the water (spring) flowing down Liverton Hill.

M10/09/23 Gullies

It was noted that no road sweeping had been carried within the Parish out for some time. Silt in the gutters had filled some gullies and blocked them. The Clerk was asked to raise with MBC.

M11/09/23 Highways

Cllr Eastwood raised the issue of Woodcock Lane name plates, reporting that the slightly damaged sign adjacent to the Village Green had been replaced whereas the seriously damaged sign further along the road had not. The Chairman had also informed the Clerk, who was <u>asked</u> to raise with MBC.

The Chairman reported that the Parish Council had received an email from a resident regarding highways signs and speeding, in particular the 30 mph sign at the south entrance to Grafty Green. The Clerk was asked to raise with KCC, requesting investigation.

The Chairman reiterated that he and the Clerk had discussed the HIP in detail with KCC. The feasibility of the Parish Council's requests for a 40 mph speed limit along part of the Lenham Road and narrowing of the Headcorn Road within the Village centre to accommodate a Speed Indicating Device (SID) were being tested by means of speed surveys, which had already been carried out.

The Parish Council had received a request for a grant towards a new outdoor play area.

The Chairman noted that the Parish Church had made a contribution. He reported that the Parish Council had investigated and does have a power to contribute to the project: the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976, s19. The School had also confirmed it was able to accept contributions from the Council.

Cllr Andrews suggested that the Parish Council purchase an item from the School's published wish list. RESOLVED: to award a grant for the purchase of a storage box (£74.99) and the mud kitchen (£69.99)

M18/09/23 Hugo Fox website charges:

From 4th October, Hugo Fox were introducing new subscription charges for their websites, including the Parish Council's.

RESOLVED: to authorise payment under the bronze subscription package (£9.99 + VAT per month)

The Clerk reported that the bronze package incorporated a secure website covered by an SSL certificate, which the Parish Council's website did not hold.

RESOLVED: the Clerk to pursue the matter with Hugo Fox

M19/09/23 Grafty Green Village Green Tree pruning:

The Chairman had received a request for cutting back of the trees overhanging the roads to allow highsided vehicles to pass by safely. He stated that it would be important to consider the health of the trees. The Clerk had checked with arboricultural consultants SJA Trees, who had recommended contacting local tree surgeons to carry out the work. Two quotations had already been obtained but the Chairman stated that he wished to be sure that they were being considered like-for-like.

CIIr Eastwood asked when the trees were next due for inspection by SJA Trees; the Clerk was asked to check.

RESOLVED: to give delegated authority to the Clerk to accept the lowest quotation, provided the health of the trees is given due consideration.

M20/09/23 Graft Green Village Green Fence:

The Chairman explained that the Landlord of the King's Head wanted the fence between the public house and the Village Green to be replaced in oak. It was noted that the gate and posts had been replaced in treated softwood but the original fence was in oak. A member of the public asked if the shrubbery and other obstacles to the replacement of the fence would be cleared and the Chairman confirmed that they would.

RESOLVED: to authorise replacement in oak of both sections of the fence between the Village Green and the King's Head public house, excluding the gate and posts, by Kingswood Fencing at a cost of £1,222.50 +



Jobs for the month ideas:

- Order and plant bulbs for spring flowering
- Prune summer raspberries
- Carry on deadheading late flowering rudbeckias, helenium's, dahlias etc to prolong flowering
- Harvest the last of the tomatoes, if yet to ripen put them in a drawer with a banana to do so
- Remove tomato haulms and put in the garden bin NOT the compost heap to avoid blight next year
- Order and apply nematodes for box moth caterpillar, chafer grubs, leather jackets and vine weevils

Finally, Don't be too tidy in the garden in order to provide winter shelter for ladybirds, lacewings and other beneficial insects.

Christian Message October 2023 - Do not despair

When a calamity happens in life, we tend to try to just deal with it. It might make us tired, irritable and anxious, but we try to focus, prioritise and move on. Depending on the size of the problem, we may deal with our feelings by discussion with family or friends, or may tell no-one for fear of judgement or reprisal. When a couple of calamities happen, we have to balance both, a bit more of a challenge and a bit more to deal with in terms of emotions. In short, we are stretched and it is harder to share our thoughts about both things adequately with those we know and love.

When several calamities happen at once we can feel completely overwhelmed, not knowing how to juggle so many balls in the air or where our priorities lie. Trying to explain all this to others can feel like yet another hurdle to jump over. It is the culmination of multiple problems that can lead to depression and despair.

In 1 Kings 19 we can read that Elijah was despairing and in fear of his life. After running away, he stopped, exhausted, ready to give up. In Genesis 39 we can read how Joseph was imprisoned for something he hadn't done and had a bleak future to look forward to. In both cases, however, God sent help, enabling them to find the strength to carry on and achieve more. There are no quick fixes when life gets tough. We might need to turn to a helpline to talk through our concerns, seek advice from a doctor or engage with a professional councillor or advisor. Like those in the Bible, we also have the option to pray and ask God to guide us through our darkest hours.

My experience is this that God really does answer prayer and, not only addresses our immediate concerns, but sometimes paves the way to something better that we hadn't thought of. Blessings can come out of adversity. We need to be prepared to be patient, prepared for change, and prepared for prayers to be answered in a way other than the one we are expecting or want. God is listening, caring, and has a plan for us all.

Philippians 4, verse 6 says:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God.

In 2 Corinthians, chapter 4, we read:

'We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. Therefore, we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day.'

Sometimes, when things seem bleak, it is hard to pray for ourselves. If you would like someone to pray for you or with you, please do fill in a prayer card in one of our benefice Churches, or why not come along to a Church service and talk to someone afterwards.
