This winter CCHP will not be running as a night shelter due to the Pandemic and the consequent decision of the Government to fund '*Room Only*' accommodation for rough sleepers. Further to this, CCHP agreed to purchase a laptop and mobile phone for the use of rough sleepers, so that they had access to internet communication. These items are held by staff and utilised when required by rough sleepers, for instance to communicate with Benefit Offices that are currently closed to anything other than internet or phone communication.

These are challenging times and being adaptable to the circumstances with which we are confronted is essential if we are to be of service. So the nature of the service offered will be different, but we intend it to be no less relevant, and we continue to rely on your support.

# Anthony Browne MP Keeping in touch with South Cambridgeshire

Many of you will have been following the events of the last two weeks closely and will already know how I voted last Wednesday: for the lockdown.

I share the anger and frustration felt by many at the announcement of a new lockdown, and at the impact it has on our livelihoods and liberties. It is particularly unfair on South Cambs, which has had just two deaths from Covid in the last 5 months. I have argued strongly against it behind the scenes, with MPs, ministers, cabinet ministers and Number 10.

But there are many counter arguments. It is absolutely clear that the epidemic is taking off nationally at a very rapid pace (but less rapid than the first peak). Across the UK, NHS hospitals are terrified of soon being overwhelmed by COVID patients, and having to limit treatment to the extent of deciding which patients to save and which to let die. Addenbrooke's is probably in the best position of any hospital in the country, but it will end up taking overflow from other hospitals elsewhere that cannot cope. I also spoke with a large number of constituents, and also asked them what they think in a survey. Over 700 people replied, and although it is entirely unscientific, it is pretty conclusive: 60% are in favour of a second national lockdown. This public opinion was a big factor in my thinking.

It is most important now to focus on what happens next. As this lockdown continues, I want to urge everyone to stick to the rules and stay safe, and I give the firmest possible commitment that I will use the next four weeks to campaign with other MPs to ensure the lockdown ends at the beginning of December, that we move back to a tailored localised system, and then lift all restrictions as quickly as possible.

Finally, I want to thank everyone who took the time to write to me on the subject over the past week. It is very important to me that you are heard, and I can assure you that I have taken on board all my constituents' comments.



Mink the carnivore



Vince Lea the trapper

Vince Lea of the Countryside Restoration Trust (CRT) has been trapping the evasive, invasive non-native North American mink for many years, starting in the Bourn Brook and extending into the Upper Cam Valley. They have all descended from escapees from mink farms. Clear evidence of his success has been some return of the water vole population on which they predate. The trouble is that mink can travel long distances through water, or overland, so eradication requires a broad regional strategy. Vince has therefore joined forces with East Anglian Waterlife Recovery East https://waterliferecoveryeast.org.uk/ which has the further advantage of additional clout when applying for grants.

The photograph above shows the traditional trap on a raft with a clay tray to record the spoor of any passer-by. Now, smart traps are available. These send a signal to a distant receiver when the trap has sprung. A raft, trap, and alarm unit cost £250 and Cam Valley Forum is making £750 available for the purchase of three such kits.

However, volunteers are needed to form a network of

smart trap responders. To reduce the mink population to zero requires a network of smart traps operating for several years while similar eradication programmes are in operation across East Anglia. Having a network of responders means that these traps can operate 365 days a year, whereas now, whenever Vince takes a holiday or has work trips outside the county, he has to close all the traps.


Responders will need to be able to get to trap locations at short notice, preferably within 2 hours of the alarm (or at first light if traps are triggered during the night). Animal welfare regulations require 24 hours maximum but we aim for a 12 hours response time at the longest. Bear in mind that traps can catch non-target species such as water voles and moorhens, and the sooner they are released the better. Furthermore, during the breeding season, catching and dispatching a female mink can quickly lead to a succession of 'following' males - some have been caught in traps within 2 hours of resetting them when the pheromones are flowing.

If anyone would like to get involved they would need to be able to travel to remote river locations and work safely, reporting directly to Vince Lea on arrival at the site and on completion of the mission. Volunteers will be trained in the despatch method. A pair of combs is used to keep the mink motionless inside the cage to ensure that there is a clean shot. Volunteers can be provided with an air pistol. Pellets are of tungsten, not lead.

Incidentally, 17 million farmed Danish mink are currently being culled because some are infected with a mutation of Covid-19. Travellers from Denmark to the UK must auarantine.

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# THE HUNDRED PARSHES SOCIETY

With Christmas just around the corner we are thinking of calling friends and family but not, I suspect, from a red telephone box.

In 1924 the Royal Fine Art Commission invited three architects to submit designs for new telephone kiosks. The winner was Sir Giles Gilbert Scott who also designed Liverpool Cathedral where he is buried. Scott was at the time a trustee of Sir John Soane's Museum and he topped his kiosk with a dome similar to that on the mausoleum Soane had designed for himself. It was produced in cast iron as GPO model K2, replacing the K1 concrete kiosk.

Later designs had a similar appearance. The most common, the somewhat smaller K6, was introduced for King George V's silver jubilee in 1935.

The colour red was chosen to make them easy to spot, although Scott had suggested silver. These robust and iconic survivors of the 20th century, found in almost every town and village, are worth preserving. At the last count, 51 within the Hundred Parishes had been listed.

Most red phone boxes have now been decommissioned although a few, like the one in Anstey, still operate as a pay phone. Many villages have used the box to house a defibrillator; others have inventively turned them into informal book exchanges and information points.

Some villages have been even more imaginative: the box in Standon has been transformed into a greenhouse full of colourful plants.

With Christmas in mind, the Society still has a limited supply of its book *The Hundred Parishes: an Introduction.* The 400-page hardback with a thousand photos is available for £25 from tourist information centres and good book shops, or by arrangement with me – 01279 813226.

The Society's trustees wish you all a very happy Christmas.
