After completion of the afternoon's bowling on 9 October 2023, the 10th AGM was held commencing at 4pm. It was attended by 18 members. The Club was formed in 2001 by John Mustoo and John Rigby, the Chairman/Secretary of the Hall Committee. In 2013 the Club became independent of the Hall and has since been run as a Constitutional Club. The existing committee was re-elected en bloc with the exception of the Treasurer Colin Prior, who after 5 years in post felt it was time to stand down. David Homes agreed to stand and was elected. Colin gave his report for the year and he was roundly applauded for his efforts.

Team Captain, Bill Robinson said it was not all bad news. Sadly we were relegated to Division 3 but by the narrowest of margins with the bottom two teams being relegated and the top two being promoted there was scope for a return to Division 3. We had lost two experienced players but had recruited five new players who were showing rapid signs of improvement. So it should prove to be an interesting year.

At the completion of the meeting John Mustoo, Pat Perret and Colin Prior were elected as Honorary Life Vice-Presidents in recognition of their contribution of the success of the Club.

As autumn is upon us, please can we remind owners to cut back any of their hedges, shrubs or trees that are growing over or encroaching a public footpath or pavement. The overgrown foliage could cause an injury to passers by or prevent pedestrians, pushchairs and mobility scooters from accessing the pavements or footpaths. It is an offence under the 1980 Highways Act to cause an obstruction to any public right of way (pavements). Thank you.

Camping on the brickfield.

During the summer months there were reports of several adults setting up camps on the brickfield. Several were openly lighting fires to cook food and the campers left behind a lot of rubbish on site. Camping on any part of the brickfield is not allowed as it's a serious fire risk not only to our village but to the surrounding shrubs and trees as well as the local wildlife, some that are on the red list of an endangered species. If you see anyone camping please report it promptly to the police on 101.

Digging on the brickfield.

Following updated advice given by our local police digging and removing any item on any part of the brickfield is considered as theft and anyone caught could face criminal charges.

The Parish Council is looking to update the local signage to make this message clearer.


LIVE WEATHER STATION AND WEBCAM

Some of our Year 2 and 3 children participated in the Sittingbourne Rugby Club's Tag Rugby Festival – great fun was had by all and they were delighted with their certificate and medal. For most of these children it was their first chance at representing our school in a sporting event, however their behaviour was impeccable and we were really proud of each and every one of them.

Our Year 6 pupils had a great team building day at the Creed Outdoor Adventure Centre, they spent the day climbing, doing archery and completing various outdoor challenges in teams. Their resilience was certainly put to the test however it was lovely to see the children try something new and achieve something they didn't think they were able to do.

Lower Halstow School teamed up with local villagers to organise and raise money through a Macmillan Coffee Morning. Our families were very generous in their donations of cakes and biscuits and it was lovely to see so many families and members of the local community join us on the day, it truly was a community event. Thank you to all those who supported it, we managed to raise £149.18 for this very worthwhile charity.

Year 6 Oak Class Feature:

Oak class have had a great start to their final year in primary school. They started their year with being introduced to their buddies. Calum: Every day for a whole term we spend our break and lunchtimes with our Reception buddies. We play games, do the Daily Mile, colour and on Fridays dance! Buddies are fun to play with especially when they run around. The buddies love looking at the horses. We teach them 'please and thank you' as well as making sure that they learn the school rules. We all love spending time with the little ones and have lots of fun. They do tire us out but we love the job of being their buddies.

Issac: The Maidstone Museum came to school to show us some Victorian artefacts. These included: a dunce's hat, a range of toys and items that Victorian children would have used in school. Some of the artefacts were once vibrant but now have faded colours. We were told about lots of different jobs that Victorian children would have done. One of the jobs was a chimney sweep which was so dangerous that many children died because they either got stuck in the chimney or their lungs got damaged because of the soot. We are lucky that we do not live in those times.

Lucy: We were the first class to trial the Moki fitness trackers which are a device that counts your steps. They are a bracelet that you wear on your wrist. Each day you scan the device and then wear it all day. At the end of the day we scan them again to see how many steps we have done. Harry did the most steps in four days - 65,000!

Florence: Our first school trip was a blast! We went to Creed Outdoor Learning Centre. We took a train from Newington Station to Teynham and once we were there we took part in: archery, where some people hit the bull's eye; campfire making and den building; the climbing wall, it was very tall but lots of people made it to the top; high ropes, we had to jump off a tree! We rushed to the train station only to find that our train had been cancelled and we had to wait an hour for the next one. Most people just sat and waited but a group of us played card games with Miss Brougham.

Mia: The Macmillan Coffee Morning was so fun! There were tea and coffee and not to mention all the delicious cakes and the people who came were lovely too, there was even a baby that stole the show. I want to say thank you to everyone who came and sent in donations and a special thank you to the governor that sent us such a lovely thank you card.
