In My Opinion...

You may have seen a recent call to arms asking for volunteers to put their names forward to assist in our Emergency Plan. In case this has not yet reached you, here it is:

The Parish Council is preparing an Emergency Plan so that we are prepared for an extreme event such as severe snowfall, flooding or a wide scale and prolonged utility failure. Not only is this good practice but it will enable us to access funds



for equipment, such as a defibrillator. To complete this work we do need your help and support.

You can help us in a number of ways:

- We are looking for volunteers to assist in the case of an emergency. Would you be willing to join a group to help coordinate our response?
- Are you a trained first aider? Would you be willing to be "on call" should an emergency arise?
- Do you own or drive a 4x4? We need people who would be prepared to use their 4x4 vehicles, should there be a major snowfall, to rescue vulnerable people from their homes, provide a lift to the doctors or hospital, ferry vital food supplies or medicines etc.
- Do you own a chainsaw? Would you assist in clearing fallen trees from roads or pathways?
- Would you be able to help in any other way? Do you have equipment or training which could be used in an emergency? Would you be prepared to assist in preparing food and refreshments should we have to evacuate some of our residents to an emergency shelter such as The Pavilion? Could you help in identifying and contacting vulnerable people in our village?

We are aiming to complete our plan in the next 4 weeks. If you can assist us, or have any questions, please contact:

You said... we did

- You said there was speeding issue on the Oakley Road in Chinnor. After a
 deployment of the Speed Indicator Device (SID) it showed only one vehicle
 going faster than 30mph which was a motorbike. We will continue to monitor
 the situation.
- We have received numerous reports of motorbikes being ridden along the Phoenix
 Trail and footpaths in Thame by young people not wearing helmets. We have
 increased patrols in these areas and have identified these young people. We shall
 be aiming to confiscate these motorbikes off them and give them section 59
 warnings.

What is anti-social behaviour (ASB)?

ASB covers a wide range of unacceptable activity that causes harm to an individual, to their community or to their environment. This could be an action by someone else that leaves you feeling alarmed, harassed or distressed. It also includes fear of crime or concern for public safety, public disorder or public nuisance. Examples of anti-social behaviour include:

- Nuisance, rowdy or inconsiderate neighbours
- Vandalism, graffiti and fly-posting
- Street drinking
- Environmental damage including littering, dumping of rubbish and abandonment of cars

- Begging and vagrancy
- Fireworks misuse
- Inconsiderate or inappropriate use of vehicles

Theft from vehicles

Over recent weeks we have seen an increase in Theft from Vehicles throughout the Thame Sector. These have been mostly in rural locations such as Aston Rowant nature reserve and Chinnor areas. We have been stepping up patrols in these areas however there are things that you can do to prevent becoming a victim of crime.

Make sure you don't leave any valuables on show in an unattended vehicle. Take all high value items with you and don't make it easy for criminals. We have been leaving crime reduction advice notices on vehicles to help in preventing vehicle crime.

The large majority of thefts from vehicles have involved work vans and cars containing power tools as these are the most sought after items. If you regularly keep these items in your vehicles, please get into a habit of removing these items when the vehicle is not in use. If anyone would like more advice, some security stickers or property marking kits then please contact the neighbourhood team who would be more than happy to help.

Crime prevention advice

To prevent thefts from sheds please ensure your shed door is locked with a good quality padlock and consider buying tamper proof screws for your hinges. A good quality shed alarm can be purchased from most DIY stores and this acts as a very good deterrent should entry be gained to your shed. The Thame Neighbourhood team are always on hand to provide free crime prevention advice so please do utilise this and contact us if you feel you need some advice about your home/vehicle security.

Rural Crime

There has been a spike in the reports of poaching and hare coursing in the Watlington, Lewknor and Chinnor area. These persons are coming onto our area in a silver Subaru forester and driving through hedges, gates and over fields to gain access to farmland in which they use dogs to chase and catch animals for sport. This offence causes extensive damage to fields and crops and therefore a financial loss to the farmer. Not to mention the distress and suffering experienced by the animals involved. Thame Neighbourhood are undertaking high visibility patrols in these areas. We would like to ask land owners, farmers and person living in rural locations to be on the lookout for such activities and call the Police immediately.

Working with partners

Thame Neighbourhood along with SOHA helped facilitate a garden clean-up for an elderly resident who was unable to tend to their garden. This enabled the resident to gain access to their garden which was long missed.

Draft budget 2016/17

The draft budget was reviewed but will not be agreed until the next meeting in December. It was suggested to earmark money towards a bus service. Raising the precept was discussed. The precept was raised by 2% last year. The responsible financial officer suggested that further savings could be made by reviewing budgeted items further.

Bus service

Peter met the organiser of the Princes Risborough bus which has been running for 7 years. Although they received a grant for the bus, they also receive public donations and the drivers are voluntary. It was felt we would not be able to sustain such a service as we have a lack of passengers compared with Princes Risborough which is similar in size to Thame.

Currently it looks as if the only option is taxis.

Ramblings from the Rectory

Oh No. As I write, only just half way through November, I have just returned from a well known local supermarket. I stood waiting by the self service checkout by a Christmas card stand. I glanced at what was on offer, several Disney characters and several cards that had Darth Vader as the central them. No Jesus though, not even Santa Claus. Darth Vader apparently rules for Christmas.

Things got worse, as I checked out my goods, In Dulci Jubilo was blasted out of the SuperMarket PA. I had my first attack of pre-christmas seasonal cynicism. It is not even half way through November, they could have had the decency to wait until December, I felt sorry for the Staff.

It is so easy to get overwhelmed by it all, and I am sure that I am not the only one who suffers the annual pre-season cynical attack. Actually, I loved last Christmas, our first here. The Carol services were uplifting and extraordinarily well attended, as was the midnight service and a really celebratory service on Christmas day in Great Haseley (this year the Christmas day service is in Great Milton). I freely confess that after twenty four years of having to get up to take 8.00am Christmas day communions, and then a couple of other services in the morning, having one main service on Christmas morning and no 8.00 am (believe me, it's a bit of a struggle following the midnight service) was a total and utter delight!

The Christmas message is of course one of the central and mysterious messages of the Christian faith, God born as man. The challenge however, at least for me, is to help people to see that it is not the only message, nor indeed necessarily the main one, for that we need to look ahead to Good Friday and Easter, over the Cradle hangs the shadow of the Cross but beyond that the promise of resurrection. I was with Tim Suter looking at the Great Haseley Carol service and I asked him to give to me the words of one of the Choir pieces that picks up this theme so beautifully.

Sing Lullaby, Lullaby bay, now reclining, Sing Lullaby!
Hush, do not wake the infant King.
Angels are watching, stars are shining
Over the place where he is lying:
Sing Lullaby!

Sing Lullaby! Lullaby baby, now a-sleeping, Sing Lullaby!

Sing Lullaby! Lullaby baby, now a-dozing.
Sing Lullaby!
Hush do not wake the infant King.
Soon comes the cross, the nails, the piercing,
Then in the grave at last reposing:
Sing Lullaby!

Sing Lullaby! Lullaby - is the babe awaking? Sing Lullaby! Hush, do not wake the infant King, Dreaming of Easter, gladsome morning, Conquering death, its bondage breaking: Sing Lullaby!

Our packed services for Christmas was a revelation to me last year, I hope they will be repeated again this year, and of course all are welcome, there is so much to celebrate, God has become man, but there is also so much more to come. Bethlehem was only the beginning, the baby grew up. We really miss out if all we do is leave Jesus in the crib.

William and Joseph Allen

We remembered these two brothers at our Benefice service on Sunday October 30th. Our Captain halted the ringing and gave a short homily to William and Joseph Allen.

These two men were related to one of the ringers, and he also added his thoughts.

We have now marked the passing of all three of the Great Milton Bellringers/soldiers lost in the Great War. These were three normal men of the village -2 gardeners and a baker - Harold Tame, William Allen and Joseph Allen - a hundred years ago.

Great Milton Athletics Club (GMAC) continues to move from strength to strength. This summer the club was invited to join the Oxfordshire Junior League as a non-scoring team. The track and field season ended in September, at the final league meeting with a flurry of personal bests for Esther Davies (70m hurdles), Emma Lamont (long jump), Phoebe Coleman (200m), Freddie Cunningham (high jump), and Jack

Spencer and Luke Robinson (long jump). Jack Spencer was also selected to represent Oxfordshire in his first English Schools national final competing in a pentathlon at Exeter. We also managed an away day in Cheltenham for pole vault training.

The winter terms sees the focus of training shift to cross country. Eight of the squad, not forgetting, Mick Robinson, our first senior athlete (as seen on the front cover) raced in the first league match at Newbury on a bitterly cold day in early November. A trip to Aldershot to train with the most talented squad of endurance athletes in the country under Mick Woods will also be a key point in the winter training calendar.

GMAC would like to extend a huge thank you to the management and gardening team of Le Manoir for allowing our athletes to carry out their cross-country training in Le Manoir's field above their Orchard. We are also extremely grateful for the extra paths, which were cut in the field. They have allowed more variety to our running and most importantly enabled the coach to keep the younger athletes in sight during training.

GMAC are also grateful to the continued support of the Sheppard Trust and the Trustees. The funds provided have helped pay for training equipment, a first aid course, a tent for shelter at cross-countries, race entry fees, field official courses and coaching courses. We are very proud our older athletes who at 14 years are starting out on their coaching pathway and are helping with the under 11s on training nights. We hope by the time they leave school some will have become fully qualified UK Athletic coaches. The club, as ever, is extremely grateful for the continued coaching and guidance of Pat Read without whom our success would not be possible.

GMAC would like to welcome any new athletes from year 4 to year 9 and would very much like to hear from senior athletes (aged 11-14) to join our keen and competitive older athletes. The d'Arcy Dalton Way

The d'Arcy Dalton Way runs for 52 miles, from north of Banbury to south of Abingdon. Col WP d'Arcy Dalton was a notable defender of Oxfordshire's rights of way and the first Chairman of CPRE's Rights of Way Group. With his wife, the Colonel was long a resident in Great Milton and both can be located at rest in the churchyard here.

Cyclists Make Hay

For their late-Summer training camp this year, your village cycling association returned to the Welsh Marches (last visited in 2014), and based themselves at two substantial barn conversions in the village of Clyro, a mile from Hay-on-Wye. Clyro's sole claim to fame is its hotel, Baskerville Hall, rumoured to be the inspiration for Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's eponymous Hound.



Cathy Harrod's superb curry dinner on the Friday evening was a nervous affair, the navigator (your correspondent) having taken the opportunity to brief the cycling cohort of the meteorological and topographical challenges that lay ahead the following day. A sense of foreboding descended as the squad slunk off to bed.

In the event, Saturday dawned overcast but dry, and a peloton of seventeen (including, as ever, the unfailingly cheerful Eva and Oscar Lloyd) headed across the river Wye to Hay, and eastward alongside the river Dore in what is known locally as the Golden Valley. After a re-invigorating coffee and doughnut at the Poston Mill Tea Rooms, the valley floor was abandoned as the navigator steered a course up a steep 540 foot climb to the village of Michaelchurch Escley.

The landlord of the Bridge, with whom the lunch had been booked in advance, expressed amazement that we had actually made it, particularly having observed that most of us were not exactly in the first flush of youth!

As we set off after lunch, the Rogers took the lead roles in a farce, epic even by their exalted standards. The mild and dry weather continues, which is certainly a bonus for the crops, having said that we do not want the wheat to grow too much at this time of year as it makes it more susceptible to fungal diseases, however the rape the better it grows now the less likely it is to suffer from Pigeon damage later in the winter as they do not like landing where there is no bare ground, up one down the other that's nature,



we farmers live to learn that. I am told that the pigeons are still feeding on Beach masts which appear plentiful this year. Don't take any notice of this statement just try and remember it later in the winter, I feel in my bones, don't ask me why nor do I have any reason to say it, I just feel we could well be in for a hard winter, I will say no more as I have no real reason to make such a statement. It is not due to the fact that there are more berries about, an old wives tale, as that has nothing to do with the weather we are going to have but the weather we had last summer.

Talking of the onset of winter, wild life is making its preparations for winter small birds grouping up game birds foraging further afield as food supplies dry up, Foxes attacking our chickens as their food starts to run short, in spite of the fact I tell then there are plenty of rabbits about. Whilst on the subject of wildlife I was particularly disturbed to hear in the media of a new species of worm that had been imported probably in a pot plant and is likely to devastate our indigenous worms. This is very serious as worms are probably the most important part of the natural food chain as they help breakdown all waste material so that it can be absorbed back into the soil. Also they are also a very important part of soil structure in that they keep the soil aeriated allowing the ground to absorb water and thus help control flooding. This just illustrates the importance of proper border control that we do not seem take seriously enough. There are other countries that would not allow importation of soil unless it was either sterilized or decontaminated, it is just asking for trouble. The result this type of contamination, could be us being forced to use some very nasty chemicals to control these imported pests, just to save our natural environment. Try getting into NZ after saying you have been on a farm, you will soon understand how serious they think it is.

What a momentous year this has been, we are now coming out of the EU, Donald Trump entering the Whitehouse, and we have an unexpected new Prime Minister, and they tell me that due to the mild weather turkeys are likely to be some 10% heavier this Christmas, not good for the waist-line, there is nothing we can do about it just nature taking advantage of what is on offer, whatever next? We humans will have to

spend more on our Christmas Dinner.

I see these recent election results as showing how we the public are fed-up with the political elite, dictating to us what they want without consulting us first. It seems to me that whatever big project there is, and however many public enquiries/consultations we have, the project will go-ahead no matter what the public say. Be it 3rd runway, HS2, Chalgrove Airfield to mention but a few, I could go on, we've had enough, and no one takes any notice of our views, after all we live here and know what the traffic is like, and pay their bloated salaries through our TAXES. Since I last wrote I have learnt of even more alarming reports of development in our area. I feel somewhat trapped and cornered nowadays, threatened by the encroachment into the country side by everything that is not country, and the general pressure on everything and everybody, and no matter what we say it goes ahead because the government wants it, supposedly for the better of humanity forget the environment and wildlife. Wherever you go there are traffic jams, the sound of planes, ground and soil structure being damaged by machines, great open spaces laid bare ready for new roads, railways, Airports, or other development, trees being pulled out for the same reason, and so on. I just ask what is the most important that we preserve human nature and business, or the world? All humans seem to be doing at the moment is bombing and killing each other, time we took note of nature and what it is doing, as it solves it's problems without any fuss or doing anything different. We have just had a referendum which showed that we did not agree with being dictated to, why cannot all these issues I mention above be annotated with a tick box for in favour or against, with modern technology it could all be counted electronically for very little cost, and done at the same time as we vote, it would also save MPs time in debating the issues.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

I recently read an article in a gardening magazine which described 1960s gardens as grim. Being born in the mid-fifties, my childhood was lived in the '60s and I remember gardens with a great deal of pleasure and I don't agree with the author.

My father was a keen gardener despite having been brought up in a one-up-one-down terrace with no garden whatsoever. His own father, son of a farmer, had been a jobbing gardener all his life in addition to his day job of railway porter. I helped with weeding and my favourite weekend of the year was Easter when my dad would be in the garden all weekend planting potatoes and sowing vegetable seed in the back garden which was given over to fruit and vegetables. There was also a small greenhouse in which he grew tomatoes; this had pipes running round with a tiny solid fuel boiler which I think was fed with coal at night. I have never seen another such system other than in large country estates. One of my most powerful childhood memories is of entering the greenhouse in the sun and being on a narrow earth path surrounded by tomato plants covered in ripe fruit; sadly my greenhouse never smells so good. My brother and I also had our own small plot where we grew annuals.

Our front garden was given over to Dahlias in a multitude of bright colours which I loved; I have no memory of what was there when those in-your-face flowers were not. There were also, planted by the house wall, two mop head Hydrangeas one blue and one pink. I remember dad putting colourant on one to make it blue. In the early sixties the Dahlias were banished for ever and roses were planted throughout the front garden with the front and back walls of the house having the beautiful climbing rose 'New Dawn' trained over. Naturally, I now have that rose and others I remember including 'Peace' in our garden.

When my father died my grandfather naturally took over tending our garden until my grandmother had a stroke when he became her sole carer. It then fell to my mother to garden and, being from a gardening family, she was a natural. Everything she touched grew and it seemed sad she had never before been allowed to do more than the occasional weeding. She sourced her plants and potting compost largely from Woolworths and made her own compost at home. In the summer months we had what seemed like an endless supply of fruit and vegetables. I vividly remember the summer of '69 as being the year of the strawberry when we were picking about a stone (6kg) a day for three weeks. This was a problem in the days before freezers as my mother was unable to source enough jam jars and we children were struggling to eat strawberries for every meal including breakfast! I remember my little brother and I being sent out with punnets of strawberries to all the elderly people my mother knew; my mother was a good woman, the extent of which we only discovered at her funeral. Eventually her garden won a garden competition and she was so pleased and deservedly so.

Of my three siblings, one has a degree in horticulture and another is a keen gardener and flower arranger. My teenage son was once overheard telling his sister that there was no point fighting gardening as she was destined to be one because it was in her genes;

that is certainly true as my other half also comes from a family of keen gardeners.
