EDITORIAL

I can't believe that we are a third of the way through 2023 already! With Coronation Day and all these Bank holidays, May should be a lot of fun! I've included the Coronation Quiche Recipe on p.19 that you may like to make for any of your parties. Please note that if you are going along to the Coronation Fireworks Display on the 7th May at the Rec, you must take along the ticket that you can find in this newsletter (on p.17). Also, if you want to see the Coronation televised in the Village Hall, you must book a place (see p.5)

Bank Holidays

Bank holidays began in 1871 when banker and MP Sir John Lubbock instigated giving the working classes an extra four days a year when they could rest on top of the existing holidays of Christmas and Good Friday. Hence, Easter Monday, the first Monday in August, Whit Monday and Boxing Day were declared the first bank holidays, so called simply because the Bank of England shut on those days. In the Sixties, the August holiday was moved from the first Monday to the last. In the Seventies, New Year's Day and May Day were also designated bank holidays. There is a theory that John Lubbock picked the dates of the first bank holidays because, as a cricket fan, those were the days when village matches were played in his home county!

It may feel like we have a lot of public holidays but compared to the rest of the world we have very few – England enjoys 8 public holidays a year, Nepal has 30 and Sri Lanka has 25! Mexico is the only country to have fewer public holidays with just 7. Let's all move to Nepal!!!

Love is in the Air

Britain's only egg-laying snake, the grass snake, emerges from its hibernation in May to start looking for a mate, so you're more likely to see them out and about. Look out for their olive green or grey top with regular small black markings along the side, with the real tell-tale sign being a yellow and black 'collar' around their neck. They'll lay 30-40 eggs in June or July, with the young emerging (about the size of a pencil) in late summer.

Bats are also looking to start raising families at this time of year. The females start forming 'maternity colonies', seeking out warm dry places with other pregnant females to have their babies.

Maybugs (or doodlebugs) come out in force around late April or May. These flying beetles can be identified by their lovely fan-shaped antennae. The more official name for this beetle is 'cockchafer'. There are reports that in 1574, cockchafers came out in such numbers in the Severn Valley that the sheer volume of their carcasses disabled watermills!

CORONATION OF KING CHARLES III

Saturday 6th May 2023

We have a large television to use which will be adequately visible to the limited number we are able to have attending. On the last Coronation in 1953 of Queen Elizabeth II, most people around then managed to view it on neighbours televisions, if they did not possess one themselves.

We are advised that the procession from Buckingham Palace will take place around 10.30 am. I am sure the TV coverage will start long before then, so the Hall will be open from 9.30am. Tea and coffee will be readily available and we will give you a mid-morning snack and beverages when you need them.

The Ceromony and return to the Palace should be complete around 1.30/2pm and we plan to provide you a Ploughman's Lunch then.

The Balcony Appearance is scheduled for 4.30/5pm. We realise that the extended day might be too much for some and we expect you to leave as and when you wish.

To be fair to everyone, we need to limit this event to people actually residing in the Parish of Monkton, as I am sure you will understand.

MEMORIES OF MONKTON

School Holidays Part 2

In the 1960's, by the age of 12 during the school holidays we were out of the house and doing our own thing without our parents worrying if it was safe or where we were. We always came home at the right time. To be late meant your dinner was put in a cooling oven or put over a pan of hot water on the stove with a saucepan lid over the plate, which kept it warm, but it did not look very appetising after half an hour (well before the age of microwave ovens).

In the Summer holidays, most of us boys went to work on the local farms. At the age of 12 I spent a week and a half working on Clary Daws farm (I will write more about Clary at a later date), pulling up young cauliflower plants. There would be four or five of us of a similar age doing this under the watchful eye of Frank (Bunny) Ireland. The plants would be taken by Clary to be planted in the main field. Four more experienced boys would be on the planter behind Clary's Nuffield tractor, the most senior boy driving said tractor. This week and a half was enough for me! I think I earnt about £5.50. This was enough to get a bus to Ramsgate and back to buy myself a small rod and reel, line, hooks and lead weights. Then, with quite a few other lads and my elder brother, I would spend most of the rest of the holidays fishing in the River Stour, catching mainly eels. This is how, over the two years my Summer holidays went. Each year I worked a bit long at Clary's, as older boys left school but never more than about three weeks of the holidays.

Easter holidays could sometimes be hard for us to find things to do at the age of 12 to 14. We may get a couple of days work at Clary's. Fishing was not allowed as it was closed season. One thing that nearly all village boys, for generations had, was a 'catapult'. Days were spent in Monkton Court or Willetts Chalk Pits shooting at cans and bottles that were dumped there. A supply of small stones was always hard to find with the exception of the year when Seamark Close was built, as they dumped loads of ballast on the edge of the road at the bottom of Willetts Hill, which was full of the perfect sized pebbles.

During the Winter holidays, when we could get out, we would often spend time in one of the various small woods that were in the Parish (before Dutch Elm Disease wiped out most of them). Someone would have a box of matches and we would make a small fire out of dead wood and sit around it for hours. We must of stank of smoke when we went home but nobody seemed to mind. Something that we never did when we had a fire, was to break new branches of trees. Unfortunately, on farms now, it is seen too often people have hacked branches of trees to make a fire, which doesn't work as the wood is too green.

Thoughts on The Coronation

The Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III on 6th May will be a novel experience for most people – one has to be the King's age to have any memory of the last one.

When Queen Elizabeth II was crowned in 1953 the Service was very much in accordance with the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England. Today, it has to be said that the Anglican Church, alongside other Churches today, is smaller and less influential whilst a wide range of non-Christian Faiths have become strongly established in these islands.

It is well known that many years back the King, when Prince of Wales, acknowledged the way life was changing. Referring to one of the monarch's titles, <u>Defender of the Faith</u>, he expressed the view that, were he king, he would prefer to be a <u>Defender of Faiths</u>.

How far these sentiments will be reflected in the Coronation ceremonies we have yet to discover, but I find myself much in sympathy with the King's views.

As a priest of the Church of England I hold fast to my Christian beliefs but I have always regretted the way in which, in earlier generations, Christian missionaries sought to sideline other faiths and introduce Christian beliefs and practices without proper regard to the values and beliefs of indigenous communities. I believe that all human beings the world over are in one way or another religious beings; we all have the capacity to reach out to someone or something beyond ourselves and ask: Where do we come from? Why are we here? What is our purpose? Why is life unfair? What happens when we die? Inevitably, different societies come up with different answers.

Whatever religion we may belong to, we are all on a journey of exploration and I believe we should travel together in mutual respect. Whilst I believe in a creator God, revealed to us in Jesus Christ, I also believe we can learn from those who follow a different path.

At the end of the day, whatever our belief or non belief, we human beings are neighbours together on a planet which is now in increasing danger. If we don't soon learn to look after it properly, it may not matter so much which religious path we follow!

God save the King and, yes, let him stick to his wider vision and be for all of us a 'Defender of Faiths.'

CORONATION MEMORIES AND THOUGHTS

Some 70 years ago, on a rainy grey June day we celebrated the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. As ours was one of the few homes in our road to possess a TV, my parents invited friends and neighbours to come and watch the day's events on the then state of the art tiny 9 inch screen (not much bigger than the I pad on which I am writing today!!) Dressed in their Sunday best, they sat crowded around the little black and white picture, as the procession made its way from the palace to the Abbey. All along the route bands struck up the national anthem as the Queen passed by and as it was played each time, the assembled company all rose to their feet, stood to attention and sang heartily! This month brings another Coronation Day – now most homes have at least one large TV and many other screens at their disposal. Much of the mystique which surrounded the royal family in times past has been lost as the media has presented us with revelation and speculation of every public and sometimes most private intimate details of their lives. Our new king has certainly had his share of personal failures and mistakes, lived out in the full glare of the public gaze. Perhaps, we might do well to instead give thanks for all his positive achievements: his long-held, and in the past often derided, care and concern for the natural world and the threat of climate change. The creation of the Prince's Trust, helping young people, especially the poor and under privileged, to live fulfilled and productive lives. As we pray for our King amidst all the pomp and pageantry of the Coronation, that he may have as his exemplar, another King whose Coronation the Church celebrates later this month at Ascensiontide. 

Along with many other Parish Councils, Monkton Parish Council will not be contested by election due to insufficient candidates standing. The vacant positions will be filled by co-option, details of which will be published in due course.

Cllrs Gilly Brown, Davina Ransom and Jason Button have therefore been re-elected uncontested.

CORONATION QUICHE

In celebration of Coronation Big Lunches taking place over the Coronation weekend, Their Majesties have shared a recipe for a Coronation Quiche - featuring spinach, broad beans and tarragon.

A deep quiche with a crisp, light pastry case and delicate flavours of Spinach, Broad Beans and fresh Tarragon. Eat hot or cold with a green salad and boiled new potatoes - perfect for a Coronation Big Lunch!

Ingredients

For the Pastry

- 125g plain flour
- Pinch of salt
- 25g cold butter, diced
- 25g lard
- 2 tablespoons milk
- Or 1 x 250g block of ready-made shortcrust pastry

For the Filling

- 125ml milk
- 175ml double cream
- 2 medium eggs
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon,
- Salt and pepper
- 100g grated cheddar cheese,
- 180g cooked spinach, lightly chopped
- 60g cooked broad beans or soya beans

20cm Flan Tin Serves 6

Method

- 1. To make the pastry...
 - a) Sieve the flour and salt into a bowl; add the fats and rub the mixture together using your finger tips until you get a sandy, breadcrumb like texture.
 - b) Add the milk a little at a time and bring the ingredients together into a dough.
 - c) Cover and allow to rest in the fridge for 30-45 minutes.
- 2. Lightly flour the work surface and roll out the pastry to a circle a little larger than the top of the tin and approximately 5mm thick.
- 3. Line the tin with the pastry, taking care not to have any holes or the mixture could leak. Cover and rest for a further 30 minutes in the fridge.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 190°C.
- 5. Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, add baking beans and bake blind for 15 minutes, before removing the greaseproof paper and baking beans.
- 6. Reduce the oven temperature to 160°C.
- 7. Beat together the milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.
- 8. Scatter 1/2 of the grated cheese in the blind-baked base, top with the chopped spinach and beans and herbs, then pour over the liquid mixture.
- 9. If required gently give the mixture a delicate stir to ensure the filling is evenly dispersed but be careful not to damage the pastry case.
- 10. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Place into the oven and bake for 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.




