Hope Cove Lifeboat

Since the last edition we have been called out 8 times to a variety of incidents within our operating area. As usual the highest number of people we have rescued have been those with Stand-Up Paddle Boards, and a few to kayaks and twice to divers in difficulty. We were also involved over 2 days with the police and coastguards in the major search for a missing person. We were stood down when sadly the body was located by the police divers. A couple of our crew had a

very frightening time when they were searching one of the caves at the foot of Bolt Tail and had to make a very rapid escape from one of the resident seals that they disturbed during their search. They discovered running in a dry suit with full kit on is a real challenge!

We have had some recent contact with our Local MP Caroline Voaden who mentioned us in parliament during the recent Water Safety Education debate, you can see her speaking here:

youtu.be/BX3U0SdV2kw?si=0dudLlnEXusn6pcM and shortly after that she visited us at the lifeboat station to better understand more about us an independent lifeboat and how we operate.

We are now putting the replacement tractor unit through its final tests and adjustments to bring it fully in to service to replace our rather tired and rusty one. They look very similar as based on the same dumper. The new one has been stripped to pieces and fully galvanised and we have made some changes to the jib etc to benefit from lessons learned from the previous one.

Our next major project will be to replace the boat as that is suffering from age and use, and is requiring more and more work and parts to keep it in service. We are currently refining what we need based on the data gleaned from our rescues over the past years. This will of course mean we have to raise a considerable amount of funds to pay for this. To this end the stall selling our merchandise will be open regularly on the Harbour Beach slip on Sundays so please come and see our new range and buy some for friends and family.

Minutes of the Meeting Held at the Galmpton Village Hall, at 7:00 P.M. on Wednesday 9 July 2025

WELCOME & APOLOGIES Apologies were received from Cllr Darren James and Cllr Louise Wainwright of Devon County Council. Cllr Hocking welcomed Cllr Alan Rundle to the Parish Council.

PARISHIONERS OPEN FORUM

- 1. A parishioner addressed the Council regarding his planning application, previously discussed at the last meeting in his absence. He noted the Council's objections relating to (a) drainage and potential flood risk, and (b) overdevelopment. He advised that there would be no net increase in run-off and therefore no additional flood risk, inviting Councillors to refer to drawing 015A of the planning documents for further information.
- 2. A parishioner raised the issue of the white lines requiring repainting at the end of Burleigh Lane, noting that this was the only section missed by the Highways team. The Clerk confirmed that the matter has been pursued.



3. A parishioner expressed concern regarding the poor condition of the sign at the entrance to Hope Cove, particularly in comparison to signage in neighbouring villages. The Council discussed options including new signage incorporating required warnings or the use of separate warning signs

SOUTH HAMS DISTRICT COUNCIL Cllr Dennis read out the points of her report. The Rock Box will operate at the same locations as in the previous year. The licence stipulates a 28- day period per site, inclusive of time required to move on and off-site. Last orders are at 10:00 p.m., with the site to be cleared by 10:30 p.m. No live music is permitted at the Thurlestone location, and the operation is being monitored for compliance.

Joint local plan – Discussions are underway regarding the commencement of a review of the Joint Local Plan. It was noted that the current Joint Local Plan remains in use during the review period, and that concerns from Neighbourhood Plans should be integrated into the process.

CLERK'S REPORT There was some discussion with regard to the positioning of the current defibrillator at The Old Parsonage which will need to be considered at the next meeting.

PLANNING, LICENSING, DECISIONS & ENFORCEMENT

- a) LIST OF APPLICATIONS RECEIVED/FOR DISCUSSION:
- 1. 1723/25/HHO, Rorcam3 Beacon Point Cottages, Thurlestone Sands TQ7 3AZ, householder application for replacement of external steps with new external terrace and new windows/external doors, 17/7 Councillors agreed that the submitted plans lacked sufficient detail, raising concerns that the proposed extended terrace, elevated 1–1.5 metres above ground level, may overlook neighbouring properties on either side. A physical site inspection was deemed necessary to fully assess the impact.
- 2. 1681/25/VAR, Application for variation of condition 2 (approved drawings) of planning consent 2447/23/HHO, Sea Horses, Hope Cove TQ7 3HH, 24/07 Councillors expressed concern regarding the proposed extension of the decking, given the property's location on a downward slope and the fact that the decking would be suspended. There was unanimous objection to the variation, on the grounds that it constitutes a second attempt to extend the decking and would significantly dominate the neighbouring property below.
- 3.1863/25/PAU, The Nest Market Garden, Galmpton TQ7 3HA, application to determine if prior approval is required for a proposed change of use of agricultural buildings to a flexible use as storage (Class B8) for the purpose of storing potatoes, 24/7 A discussion ensued as to whether the property would be used for all manner of storage and what that could include. It is proposed that it would be used to store boats. Unanimous support of application.

ENFORCEMENT Please note that the Enforcement Lists are confidential and issues concerning Enforcement cannot be discussed at a public meeting. South Hams District Council are responsible for the enforcement of all planning breaches. Please will all parishioners continue to report full details of any violations that do not adhere to the original application for which permission was granted. ALL violations can be reported to Enforcement via www.southhams.gov.uk/article/3043/Report-a-Planning-Breach

BUSINESS TO BE NOTED/DISCUSSED:

- To discuss and update list of jobs for the lengthsman.
- To discuss setting up a SHPC identity on Facebook unanimous agreement for Clerk to set up a Parish Council identity on Facebook.
- To discuss the mandatory requirement to update SHPC email to a gov.uk email address and the option of a gov.uk website through Hugo Fox
- To discuss how we are proceeding with the shower project The proposed shower facility is intended to be located adjacent to the toilets on Harbour Beach.
- To discuss problems with the condition of Sandpebbles' fencing and rubbish concerns It was agreed that the owner should be contacted. Cllr Long recommended reporting the property as an untidy site via the enforcement section of the South Hams District Council website and noted that he will follow up on this.
- Issues surrounding drainage at The Lanterns were discussed. Although the site had been expected to address the drainage problems, Cllr Dennis clarified that responsibility for this matter now lies with Devon County Council, and not South Hams District Council.
- To discuss proposals for Community Composting Scheme the Council noted that formal permission from South West Water was still pending. Cllrs Dennis and Long raised concerns regarding the level of community interest and lack of volunteer support, suggesting that an alternative site in Malborough may be more appropriate and could be explored at a future date. In view of these concerns, Cllr Hocking proposed that the Parish Council discontinue the project.
- To discuss proposed dates of Neighbourhood Plan Modification consultation Cllr Hocking advised that the Council is proposing to replace the existing primary residence clause within the Neighbourhood Plan with a Section 106 clause. It was agreed that a public consultation should be promoted via the Parish Council Facebook page.
- Hope Cove Toilets following the news report on BBC Spotlight, SHDC have decided to install bins in the Hope Cove public toilets in the first instance and then in all toilets in the South Hams. <u>No official</u> <u>confirmation</u> from SHDC as yet.

Kats Presents Play On! by Rick Abbot



The National Trust

The summer has brought the heat but also some wet which means the footpaths have been growing quickly, the Rangers and volunteers have been working hard to keep them strimmed back and accessible.

We have been harvesting seed from the wildflower meadow that we established at Southdown Farm which will be used around the farm and on other sites in the local area to increase the diversity of the meadows. Increasing the amount of different native flowers attracts more insects, which are important pollinators and a key part of the food chain.

We have been working with the volunteers to complete the chestnut paling fencing at South Milton Sands, thanks to a small grant from the South Hams NT Supporters Centre we have been able to purchase the last section of materials. This will mean the dunes are fully fenced off between the two slipways and will be protected from erosion and damage.

We have been getting long spells of dry weather which mean there is an increased fire risk, we have installed extra signage in the car parks and messages on social media, please remain vigilant.

Once Bolberry Down is hay cut the sheep will be grazing this area so please keep dogs on leads to keep the sheep safe.

We are carrying out another archaeological investigation at Middle Soar in partnership with the South Devon National Landscapes team and Historic England to investigate the Scheduled Ancient Monument site. Nature Notes

Oh wow! Lots and lots of wildlife around finally!

Our reader notes 'It seems my garden is Wildlife Central at the moment! Apart from the resident pheasant and his harem (well only one lady friend this year) I've also had a visit from a grass snake, slow worms [stupid name – they are slow but they are not worms or snakes – they are legless lizards Anguis fragilis—so there!], sun lizards [might be 'sand lizard – sun lizards are South African – I think] and this morning a fox was trotting round my back garden!

The snake was a bit of a shock as it slithered up from under the gravel behind a wall whilst I was weeding, like something out of a horror movie. [Please—it is a snake not a character out of Aliens—the movie] Kept telling myself it was just a big slow worm but my nerve failed me and had to call for backup in the form of 'a neighbour' [name withheld for political reasons]. He had quite a job catching it, a lively one! and a good two foot long. In comparison, the fox sighting was lovely, a fine specimen, not a cub but possibly quite young. Don't know how it got in, can they climb/jump fences or perhaps burrow like the badgers I was plagued with a few years ago? [Yep they can climb and burrow as is testified by their presence in Clapham—London NNI's regional office]. Our other reader reported otters [Thurlestone Sands] hares pictured on the website edition—well one hare on the road to Thurlestone Sands. While we at NNI have been blessed with a yellow hammer [verified by our neighbour PG] and almost the full set of birds of prey: buzzards, merlins, kestrels, sparrow hawks, peregrine falcons and a hobby.

This year has provided a veritable plethora of small birds and creepy crawlies locally. Why? I hear you ask; well because for the first time in many years the local burial ground has been allowed to go 'wild'. This has attracted greenfinches, goldfinches, tits (blue and great) sparrows, wrens, robins and blackbirds. All balancing on long seed heads of the grasses; some are searching for the bugs of which there are many hiding in the wild vegetation (principally sorrel and docks.) Overhead the swallows, swifts and house martins wheel and reel snapping up those insects that deign to fly high above the safety of the long grass mimicking Icarus. What was once a sterile and manicured landscape has blossomed into a veritable haven for wildlife. So much so that one of the lady pheasants found it to be a suitable site to have a nest. There is only one bird missing and that is a thrush - but a short walk to Holy Trinity Galmpton will cure your sadness as thrushes abound there and even if you do not see one you can hear their beautiful song and see the remnants of their dinners in the form of broken snail shells. Speaking of which we have not done snails for a while how sad! Did you know there are over 100 species of snails in the UK? They belong to the mollusc group of Gastropoda (gastro = stomach, poda = foot). You see they eat by rasping the surfaces of leaves with a mouth that forms part of their foot. Amazing! We wonder if thrushes have a particular penchant for a special species of snail. The French do – no wonder we left the EU.

Do not contact NNI during the next couple of weeks – the team will be in Grenada counting sand grains on blissful tropical shores whilst establishing a local office.
