NEWS FROM ULCOMBE'S VILLAGE SCHOOL

It's Good to be Back!

It was fantastic to welcome everyone to the new school year. It has been wonderful getting to know the new members of our school community, and seeing all of those who have returned. As many of you will know we have had several improvements during the summer holiday and so far this term. We now have a new front wall and fence, a ramp to the playground and new fencing around the field. Even the bin area has had a make-over! Thanks to money raised by the Friends of Ulcombe school, our PTA, the Junior adventure trail has been extended with the addition of three new items. Thank you to everyone who has helped raise money for this!

There have been some improvements to the building too. The cook's office and store area has been redecorated and metal grills have been placed on the down pipes from the roof, to reduce the chance of problems arising from blocked drains.

Before the holidays we were fortunate to have some students with us. They were able to paint the fence around the Infant play area and complete some weeding and pruning. The playground is an on-going issue at present, though this should be sorted by the school holiday at the end of Term One. Immediately after the break we hope to redecorate The Owls' Nest (formerly Barn Owls Classroom).

Charity Corner

Funky Footwear Friday was on Friday 24th September. The children (and staff) came to school in school uniform, but with the weirdest, wackiest or trendiest footwear. We had children coming in wearing amazing creations on their feet. This event is arranged to raise money for the Kent Air Ambulance. Children had to bring in a donation of at least £1 to wear Funky Footwear. Thank you to everyone who helped raise money for the amazing cause.

Off to London to see an Angel

All of the children from Y1 to Y6 went to London on Tuesday 21st September. This was so that we could go to the National Gallery to see Tobias and the Angel, painted by the workshop of Andrea del Verrocchio. Each year the gallery chooses a painting and asks children to find out more about it and create work of their own from it. We are using this project, called Take One Picture, as our topic for the term. It was quite an adventure, going by train up to the capital, a first for some of the children. We took in a few of the sights, too, with older children having a brief walking tour seeing the Houses of Parliament and Downing Street. We all felt relieved to be home after an exhausting day.

Awards and Rewards

It has been a pleasure to present awards already this term. We continue to have certificates each week for Good Citizenship, Effort and Achievement and Homework (KS2 only). As well as these weekly awards we have re-introduced the Superstars book, in which children who have excelled in any aspect of school life can be

recorded. The names and reasons are read out in Friday's celebration assembly too. Children continue to earn House Points towards the House Cup awarded at the end of each year. They also have Golden Time as a constant incentive to do the right thing. It is wonderful to be able to celebrate such a wide range of achievements in our small school. We also started the year by awarding the Attendance Star Trophy to the three children who achieved 100% attendance during 2009/10. Very many congratulations to Amy, Rhiannon and Lauren!

Clubs Galore

As ever we have a fantastic variety of clubs this term. We hope we have been able to provide something for all pupils to join in with. We have art, basketball / netball, chess, choir, drama, film, football, gardening, Karate leadership UK, Kingsquad and the school web-site to choose from. Money raised by Film Club will be passed on to the School Council, who are helping to find ways to improve the school. Thank you to everyone who gives up their time to provide clubs for the children.

Library Project Update

Our Library project is still moving forward, albeit slowly. The latest news is that Bailey Partnerships, architects appointed to work on the project, have submitted planning applications to Maidstone Borough Council and Kent County Council. In case you are not already aware, KCC are intending to sell our old, disused adventure play area, but give the proceeds to us in school to improve the building. We have worked with Bailey Partnerships to plan the extension, which will house a library which can also be used as a small group room. We hope there will be sufficient funds to develop the front entrance and office areas.

Bailey have planned for four semi-detached houses on the plot of land to be sold. The plans are with MBC should you wish to see them. The planning application for the development of the school has been submitted to KCC. We wait with eager anticipation to discover the outcomes.

Latest News: The Parish Council approved plans for the extension, with the final decision to be made by KCC. The Parish Council approved the development of the disused play area in principal. They will be passing all of their thoughts to MBC.

Heaths Countryside Corridor Ice House Dig.

If you have ever wondered how meat and other produce was kept fresh before refrigeration then the answer is the ice house. These structures, usually built at least partly underground, were filled with ice in the winter and remained frozen right through the summer. The Heaths Countryside Corridor ran an event recently looking at the former Ice House of Chilston Park, near Lenham which attracted over 60 people. The weekend was spent excavating the remains of the ice house, cleaning the masonry and establishing the original shape of the building. Ges Moody from the Trust for Thanet Archaeology stated, "It's great to get so much support for the project. We have had help from the North Downs Young Archaeologists, Lenham Archaeology Society and many members of the local community." The next phase of



the restoration of the ice house will include re-pointing and protecting the remaining structure of the building for future generations. This event formed part of the Heaths Countryside Corridor's Wandering and Wondering project that aims to allow local people to explore the wildlife and history of the area around Lenham Heath and Charing Heath, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Interreg IVa.

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



Kent County Council (KCC) like all other local authorities will face a significant reduction in government funding after the Comprehensive Spending Review is announced on 20 October. At the same time, the public spotlight is on councils to demonstrate that the services they provide deliver real value for money.

It will soon be easier for the public to understand how KCC spends taxpayers' money. Kent residents are being consulted on the services they really value and whether KCC could do things differently. To help explain, KCC is making it easier for people, by publishing more financial information online.

We believe it is important to make it even easier for the public to see information about council spending. On our website (<u>www.kent.gov.uk</u>) we have published the salaries, expenses, hospitality received and declined, declarations of interest and job descriptions of our most senior managers.

We have also published invoices worth more than £500 paid by KCC's Environment, Highways and Waste department. This will then happen every month and the invoices of other KCC departments will follow shortly afterwards.

KCC is also introducing a new way of tracking performance for the first time. This will now be done every three months rather than once a year. This includes information on how KCC is delivering services such as waste management, children's social care and fixing Kent's roads and pavements.

We want the public to know how well we are delivering on our targets. Publishing quarterly statistics about our performance makes us more accountable and open so that people can see how we are running vital services such as social care and highways. The public will be able to use this information and tell KCC what they think, giving them the opportunity to help shape services.

In October, Kent County Council will be launching its campaign '*Your voice, your services*'. The aim is to listen to and involve people to see what services they really value and if KCC should do things differently. The campaign will be highlighted in Around Kent, the residents' magazine, on the council's website and at neighbourhood forums. The magazine will include a questionnaire aimed at finding out what the public's priorities are.

Tackling the problem of lorry chaos

Kent Highway Services (KHS) has launched a major action programme to tackle the problem of lorries causing disruption and traffic chaos in town centres and narrow rural roads.

Last year nearly 3.2 million freight lorries passed through the ports of Dover and Ramsgate, and the Channel Tunnel – that's an average of 8,700 a day. Dover, meanwhile, expects to see an increase of around 50% in the number of HGVs using the port over the next two decades.

The work, which is expected to take between 12-18 months, will involve a complete overhaul of Kent's current lorry-route map, a county-wide review of lorry directional and regulatory signs and a review of Traffic Regulation Orders such as weight, height and width restrictions – which set out where Heavy Goods Vehicles are prevented from driving.

KHS will work with satellite navigation firms to ensure lorry drivers are provided with the best routes for commercial traffic, rather than car satellite navigation information. KHS is also in consultation with the two leading industry bodies, the Freight Transport Association and the Road Haulage Association.

Lorries can cause tremendous problems for residents and businesses when they use the wrong road and get stuck. They also rumble through our small villages day in, day out, and get stuck on inappropriate town centre roads, in some cases causing damage to property. Of course, companies have to use our roads as part of their normal operations and we do not want to limit businesses. This is about putting lorries on the best available routes. We will look at where HGVs want and need to travel and map out routes that will minimise disruption to residents and other business.

District councils are responsible for approving the development of industrial units and the licences that allow them to operate. KHS will also look at working more closely with the planning authorities, so that it is consulted on preferred lorry routes when operating licences are granted.

KHS is also tackling specific, local lorry-related issues by developing tailored plans to fix them, such as restricting through lorry traffic from the High Street, in Sevenoaks. The Grafty Gourmet

This is a classic way of cooking a French stew, by cooking the ingredients on a low heat, standing in for a day to marinate, and reheating slowly before eating. The flavour is mouth watering.

Marinated Beef Stew (serves 6):

3 lbs stewing beef, in 2-inch cubes	8 oz bacon, diced
1 litre red wine	Mixed herbs
3 carrots peeled and sliced	1 shot of brandy
2 garlic cloves, minced	1 thick ham, diced
3 onions, chopped	5 tbsp oil or butter
3 shallots, chopped	salt and pepper

1. Melt butter or oil in a large pan and brown meat cubes on all sides.

2. Add bacon and brown, then add a pinch of salt and pepper. Add onions, shallots, carrots, ham, and herbs and mix well.

3. Warm the brandy in a small pan, pour over the meat and light it with a match and flambé it.

4. Add minced garlic. Warm the red wine in a separate pan and pour over the meat. Transfer to a large casserole dish.

5. Cover and cook over very low heat for 2 hours. Turn off heat, do not open lid and let stand until the next day without refrigerating. The next day, let it simmer on low heat for another 2 hours. Serve hot.

The October Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Virgo throughout October.

We have all noticed how cold it has become recently, and I'm afraid, to crown it all, British Summer Time ends on 31^{st} October, when clocks should be put back one hour.

New Moon occurs on Thursday 7th October, when it appears in the constellation of Gemini. Full Moon is on Saturday 23rd October, when it is in Pisces, close to the border with Aries.

Mercury is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 17th October, so we are unlikely to see this elusive planet this month.

Venus is in inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun) on 29th October, so it will not be possible to see the "Evening Star" this month.

Mars sets less than an hour after the Sun, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter is the only planet we can see this month, as it is in opposition to the Sun. It can be seen due south, and it is moving slowly south-westwards out of the constellation of Pisces, entering Aquarius on $15^{\rm th}$ October. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons.

Saturn is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 1^{st} October, and will therefore not be visible this month.

During the second half of October we can see the Orionid meteor shower. They appear to radiate from the northern part of Orion, and will probably peak around 22nd October. The best time to view them is in the early hours of the morning. This is also the best time of the year to see sporadic meteors. These can be seen at any time and in any part of the sky.

Some of you may have read recently in the papers that scientists have found that climbing just a couple of steps upstairs will age you. Proving one of Einstein's theories of relativity, that clocks will run faster the further away from the ground, because they are subject to less gravitational force. Of course the time differences are miniscule, and will have no affect on ones normal lifespan. Still perhaps it would be wise to buy a bungalow! Incidentally, GPS systems have to adjust for this, otherwise locations could be as much as 6 miles out.

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


Graham Howkind, a tool sharpener, will be at Grafty Green garden centre from 10am to 4pm on Friday 8th October. He has already improved one mower!

Maidstone

(An extract from a late 1920's edition of the "Newnes motorists touring guide")

"A walk through the streets of Maidstone provides delights at every turn. In Knightrider Street is Digons, now the vicarage, where lived Lawrence Washington 1602-19. Knightrider House, nearly opposite, was the residence of William Shipley, one of the founders of the Society of Arts, now the Royal Academy. In Stone Street is a fine Tudor residence (re-fronted 1716) which contains a beautiful panelled hall. In Week Street there is a house dated 1680 with a pargetted front.

On no account should the Corporation Museum and Bentlif Art Gallery be missed. They are to be found in St. Faith Street, adjoining the Brenchley Public Gardens and within a few minutes' walk of Maidstone East Railway Station. The place was formerly Chillington Manor House, and this is one of the very few instances in the country where a museum is actually housed in an old Tudor mansion"

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Christian Message October 2010

Harvest Time

By the time this Newsletter comes out, we will have celebrated Harvest with our Harvest Thanksgiving and our Harvest Supper in the Village Hall. Throughout the centuries, harvest has always been celebrated by the church. One of our most well known hymns is:

> We plough the Fields and scatter the good seed on the land, But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand.

But when that hymn was written two hundred years ago, life was very different. At harvest time, most of the villagers would be out in the fields bringing in the harvest. Yet, as I write this, the corn in the field adjacent to my garden is being cut - not with an army of men and women with scythes as in the past, but by a huge and noisy machine rather like some horrendous space monster. The whole field has been cut in a day, the corn sifted and the chaff baled and carted off.

It makes one think how times have changed – and how much easier life is for us here in the west than in the old days. But at this time of year one cannot help but think about the thousands of people across the world for whom there will be no harvest because of floods, droughts, and other natural disasters. The picture that stays in the mind the most at this time is of the vast area of flooded fields in Pakistan, and the thousands forced to flee their homes.

The Bible is full of stories about harvest. One of my favourites is about Ruth, a Moabite woman, who marries a refugee who has come to her country with his brother and his parents because of famine in their land. Her husband, his father and his brother all die, and Ruth's mother-in-law, Naomi, decides to go back to her homeland. Although Naomi tries to persuade Ruth not to go with her, Ruth insists, saying in these lovely words, 'Entreat me not to leave you or forsake you. Where you go, I will go, your people will be my people, and your God my God.' Ruth's loyalty is rewarded when, at harvest time, she is given permission by one of Naomi's relatives, Boaz, to glean in his fields after the harvest is collected. He sees Ruth and marries her.

It's a beautiful story and one is struck not only by Ruth's loyalty and love, but by her courage in leaving behind everything she was familiar with to go to a foreign land in support of her widowed mother-in-law, to live with strangers, and worship a foreign God. It makes one think of the millions of refugees who are forced to leave their homeland because of famine, flood, earthquakes or political upheaval, and take up residence in foreign lands where they are not always welcome. But Jesus enjoined us all to welcome the refugee. He told a story about the end time when people are separated into two groups 'as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats.' He

said to the one group, 'when I was hungry, you gave me food, when thirsty, you gave me drink, when a stranger, you took me into your home, when naked you clothed me, when I was ill you came to my help, and when in prison you visited me.' And the people, puzzled, asked Jesus when they did that for him, and he said 'I tell you truly: anything you did for one of my brothers here, however insignificant, you did for me.'

This seems to embody what the Christian life is all about. Though for some it may seem incomprehensible, for others difficult, and for others something they don't want to think about, the Christian life is simple. Jesus said, 'The first commandment is this, to love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, all your mind and with all your strength, and the second commandment is this: you must love your neighbour as yourself.'
