Dear Friends,

We find ourselves 'in the bleak mid-winter'. The evenings are dark, the mornings are dark. The nights, and days, are cold. The trees are bare, the sun is low, the days are short. The wind is crisp on our faces, the hard ground crunches beneath our feet. We wrap up warm, we light our fires, and we hunker down. We wait patiently, hopefully, expectantly, for the light to come.

The season of Advent is all about waiting. For some, the wait is for all the joy of the Christmas Season. For others, the wait is for the sense of rest and relief that the holidays bring, in the hope that stresses and strains can be put to bed for at least a little while. For some, the wait is for the fanfare of Christmas to be over. It is a season that is not easy for everyone.

For me personally, Christmas is one of the most exciting times of the year. In fact, my excitement levels start to grow sometime around mid-November! But this year, things might well be very different. I might not be able to see family and friends. We might not be allowed to sing carols in church. We might not be allowed to share both wine and bread at Holy Communion on Christmas-Eve. I can't help but feel so sad when I consider the possibility of not doing these things.

But I then remember what the season of Advent is really all about. Waiting. Waiting for Christmas? Well, partly. That's half the answer.

For the church, the wait is for light to come. For darkness to be dispersed. For God to come into our human existence. For Emmanuel: 'God-with us.' For Jesus Christ. This is why I said that waiting for Christmas is half the answer. Christians do wait for Christmas in Advent, where we celebrate the birth of Jesus; the coming of God into our humanity two thousand years ago. But we wait for this celebration with the expectation, the reality, the un-dying hope that Jesus will one day come again; that the light of God will once again break forth into our world, that a new reality will come and justice and peace will be seen in all the earth.

This might all sound a bit overly optimistic. But I believe we can already glimpse it. Each time we hear stories of communities coming together, of neighbours being there for each other, of people doing all that it takes in order to help others. In each of these moments we see love, light, and, I believe, God. We have seen this a lot this year; a year that has been so difficult for all of us. But for me, the hope of Advent remains as strong as ever. For even in a time that has felt so difficult, stories of love and hope have broken through the despair. Even in a time that feels so dark, glimpses of light have shone bright in the darkness. Even where hope has felt as distant as the far horizon, the love of God has been as close as our own breath. All of this a glimpse of the future reality that the Church waits in expectation for.

So, as we enter Advent and wait for a Christmas that might feel difficult this year, let us remember this. Darkness and despair are not eternal. But love, hope, and light are. These are here, and these will come. And so we wait.

A trip down Memory lane to 13th October 2019

Last year, we were successful in nominating Helen Oldham our retired organist and choir mistress for the St Ethelbert's award which is presented by Hereford Cathedral to people who have given long and outstanding services to the diocese, their local church and community.

Helen became organist and choir mistress at St. Andrew's Church, Hope Bowdler in 1975 and remained in that post until she was 85. She then retired but continued to sing in the choir and play piano for our choir practices only ceasing to do this earlier this year when the winter weather and increasing mobility problems have made it difficult for Helen now in her 97th year to continue. During Helen's time as organist and choir mistress, she worked tirelessly with the choir taking them to new horizons introducing new communion service music and regular singing of anthems. Through the training she gave to the choir she enabled them to become involved in Hereford Diocesan and Lichfield Cathedral Choir festivals. Many enjoyable times were had by all particularly having tea and cakes at some tea



rooms close to Lichfield Cathedral and in Hereford having a picnic lunch in the cloister gardens or eating in the cathedral restaurant.

Helen set up a music group in her house for the young children in the locality and was instrumental in getting them involved in worship through music. She also organised concerts for the choir and the children who sang and played a variety of musical instruments. She involved as many children as she could and even if they could not read music, she found a way of including them. Helen spent many a laborious hour writing out music parts for the children and the choir which before photocopying became available was quite a task.

In the wider community, she opened her garden and house and hosted several church fetes as well as being a very active fundraiser in earlier years. In Church Stretton, she was the Golden Age Retirement Group Choir Mistress. In the late 1970s and continuing for some time through the 1980s, she assisted with the music in St. Laurence's primary and junior school on a voluntary basis.

Helen received a letter in late Summer 2019 inviting her to attend a Choral Evensong in Hereford Cathedral to receive the St. Ethelbert's Award for her long and diligent services to the Diocese. The cream on the cake for all of us was that on October 13th 2019, 17 parishioners from our Apedale Group had a very enjoyable coach outing to Hereford Cathedral to attend the Evensong Service where Helen and 19 other people in the diocese were presented with the St. Ethelbert's Award. It was an amazing and poignant occasion for all, particularly Helen's children who had travelled from London and Winchester to be with her on this very special occasion.

We are all so grateful to Helen for all she has done during her long service in St. Andrew's Parish. We have all benefited so much from her tireless work particularly with her musical input which was so refreshing and enjoyable. Jean Webb

LETTER FROM THE BISHOP FOR December 2020

Most human beings have a natural sense of justice. We don't think it right that people can commit crime and get away with it. It was important at the end of WWII that those guilty of war crimes were seen to be punished. The Nuremberg trials did not accept excuses that they were only obeying orders. It was essential that those accused accepted personal responsibility and its consequences.

In the story of the Garden of Eden in the first book of the Bible, one of the characteristics of sin was evading responsibility. Adam blamed Eve, Eve blamed the serpent, and then they ran and hid when God showed up. The story is a powerful one. It identifies a defining human characteristic. When we are bang to rights, we all tend to try to excuse and blame someone else for our misdoings.

Advent is for Christians a season where we seek to reflect on our own responsibility and accountability before God. For many people, being accountable in this way sits uncomfortably with popular myths about what God is really like. We are comfortable with a cosmic grandfather or Father Christmas type figure, whom we expect to keep the good times rolling. However, we get cross if he doesn't do his job properly and things like COVID happen, or heaven forfend, he expects something of us.

Religion can be terribly abused if people's distorted view of God leads them to think they can do his job of judgement for him. ISIS is a case in point. However, faith can be a powerful corrective if we recognise our accountability. Christians sum it up in the creed that says, "one day he will return to judge the living and the dead". To have our inner secrets exposed in this way would be a frightening thing. But it's this bad news that led Christians to describe the message of Jesus as such very good news. There is judgement, but with Jesus there is also forgiveness. Advent anticipates the former, but prepares us for Christmas when we rejoice in the gift that sets us free.

The Shropshire Hills Conservation Fund is open for applications.

This is a small grant pot, administered by the Shropshire Hills AONB Trust, which can award up to £2,000 towards local projects that help to conserve, enhance and raise awareness of the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). Over the years, the Fund has supported many local conservation, community and educational projects. From habitat management for rare species such as the Wood White butterfly, whinchat, dormice and curlew, to creating pollinator gardens in community spaces, restoring village verges and enabling volunteers to monitor wildlife.

The fund has also helped lots of school children and young people to engage with their local landscape through various outdoor activities including using digital media.

Please get in touch with us if you have a project in mind. Priority areas for projects are:

Conserving and enhancing the natural beauty, landscape, wildlife or heritage of the Shropshire Hills AONB. Educational and awareness-raising activities relating to the AONB and its conservation, especially involving young people.

Public, private, voluntary sector and community groups can apply, along with individuals and businesses, but in all cases **the project must show a clear public benefit**. Grants are generally awarded for activity within a particular Financial Year (April to the end of March). So, applications this autumn/winter would be assessed for projects starting on or after 1st April 2021.

For starters, please email *shropshirehillsaonb@shropshire.gov.uk* to request a project ideas form. This is a short (two sides of A4) form to briefly describe your project idea. Once you have filled it in and returned to us, we will get in touch with you to discuss your project in more detail and will be able to recommend whether your project should progress to a full application.

Deadline for receiving your project idea form is 22nd February 2021 Deadline for full applications is 8th March 2021. 
You need:
