Curiosity Is In The Air

Much to my surprise, on returning from being out and about this morning, I found on my doormat a hand written envelope post marked Torteval Guernsey. I was, to say the least, curious as I ripped open the envelope. The enclosed letter was making an enquiry regarding a mid-air collison which took place on 30th August 1943 between two Boeing B17s known as Flying Fortresses. The accident occurred north of Portsmouth. Both planes survived the incident with one landing somewhere nearby... "13 miles north of Portsmouth". The correspondent is hoping that someone from the locality may know where 42-29962 landed. If, by chance, you have any information regarding this incident please be in touch and I will give you the contact details.

I have no idea what connection the gentleman that wrote had to this incident and I do wonder what his interest is. I'm curious. Curiosity, that strong desire to know about something or someone, is an interesting phenomena as it is, for most of us at some point in our lives, a driving force. Think for a moment of something that has sparked your curiosity. Living in the Rectory on Doctor's Lane, for example, the resident bird population have caused me to be curious, bird book in hand I now attempt to categorize the local avian population.

Sometimes however, our curiosity leads us into considering or reflecting on particular aspects of our life. Perhaps it is the very nature of November, with the nights drawing in,





curtains closed and fires lit, that we become more reflective. November, is I think, a time for both remembering and story telling. For many, enquiries into family history have become very popular in recent years. These explorations may be spurred on by programmes such as 'Who Do You Think You Are?' Perhaps there is a hope when an individual begins their quest that there will be connections to royalty or people of means, but I expect for most of us our ancestors are just ordinary people who lived their lives at a particular time in history dealing with the events of the day. Many of us hold stories of the Second World War, perhaps told to us by parents or grandparents. If, however, you come from a family of story tellers then the stories may go back much further. The stories we remember and pass on are important as they define who we are and how we react to the situations in which we find ourselves. For example I hold stories of a maiden aunt, Geraldine Carlton, who in the September of 1918 travelled to Boston Massachusetts to begin her nurses training. In October of that year the Spanish Flu epidemic began and, as remarkable as it may sound, in that same September my dad began his medical training at McGill University in Montreal. Times not very different from the situation in which we find ourselves.

I think that, in a bizarre way, stories of crises may actually sometimes give us hope. It is true that not every individual survived in past crises but generally the human race continues simply to trudge on. The telling of stories has gone on for centuries, with some of the oldest stories which inform our lives, being recorded in the Old Testament. It is thought that those stories were begun to have been recorded around 1200 BC but that they tell of much earlier civilizations. Truthfully, the Old Testament in parts is pretty grim reading with, in some books, page after page speaking of murder, death and destruction. I suppose the question might be asked, "why do we read this stuff? Perhaps the answer lies in the notion that stories have outcomes, that there is hope and that even in the worst of times there are good people who help others and create communities and uphold family values. And I believe that God accompanies his people.

In so many ways November, culturally, is our remembering month. We begin with the Feasts of All Saints on the 1st where the church remembers "saints and martyrs, known and unknown", and on the 2nd the Feast of All Souls where we remember all those who have died. Around the world many cultures celebrate these feasts. In Mexico it is a great festival called el Dia de los Muertos or the Day of the Dead. In that culture death is truly seen as a continuation of life, only in a different place and so during that festival the deceased are remembered, prayed for and welcomed into family homes in tangible ways. In recent years in the UK it has become commonplace for services to be held in parish churches that give individuals the opportunity to light a candle in memory of a loved one and to take the time to remember and pray. Unfortunately this year that will not be possible. However, we will hold a service of Evening Prayer at 4pm at West Meon Parish Church on Sunday the 1st of November. At that service the names of those who have died over the past 5 years will be read out and they and those who mourn will be remembered in prayer.

Remembrance Sunday on the 8th is normally a service which is very well attended. We have decided that, due to our current number restrictions, all of that service will take place out of doors this year at the war memorial in front of West Meon Parish Church, St John the Evangelist.

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
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That service will begin at 10.45am. Prior to that service a service of Holy Communion will take place at The Church of Our Lady, Warnford at 9am.

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Harvest Festival Generosity

An enormous thank you to everyone who contributed goods to the church's harvest festival collection for the Petersfield food bank. There was an unprecedented response to this year's request for donations and we were able to deliver an entire carload of bags full to the brim with groceries. The volunteers at the food bank were delighted and amazed by the amount we brought them. The church received the following message in an email from Terry Doubleday, Chair of the PACT (Petersfield Area Churches Together) food bank:

'Thank you and all your parishioners for the marvellous Harvest Festival donations you delivered to the PACT Food Bank last week. It is most appreciated as the number of packs we are currently distributing is still high in comparison to the beginning of the year. Our stocks were greatly depleted during the Covid-19 lockdown when the volumes increased four-fold and we were open five days a week.'

We have decided to continue to make our church a drop-off point for food bank donations. Donations may be left in the plastic container in the kitchen area. They will be delivered to the food bank every couple of weeks or so.

The food bank can accept tins and packaged goods, but not fresh food. Their website (www. pact.org.uk/pact_food_store.asp) has information about the items they are short of at any particular time, which often include things like shampoo, soap and toothpaste, as well as specific types of food. Packs of food and other supplies are given to people in need in our area. In the first six months of this year, the Petersfield food bank distributed 534 packs to 868 adults and 468 children. The equivalent figure for last year was 160 packs to 236 adults and 90 children, so you can see that the need is particularly great at the moment.

Recipients have to be referred to the food bank by authorised organisations, which include churches, GP surgeries and council services, and the website also has information about who to contact if you need a referral.


the cake. This was gratefully received by Macmillan Cancer Relief Fund and will help to fund a Macmillan nurse for a day.

Our new Year R and new children in other year groups have settled in well and despite having missed last term, all the children have settled back into school very well. They have adjusted to restrictions quickly, although we still would rather not have to teach them in rows all the time.

Our focus has been the health and well - being of the children and staff, but as we approach half term, we are preparing for

virtual parents' meetings and discussions about where possible gaps might be and how we are ensuring there is a catch up curriculum in place.





The staggered start and finish times to allow for social distancing are working well, but we are missing the face to face interaction with parents and virtual meetings are not the same.

Before and after school club, Aspire coaching and music lessons continue and we have not had to close any 'bubbles' and long may it last!

We are keeping our curriculum broad and balanced and there is a whole school focus on Art and DT at the moment, with the

older classes focussing on Monet and the youngest children making puppets.

Flick Drummond MP visited the school and her article in the local papers talked about our 'can do' attitude, as we endeavour to make school life as normal as possible for the children. She was impressed with our covid procedures and she and a music peripatetic teacher said how safe they felt, as we introduced masks in communal areas for



staff and visitors at the beginning of term. Jack and Alex Hollands also showed her their comprehensive files of work they completed during lockdown, following work set by teachers online.

Harvest worked well with bubbles socially distanced in the church and Reverend Mary and Reverend Jane led the service. Rachell Barnett from the village shop, kindly distributed the food gifts that the children brought in around the village. We had just started to prepare similarly 'socially distanced' Remembrance and Nativity events, but have now been told by the Diocese that the church is not allowing events in the church because of the rise in covid cases. This is a real shame. David is fascinated with the passage of time, the transience of things, the slow, inexorable metamorphosis of one thing into another and the joy of existence in the world.



WMPC Grants Policy. Just a reminder that small Grants are available to assist in community projects. If you have a community project that needs some extra funding, please see our website (westmeonpc.org.uk – Parish Council, Grant Applications) for further details. Closing date for applications during the current financial year is 28th February 2021.

Autumn events and observances. To ensure that Hampshire residents are prepared to mark celebratory events and observances over the coming months in a Covid-safe way, the County Council continues to communicate the key messages outlined below. The Director of Public Health, Simon Bryant, has written to all District/Borough Council Chief Executives outlining current public health advice and the communications approach that the Authority will take in the coming months. In addition, a press release will be published containing advice for residents on events over the autumn and winter, and targeted social media campaigns will be launched. The specific advice for this season's upcoming events is as follows:

Halloween - Trick or Treating. The practice of door knocking is not recommended because of difficulties adhering to social distancing guidelines, risks associated with potential contact, mixing of multiple households and spread of the virus through contact with shared surfaces, including shared buckets of treats. Government guidance applies to any social gatherings of people of all ages both in and outdoors. This includes meeting in groups of six people or less when seeing friends and family and the need to following social distancing rules. Residents are encouraged to celebrate within their own household and to find alternative and creative ways of doing so.

Bonfire Night. Large events to celebrate Bonfire night are strongly discouraged because of the potential for mixing of large numbers of people, the risk of infection spreading from other areas of the community, and the potential for required support from emergency services. Private events must adhere to government guidance around gathering and social distancing, with people encouraged to watch firework displays virtually wherever possible. Hampshire County Council will be working with the Fire Service to ensure appropriate messaging around safety, including the requirement to be Covid safe.

Remembrance Day. Hampshire County Council will work with its partners to ensure that any events taking place are able to go ahead safely and are planned in accordance with government guidelines. Where events do take place, strict social distancing must apply with public attendance carefully managed by the event organisers. Parades are strongly discouraged because of the potential for mixing of large numbers of people and the risk of infection spreading from other areas of the community. The County Council will work with the faith community to provide continued support, particularly with regards to special ceremonies and support for our armed forces and veterans. Overall, wherever possible, private moments of remembrance and reflection are encouraged.

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West Meon's Pavilion Makes Progress

At a time when we use our public spaces less it's perhaps a good time to reflect on how some of our facilities came into being and the hard work (and fun) of our villagers in making them happen. This is an extract from an archive newspaper article originally published locally in 1981.

'Over the past few years a number of villages have taken in hand enterprises which, in the event, have proved to be considerably more costly than had been visualised. West Meon, having embarked on the construction of a new pavilion on the Recreation Ground, is no exception, and, particularly during the past twelve months, the Sports Club has had some anxious moments as costs have continued to outreach the available funds.

However a lot of ingenuity and a great deal of perseverence on the part of a relatively few dedicated people point to a reward. The sum outstanding at the preent time is still considerable but, by virute of interest-free loans and a number of small but cumulatively effective fund-raising events, it seems likely that before the cricket season opens, West Meon will have a fine a pavilion as any village could wish for.



An hour of great fun on Sunday morning brought a further £130 to the club. At 11 o'clock a portion of the High Street outside the "Thomas Lord" was marked with flags and empty oil drums to form a track over which a series of pancake races were run. With David Edwards and David Hoppe acting as the marshals, motorists showed great tolerance in permitting themselves to be held up whilst each race was in progress. The race for children under five was won by Rachael Kaleta. Astria De Cosson won the five to ten years old; and the girls' ascendancy was continued when Sarah Brock came in first in

Nobody seemed to know the age qualification for the geriatrics' race but, eventually, anybody who "felt old" was accepted, and Lindsay Pirie was first past the post.

There followed an unscheduled event for those who sported a beard. Although possessing no more than a moustache, Police Constable Burrett, being off duty, was persuaded that this was a mere technicality and everyone was delighted when he won his race in fine style. PC Burrett only came to the village within the past few weeks to replace PC Wall-Palmer. Mr Burrett's early involvement is much appreciated in a village which has traditionally enjoyed very good relations with its policemen.

Lawrence Beazley became the overall winner in the "race of the winners" and they shared in a variety of prizes all of which had been donated. They ranged from sweets and games for the children, to more appropriate rewards for the grown-ups - which included half a bottle of vodka for PC Burrett!

Mrs Nina Byles and Mrs Caroline Broadhurst provided the pancakes. "They were good quality pancakes when we started," said Mrs Byles, "but they were decidely the worse for wear by the time the racing was over." None had escaped several encounters with the ground as competitors failed in their attempts to toss them as they ran; and one particular puddle claimed more than its fair share of casualties. However, the morning stayed dry and a lot of people had a lot of fun. Similarly, Mrs Byles' chickens appreciated whatever remained of the pancakes.

The "Thomas Lord" having been the starting point, it was appropriate that at the end of the morning, Derek Gibson, the landlord and for a long time the club's Chairman, should be mine host to a full house. At the bar a challenge was put down by the football team to the ladies' hockey team and was promptly accepted.
