Valley Bridge in the 1890's

This is one of the best photographs I have found of the original Valley Bridge. I had always thought that the new bridge incorporated parts of the old bridge when it was rebuilt in 1926 to 1928. However I recently discovered a packet of photographs in the Historic England Archive that suggests that the old bridge was completely dismantled and destroyed during the construction process for the present bridge.

Meeting with Estates

We finally met with the Estates Department of Scarborough Borough Council regarding the renovation work we want to do on the grotto and Vernon Road footbridge railings. It was quite a productive meeting and we now have a way forward on this project. The Parks and Gardens Department will act as the responsible body, getting estimates and arranging for the work to be carried out and the Friends will obtain the funds. The Estates Department will be kept up to date with developments but do not appear to want to be closely involved in the actual work. Felicity and I have a meeting planned for this week with Parks and Gardens to discuss the schedule of works.

Scilla Siberica

There has always been a small colony of Scilla siberica on the rockery below the art gallery but the display this year is exceptional. Its common name is the Siberian Squill although it doesn't appear to be native to Siberia, originating instead from Central Russia and Asia Minor. The vivid blue colour is a little unusual among spring flowers, although a white form of the plant also exists. It is extremely hardy and prefers shade, in fact an ideal plant for Valley Gardens.

In fact there has been a lot of colour already this year in the park. The snowdrops are going over now but gave an excellent display and the daffodils are just beginning to flower (see left). There are a lot of bluebells and wild garlic beginning to emerge and should give a good display later in the spring. In a later newsletter I will look at the differences between the English and Spanish Bluebell and see if we can work out which type we have in the gardens
