The view from the Ice House Grotto

The 'Ice House'

I've always known the cave like structure near the bridge over Vernon Road as the Ice House. However I have my doubts that it was actually built as an ice house, I think it is more likely to be a grotto or hermitage, both of which were common Victorian garden features. An ice house would often have an entrance like ours but would then open up into a deep, often brick lined pit where the ice was stored. Chris Cooper and Andrew Clay are going to scour the Wood End records to see if there is any information that might throw light on its origins.

What is not in doubt is the awful state the building is in. It is full of rubbish and needs some restoration to replace missing stones. Putting it right will require the fitting of a strong, possibly steel, door and the employment of a craftsman to restore the stonework. This will require the committee to apply for grants and would be an ideal first project of this type for the group to attempt.

The area surrounding the feature would also benefit from some tidying up and it was suggested that a seat might be placed here to take advantage of the view towards the sea. A certain amount of concern was expressed about this idea as some committee members felt that it would become the focus of anti social behaviour.

However if we wish to tackle anti social behaviour by increasing the number of people using the park then it has to be more welcoming and seating is an important element of that. Of course it is never pleasant when an area is covered in litter or seats are vandalised but should policy be dictated by what a few idiots might do? Clearly, it is important that the matter is very carefully considered before a decision is taken and grants applied for.

It would be interesting to know what other people feel about this issue. Some feedback would be very welcome.
