These included everything from paintings and drawings to pottery, knitting, models and woodworking. During the exhibition, Ma Strange and her team were at full pelt serving a steady stream of delicious cream teas and cakes.

Tar Road Planning Applications Dismissed

The Lowlands Planning Committee accepted the recommendation of the planning officers and unanimously refused all three planning applications for change of use to a gypsy site at their monthly meeting on Monday 17 May. A big thank you to the many local residents who turned out to witness the debate, and heard Emma Hare and Charles Mathew speak.

The Inspector found that: "development of the site would give rise to unreasonable living conditions for the occupiers of the site and the occupiers of adjoining properties by reason of the risks of living on a landfill site, that the development harmed the setting of a listed building, harmed the character and appearance of the area and represented unsustainable development, poorly served by pedestrian modes of transport and severed from local facilities, with some additional harm to the amenity of adjoining occupiers, and that the benefits of the scheme in terms of meeting a need for such sites, the personal circumstances of the applicants and the availability of alternative sites did not outweigh these concerns.

"The Local Planning Authority are not persuaded that the limited additional information provided seeking to address the contamination issue nor the changes to legislation have materially altered the position such that an approval could be justified.

"In addition, it has not been demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Local Planning Authority that the development can be undertaken without harm to a protected species. It is not considered that the benefits of the development outweigh the harm."

Once again, we have an outstanding School!

Stanton Harcourt CE Primary School was inspected recently by the National Society, the body which monitors the distinctiveness and effectiveness of Anglican schools. The School was judged as Outstanding – the highest possible grade – in all categories: meeting the needs of all learners, the impact of Collective Worship, and the effectiveness of leadership and management of the School. The staff work hard to ensure that all children have an outstanding education at the School and this is an excellent result, highlighting especially the emphasis on Christian values and behaviour, and the close links we have with St Michael's Church.

The School has also had a very productive time in May and June this year, including a couple of float painting sessions for Festival Week. Other activities have included a visit from Mr Laurence Bee to talk about fossils (see picture opposite), using the outdoor classroom and explaining what fossils are and where they can be found. The children in Class 3 were particularly keen on the ammonites!

The travelling book fair visited the School in late May. This is always a popular event and the choice of books for sale seems to appeal to all ages across the School. Class 2 had great fun with a drama workshop by the excellent Creation Theatre group – their theme was based on Aesop's fable of the goose which laid the golden eggs.

The School also organised its important yearly Disability Awareness Day, everyone brought their teddy bear, and £73.50 was raised for Action Medical Research for Children. The day was led by Mrs Becky Clark and this time the focus was on people with sight and hearing impairments. Some of the children were blindfolded, trying to identify various objects by touch only.

There has also been an accelerated Maths Day for some Year 6 children, and Class 2 participated in the Festival of Voices in late June. The very popular Teacher Swap day is also coming up in July!

The School is urgently looking for more community members who would be able to help with extra-curricular activities, especially reading – any help is hugely appreciated.

Finally, do you have any Lego you could donate to the School? The children would like to start up a Lego club and, although they're interested in bringing and showing off their own creations, the School itself doesn't actually have much Lego! Can you help?

Stanton Harcourt and Sutton Ultra-Fast Broadband – almost there, but need your help

It is now almost a year since we formed the Stanton Harcourt and Sutton Ultra-Fast Broadband Group, with the goal of providing the Village with a state-of-the-art fibre optic broadband network. We identified and recommended Gigaclear's pure fibre network as the only viable solution, and have been working hard since then to reach Gigaclear's target of 140 sign-ups that will trigger the design and installation of the network. 140 households represents ~30% of the Stanton Harcourt and Sutton community and is the minimum level of take-up for the project to be financially viable.

In mid June, we had 107 orders confirmed with Gigaclear, with another 10 or so anticipated from recent discussions. This would get us to 117, leaving us just 23 more to get us across the finishing line! There continues to be a slow but steady trickle of new sign-ups.

We are now very close to hitting the target and joining communities including Appleton with Eaton, Fyfield and Tubney, Frilford, Cothill and Garford, and Otmoor, which are already either enjoying or about to enjoy all the benefits of high speed connectivity such as:

- Fast internet browsing
- HD video streaming
- Catch-up TV such as BBC iPlayer
- High-quality and low-cost phone connections
- Skype
- The ability to download and upload unlimited data at ultra-fast speeds.

However, we also know that there are many other communities nearby and further afield that are doing what we're doing now, and desperate to get ahead of us in the queue. We need to make sure that Stanton Harcourt and Sutton do not fall down the priority list so must make our 140 target as soon as possible.

So, please, encourage your friends, family and neighbours to sign up without further delay so that we can get the planning phase underway and set a date to break ground and start the installation.
