Stockbury Social Housing

The social housing in Stockbury is administered by Maidstone Borough Council in conjunction with the housing associations that own the social housing in the village.

To be considered for social housing in the village, as and when properties become available, any person who wishes to apply must meet the eligibility qualifications for MBC social housing, be living or working in the village, or otherwise have a connection with Stockbury *and* be registered on the MBC housing register. It takes approx 4 weeks for applications to be processed. Please see the link below:

In addition to being on the MBC register, it is also necessary for persons to be registered on the housing lists for each of the village housing associations that the applicant may wish to apply for.

The story of Jack's life (everyone knew him as John) is represented here by a compilation of thoughts and memories particularly from his daughters Abigail and Helen and also from friends who knew him throughout his long life in Stockbury.

JOHN BLYTH COCKETT 30th August 1931 – 17th June 2021



John was born on 30th August 1931 in Norwood, London. He was the only child of Jack who worked as a barristers' clerk and Emily. In his teens he was educated at Chislehurst and Sidcup County Grammar School for Boys until 1948. Two years later he moved to Stockbury with his parents where his mother ran a café from the house, which was popular with the RAF based at Detling Aerodrome. He would have met some interesting people at this time of his life; many Europeans stayed at the field centre based at Steppes Farm nearby. They came to study our flora and fauna and used the little tea shop round the corner for refreshment.

At twenty one he was called up to do National Service and was with the Royal Engineers until September 1954; for part of that time he was stationed in Malaysia. Apparently before he went he dismantled his motorbike engine, filled the tank with oil and deposited the components inside, ready to be reassembled on his return. Such fore-thought!


Afterwards he undertook a cabinet making course which sparked his interest in a career in design, woodwork and ultimately wrought iron work. He

spent his life perfecting his craft in the forge at his home. He produced many intricate designs for gates, both large and small. For one client he produced complicated drawings for a spiral staircase, which he also forged. Around the village there are bespoke creations of his in the shape of gates, window boxes and also the wrought ironwork, which for years hung over the Harrow Bar and housed the glasses, was forged by him. Another example of his design capabilities and on permanent display is the village sign standing on the green; his legacy which will be part of Stockbury for future years. At his home he built a pergola along the side of the house; it had beautiful curlicues and leaves supporting the roof. His car park gate was in similar style and his front gate was a cobweb. As well as being skilled he was inventive, coming up with solutions to problems he encountered in his workshop. For instance he made a device which enabled him to carve lettering into wood using a template. His wood carvings were many and varied.

John was multi-talented and he put his active mind to writing stories, which he illustrated and using his observations of village life related episodes he had witnessed. Some of these anecdotes were broadcast on local radio in the 1970s.

He did write and illustrate a book but thought his characters might be recognised by villagers so never published.

Add to his many talents Cooking! John's mother who had run the café in the 1950's (it was the only place for miles where you could get an ice cream) had taught him to make cakes and his light, tasty Victoria sponge is legendary amongst his friends.

It is no secret that John was quite eccentric and quirky at times in a gentle way. It meant that his active imagination seemed to have led to perhaps some lapses in concentration. Anyway it tended to make him accident prone! Once he nearly cut his thumb off with an axe and on another occasion, one winter, his magnificent moustache froze to the water tank. There were other instances too, some of which landed him in A&E.

At some point he also taught at Tonbridge College, enjoying the opportunity to pass on his knowledge.

Not until he was forty years old did he meet and marry Brenda. They lived in his family home, raising their three daughters Mary, Abigail and Helen in the lovely rural spot at Beaux Aires. Together they became engaged with village life for the next forty five years, joining clubs such as The Gardeners, The Not so Young Club, the W. I. and the Short Mat Bowls Club. A friend of forty two years recalls when Brenda joined the W.I. and John became a 'W.I. husband'. He supported them in all kinds of ways, whether helping to set up the village hall for harvest suppers, pie lunches or carol concerts and finally clearing up, or supplying his mother's 1950s café crockery for those events. Ever practical he even made a special cupboard for the china and it was placed in the village hall obviating the need to transport the it all on every occasion. He also assisted them in building and painting the staging for their entries into the Kent County Show each year. Many prizes resulted for the W.I. They

often asked him to speak at their meetings keen to take in knowledge of his crafts which he shared with them. cont'd ...





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
John Cockett cont'd ...

Brenda passed away in 2016. In her last few years she sadly suffered with Alzheimer's and dementia. John ensured that she was extremely well cared for walking daily with her in those last years and facing stressful times with equilibrium, love and good humour even when his own wife accused him of kidnapping and the police came to investigate.

John was very committed to Stockbury and the community, involving himself in many aspects of village life, with as much energy and dedication as he applied to his work. In particular he served on the Parish Council for a number of years and was vigilant in protecting the rural aspect of our parish. Early in 1993 he helped with fundraising for a branch of the Hearing Dogs for the Deaf charity, latterly he organised Art classes for villagers, ever happy to pass on his knowledge and also at this stage in his life he loved plenty of company.

Many people remember John's irreverent sense of humour and his ready smile; they knew him as a gentleman, quietly spoken and unassuming. Only in the last couple of years did he experience health issues which ultimately led to him leaving the family home as he could no longer live an independent life safely. It was a great wrench for him. His last year was spent at Leysdown in a residential home where he regaled his carers with stories and continued to draw as best he could.


Many people in Stockbury and elsewhere whose lives John touched, will miss his conversation, banter and cheerful demeanour.

Robert (Bob) Town, RN RM January 1927 - 16th June 2021

The Observer is also sad to learn of the passing of villager Robert Town, known to many as Bob.

Bob was eager to have some of his life story in The Observer and spoke to Mick Bingham about his rich and varied life shortly before he passed away.

Bob was born in January 1927 and lived with his parents Thomas and Mable at Grafty Green near Maidstone. In 1941 at the age of 15, he left Harrietsham School and obtained a job on a local dairy farm.

A short time later, he joined 'E' Company, 29th Mid-Kent Battalion of the Home Guard, working by day on the dairy farm and doing his guard duties at night as was required. Early in March 1944 he decided to join the Royal Marines but was instead enlisted into the Royal Navy and on the 25th March, that same year, Bob, then aged 17, was posted to HMS Royal Arthur at Skegness for process and then onto HMS Ganges for basic training. On completion of his training, he was posted to HMS Sanfoin, a troop landing ship in India, which was ferrying troops from Burma and the Dutch East Indies to invade Malaya (Operation Zipper). During the voyage to Malaya, VJ Day was announced and the troops were instead landed to reoccupy the area.

Bob was then posted to HMS Maenad, a minesweeper that carried out operations in the Malaccan Straights and around the islands of Indonesia.

His next posting was to HMS Theseus, an aircraft carrier and toured Australia, Tasmania and New Zealand before returning home. He was released from the Royal Navy on the 26th February, 1948 and married his wife Theresa in January 1949.

After almost a year at home, he joined the Royal Marines and on earning the coveted green beret was posted to Malaya where he spent two and a half years during the Chinese Terrorist Campaign. He was released on completion of his service in January 1956.

Shortly after leaving the Royal Marines, Bob joined the Kent County Constabulary and after initial training, was posted to Chatham Division, then moved onto Ashford Division where he worked as the Coroner's Officer for the area, later being posted to Bethersden as the Rural Police Officer, serving there until he retired from the Force in 1980.

His last employment was as a porter at Benenden School for Girls, where Princess Anne was a former pupil some year's prior. He once met Prince Philip when he visited Mersham, who quizzed Bob about his marksmanship with firearms when he was part of the security team.

He finally retired at 65 years of age.

Bob was a countryman at heart and until age took its toll on him, enjoyed many a happy day with Jim Mackelden and his band of friends when the shooting season was in full swing.

Bob leaves behind a son, two grandsons, two great grandsons and two great granddaughters. Our thoughts are with his family at this sad time.

A Man Called Ove by Frederik Backman

This is the tale of a grumpy yet loveable man who finds his solitary world turned upside down when a boisterous young family moves in next door. Ove is a curmudgeon. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse but behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So, when one morning a chatty young couple with two young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heart-warming tale of unkempt cats and unexpected friendship, which ultimately will change Ove forever.

The majority of book club members really enjoyed this book, finding it both amusing, thoughtful and sad in places. Words such as "charming", "touching" and "endearing" were used in feedback.

Members liked the way the roles given to the wide range of people and the cat, led to getting to know more about Ove and helping to explore the process of him gradually healing, We felt the author alternated between past and present very well and most people felt that the conclusion was very satisfying.

We gave it 8 out of 10.

CCTV And The Law

Increasingly we are making our homes more secure to prevent burglaries, keep ourselves safe etc. We all know the laws about dogs and alarms but how many of us have really thought about the CCTV systems we have installed (including the latest fad for CCTV doorbells)?

Under the current data protection laws, installing CCTV is not quite as straightforward as you might think. If it only captures images from within the boundary of your property the laws do not apply to you but if you are capturing images of people outside your property there is a lot to think about.

Rather than writing my own interpretation of the guidance from the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO), below is an extract from the ICO website (ico.org.uk/your-data-matters).

What is the law if my CCTV capotes images of people outside my home and garden?

If you are capturing images beyond your property boundary, you should have a clear and justifiable reason for doing so. In particular, you will need to think why you need these images. If asked by an individual or the ICO, you will need to be able to explain your reasons, so you should write them down now. You should also write down why you think capturing the images is more important than invading the privacy of your neighbours and passers-by.

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CCTV Cont'd ...

- Let people know you are using CCTV by putting up signs saying that recording is taking place, and why.
- Ensure you don't capture more footage than you need to achieve your purpose in using the system.
- Ensure the security of the footage you capture in other words, holding it securely and making sure nobody can watch it without good reason.
- Only keep the footage for as long as you need it delete it regularly and when it is no longer needed.
- Ensure the CCTV system is only operated in ways you intend and can't be misused for other reasons. Anyone you share your property with, such as family members who could use the equipment, needs to know the importance of not misusing it.

You also need to make sure you respect the data protection rights of the people whose images you capture. This includes the following things:

- Responding to subject access requests (SARs), if you receive any. Individuals have a right to access the personal data you hold about them, including identifiable images. They can ask you verbally or in writing. You must respond within one month and give them a copy of the data
- Deleting footage of people if they ask you to do so. You should do this within one month. You can refuse to delete it if you specifically need to keep it for a genuine legal dispute in which case you need to tell them this and also tell them they can challenge this in court or complain to the ICO.
- Consider any objection you get now from particular people about capturing their image in the future. Given the nature of CCTV systems, this may be very difficult to do. However, you should again think whether you need to record images beyond your property boundary – particularly if your system is capturing images from a neighbour's home or garden.

There is more guidance on the website, including the steps recommended before installing CCTV and the potential consequences of disregarding the data protection laws. To avoid a potential fine and an awful lot of work responding to data access requests, it's well worth reading ...

Patrik Says ...

Regular readers of this newsletter may be used to the annual August edition, when I task you to do a bit of homework, in the name of democratic consultations. This year is no different but twice as urgent!

Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) is consulting residents on how often they would like to vote for the Borough's councillors.

Currently the Council holds elections 'by thirds' meaning that in three years out of four, one third of seats are up for election. MBC is interested to hear from people as to whether the system should change to 'whole' council elections, which would mean that all seats on the Council would be elected at the same time, once every four years.

Theoretically elections by thirds would be a good democratic tool to hold the authority to account regularly. Practically however, in Maidstone historically we never had sound majorities and therefore elections by thirds will make a weak system even more unstable. Furthermore we are losing 2 months every year to elections and purdah. We can only plan for the next 10 months because we never know who will be in charge next year.

As far as the **North Downs** are concerned, **elections by thirds would be even worse.** The electoral commission is very adamant that if we want to retain elections by thirds, we must have three members per ward in future, in order to get the required number of electors per elected member; the current rural ward of North Downs would have to be split up and sections attached to urban wards. Quite frankly I would think this to be a disastrous decision for our communities and I would not be comfortable in such a new ward.

I've thought for a long time that large **council car-parks**, albeit necessary, are ugly and, quite frankly, a waste of space. What a brilliant idea to float much needed, affordable homes over those parking spaces! MBC envisions just that: put some pre-fab pods on stilts over the King Street car park.

The proposed new homes will consist of a mix of 1 and 2-bed apartments (of which 6 will be offered at social rent). A public consultation around the redevelopment of Maidstone's King Street car park will take place at the Town Hall on Thursday 12 August at 6-8pm. Everyone's invited.

Covid: Looking around town you would think that nobody had ever heard of this dreaded disease. Nice to

experience some normality but beware, latest figures in Kent show that infection rates are going up like a rocket. We haven't seen such rates for months. The epidemic is far from over!!!!! The striking news is however, that hospital admissions are incredibly low, almost close to zero. Most infected are 14-26 year olds. Covid won't go away and we may have to learn to live with it, as we learned to live with the common cold. Please look out for your own safety and your loved ones. Just because hygiene rules are no longer mandatory doesn't mean that they are obsolete.

I hear that in December 2025 the UK's old copper-based analogue telephone network will be switched off, resulting in the withdrawal of all traditional land-line telephone services. You won't lose your phone or number but every business and household in the UK will need to replace their traditional telephone-outlet with an internet based service adapter. Will that mean that our rural communities will finally be connected to the 21st century? There is hope ... watch this space.

And finally, I see that *The Kent County Council (Waiting Restrictions And Street Parking Places) (Variation no. 39) Order 2021* has been advertised in the local paper.

You may remember me telling you that two years ago Maidstone commissioned learned and very well-paid traffic consultants to come up with a solution to reduce congestion and air pollution in Upper Stone Street. Kites were flown about introducing a Congestion Charging Zone at the cost of £5 million, among other harebrained ideas.

At the time your Councillor and writer of this newsletter bamboozled those learned traffic consultants with a strikingly obvious but simple idea, which only a layman in his unprofessional ignorance could ever envisage. I proposed to prohibit stopping along that road.

Well, it was a long time coming but the above (mouthful name) Order will forthwith prohibit waiting at all times [double yellow lines] on both sides for the entire length AND prohibit loading/unloading between 7am and 8pm, on all days [single kerb markings].
