
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• A warm welcome to Dr Tim Bowling & Katie who have moved into Willow House, School Lane. We wish you every happiness in your new home.

#### Village Hall:

1) The village Race Night is scheduled for Friday 12th February – not 13th as incorrectly stated last month: apologies.

2) Role of the Village Hall Committee was discussed - Mrs Thompson is standing down from the committee. The committee's role should be more of an occasional input for particular issues or projects. Future meetings will be held as and when necessary.

3) The cost of re-wiring the heating so that one-hour boost settings are available. The Clerk will obtain a quote.

4) Village Hall Committee are working on a grant application for possible window/glazing replacement and other works – need written support from people/organisations who use the hall, or have used the hall in the past. Please send any information to Sarah Godfrey.

5) A schedule of routine maintenance for the hall is needed.

#### **Roads and Hedges:**

1) Some further works on Halam Hill are still to be completed, including white line painting.

2) Water at the top of Radley Road is still a problem. It has been arranged with Highways to have a meeting on site when it is raining so that the problems can be fully assessed.

3) A further survey of over-grown hedges is to be conducted and discussed at the next meeting.

#### HALAM & DISTRICT WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

When the editor asked me to write something for the Halam News, I thought back over the past year. My highlight was a talk by a lady from the Police Convoy. In the village we have known of this extraordinary group of folk, but perhaps not fully aware of the extent of the work they do. We have our own contact point through Carolyn Todd who works hard for them, and has the privilege of travelling to parts of Africa with the container lorries which they send out, full of goods that improve the lives of remote villagers.

Children there get up early, fetch water and do essential domestic tasks - and all before going to school!. Bicycles are the answer! The Times newspaper had this as their Christmas appeal: discarded bikes are rejuvenated in self-help workshops in Africa.

Another group, based at Southwell Methodist Church, gratefully accepts old tools to repair and ship out in useful packs. Please bear these groups in mind before throwing out such items.

The ladies with the Police Convoys are so inventive: workshops have been set up to teach basic sewing skills - old hand sewing machines are favoured.

When African girls reach puberty lack of sanitary provision debars many from attending school. This can be overcome by making pads and bags in workshops (men must never be allowed to see such items!) A few years ago the W.I. held a 'knicker collection' drive to help this situation.

I feel sure the Police Convoy ladies would be willing to come again perhaps to an open village meeting and we could find out how we might give further practical help through a village initiative. These indomitable ladies are truly inspiring, not least for the trust and friendships they have built up over the years. Nor must we forget the men who make deliveries to Zambia every year.

Deciduous trees have almost all shed their leaves leaving the evergreens to adorn our countryside. Holly is the only true broadleaved native evergreen we have in Britain. It is the 'holy tree' with which we deck our halls at Christmas time. Other native evergreen trees include Yew, Juniper and Scots Pine. There are other evergreens such as Box, but they are really considered as shrubs. If, like me, you are planning to plant a new hedge and you value your native birds and wildlife you should always go for native species as they support wildlife best. - The Ed.

#### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

13th January 2016 at 7.45pm in the Village Hall

<u>Present:</u> Simon Bust, Andrew Paris, Chris Bevans, Glenys Herbert, Janet Simmonds, Carolyn Todd <u>Apologies:</u> Sarah Godfrey

**Devolution:** Mr Tony Roberts from ARENA gave a presentation on a proposal for a Unitary Authority for rural east Nottinghamshire as an alternative to the government's devolution proposal for Notts and Derbys with an elected mayor. For further information see **www.arenainfo.org.uk** 

Under this Unitary Authority there would be scope for parish councils to take greater responsibilities e.g. street cleaning, grass cutting, and more responsibility for Parish planning, subject to a Neighbourhood Plan. Although an interesting proposal, the P.C. expressed some doubts about the desirability (and feasibility) of taking on wider powers and responsibilities. It was agreed to support the general principle of a single authority looking after the rural areas of Notts, rather than a single authority responsible for city, towns and countryside. It was felt this would better represent the interests of rural communities. Further developments in the devolution process will be monitored.

Clerk is to arrange painting of damp areas in hall; any volunteers to help would be appreciated. If a few people could help for a couple of hours every month or so then the hall could be maintained in a better condition. Please contact the Clerk.

The Diamond Jubilee tapestry is to be remounted on the wall with a ventilation gap behind.

It was noted that cars parked in the village hall car park must not obstruct parking for village hall users.

**Roads and Hedges**: 1) Pot holes – some serious holes have opened up again. Information will be sent to Matt Duckworth at C.C. Highways for attention.

2) Gritting – it's unlikely that Radley Road can be gritted, but there is the possibility to divert gritters to cover particular (urgent) issues. 3) Tree on Halam Hill – this was cut down without any consultation or notice to the P.C. County Cllr Jackson reported that Highways are empowered to remove any trees they deem a danger to road-users. 4) 20mph signs – all Notts schools are to have these signs outside the school roads. 5) Road cleaning & pavement condition – there has been a lack of road sweeping in the village; the pavements are slippery as they are dirty and covered in moss. Information is to be sent to Matt Duckworth (County Council Highways) for attention.

6) Water at the top of Radley Road – further information (including video of the water) to be sent to Matt Duckworth at C.C. Highways for attention.

7) Hedges – some pavements are still obstructed by hedges; The Clerk to speak to the householders responsible.

8) St Michael's Close – cars are being parked opposite the entrance to St Michael's Close and close to the junction on Radley Road. This is making it very hard for residents to exit St Michael's Close safely – please park more considerately.

9) Footpath past Machin's Farm – this is very muddy especially at the top where it is virtually impassable. This has been made worse by 4x4 vehicles and trail bikes using the footpath. Andrew Paris to report offroad vehicles to the local Beat Officer.

#### **Open Meeting:**

1) The Queen's 90th birthday – 21 April 2016 – this could be a village celebration with a beacon to be lit and perhaps an event in the village hall. To be discussed further at next meeting. Those interested in helping to organise should contact the P.C.

2) Dates for future P.C. meetings – agreed to hold on the second Thursday of each month at 7.30pm.

#### Planning Decision

Appledale, Radley Road: first floor extension to form bathroom, plus conservatory to rear – planning approval granted by N&S District Council.

Finance: 1) Agreed to pay village hall fire check.

2)\_Precept – agreed to leave the precept unchanged at £7,500 for the financial year 2016/17.

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#### JOHN HENRY BECKETT (1942 - 2015



John was born in Southwell on the 24<sup>th</sup> June 1843, the middle child of three children. He attended the National School and then Edward Cludd in Southwell. He went on to become an apprentice joiner at his uncle's firm in Southwell. He gained his qualifications and worked in Civil

Engineering, but always returned to joinery.

John met Gwen when they were both aged 17. They were married, both aged 21, in December 1963 and moved into their first house, Number 4 Radley Terrace, Halam. Later they purchased number 5 and eventually sold both properties to move to Annesley House on the Turnpike in December 1975.

John and Gwen had one daughter, Tracey who married Neil in 1991 and he was delighted to become a granddad to Penelope (Penny) in 2008.

John was very sociable and was a member of the local dominoes team, primarily for the Waggon & Horses, but latterly played for the Old Reindeer at Edingley. John enjoyed strategic games such as chess, logic puzzles, and spent a lot of his time in his garden growing fruit and vegetables. He loved to be outdoors working in the sunshine.

John was a true gentleman who quietly helped those around him. He retired in 2008 at the age of 66, but did not stop working; he set about extending Annesley House single-handedly. He dug out the foundations by hand, and ingeniously planned every detail. He made all the internal fittings, doors, skirting board himself - a real testament to his craftsmanship.

Sadly John died on 13 December aged 73, the day before his 52<sup>nd</sup> wedding anniversary and is greatly missed by his family and friends.

Village Hall: 1) The village Race Night has been cancelled due to poor ticket sales. 2) Chris Bevans will investigate a replacement heater or heaters for the hall. 3)\_Waiting to hear about the grant applications made in December.

<u>Village Website:</u> Work has started on this. Mr Bevans will investigate the possibility of putting the Millennium Photos on the site – there may be copyright/permissions issues. The implications regarding liabilities is also to be investigated; Mr Bevans to contact NALC. Further work and the integration with the current www.halam.org.uk site will continue.

<u>Roads and Hedges:</u> Pot holes – Holme Lane is much better, but the surface on Halam Hill is very bad. The more residents that report this to the County Council the more likely it is that it will be repaired. The County Council may be contacted via their website, or phoned on 0300 500 80 80

<u>Water at the top of Radley Road</u> – a meeting with Matt Duckworth (C.C. Highways) has been arranged. <u>Hedges</u> – some pavements are still obstructed by hedges. The County Council will now contact the householders concerned.

Fly-tipping Gray Lane – cleared by District Council

<u>Footpaths</u> – Gray Lane and the top of the footpath at Machins are in very poor condition. Little can be done regarding Gray Lane as it is technically a public highway. The police have been out regarding 4X4 vehicles and motorbikes churning up the footpath between Machins Farm and New Hall Lane

<u>Parking on Radley Road</u> – some vehicles are still causing issues for residents of St Michael's Close. Please **do not park by the junction** of St Michael's Close/Radley Road **or opposite the road junction** 

<u>Open Meeting</u>: 1) HM The Queen's 90th birthday – 21st April 2016 – this could be a village celebration with a beacon being lit and perhaps an event in the village hall – village tea, or barbeque. Anyone interested in helping to organise such an event(s) should contact the parish council.

There is also a "Clean for the Queen" litter pick on the weekend 4 - 6 March.

It was suggested that a village tea or fete could be held in June to mark the Queen's official birthday (12th June)

2) Break-ins – there has been a spate of thefts from cars in the Southwell area, and also house burglaries with access being gained through rear patio doors. If you see anything unusual or suspicious you should report it on 101, but if you think a crime is in progress then call 999.

<u>Structure</u>: governance and management: All those who attend our services or live in the parish are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll of the church and stand for election to the PCC. Our Annual meeting will be held in Church on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30 and all are welcome to attend.

<u>Financial Review</u>: In 2015 total receipts were £20,672 of which £15,199 was voluntary donations, £2,693 from gift aid and £2.780 from other receipts. Our thanks to all who supported the promise programme held in 2015. Without voluntary donations we could not continue the work of the Church in Halam. Total expenditure of £19,465 was spent to provide the Christian ministry from St Michael's Church, including the contribution to the diocesan parish share that largely provides the stipends and housing for the clergy. The net result for the year was an excess of receipts over payments of £1,207, which is a welcome result after the previous two deficit years.



#### **NATURE NOTES: Violets**

In Halam the white sweet violet can be very commonly found growing.

The sweet violet has a romantic history: the ancient Greeks made perfume from them; the Romans made wine; ancient Britons used them in cosmetics. Violets represent the idea of constancy in love.

#### David Stubbs (7 September 1948 - 1 April 2016)



David was born at Machin's Farm Halam. The countryside and Halam had a deep and enduring meaning for him. Soon after he was born his family moved to Manor Farm Cottage. He attended Halam School and the Magnus Grammar School, Newark.

David worked on farms from a young age. On leaving school he went to work at Turncroft Farm Edingley, and then Coombes Farm, Farnsfield. He left farming and worked for North Sea Gas Pipes at Swinderby; David met Diane at the age of 18 and when they married and had a family this job gave him better means to support them. However he was soon drawn back to farming, and later returned to his beloved Halam to work at Manor House Farm and live in the cottage where he stayed until a year ago. When Manor Farm was sold he worked at Southwell Crop Sprayers, then Staythorpe Power Station before his final job as Pest Control Officer and Dog Warden at Newark District Council.

His life was, in the truest sense, a countryside life: he loved fishing and shooting and working on his allotments; he loved to pass on his knowledge to other people and was always very patient when showing young people how to do things.

Sadly for David he had a troubled life. There was family illness and he had his own health problems. He was devastated to leave Halam but tried to build a new life in Mansfield. He died peacefully in hospital.

David loved country music and shared this love with his family who have happy memories of listening with him. He came to church in country style on a trailer pulled by a tractor, was carried in to the sound of birdsong, and went out to 'Love is like a butterfly' by the queen of Country music, Dolly Parton.

Nora had been a resident of Halam for over 40 years, 35 of which had been happily spent at St Michael's Close where she had many different neighbours over the years, a number of whom she had befriended. #### Matters Arising: Water Pressure: since work on the new pipeline, some villagers have experienced a drop in water pressure. Please report problems to the P.C. so that this can be investigated.

Chairman's Report: Simon Bust reported that the P.C. was elected May 2015; fewer candidates than places meant all councillors continued in their posts. Carolyn Todd was co-opted to fill the vacancy. Meetings have been held monthly over the past year, and district & county councillors regularly attended. #### ASPECTS OF HALAM

#### The Mediaeval Dovecote

There are several dovecotes in Halam, relics of a bygone age when many landowners had them to supply fresh meat as an alternative to salted meat. It is estimated that at one time there were 25,000 dovecotes in England and Scotland with an average of 500 birds in each.

Perhaps the best-known local dovecote is situated to the rear of Halam House. It is thought that this barnlike structure was built in Tudor times. The brick walls are lined from floor to ceiling with 1200 nesting places and originally there was a central pole to which was fixed a revolving frame and ladder that enabled the keeper to reach any point along the walls. The doves were caught by stretching a net across the doorway on the west side of the building now replaced by a window. The brickwork string course around the outside was to deter rats from climbing up the walls.

On 23 April 1927 a Mr J Whitaker FZS visited Halam and was shown the dovecote by Mr H Rickett senior (Patrick's grandfather). An account of Mr Whitaker's visit and a poem about the dovecote appears in his book entitled: "The Mediaeval Dovecotes in Nottinghamshire". - **Tony Hallam**
