

# **Lockdown in Culworth**

Lockdown has forced us to spend much more time in Culworth than many of us ever expected to. This period of enforced isolation will doubtless have proved difficult, particularly for those mandated to remain indoors and entertained solely by the increasingly dreary diatribe of daytime television. However, this time has also allowed for a period of reflection on what are the most essential things in our lives as well as perhaps finally get on top of those nagging items on the "To do" list. Plus without the demands of school runs and commutes, the flow of traffic through the village has dropped dramatically as well as fewer planes spotted flying overhead. Add in the lockdown coinciding with weeks of fine spring weather and the birds seem to be singing louder than ever to celebrate this renewed appreciation of nature. By now the bulk of our summer migrants have arrived from foreign climes, with the swallows and house martins returning to old haunts.

The fabulous weather has also provided the perfect encouragement to garden with the early weeks of lockdown supported by deliveries from local garden centres until they reopened earlier this month. Frustratingly for allotment holders, lots of that hard work has gone to waste with Monday's sharp frost causing the loss of the bulk of carefully tendered vegetables.

In the daily exercise, footpaths and bridleways have been much used allowing residents to explore unknown parts of the village. These walks have also provided the opportunity to meet other residents, at the approved social distance of course. The boom in cycling has been further energised in the last few weeks with many people rustling around at the back of sheds and garages to dust down bicycles that haven't seen the light of day in years. Culworth's own Catherine Ruffley of British Cycling, reminds me that cycles need annual service checks just like our cars, so do consider getting your steed checked over to ensure it is actually "trusty" after all.

The Northamptonshire air of Culworth is far cleaner than the London smog many of our residents flock to

in "normal times" with the lichen on the gravestones proof of this. Equally the wide-open spaces that surround the village ensure there is plenty of space for us to walk, run, cycle or ride without bumping into other people. Have you walked round Berry Hill Close admiring the site of Culworth Castle or noted the splendid long view from the church overlooking the valley, or from the allotments towards Eydon? Getting out of the house daily for some form of exercise is essential for both the physical and mental health benefits it provides.

Spring is of course the time of new arrivals and Culworth has been no different with four new families arriving since early March to the village. Welcome to you all.

The majority of shops may be closed but in Culworth the wonderful Mumfords remain open, working long hours to supply as much of our needs as possible and delivering groceries to many. Who thought there would be queues outside their shop extending to the other side of the road to provide safe distances?

Forge Coffee has been repurposed to be a centre point for gardening deliveries and offers a weekly order collection service for fruit and vegetables, bread, cheese, milk, yogurt and seasonal supplies all locally sourced.

John postman and his colleagues deliver our mail faithfully. An enormous amount of delivery vehicles tour the village daily with unnumbered houses making life difficult to find the property. Do we all know the names of the houses to guide them?

Milk and More and newsagents from Woodford Halse and Nick Smith with reliable Margaret delivering papers have kept us in the written news with the plethora of quizzes and puzzles and our favourite magazines to keep our brains going. Unlike many districts, SNC has maintained weekly bin collections.

Life has undoubtedly been more challenging and difficult in the last few weeks but one thing remains clear that Culworth offers much to be proud of so let's ensure we keep working together to support and protect those local things we've valued more dearly than ever.

## **VE day in Culworth**



# **Village Hall Report**

(as would have been presented at the Annual Parish Assembly)

At the AGM on 20<sup>th</sup> November last year, all of the representatives and trustees agreed to stand again. The Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary were reelected. Kirsty Hawkins joined the Committee.

Michelle Koster resigned her position on the Committee on 14<sup>th</sup> May 2019 as representative of the Parish Council due to time constraints. There being no Parish Council representative, Martin Rowling took on the role for the time being.

Since the last Parish Assembly work has continued on the new community building project. SNC granted planning permission in December 2019 and the CHFT is now focusing on finding the necessary funding.

The Village Hall Committee has been trying to fix a date to hold the Public Meeting to gain village consent to sell the current Village Hall site conditional on the new building being finished and operational. However, this has been put on hold due to the outbreak of the Coronavirus and the restrictions imposed on gatherings.

At the beginning of this year we updated all of our policies – Risk Assessment, Health & Safety Policy, Equal Opportunity Policy and a Vulnerable Persons Policy was set up.

Regular fixtures such as film nights, coffee and chat, pilates, circle dancing, Tai Chi, Snappers Photography Club and Village café have contributed valuable funds to the upkeep of the Hall. They are also a way of getting people together. Jenny Howse organised two Frugal lunches in March and April. The March lunch went ahead raising approx. £140 of valuable funds for Banbury Food Bank. The April lunch was cancelled. She also organised a Lent quiz which raised approx. £120 which was split between the Church and Village Hall.

There was no Village Fete in 2019 but plans are in motion for one to be held this year on 13<sup>th</sup> September in conjunction with the Fun Run organised by Rupert Rowling.

The Committee agreed not to increase the hiring rates for the Hall this year. The Hall remains a popular, wellappointed venue and an asset to the community.

The occurrence of the Coronavirus in the last few months has meant that all activities in the Hall have been cancelled until further notice. This will inevitably impact on the income for the Hall and on everyone's life, but we sincerely hope that we can reinstate the classes and social gatherings in the not too distant future.

# CHFT New Recreational and Community Facility Progress Update, 18<sup>th</sup> May, 2020

Not much has changed since our last update in April. We continue to look beyond the Coronavirus pandemic and our efforts remain focused on fund raising. The difficult economic situation has led to many potential sources of funds closing their doors in the short term. Our initial Expression of Interest to the Lottery Fund was not successful, although they have not ruled out helping us in the future.

We will be submitting our third application to SNC for a grant, this time for the smaller sum of £150k, by the end of May. The date of the next SNC Grants Panel meeting has not yet been fixed. We also are continuing to work on our application to Sports England for £150k, which is likely to be submitted around the end of July. We also plan to submit an application to The London Marathon in the summer.

The VHT have agreed to serve the necessary notices and hold the public meeting, to agree to the sale of the existing village hall site, as soon as practically possible, in the context of the Coronavirus pandemic. A positive result will demonstrate continued support from villagers for the project.

This is an exciting one-off opportunity for the village to get a new community and recreational facility, that will be able to provide an extended range of recreational, social and sporting activities, and will serve current and future generations.

Community facilities in rural areas are likely to become increasingly important, post the Coronavirus pandemic, for the provision of essential services. Thank you once again; your wholehearted support for this project is essential for us to get this done. We will keep you updated.

I am a jewellery designer, and the founder and owner of Ammo Social Enterprise, Cambodia. Working primarily in social business development, I am a design consultant for local artisans, International NGO's and commercial clients. I am passionate about good design, ethical fashion and sharing Cambodian craftsmanship with the world!

My early inspirations in life came from my father Malcolm Green, who was a silversmith and designer, and part of the team at Canons Ashby, Northamptonshire that made Prince Charles coronation crown. My childhood was also filled with creative projects and gallery visits with my late mother Valerie Whitaker. At Chenderit School, Mr Childs and other design teachers really inspired my inquisitive mind, and I was the most enthusiastic and well behaved (unlike other subjects) in these lessons! I loved screen printing in Textile Design, and creating models in wood and metal in Design Technology. It was here that my journey towards a creative career began, and I am most grateful to Chenderit and Mr.Childs in particular.

After graduating, I gained a place at Cherwell Valley College in Banbury, where I studied Art and Design BTEC. Within the two years of study, I became

fascinated by jewellery techniques and experimenting with different materials. Although quite a wild-child in those years, I was lucky to obtain a place at Manchester Metropolitan University studying a BA HONS in 3-D Design, where I spent many long glorious days in the glassblowing studio, and intense sessions in the metal workshops spinning pewter, and forming in copper and silver.

Following the completion of the three year degree, I exhibited my work in London, and an extremely lucky chance meeting with Oxfordshire Jeweller Lucy Sylvester (also exhibiting in this show), changed my future! For years after, I shared jewellery studios with Lucy, and learnt a great deal under her mentorship. In this time, I also worked as a freelance a co-ordinator for Oxfordshire Artweeks, a large art festival, representing hundreds of artists from a wide range of disciplines.

In 2010, I began travelling South East Asia, and again, a chance meeting with a jewellery designer in Cambodia changed my life once more! Volunteering with her social enterprise training young people how to recycle brass bullets and making traditional Khmer jewellery designs. The talented locals taught me so many techniques and skills in business, that I felt it only right to create more opportunities for the growing population of young, disadvantaged and disabled Cambodians in Siem Reap. In 2013, I set up my own Ammo social enterprise, and funded a purpose built jewellery workshop, offering vocational training and sustainable employment. Since then, we have trained eight young Cambodians to become jewellers (including three female jewellers). Four of the staff now also have their own collections of jewellery, selling locally and internationally.

The pieces in this show are a collaborative project between Madeline and the Ammo team, and an esteemed Cambodian wood carver named CHHAY Saron. The feminine face of DEVA, and more masculine ASURA are to represent the duality of good and evil, often displayed in relief carvings in the Angkorian Temples, and in Hindu mythology. The concept behind the work bears additional depth with Sarons background as a soldier. The bullets that adorn the pieces also represent both the troubles of the past, but also of revival and new opportunities that are possible for the next generation of Cambodians.

My jewellers and managers are working towards selfsustainability, so we are always looking for support, both to buy tools and equipment for them to set up their own businesses, and to provide them with training and travel opportunities. # **Brackley Community Hospital**

As the season of Annual Parish Meetings was approaching, I have to admit that I was very much looking forward to visiting so many of our local villages whose residents are patients of one of the two Brackley GP surgeries. I had intended to show the plans for the new Community Hospital and update you on the progress with fund-raising towards those items which are "over and above" standard NHS issue but which will help to make anybody's time, however short or however long, in the new building an even nicer experience than it might otherwise be.

The building was scheduled to be finished by the end of May with fitting out anticipated to take some four to six weeks after that. Although some work on a limited scale continues at the site, this is dependent on the type of work. If a workman can operate alone or whilst maintaining the necessary social distancing, then the work can proceed – if not, well, you know the answer.

All fund-raising activity has necessarily come to a halt and events are being mothballed to be resurrected, with plans to be finalised, once "normal service is resumed".

So, to update you on the building itself, the Northamptonshire Healthcare Foundation Trust

(better known as the "NHS") will be renting space for consulting rooms for visiting specialists; this will save many local residents trekking into Oxford and Northampton with their accompanying difficulties of heavy traffic and parking. There will also be a physiotherapy unit, podiatry, occupational health, some rooms to be used for wellbeing pursuits and health charities, and there will be a café on the ground floor. The second floor will be home to 16 intermediate care beds: these will be essentially "stepdown" beds. I see these being used quite often if a patient is well enough to be moved from the acute care of one of our larger hospitals but not yet well or able enough to be discharged back to their home. They can also be used for a step-up purpose: building somebody up prior to major surgery, for example. Additionally, they will provide a facility for respite care and for end-of-life palliative care. There will be a family room for visitors to stay if appropriate, and there will be a kitchen and dining-room – all meals will be freshly cooked, a legacy from the old Cottage Hospital which the NHS was determined to continue. There will be a pharmacy on site.

The Brackley Medical Centre (formerly Washington House Surgery and Brackley Health Centre) will be moving, lock, stock and barrel, into the new building. They will have consulting rooms and reception on the ground floor with some administrative functions in rooms on the first floor. Their walk-in clinic facility will continue on this site. Springfield Surgery is remaining at its premises just off Pavillons Way: there are some negotiations ongoing as to whether the walk-in facility may have extended hours at which point it would become available to all patients of both practices (Springfield has its own system while the building is open).

But, rest assured, every NHS facility within the building will be there for any patient of either GP practice – and may even attract more from, for instance, Silverstone and Greens Norton.

Onto the money side, some of the things that we are seeking to contribute towards are:

- A digital state-of-the-art X-ray machine which will give better and faster results, but at a very high cost. This is estimated to cost £165,000 and is our initial target. The NHS will put in an x-ray machine but their funding would allow only a rudimentary model which would 'do the job' – eventually. Public fundraising can ensure something better for all our local residents.
- An ultra-sound scanner at a cost of approximately £40,000. Again, this would save the journeys to other hospitals and free up

- facilities which are going to be seeing increased demand as the housebuilding programmes continue and all our towns grow ever larger.
- Ideally, on the basis that many of the patients will be elderly, relatively infirm and not overly mobile, the NHS would like special, electrically-operated, rise-and-fall, recliner armchairs. These have a great therapeutic benefit alongside the psychological benefit of being out of the bed for long periods of the day. They do not, however, come cheap and cost around £2,500 each once the full specification has been taken into account. One for each room and that's another £40,000 on our list.
- It would be good to have a few, more basic, recliner chairs which could be moved from room to room and would enable a family member or friend to stay overnight with a patient who was near end of life. It is envisaged that these would cost about £1,000 each and that four would be adequate. Peanuts really, in comparison, but another £4,000 nonetheless.
- Finally, we would like to see a television set in each of the 16 rooms. These will not only offer entertainment for the patients but would be Smart TVs so they would have Skype and Facetime facilities enabling families to keep in touch with their loved ones, even if they are unable to travel to and from the hospital. The anticipated cost of one of these sets is £500; it is higher than you would have expected because there is a desire to make them compatible with the NHS Pathway which would ensure confidential discussions to take place remotely between consultant, patient and family. We are therefore looking at £8,000 here. It is important to add that these TV sets will be free to view.

It all stacks up quite alarmingly, but we are doing well so far. We have a thermometer on our website and the figure raised to date as at 10 April is £122,357, so we are three-quarters of the way towards our initial target. This has been boosted by some excellent fundraising events and some very generous personal donations, but principally by a pledge of £95,000 from the Brackley Hospital Trust: this is the charity that was set up in 1991 to run the old Cottage Hospital and it was agreed that their residual funds, after closure, would in due course be used towards equipment for the new Community Hospital.

I had planned a 'sales pitch' for the Annual Parish Meetings. I appreciate that the sums mentioned above can seem quite overwhelming and totally out of reach, especially for a relatively small village. They are difficult to get your head round even in Brackley, which now has a population approaching 17,000. However, I was hoping to reduce it into bite-sized chunks and I was going to ask each village whether they would consider organising one community event within the village with a specific target of raising £500 towards the new hospital. If 16 villages were able to do that, that would purchase all the TV sets in one fell swoop, and I know that several villages already had plans which have had to be put on hold.

I would therefore ask if you could consider taking on this challenge once we are all up and running again and help to make the new Brackley Community Hospital a facility in which we can all take pride, from which we can all benefit and in which we all have a sense of ownership.

The Brackley Community Hospital 2020 Trust is a charity that was set up specially to manage the publicly raised funds. Trustees will be happy to support your fund-raising events in whatever way they can – even if we are only required to offer a presence and answer any questions that may arise.

Your support is greatly appreciated, and I am happy to hear from any of you at any time.
