Farming News

The ongoing dry weather has had a significant impact on our crops, and you will have noticed the lush green fields gradually giving way to senescing crops. As a result of the drought and prolonged high temperatures, we have started the wheat harvest around four weeks earlier than usual.

The spring wheat behind the cricket pitch would normally be harvested during the last week of August, but at the current rate I would not be surprised if we are cutting it before the end of July.

The fields along Five Lanes that have grown winter wheat this year will be planted with rye next season. We have moved away from barley and back to rye, as current forecasts suggest a potential El Niño weather pattern could bring a wetter autumn followed by another hotter summer next year.

Rye is better suited to these conditions and is more tolerant of drought than winter barley.

We have also planted our wild bird seed mixtures around Hankerton and along Five Lanes towards Long Newnton. By the end of August, these areas should be full of colourful flowers, providing an important source of nectar for bees and other pollinating insects. As the flowers set seed, they will also provide valuable food for wild birds throughout the winter months.

Gem Festival

- At the Parish Council (PC) meeting on 2 Jul, a remarkable total of 26 members of the public attended. They were there to express their displeasure at the noise caused by Gem Festival in Charlton Park 12-14 Jun. Seven of them were from neighbouring areas – from Milbourne, Murcott, Burton Hill and Hankerton; this indicated the widespread nature of those considering themselves affected.
- A full record of all complaints may be found in the minutes of that meeting, a draft copy of which can be found on the PC website under the Minutes tab.
- Some also expressed their anger about another noisy event in the Park – a private wedding on 20/21 Jun held under a Temporary Event Notice which allowed loud music to 4am. However apart from 3 complaints this subject wasn't discussed as the main subject was Gem Festival.
- The PC's decision was that the PC Chairman should investigate with other local PC Chairmen whether they felt strongly enough, considering the effect on their residents, to join with Charlton PC to seek a review of Gem's licence. This will form a key part of the **next PC meeting on 10 September** (note date change).
- No-one should under-estimate how significant a licence review is. It is a very serious business and if going down that route we must take time to get it right.

Festivals in Charlton Park in August/September

- iZambesi Festival, 15 August.
 - A Southern African cultural event, one day only, music, food and other cultural events, 10am-11pm with music from 12 midday.
- David's Tent, 28-30 August, now in its 3rd year here.
 - A religious festival, non-stop day and night throughout the 3 days. By nighttime the music is acoustic only – no amplified music.
- 3 one-day music events, Fri/Sat/Sun of one weekend Licence application not seen at time of writing these notes but event being advertised 11-13 September with end times 10pm each day. Believed to be all by 'tribute bands'. Believed to be no camping on-site.

Festival Nearby – Existance – 4-6 September

- Existance Festival was due in June but failed to get some part of their paperwork completed in time. They are now thought to be due 4-6 September.
- They are between Long Newnton and Crudwell so it is possible that you might hear some of it. They finish at 4am Fri and Sat nights, midnight on Sunday.

Help available for heating bills...

Warm and Safe Wiltshire is a free and impartial energy advice service delivered by the Centre for Sustainable Energy. We work with people across Wiltshire who are struggling with cold homes and energy bills they can't afford.



In March, the government announced a £50 million fund to support vulnerable households heated by oil. We are working with Wiltshire Council to help distribute this funding on their behalf through the Crisis and Resilience Fund. The Fund offers:

£350-£700 payment towards the cost of domestic heating oil and tailored energy advice to build household resilience to rising energy costs and energy inefficiency. This tailored advice can include low-cost, easy to implement advice on lowering oil and electricity costs, upgrading to a renewable heating system, lowering other utility bills (such as Water bills) and income maximisation.

This support is available to households who are on a low income or in receipt of

means-tested benefits and meeting one of the following criteria:

- Vulnerability within the household, such as young children (aged 5 and under) or older residents (aged 65 and over)
- A health condition exacerbated by cold homes, such as respiratory or cardiovascular conditions.
- Live in a poorly energy efficient home (EPC rated D or below)

August Thoughts from the Ministry

Coping with the inevitable changes we all face in our lifetime

Whether we welcome them or not, changes come along and affect our lives! Some of the changes are barely discernible, and we take them in our stride easily, whilst others will have a profound, ongoing impact. Changes in our personal relationships, employment (or the lack of it), finances, retirement, moving homes, starting a family, children growing up and leaving home, ageing, bereavement – all these factors play their part in changing our lives, just as the seasons change throughout the year.

God's Word promises that seasons change. When change comes our way, it is helpful to remind ourselves that all seasons will pass. God is still with us, and he will carry us through these changing seasons. Life might change, but God and his Son Jesus never will. Find peace in this promise. He offers peace in the shelter of his wings. The writer of Hebrews states that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Because life is unpredictable, scriptures like Proverbs 3:5-6 encourage us to trust God rather than lean on our own understanding, to help bring peace and direction through our life's transitions and difficulties – particularly those unwelcome changes with which we must come to terms. Our circumstances and people are always changing, but the Scriptures remind us that God never changes, offering a foundation of stability and faithfulness in turbulent times. Joshua 1:9 states 'Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go.'

Wilts Farming Club - Malmesbury Branch.

The last report said we were going to visit the Charlton Park Anaerobic Digester for our June meeting. Unfortunately for us the harvest for the whole crop cereal, which is the 'Fuel' for the digester, came early due to the advanced weather conditions. Understandably Robin Aird, the Estate & Farm Manager, ruled that we wouldn't be able to be on the site whilst that was going on, due to safety concerns. Regrettably, I was unable to find an alternative at short notice and certainly, being 10K miles away, didn't help. We will now go there in the autumn when harvests will not be a consideration.

Our July meeting, which will have happened by the time you read this, will now be a visit to Crapper & Sons on the outskirts of Royal Wootton Bassett. Joseph Crapper gave us a talk in May, about their recycling and landfill business, which with energy



production, is moving into food production in a Growing Dome. I will report on this in the next issue.

Our August meeting will be a talk by our **Roz Savage MP**, on the UK Food Security Policy, something that she is able to inform us about as she is joint Chair of an All Party Parliamentary committee that deals with this. I am hoping that we have a large audience that want to find out more, and maybe have questions to ask our MP. So this is not restricted to just members of the Club, anyone who is interested, you are welcome to attend, please let me know you are coming and want more joining details.

This should be a very interesting meeting, particularly for anyone wanting to know how our food sources can be guaranteed when we are under threat.

Current low uptake has also delayed the draws for May, June and July but these should go ahead in August, following a campaign to increase subscriptions.

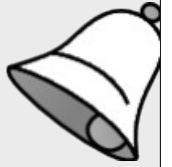

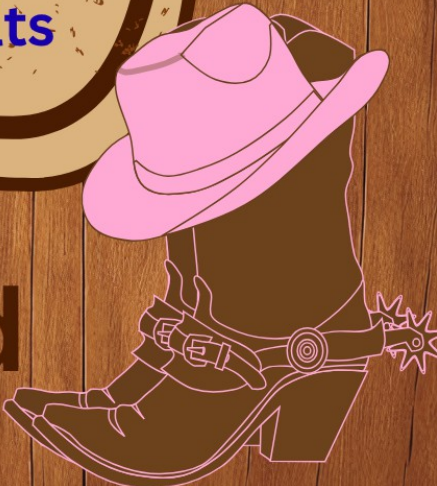

Defibrillator – a reminder – what to do ...

- Someone is unresponsive, not breathing normally. Dial 999 and ask for an ambulance.
- Start CPR – 30 chest compressions, 2 breaths, repeat and keep repeating.
- If you are alone with the casualty – it is far better to do CPR than to go to fetch the defibrillator. However if anyone else is with you or you can shout and call anyone else – send them for the defib.
- You need to understand the 400 metre Rule – when you call 999, the operator's computer will not tell the operator about our defib if your location is further than 400 metres away from the defib, so the 999 operator can't tell you. That doesn't matter – you know where it is so you can go and get it or send someone else to get it.
⇒ **Note – that 400 metre rule – the old 200 metres rule has been extended.**
- The cabinet on the Village Hall outer wall is unlocked. The cabinet in the Charlton Rural area at Elm Farm is locked and all those living there know the number, as does the 999 system.
- Open the defib when it gets to you – it starts operating as soon as you open it. It tells you what to do, with a recorded voice. It cannot do any harm to the casualty – it will not give a shock unless it detects that a shock is needed.
- But tell anyone else in the vicinity to stand back before shocking.
- Keep going with the CPR until the ambulance arrives (or until the casualty starts breathing normally on their own).
